

A cross hipped gable addition was built onto the east wall c. 1934. It has a front-facing, gabled wall dormer and a brick east wall. 43. History and Significance This congregation apparently began as a small Sunday class in 1854. It was formally organized as the German Evangelical Church in 1871 through the efforts of Louis Beatty (ERI-1653) and Theodore Suhr (first resident minister). The first church was built nearby on Division St. (See ERI-1622) in 1873, and the parsonage (see ERI-1549) was constructed next door						
44. Description of Environment and Outbuildings This church is located on a corner lot bounded to the east by its parsonage and to the north by the first German Evangelical Church building (now a residence, ERI-1622). Until it was demolished, c. 1934, the Congregational Church stood on Division St., directly west of this church.

42. (Cont'd.) asphalt shingle; wood shingles on steeple were replaced 1983. Windows all have central lights bounded by colored square panes. There are three window configurations: painted arch, triple-hung sashes; rectangular double-hung sashes (first floor, southwall); rectangular, single-sash (west tower wall). Rectangular, louvred vents in belfry. Concrete steps lead to a glass replacement door in front entrance. Beveled siding was covered by aluminum siding in 1975-78. The interior features an altar base built from the ornate top section of the Congregational Church. (ER-361) organ. (The Congregational Church was once located across Division St.) Material to build the east wall classroom addition was also taken from the dismantled Congregational Church.

on Chapel St., by the congregation in 1879. The present church was built on the corner lot between the parsonage and the first church building in 1893-94. Services were all held in German until the English language was introduced in 1910, soon supplanting the former. When the German Reformed Church (ERI-1581) and the Congregational Churches discontinued services, this church adopted a more ecumenical stance and became known as the Community Church. In 1946, the Evangelical Association merged with the United Brethren Church in Christ. Another merger took place in 1968 when the Evangelical United Brethren Church joined with the Methodist denomination. The name of the church was changed to Zion United Methodist in 1973. This church is a significant part of the island's history in that it represents the development of organized Protestant religion on the island and reflects the change in scale and design priorities between the first German Evangelical church next door and this institution. Organized as a German language congregation, it also provides an interesting contrast to the limestone German Reformed Church (ERI-1581).



43. History and Significance On the 1874 Atlas map a 3 acre parcel and house at this location was listed as owned by "C.S." Court records show that Christian Sternberger purchased a 3 acre tract in Lot 6 from John Dean in 1872. It can, therefore, be assumed that Sternberger built this house c.1872. Christian Sternberger emigrated to the United States from France in 1860 where the Census records

show him on Kelleys Island working as a shoemaker for Henry Olemacher. He was still working at the trade when he married and built this house. However, in 1885 court records find that a saloon was added to property he owned further east on Chapel Street (now ERI-1613). He undoubtedly continued to use the present building as his residence while operating his saloon. The 1896 Atlas map indicates ownership of the residence and lot as "S.K.", but no other information has been found of this ownership. By 1914 the Kelleys Island Directory lists Louis and Emma Smith as owners. They had come to the United States from Germany in 1866 and 1855 respectively. The Smith family were brought to the island from Michigan c.1883 to manage the farm of James Estes (ERI-1656) on the south shore. Two of Smith's sons, George and William, were fishermen, and a daughter, Ida Mae, taught the first through eighth grades at the island's North School.



church and stores they returned to their original neighborhood and built this house. Michael's four sons all followed their father into quarry work. He met his death from a flying stone of a quarry blast. Another quarry worker, Frank Martin lived here for a short time. Frank was the son of John and Harriet Martin and married Mary Hipp, daughter of Leonard and Mary. Henry and Bertha Schlesselman lived here after retirement. Henry, son of German immigrants, William and Mary Schlesselman, lived on the island's East Lake Shore Drive (ERI-1657) c1930's, and was "Boss" of the Northside fishermen that operated from "the twine shanty" (formerly the North Quarry Store, ERI-1648). Christian Kourtz, a quarry worker who had emigrated from Germany in 1883, was also said to have occupied this house c.1920.



Like his father and brothers, Edward also worked for the KIL&T Company. He was a machinist for their West Quarry Roundhouse. In 1904 he built this house for his bride, Betz Myers, raising his family here until the closing of the quarry forced him to leave the island.

The house was then purchased by Howard and Nadine Bickley Brown. The son of Walter and Maimie Brown, Howard helped his family in the operation of the General Store (ERI-1559), and served as the island's Post Master for many years.

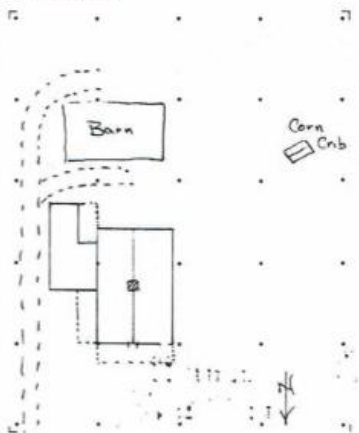

At that time his farm and vineyards extended on both sides of Chapel Street, and he was making some wine, with an annual production of 500 gallons in 1872. Around 1870 he built the first section of this house for storage and for grape processing and the making of wine. A short time later he enlarged this structure to accommodate a growing family, adding a kitchen, pantry, and summer kitchen on the east side, and took up his residency here. After his death, his son, Elmer, continued to operate a successful farm and vineyard. Three of Elmer's children, Karl, Edward and Mary, gained honors in the fields of music, electrical engineering, and childhood education respectively. Elmer sold to Henry and May Marchky who expanded the vineyards, and lived there until their deaths. The house remains in the family, and is presently owned by Helen and Mary Marchky. *Helen Marchky is now retired from her position as principal in the Sandusky school system, & a former mayor of K.I., 1974.





The Schotts added the screened porch on the east side in 1930. In the late 1940's the house was occupied by Mrs. Baring, an actress associated with the John Himmelstein repertory theatre group who was known for her stage name, Bessie Dainty. As the ingenue, she often practiced with this group during the summer in the Town Hall (ERI-1560). Passing through several owners after 1952 it was purchased by the present owners in 1975 and is used as their summer home.





sills and shaped labels visible but hidden beneath the stucco. Hip roofed central tower features paired louvred Gothic arched openings with flanking corner buttresses, double-hung windows treated with shaped labels and lug sills with a similar paired Gothic arch configuration in the upper sash, Gothic arched windows treated as above, front double door with leaded glass transom and flanking three-tiered buttress supports. The church was substantially remodeled in 1915 at which time a central cupola was removed, front-facing eyebrow windows were replaced and the central tower was added, blocking the circular stained glass gable window. Stone used to build the church was taken from the island's north quarry.

church building on the island. Fr. Charles Kueman was the first resident pastor in 1865. By 1871 the congregation consisted of 45 families from a total population of 836. Sometime between 1880 and 1885 the building was enlarged. The congregation doubled by 1914 and the church was completely renovated, enlarged, and re-dedicated in an impressive ceremony headed by the Bishop of Cleveland.

Originally, the altar, communion rail and some benches came from the first mission church in Sandusky upon its demise in 1854. (This mission church was established in 1754 and stood close to the site of the present St. Mary's on Central & Jefferson Aves., Sandusky.) The items were held in

storage for six years until the island church was built. The interior of the church has been remodeled twice since 1950. Although the fine old communion rail was removed during the last remodeling, sections of it can still be seen fronting the baptismal and confessionals.

ed the school known as Marquette Hall, and the former rectory.

The school was built in 1905 at the southeast corner of Woodford and Addison Roads. It operated as a school until about 1930 and was later used as a recreation hall. Just before its demolition in 1956, it was used as a short-lived rat trap factory. The original rectory (ERI-1738) still in use, stands facing Woodford Rd., just east of the site of the former school. When this building was used to house the teaching nuns, a house on Addison Rd. was purchased from the Henry Elfers family for the rectory. This house stood just north of the Frederick Elfers home (ERI-1528), and, except for a porch and more elaborate mill work, was identical to it. The Henry Elfers house burned in 1936.



shoemaker, on the island's east side. By 1870 he had married, bought 3 ac. of land from John Dean on Chapel St., and built the house which is ERI-1550. The saloon, east of his residence, was operated by Robert Barry who we find in 1880 is married to Sternberger's widow, Caroline. January Coutcher purchased the building c1891. Although not known for a fact, it could be presumed that he continued to operate it as a saloon before building his large saloon on the Steam Boat Dock (ERI-1628) in 1894. It was next used as a dwelling by Harold and Catherine Dwell before being sold to Katherine Schlumbohm, widow of quarry worker Frederick Schlumbohm, in 1922. Kate worked as a grape tier for Henry Marchky (ERI-1554), augmenting this income with sales of berries and vegetables from her large garden. Oral tradition indicates that it was Mrs. Schlumbohm who added the partitions that converted the saloon to a dwelling.
