



At the recent meeting of K.I. Volunteer Fire Department, the following officers were elected:

The Fire Department is encouraging all cottage owners to install fire alarms in their homes. These devices are readily available for a nominal fee at most discount outlets and department stores.

According to Gorchester, the VFD will install free of charge if cottage owners buy their own. They may be purchased on the island directly from the Fire Department and also installed free of charge.

Several professional fire fighters are being contacted to conduct the spring training sessions on the island.

As everyone knows, this is an organization designed to save lives and homes on the island.

It depends entirely upon volunteers, and at the present time, records show that a very small percentage of all home owners on the island are taking part in the operation. This leaves the responsibility of growing summer populations upon a few, and places the burdon unfairly upon these men.

New men and women are needed... The spring meetings will inform you just what is expected, and how you might best serve yourself and the island by becoming actively involved. During the dry hot summer months, grass fire is always a threat, and many cottages are located a long distance from any hydrants. Prompt action on the part of the department is essential if homes and lives are at stake.

Why not make a mental note to contact the fire department when making your initial trip to the island this spring... let them know you are available and then take an active part. Learn the necessary techniques, and feel confident that should an emergency occur, you would know just what is expected of your skills.







He recently announced the completion of the sixth major addition in 30 years to the plant. He was one of the first plants in the area to install a water treatment plant for waste water from the operation.

Inflation has finally hit the fishing licenses. This year, Ohio resident fishermen will pay \$7.75 for the right to fish in Ohio waters This amounts to an increase of \$3.25 over last years fees!

Gil Palmer, manager for Wildlife District Two, said the increase was due to many factors. "There hasn't been an increase in license fees for nearly ten years", he explained. "The additional funds will' be used for purchasing more lands, to educate the younger sportsman, and for implementing several programs that will benefit both the hunt er as well as the fisherman", Palmer continued.

The 1978 fishing licenses will expire the last day of February, and the new licenses are on sale at all regular outlets. So, fishermen, take heed...and make sure you have your new license before venturing out on your next trip.

Warmer temperatures and high winds could cause some deterioration in ice cover on the lake, as well as on inland bodies of water, so if you're planning an outing, be cautious.

Northern Pike, perch and jumbo bluegills are especially likely candida for awards which will be given through the 1979 Fish Ohio Program to honor fine catches. Many large examples were caught through the ice this winter. Some details of the program have not yet been finalized but an attempt is being made to honor more anglers this year than have been recognized in previous years.

Entry forms for hopeful anglers are available from your local county game protector or from the Wildlife District Two Headquarters in Findlay, Ohio.

FISH CHILI (DELICIOUS)

Cook 2 cups sliced onion, 1 c. diced g. pepper and 1 minced clove garl in 2 T butter until onion tender. Stir in 2 T chile powder (less if you prefer) 1 tea salt, ½ tea oregano dash petter. Add 1 can red bean 1 can tomatoes and 1 can tomatoe paste (6 oz). Cover and simmer 15 mi Add 2 pounds fish fillets, cut in chunks. (perch, bluegill, crappie et Cover and simmer till tender (lo-15 min). Six to eight servings. (Good way to utilize fish which have been frozen for some time, but are still good.)

REV. EHRBAR, 65, DIES IN FLORIDA

In Loving Memory...

The Rev. Joseph Ehrbar, 65, Kelleys Island, died Friday, February 16, 1979 in Key Largo, Florida where he had been vacationing.

He had been residing at Kelleys Island for the last 15 years and was on leave from the Catholic diocese.

He owned Sunset View cottage rentals on the island for several years.

He was chairman of the Kelleys Island Planning Commission and served as the village's representative and secretary of the Erie Regional Planning Commission. He was also the village's representative to the Hancock-Wood Electric Coop (REA). He was to have been a delegate to the rural Electrification Administration national convention in Houston, Texas, the week following his death.

He was ordained in Cleveland Catholic Diocese May 26, 1945, and first served at St. Stephens Catholic Church in Cleveland. He also served at parishes in the Akron area and was an assistant at the St. John's Cathedral, Cleveland.

Surviving are two brothers, Edward J. and Albert L., leveland.



The funeral mass was in St. Stephens Catholic Church, 1930 W. 54th St. Cleveland, with the Rev. Bishop James Hickey officiating.

Burial will be in Kelleys Island cemetary.

He was preceded in leath by his parents, Albert E. and Gertrude M. (Biebelhausen) Ehrbar.
