

house from George Bristol c. 1872-3 (see ERI-1743). William Henry, born on the island, 1871, helped his father in his vineyards and farm until his marriage to Julia Sheadler (b.1879, KI), daughter of wine maker August and Christine Sheadler (ERI-1654). The young couple made their home for a time with the widowed Christine Sheadler on the island's south shore. Probably soon after his own father's death in 1901, William Henry moved back to the old homestead with his wife in order to help his mother run the farm. It was then, oral tradition indicates, that he built this cottage for Elizabeth. According to the 1910 Census they also took in a number of quarry workers as boarders, but it is not known in which house these men lived.

Like other stone walls on the island (eg., ERI-1664), it is constructed of horizontally laid, tabular limestone slabs. Large and irregularly sized stones were saved for the capping course which consists of parallel pieces stacked on the slant.		26. 43. History and Significance The first stone wall built on the island was constructed on the George Huntington property (ERI-1698) in December, 1856. Many islanders soon followed his example, finding it an efficient way to utilize the ubiquitous limestone slabs that were considered a nuisance in their fields. This was particularly true in the southeastern part of the island known as "New Germany" where so many vineyards were located. Cedar stumps, another ubiquitous mater-		27. 

ial and by-product of field clearing, were also used to construct fences. Stone walls were usually built during the winter months by hired men to keep them busy. This particular wall was probably built, at least in part, by August Schaedler (ERI-1654) c. 1865, to fence-in his pasture land. Other German farmers, recognizing the value of the marginal soil for pastureage, tended their cattle in adjoining lots (eg., L. Beatty, H. Trieschman, H. Hess, and H. Voght). Few stone fences are left on the island because they were scavenged as a ready source of raw material when the bases were laid for paved roads. Like ERI-1644, this stone wall is an important component island's historical landscape.

43. History and Significance The Charles Seesholzer & Son winery was one of a number of small family operated wineries on Kelleys Island. Still wines such as Catauba, Delaware, and red wines were produced at the winery, which operated approximately 1870 to around 1907. The first cellar was located in the Chas. Seesholzer, Sr. house on Woodford Rd. around 1870. Around 1880 a new cellar was built behind the Chas. Seesholzer, Jr. house and it was in operation that had the name Chas. Seesholzer & Son Winery. This cellar had a capacity of 25,000 gallons. Chas. Seesholzer grew grapes (see)

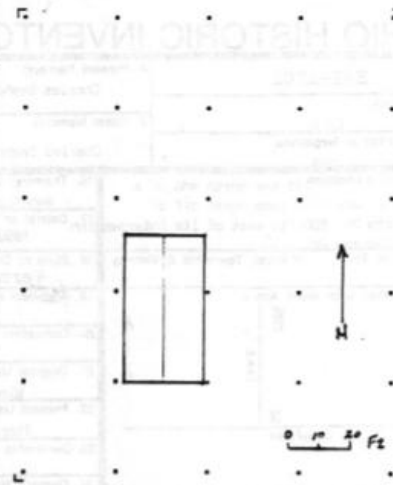



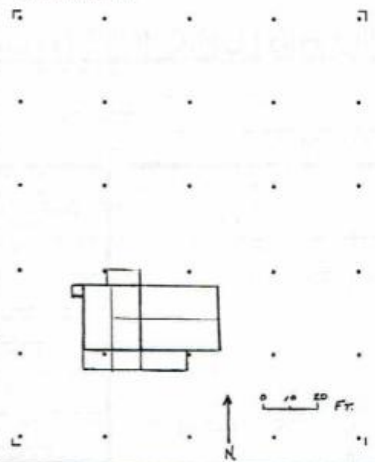

occupy the new rectory was Fr. Charles Wardy who served the island from 1869-1874. During the long pastorate of Fr. Joseph Maerder (1912-32), Franciscan nuns were engaged to staff the catholic school that had been built on the grounds just west of the rectory in 1905 (torn down in 1967). The rectory was given to the nuns for their convent, and the home of Henry Elfers just south on Addison Rd. was purchased for the priests. This house burned in 1936 and the sisters found temporary quarters in the old Jared Dwelle house on Monaghan Rd. (ERI-1660), then a summer retreat for the Franciscan Fathers of Cleveland. At this period the population of the island was declining because of the close of the quarries, resulting in a drop of school enrollment. Financial problems caused the school to be closed and the nuns left the island. This house once again became the rectory, as it remains to date.


the house was built by John May between 1860 and 1865 on 6 ac. of land. John and his wife, Ann, had emigrated from Ireland in 1852, coming to the island soon thereafter. They lived first on Water St. near the Norman Kelley & Co. quarries for whom John worked. By 1865, as indicated by the Nunan Map he had built this home on Woodford Rd. He continued working for the quarry probably until he reached retirement age, but the 1880 Census lists him, at age 60, as a farmer.

His son, Anthony, (born 1859) became a captain on a lake steamer, and in 1917 went with the steamer "Lakeside" to New York. John's younger son, Thomas, (born 1869) followed his father into quarry work, becoming a master mechanic for the KIL&T Co.'s west quarry shop (ER-337). The house was always the homestead for John's children. Daughter Mary and Tom lived on after their father's death, c.1905, and when Tom married Carrie Hipp Haag, widow of Frank Haag (See Hipp ERI-1524), he brought her and her son, Frank, Jr., to this house. Later, the widowed Emma May Hauser also returned to live. It was probably upon his marriage that Tom added the large front wing.



The large, middle addition is sided with beveled boards, except for a section of board-and-batten walls on the east side. the U.S. c.1836, making his way to Kelleys Island via Canada and New York. By 1850 he was living with his wife, Jane, and 5 children on the south shore working as a laborer, probably on the farm of Charles Carpenter, next to whom he appears on the Census listing for that date.

The 1860 Census shows him on Woodford Rd. in a modest home whose value was given as \$880 with 15 of his 18 acres in corn, pigs and cattle. Ten years later, after planting 2 of his acres in grapes, his house and land were valued at \$9000. By 1880 Thomas had died and his widow, aided by their son, Charles (born 1855) was carrying on the farm which Charles later inherited. With his marriage to Elizabeth and his farm and vineyards prospering, Charles added the large front section to his home in 1886, and in 1893 a new barn. Along with maintaining his farm, Charles was also Superintendent of Roads for Dist. # 2.


His son, Charles, Jr. (born 1894) lived on in the house, but with the coming of prohibition he sold off all but 1 ac of his land to the KIL&T Co. and himself worked for the company. With the closing of the quarry he left the island but retained his home as a vacation retreat. In the 1940's he sold to Adne McKillips, one of the "boss" fishermen working for the Lay Brothers Fish Co. at Koster's Dock.


George Knauer, a bachelor, born in 1865, had emigrated from Germany in 1882, and c. 1905-08 was living here with his widowed mother and brother, Leonard, age 36, also unmarried. Both men worked for the KIL&T Co., George as a mason, and Leonard as a laborer. This arrangement lasted a relatively short time for the 1914 Directory finds George living on Division St. with Albert Ranft (ERI-1606), and the house rented to the George Watkins family. Knauer, being a mason, may have been hired to work on the north and south crushers that were being built at this time, and when completed, he would probably have moved on to another job.

George Watkins, also a quarry worker, was the grand son of the James Watkins family that farmed Long Point in the late 1840's.

According to the present owner, another member of the Knauer family returned to the homestead, living here from c.1925 to 1946 when it was purchased by William Perruchon. It was during this latter period that the several additions were made to the rear of the house. William was the son of Max Perruchon (ERI-1731), and worked first for the Lay Bros. Fish Co., then as an independent, owning his own boat, The Roamer. He was one of the last commercial fishermen operating from the island. His wife, Ruth Seeholzer Perruchon, the daughter of Charles Seeholzer (ERI-1702), operated the island's only beauty shop from a small building at the rear of the house, from 1948 to 1977.

house or room on Woodford Rd., and here he probably met his wife, Electa, the daughter of Jesse Woodford (ERI-1751) whom he married in 1861. After service in the Civil War he returned to the island, and by 1870 the Census shows him as a grape grower. (He was later briefly affiliated with the Stokes Winery, (ERI-1637)) However, he soon went to work for the Norman Kelley quarry, c. 1874, becoming foreman and eventually superintendent. Around 1871 he sold this house to Henry Vogt (aka Volght) and rented first the home of his widowed sister-in-law, Angeline Kelley (ERI-1527), then that of William S. Webb (not extant), before building his fine new home (ERI-1694) on Water St. in 1893.

Henry Vogt, born in Switzerland, 1833, was part of the wave of Swiss and German emigres, who, hearing of the growing viticulture industry here, were coming to Northern Ohio and the Erie Islands in the 1850's. The 1860 Census shows Henry living on Kelleys Island with a Jacob Vogt, and by 1870 was married to Swiss born Elizabeth, and living in the Woodford area near the

Bristols. Oral tradition suggests that he first lived on the north side of Woodford Rd., and that the foundations of this earlier house can still be seen along the fire lanes of what is now State property. This is further born out by both the 1874 and 1896 maps of the island.

Around 1880 tax records indicate that extensive improvements were made by Vogt to this present house, and c. 1881 a barn was added to the north property where he had set out additional vineyards.

Some time after Henry's death in 1901, his son, William Henry, moved into his father's house with his wife, Julia Schaedler. In 1905 William Henry then built a small cottage just to the west, traditionally said to have been for his widowed mother. The 1910 Census lists The mother, Elizabeth, as part of the household, but also lists as boarders, eight quarrymen, all of Austro-Slovak birth, indicating that the cottage might first have been for rental. (See ERI-1570)

The next known owner was Fred Schardt who bought both houses, using them as rental property. After Schardt, ownership passed through several hands until purchased by the present owner, Lydia Bechtel, daughter of island fisherman, Nelson Dwell. (See ERI-1584.)
