Born in 1864 to German immigrants, John and Christine Burger (ERI-1611), William began his working career at 14 as a clerk in the General Store (ERI-1559) under Fred Elfers, and became its manager by 1890. He had also started a mortuary business in his former home, and when building this new house in 1897 also added a small building to house his mortuary.

Just when and how he learned the undertakers trade is not certain but it is known that, at age 22 (1886), he left the island for Cleveland remaining there for 4 years. It may have been in this interim that his training was received. By 1890 as indicated by the Census of that year, he was once again on the island and serving as manager of the General Store. It was probable around this time that he converted the small Post Office built by Elfers onto the south wall of the store for his undertaker offic as indicated by the Santorn Insurance map of 1893. This is further supported by the fact that it was in 1890 that Gus Kelley erected his new building on Water St. to house a Post Office and barber shop. (See ERI-1682)

A man of great energy, in 1899 Mr. Burger was a member of the Board of Education, in 1904 he served on the Board of Directors of the K.I. Dock

and Steam Boat Company, and in 1920 he left the store to become manager of the Steam Boat Lock.

It has been said that this house was used as Burger's funeral parlor where bodies were laid out for viewing in the front parlor decorated with two corner cupboards each trimmed with embossed urns. However, it is the concensus of many residents that the more common practice was to have the visitation at home. Undoubtedly both customes were followed depending upon circumstances.

Moore that Frank Hamilton (See ERI-1707) got his first taste of the lakes as a school boy, and islander, Anthony May (See ERI-1739) was his mate for many years before himself becoming a Great Lakes Master. Moore was mate of the Steamer Arrow and Capt. of the schooner, Quincy L. Gilmore, owned in partnership with Erastus Huntington, both of which carried trade goods and passengers for the island. He also captained the scows Peerless and Hercules, carrying stone from the island quarries.

The next known occupant was Oliver "Ollie" Schlesselman and his wife, Jean. Both island born, Ollie was the son of grape growers Henry and Bertha Schlesselman (ERI-1749), and Jean, the daughter of Frank and Ida Reinheimer (ERI-1588). Mr. Schlesselman worked for Lay Brothers Fish Co. from Koster's *Dock (ERI-1650). He and his family left the island during WW II.



packers. The family lived here only a short time then sold to Jerrod (aka Jared) Dwelle, son of Sylvester Dwelle (ERI-1633). Jared was a fisherman with his own boats and crew, and had been living in a house on his father's land on the island's east shore (ERI-1632).

In 1888 Dwelle sold to Edward Ward and moved to Milan, Ohio. It was Mr. Ward who then converted the house to a cottage hotel catering to summer visitors and serving meals. Many of his clientele returned here regularly, summer after summer. Edward Ward was born on Kelleys Island in 1333, the son of Edmond Ward of ERI-1673. He married Jennie Duysing, an island teacher in 1887, and they were both active in community affairs. Mr. Ward was mayor from 1913-1926, and one of the incorporators of the KI Dock and Steam Boat Co. (1904) (ERI-1628). His son, Stewart, born 1889 married Esther Roswurm, daughter of Philip (ERI-), bringing her to his family home. Together, they continued the hotel's operation until its close in 1952 at Esther's death. Under the present ownership the house once again is used as a private residence.

Jesse Woodford (ERI-1751) in 1861, and in 1865 built his first home on Woodford Rd. (See ERI-1743). There he was listed as a grapegrower, and for a brief time, was connected with the Stokes Winery on Lincoln Rd. (ERI-1637). However, he soon went to work for the Norman Kelley Quarry, becoming foreman by 1870. By the time of the building of this imposing new home he was superintendent of the KIL & T Company's south quarry. In addition to his work he was active in the Congregational Church where he was superintendent of the Union Sunday School from 1868-1910.

His daughter, Jennie, born on the island in 1869, was one of the newly emancipated young women who went in to commerce, working as a weigher for the Lime Company. She married Norman Hills, the author of "A History of Kelleys Island", used as a reference for this study. The couple lived on in this house after Mr. Bristol's death. During the years the wills resided here Mr Hills, an avid historian and collector, built a sall museum at the rear of the house to store his collection of historic and pre-historic artifacts he found on the island. Unfortunately, after Fr. Hill's death most of this collection was lost.

Fr. Charles Haley, Fastor of St. Michael's Catholic Church, Kelleys Island, was the next owner, buying the house in the early 1940's.

The next known owner was Fred Hauser who also used it primarily as rental property. The 1914 KI Directory indicates it was rented to a George Winzeler. Fred, the son of Frank Hauser (ERI-1699), was born on KI in 1882, and, like his father, worked in a winery. In 1921 the house was sold to its present owners, Dr. and Mrs. John Towle, who use it as their summer home. Mrs. Towle, the former Ruth Reinheimer, is the daughter of Frank Reinheimer and Ida Mae Smith, both members of old island families. See ERI-1588 and ERI-1550.

The new owner was Peter L. Diffley, son of Peter and Ann Diffley (ERI-1594). Born on Kelleys Island in 1877, Peter L. worked for the Caulkins and later the KIL&T Co. quarries as a cooper. After his marriage to Ella Foley, he and his wife left the island for a brief time to work as a light house keeper or Green Island. It was probably upon his return to Kelleys Island that he bought this house and again went to work for the quarry, reportedly as a foreman.

The enact owners were also quarry employees. Alfred and Katherine Lange Martin were both island born: Alfred in 1904 to Fred and Amanda Martin (ERI-1688) and Katherine to Albert and Elizabeth Lange (ERI-1644). Upon the close of the quarry c. 1938, the Martins left the island, and the house was purchased by Arthur Lange, son of Frederick and Mary Lange (ERI-1600). Married to Emma Hauser, daughter of Frank (ERI-1699), Lange worked as a shipping clerk for the K.I. Wine Co. After prohibition, he left the island, receiving a Ford Dealership in Michigan through his acquaintance with Henry Ford. He retained the present house as a summer home until his death in 1985 when it passed to his nephew, the present owner.

(not extant), and may possibly have have operated John Ranft's saloon there as well. This Water Street house was sold to Frank and Kate Betzenheimer in 1906.

Frank, the son of John and Elizabeth Betzenheimer, was a locomotive engineer for the KIL&T quarry. He and his wife lived here for four years, then sold to Roland Brown in 1910, who in turn sold it to his brother, Lee, in 1916, soon after Lee's marriage to Helen Hauser (See Frank Hauser, ERI-1699). It remained in the Brown family until 1983.

Roland and Lee Brown were sons of early farmer and land owners, Louis and Mary Beatty Brown. Together they meintained their father's firm (ERI-1656) where Roland resided, and operated the Monarch Wine Co. (ERI-1618). The Monarch was the only winery to reopen after prohibition. During prohibition years, it was one of the largest distributors of grape juice in the area. Lee's son tells of his father transporting 50 gal. wooden kegs across the lake in winter, either by sled or by boat, to distribute to Cleveland or Detroit.

However, his plans did not materialize and the family returned to the island within a year. They then built a second house in which to live until the lease was up on their original home.

Information from Mrs. Huntington's autobiography of 1895 points to the certainty that the present house is that second house built c.1846. Its architectural style supports this date. Further, the autobiography describes the house as the one "Simon now lives in"(i.e.1895), and we find that Census records do show Simon Huntington renting this dwelling in 1900, a fact further corroborated by information from a relative.

After the family returned to their first home, this house was then used as rental property. John Hughes (ERI-1576), and possibly Jerry Dean (ERI-1566) in 1864, were among those said to have lived here. In 1887 Simon Huntington, son of Erastus and Elzina Huntington (ERI-1707), and grandson of George and Emaline, married Mary Kastning, daughter of Frederick (ERI-1736), and brought her to this house. Here his two children were born: Erastus in 1889, and Ruth in 1890. During this time he worked as a clerk in one of the island's general stores.

At about the same time the cellar capacity was increased to 80,000 gallons and the firm of Schaedler and Rhein became one of the largest wineries on K.I. In 1905 it was considered one of the most modern and best equipped cellars on the lakes, their production consisted exclusively of still wines: Catawba, Delaware, Ive's Seedling, Sweet Catawba, Fort, Angelica, Sherry and Blackberry wine The company's 28 acre vineyard supplied one-third of the grapes used per year wine was stored in 2,000 gallon casks and sold by jobbing, lots and wholesale all sizes from 5 gallons to the largest barrels. It was one of the five islam wineries still in operation on the eve of Prohibition but both Schaedler and Rhein died while the 18th Amendment was in effect and it sat idle until 1935.

Island in 1843. He quickly made himself useful by helping John Dean build a house for Datus Kelley (later the Island House, ER-349). He married Caroline Kelley, daughter of Datus, in 1844, and acquired the 123 acre farm of Horace Kelley the same year. The couple lived in one of two log houses on the property. His interest in horticulture led him to set out the island's first commercial vineyard in 1846, and by 1854 he constructed the first winery north of Cincinnati (ERI-1706). The commercial success of this venture inspired similar efforts by other islanders and established a trend that would focus the island's development for the next half-century. In 1859, he constructed the large cellar (ERI-1705) that was later rented by the Kelley Island Wine Co. By 1866, the year that the K.I. Wine Company took over the operation of his large cellar, Mr. Carpenter had retired from the wine business, and was devoting his time to his vineyards and orchards.

Through his prominence as a horticulturist, Mr Carpenter was asked by the Grape Growers Association to represent their interests in the Ohio Legislature. He also assisted Mr. F.R. Elliot in organizing the fruit and floral department of the first Ohio State Fair at Cincinnati. Mr. Carpenter's energy was not limited to horticultural efforts. His deep interest in artificial propagation of fish was prominent in inducing the state to experiment in White fish propagation. Thus, when the state decided to establish four experimental White fish hatcheries in 1875, one was constructed at Kelleys Island on Charles Carpenter's property (ER-344). His deep interest in artifi-

several large contracts for U.S. Government piers in Cleveland and elsewhere. His quarry also produced lime, and the building stone for his residence and wine cellars. His quarry workers lived in a log house, presumably the one built by Horace Kelley for his farm workers, and located west of Carpenter's stone house, mentioned by Huntington in his Historic Sketches. Mr. Carpenter retired from the stone business in 1863.

Carpenter's residence was built prior to 1860 and census information suggests it may have been built as early as 1850. This approximate date is further supported by the Grand List of Erie County which sites a house added to the tax valuation on the 1853 books. In 1887 a Dr. Reed rented a room from Mr. Carpenter and set up a dentist's office there. The house remained in the Carpenter family until the death of son, Lester, when much of the land was subdivided, c. 1919, by the next owner, a Mr. Wiese. Few, if any of these lots were sold. In 1957 the house and surrounding acerage was purchased by Howard Navorska, father of the present owner. It was he who established the trailer park and cabins.

The immediate vicinity is dotted with trailers, backed by cottages, all of which face and have access to a small marina that began as Horace Kelley's Dock, and was later known as the Wine Dock. Two vestiges of the Wiese occupancy remain. The one is the brick pillars mentioned above which marked the former planned subdivision. The other is a concrete dock in front of the residence which may be the first dock to be constructed of this material on the island.

The fairly intact southwest wall features window openings treated with plain stone lintels and lug sills. Underneath the round-arched cellar is still in good condition. The walls of the cellar consists of two parallel limestone seams and are topped by a 16'high stone arch. 43. History and Significance By 1859. Charles Carpenter had almost 11 acres of grapes 1 bearing and his harvests had surpassed the capacity of the cellar which he built five years earlier. For his new cellar, Carpenter chose a location in hi quarry where two parallel seams, 85 ft. apart, cut transversely through the lim stone strata. The block stone was removed between these two seams to a depth of 16 feet and hack into the hill 110 feet.



43.(Cont'd) This gave him the side and back walls, as well as the floor of the cellar, all of smooth, solid rock. The front wall was constructed of brick. The roof arch, constructed of stone, commences 7 ft. above the floor and is sprung to a central height of 16 ft. Capacity of the cellar was 200,000 gallons and could accomodate three rows of casks. At the time of its construction, it was the largest cellar, in one room, in the United States. A wine house was constructed over the cellar in 1860 and arranged so that the juice could be conducted from the press vats to any part of the cellar. In 1866, Carpenter retired from the wine business and devoted his time to his vineyard and orchards. The year before the Kelley's Island Wine Co.(ERI-1535) was incorperated they rented Carpenter's cellar and dock for a period of five years, until a larger facility, adjoining this cellar was built.

Mr. Carpentar purchased his 124 acre farm from Horace Kelley in 1844 and the next year set the first commercial vineyard with 46 Isabella and 40 Catawba vines. By 1850 he had set a full acre of grapes and was presented the problem of accomodating a surplus harvest. There is some confusion as to whether Chas. Carpenter or Geo. Huntington pressed the first wine and what the actual volume was of that pressing. The most probable account follows: In 1838, Sumner Knapp buil a log house to live in located just at the head of Horace Kelley's Dock (later known as Carpenter's or Wine Dock). In the same year Horace Kelley built a log house for his laborers on his farm. This building was located a short distance west of Carpenter's house. Both log structures were still standing in 1863 and the later structure probably stood in 1877. In 1845 Chas. Carpenter and his brid occupied a small log house near the Horace Kelley Dock (probably the Sumner Knapp home) and it was there, in 1850, that the first wine from his vineyard was pressed; a fifty gallon cask of Catawba and the same amount of Isabella. In 1850 this wine was presented at the State Fair and Nicholas Longworth, among other Cincinnatians, declared it the best they had tasted. Bolstered by this proclamation, Chas. Carpenter built the first wine cellar north of Cincinnati the following year. By 1859, his wine business had flourished to the point that it necessitated the building of a much larger cellar. The new facility had a storage capacity of 200,000 gallons and was built in part of Carpenter's quarry,northwest of the first winery. Around 1905, this building was converted into a residence was converted into a residence for the hired man, Tony Ott.

his uncle's store, "The Lodge" (ERI-1562), becoming his partner in 1866, and full manager in 1871. Married Elzina Hamilton, daughter of James, in 1863. A man of many facets and great vigor, Yr. Nuntiagton not only ran the then only general store on the island, but maintained a substantial farm and vine-yards; in partnership with Capt. Ort Moore (ERI-1692) owned the schooner, "Gilmour" carrying stone from the island, served as treasurer of Kelleys Isl, and was its Notary for 20 years, was post master from 1872-1885, Deputy Surveyor, U.S Express Agent, Sec'ty-Treas. of Island Cable Co, and organist for the Congregational Church.

In 1897 Mr Huntington sold his business to Titus Hamilton, his brother-inlaw, (ERI-1527) and left the island soon after. Coming under the ownership of the Hamilton; this house was then operated as an inn, managed by Henry & Elizabeth Upp (ERI-1672) and later rented by the season to summer vacationers. By inheritance, the house then passed to Frank Hamilton, son of Titus and Fredrena Relley Hamilton, c. 1940.

Frank Hamilton was born on KI 1892, (only child to be born in the Addison Kelley Mansion, ERI-1645). He met his wife, Katherine Shelby, when she was employed as a bookkeeper for the KIL&T Co's North Office. For many years

Frank Hamilton served as captain of a number of Great Lakes Vessels, and became one of the foremost chroniclers of Great Lakes Marine history. His collection of archival material and ship modles is on file at the Hayes Presidential Center, Freemont, Ohio. He was also an authority on the history of Kelleys Island and his extensive photographic and historic collection has been a major source of information for this study.

It is Capt. Hamilton's grand niece, Lori DeBord, who once again is operating this historic home as an inn.
