

42. Further Description of Important Features (Continue on reverse if necessary) The basic configuration and trim details of this house are almost identical to the house next door (ERI-1569). Both, built by Mr. Godfried Schock, are the only Tudor style houses on the island. The facade of this side-gabled building is dominated by a steeply pitched central dormer, an eave-wall brick chimney, and an enclosed hip-roofed porch. The porch is supported by coursed rubble limestone columns. Windows are casement type and feature dressed		28. No. of Stories 1 1/2		
43. History and Significance This house was built of local glacial erratics by Godfried Schock in 1936. The owner and builder received the land on which the house sits as payment for the construction of an identical house immediately to the south for William C. Schlesselman (ERI-1569). (A) The initial structure is the building's main block and consists of a front-gabled, 3-bay facade with 2 side bays and a rubble limestone foundation. The moderately pitched roof has a central brick chimney and is set-off by wide, overhanging eaves with pronounced cornice returns. Windows are all 2/2 with louvered shutters and are capped by triangular pediments decorated with a		
43. History and Significance This house was built in 1876 by Henry Trieschman. Born in 1843, Mr. Trieschman and his wife, Katherine, had emigrated from Hesse, Germany, to Sandusky, Ohio, and, with his brother, John, entered the butcher business. Henry and Katherine came to Kelleys Island a short time later, for the 1870 census shows Henry and Katherine and their 6 month old son, Albert, living in the home of Jake Bay (ERI-357), and working as a butcher. 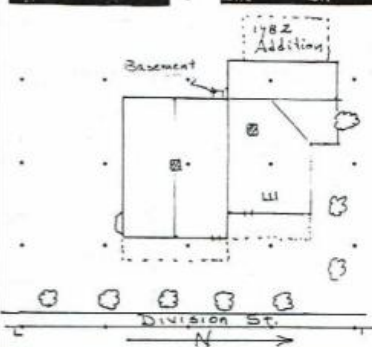

Division Street (ERI-1563) was already in place by 1874, but it is not clear whether this was already a part of the Huntington store complex (ERI-1562) or was added by Mr. Trieschman. The Trieschmans lived with Jake Hay until this house was built in 1876. Henry operated his own slaughter house on 35 a. of land on Monaghan Rd. which he purchased from Michael Hughes. Here he grazed his cattle which he brought from the mainland each year, either by boat or over the ice, until they were ready for slaughter. Later he purchased the remaining 35 acres of the Hughes farm to the south. This parcel contained the Hughes homestead which he used to house his employees who worked with the cattle and at the slaughter house. In addition to his meat business, Mr. Trieschman also owned 12 acres of vineyards, and was one of the organizers of the Sweet Valley Wine Co. (ERI-1618), and in 1887 became its president. In addition to his business activities, he was active in village affairs, serving as Township Trustee, and member of the School Board. His family of 7 children were also a vital part of the community. Henry, Jr. married Sarah Pringnitz (ERI-1636), built his own home on Woodford Rd. (ERI-1747), and carried on his father's business after Henry Sr's death. His daughter, Clara, married Robert L. Moysey, and served as her father's bookkeeper. Elda and Wesley, children of Henry, Jr., were the third generation to operate the meatmarket.

42. scroll emblem. Other trim features include plain frieze, end, and water table boards. Additions and alterations include a 5-sided bay on the south eave wall. It has a shed roof and ashlar foundation and is trimmed with floral brackets & pendants, and set upon a paneled base. The original block & panel columns of the front, shed-roofed porch have been replaced by wrought iron. (B) This section features a truncated hip roof with central brick chimney and a rubble limestone foundation. The street facade consists of 2 bays and has a gabled dormer in the center of the hipped gable. The dormer has two 1/1 windows and its gable end is trimmed with undulating board siding. Windows in this section are all 2/2

And except for a different window pediment emblem on the north side, this section has the same trim and porch features as section (A). (C) A third roofline dimension is created by this section. It features a steeply gabled roof with the same frieze boards and cornice returns described for section (A). Unlike the other two sections, however, this addition is built upon a coursed ashlar foundation. Windows are 2/2 and, on the east elevation, are trimmed as described for section (B); windows on west elevation are not trimmed. (D) This is a 1982, 1-story gabled addition used as kitchen space.

The interior floor plan and trim features are predominantly intact. Remodeling for restaurant use has had minor impact.

42. (Cont'd) front facade features a recessed central glazed door. Another door that leads directly to the second floor. is located in the east corner of the south eave wall. Windows are double-sash replacement types with rusticated lintels and rusticated lug sills. The front windows and door are shuttered. A frame, single-story, shed-roof addition has been built onto the west wall.


According to one source, a second floor was added to the original structure. This would explain a number of unusual architectural and structural features such as the separate entrances, a difference in the course of the stone between first and second floors.

43. (Cont'd.)

was afforded by separate entrances. After the construction of Estes School (ERI-1610) and the consolidation of all the other schools, this building was converted to a residence. One of many of the early families that occupied this dwelling was M.B. Meyers. In the mid 1940's Michael and Iola Riedy bought it, retaining ownership to the present day. Michael was the son of Henry and Anna Riedy whose family history dates to the 1850's when Michael's grandfather, Paulin Riedy, came to the island with Henry Lange (ERI-1644). *After the death of her husband, Iola Riedy, a professional librarian, installed a station of the Sandusky Public Library in a small wing she added to the southwest. The library served islanders and summer visitors until 1985 when, upon Mrs. Riedy's retirement, it was moved to the basement of Estes School.

*Unlike his father and grandfather before him who were grape growers, Michael and his brother, Eugene were fishermen. Gill netters, they worked from the island's south shore, owning 2 boats, the ReneDeen & the Pal built by Arthur Beatty.





Census Records of 1900 and 1910 seem to bear this out. This house either burned or was razed. It is possible, as so often occurred, that Mr. Meyers used this site or foundation when he moved the house to the property on which he had built his auto service station.



munity, and was the first mayor of the incorporated village of Kelleys Island in 1887. The next known owner, indicated by the 1914 Directory of KI, was Mrs. John Koster who rented it to January (aka John) Coutchar. Coutchar was a saloon keeper who came to the island c1891, probably operating his first saloon on Chapel Street in the saloon built by C. Sternberger (ERI-1613). In 1894 he built a large 2 story new saloon on the Steam Boat Dock (ERI-1628). Active in community affairs, he served 3 terms on the Village Council, designed a new and efficient ice boat used by the Island Transit Co., and played trap drums in the island band. After his saloon burned in 1915, he managed the Kelley Island Dock and Steam Boat Co. for a short time. When Joseph Matsuo purchased the house in 1924, it was again being used for the home and office of the island doctor. Joseph had come to the island in 1916 to work in the quarry where he was injured in an accident. He continued to rent the house to doctors until c.1928, several years after his marriage to Mary Tomko, and 1 year after he had purchased "The Lodge" (ERI-1562). Joseph's son, Russell, now lives here with his family, continuing to operate The Lodge, now known as Matsuo's Bar. Russell's wife, Beatrice, is the daughter of Florence and Allen Mc-Killips (ERI-1583). A second son, Eugene, married Emma Jane Seeholzer, great grand daughter of Henry Lange (ERI-1644) whose home they retain as a vacation residence.



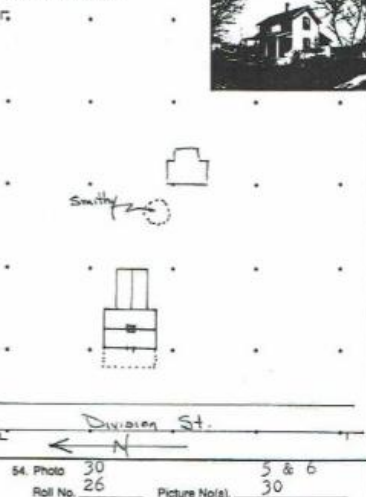



Edward, born on the island in 1858, was the son of Samuel and Bridget Bauman, who emigrated from Ireland in 1854 and settled on the island's east side (ERI-1635) as farmers and grape growers. Before his death, Edward helped on his father's farm. Various members of this family lived in the present house including a sister & brother, John, who died here in 1948. Some time after the house was built, a blacksmith shop was erected southeast of the house. It was considered the "village smithy" and was operated by several different smiths. The most well-known of these was Herbert Pringnitz, who was born on the island in 1883, and lived in the house of his parents, Henry and Elizabeth Pringnitz (ERI-1636) on the east side. Another occupant of the 1930's and 40's was Karl Miller who rented here before buying the Willaim Bauman house (ERI-1594). Born on the island, 1891, to Adam and Margaret Miller, he was a shovel operator for the KIL&T Co.



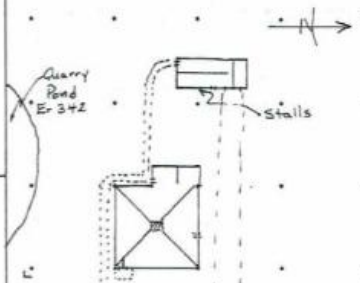

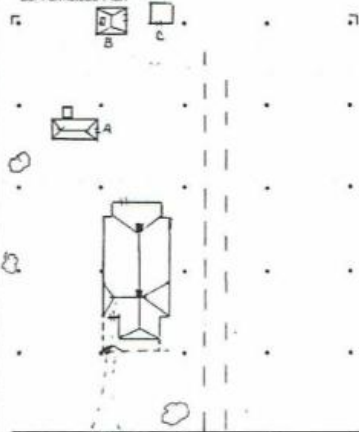

in 1855 and was a sailor on the lakes.

By oral tradition it was known in the 1930's as the Weller house and is said to have been the only house in the neighborhood that seemed to be constantly changing occupancy. There is little information available on the Weller family. It is known that c.1910 the house was owned by the KIL&T Co and was rented to a succession of office and supervisory personnel of the West Quarry. Among these were John Guerin (c.1910), Frank and Georgia Kiefer Neuman, George Cleazy, and Robert and Lydia Schnittker Kurtz (c.1930's).

John Guerin was the son of Irish emigrants, Michael and Honora Guerin, was born in Ireland in 1878 and came with his parents to the United States in 1884. Like his father, John worked for the Lime Company but unlike his father who worked in the field as a derrick operator, worked in the office as a timekeeper/bookkeeper and later as a superintendent. He married Lisa (or Lura) Smith, daughter of Louis and Emma Smith (See ERI-1550). George Cleazy was a timekeeper, Frank Neuman a bookkeeper/timekeeper, and Robert Kurtz, a bookkeeper. He was the son of Christopher and Caroline Kurtz, and was born on the island in 1887.

The next owner was Frederick J. Martin (aka Fritz), son of Frederick and Julia Amanda Martin. He probably purchased the property when the KIL&T Co. was divesting itself of much of its property in the 1940's. Fritz operated the Martin Electric Co. (see ERI-1723) until the coming of the electric co-op and later worked as the island electrician. The present owner purchased the property from the Martin Estate and has used it as occasional rental.



tradition identifies it as the Mischler (aka Miskler) meat market. Census records and an account of a relative do not substantiate this. However, what is known, is that around 1860, Daniel Mischler, a farmer from Baden, Germany, first lived with Henry Olemacher, another shoemaker. By 1870 he was living with his family on the south shore near Julius Kelley (ERI-1686) and W.D. Kelley (ERI-1685). Between 1870 and 1880, he and his wife separated and his wife established a homestead on Ward Rd. (ERI-1674) while Daniel, now a laborer in the Norman Kelley and Co. quarry (ER-339), boarded in Fred Martin's south-side boarding house. Daniel Mischler was living with his daughter, Elizabeth Mischler Lincoln (ERI-1593), just north of the meat market around 1900. This coincides with the operating dates of the market, but his occupation was recorded as a farm laborer. One of the butchers in the meat market was Carl Erne. He came from Switzerland with his wife, Frieda, to the island in 1863 and lived on Huntington Ln. until the encroaching quarry (KIL&T Co.) forced them to move. At that time, he built a house (ERI-1589) in a wooded lot just north of this meat market, his place of employment. Louis Huber, a locomotive and stationary engineer for the KIL&T Co. quarry, purchased the building and converted it to a residence in 1906. His wife, Mina Buess Huber, was the daughter of John and Susan Buess, who were also from Switzerland and lived on the south shore near the Mischlers around 1870. This market in one of
