Emmeline Kelley Huntington, one of the daughters of the first Kelleys to purchase land on the island, tells her continuing story. In this, the fifth in a series, Emmeline tells of her transformation from a rough country girl living in "Rockport" or Rocky River, Ohio to a quiet city girl who moves to Kelleys Island.....

In 1863, Charley Anderson, Gen. McCook and their wives came to the Island. Charley sent word by Evie Kelley to me he was on the Island and would be up to see me. I got my best fixings and Grandpa and I went to the Island House to call on him. There were 30 or 40 people sitting in the yard around him laughing fit to kill themselves at Charleys story. We waited for him to get through his story before we spoke to him, and heard a part of it.

He was telling about our trip on the canal. It was a good deal embellished. One thing amused me was that we rolled punkins on the deck of the canal boat. Our trip was made in July, not a very good month for punkins and after a little I asked him if he had not told that story a good many times. He said he had told that story to at least 40,000 people! "By the way, which of you girls did I fall in love with?" (said he before the crowd). If that crowd did not laugh good!

I stayed a year with Aunt Mary and got tamed down from a rough country girl to quite a city girl. As they say, got the hay seed out of my hair. Father had bought the Island and was building a vessel of 40 tons to carry cedar from the island to Cleveland and other ports on the lake.

Our house was full of ship carpenters and all had to work. I got into the traces and went to work, but it was a great change and at first the rough work did not suit me. I had got used to the most refined society there was. Plenty of help, not much to do but get my lessons & go to school.

In a month or two the vessel was ready for service, and I made a trip on here to Cunninghams Island. There was a small wharf to ship cedar from and a log boarding house on the hill. Not 5 acres cleared of timber. No water, but lake water, that was warm enough for dishwater to drink.

I did not stay long, no society, but strangers and workmen. There were five families, Napier, Elethorps, Ferguson, Ellis and another, Lazy good-for-nothing squatters who killed wild hogs to eat and raised a few

vegetables and sold some wood to vessels. I rather stay home with mother. The year I came home from Columbus was the most disagreeable year of my life.

The next winter was better though, father was up to the island nearly all winter and one or two of my brothers. Loretta and I went to some parties, but on the whole it was very dull. Next summer I got used to country life and went to the island more. Capt. Blackler, a well-educated gentleman sailed the Franklin and he paid me a good deal of attention after a short visit at our house. He bought me a pretty riding horse and sent it to me with his compliments.

He stuttered a good deal and was 20 yrs. older than I was. I liked him for he was not over-attentive. That summer I got acquainted with my future husband.

He married while I was in Columbus a ward of my fathers, Angeline Porter. She lived at our house a good deal and Mr. Huntington was a crockery merchant in Cleveland. I went to see Angeline quite often. Our folks had known him while I was in Columbus, and spoke very highly of what a good husband Angeline had etc.

While at thier house, I met a gentleman by the name of Wolcott who asked me very politely to be his for life. He was too old, and I declined. He went to Rock Island on the Mississippi and that was all I heard of him. That summer, 1837, Abram Wright was making my life miserable by his persistent attentions, as usual. I liked all the Wright family...but him.

In the fall of 1836, Mother went to the island to stay all winter and left the farm with brother Julius & wife. Uncle Irad gave me an invitation to stay with them all winter, which I gladly accepted.

Father built a log house on the island where Geo. Kelley afterward lived, and in the spring built a frame house adjoining. I had a lively time that winter. Cousin Horace Kelley took me to several Balls and brother Addison came down from the island and took me to our old home in Rockport.

Capt. Blackler sailed father's vessel in 1836. In the fall, he got caught in the ice near Point Pelee Island and stayed there on the vessel all winter. Next spring, he came over to our island a disgusted man. The winter of 1836 Angeline died leaving her husband a sorry disconsolate man.. I was with them a good deal, thought him good, pleasant, educated and refined. Next summer, after his wife died, he came to the island for a visit, supposing I was engaged to be the wife of Geo. Barnum.

SANTA CLAUS VACATIONS HERE!!

That "Jolly old Elf" made a surprise appearance here on the July 4th weekend. Wearing his traditional red suit and full beard, Santa handed out treats to the youngsters and young-at-heart. He was in reality, Richard Windgate, of Windy's Kamp Kellile. "Windy" has donned the costume for many years during the traditional Christmas holiday and visits hospitals cheering up those who are less fortunate. He arrived at the island dock by boat and delighted many by posing for pictures with a large string of walleye caught by visitors that weekend.

HIGHLIGHTS OF KELLEYS ISLAND VILLAGE COUNCIL MEETING...

A letter of resignation was read from Jim Bugel who is now residing in Florida. Mary Schock was elected to fill the vacant seat.

The airport has been completely re-surfaced. A \$25,000 grant from the State of Ohio financed the project. Norm Crabtree, who heads the Division of Aviation for the state was in charge of this project, according to Kenny Haig, airport supervisor. Stone necessary to complete the job was donated by Erie County. Kenneth Polta, Erie Co. Road Commissioner is thanked for his help in making this job such a success, Haig said.

John Kilko, Fire Chief reported that three fires had been reported; One at the residence of Larry Eaton, out before department arrived, one at the old Hamilton house on the beach (roof fire from burning on beach) and one false alarm. Kilko reported that the pump on the pick up truck is not sufficient. The hand-started motor is difficult for senior citizens on the volunteer department to start. He was asked to bring more details to the finance committee and they will begin procedure to purchase adequate, new equipment.

Planning commissioner, Ken Haig reported that billings should have been received by all airplane owners using the island airfield regularly. Fees range from \$100 per year for single engine craft to \$150.00 per yr. for twin engine craft. In addition, the complete airport ordinance is on the wall of the waiting room. It establishes landing fees at: \$1.00 for one hour, \$2.00 for up to 3 hrs. and \$5.00 for 24 hours. An honor box is provided for deposit of this money. Violation of these fees constitutes a \$100.00 fine plus hourly rate owed.

The land fill is plagued with deposits of large appliances. They do not contain enough metal to justify a contractor coming over to haul them away. The Erie Co. Health Department is investigating the possibility of constructing an incinerator to handle burnable waste. Discussion followed regarding dumping rates. According to Mayor Mike McCune, the island has the lowest rates in Erie Co. Presently they are: \$7.00 per home, \$1,500 for the state park, \$400 the marina and \$40 for individual businesses. Everyone with an electric meter will now be billed for dump usage. Apparently there have been some homes missed in the billing, but now an adequate list has been prepared using itemized customers of the electric co op. New dump fees are expected to be set at a later date, according to the mayor.

Island Council

A financial report was read and discussed for the year. It contained \$97,775 for operating expenses in 1980. In October, revenue sharing will cease to exist, according to the mayor. Kelleys Island has derived a large amount of revenue from this source in the past years, McCune said, and it will leave a real void in the village budget plans.

He is appealing to anyone who has had experience in the area of soliciting grants for village spending to come forth and offer any kind of assistance possible. "I know there is money out there for the asking, but we have to employ someone with the proper credentials or know-how to find out what areas we are eligible for", McCune commented.

A total of \$3,037 was turned in to the village of Kelleys Island from Mayors Court in the month of June.

A public hearing regarding flood insurance for Kelleys Island was set for 7PM Tuesday, August 12 at the town hall.

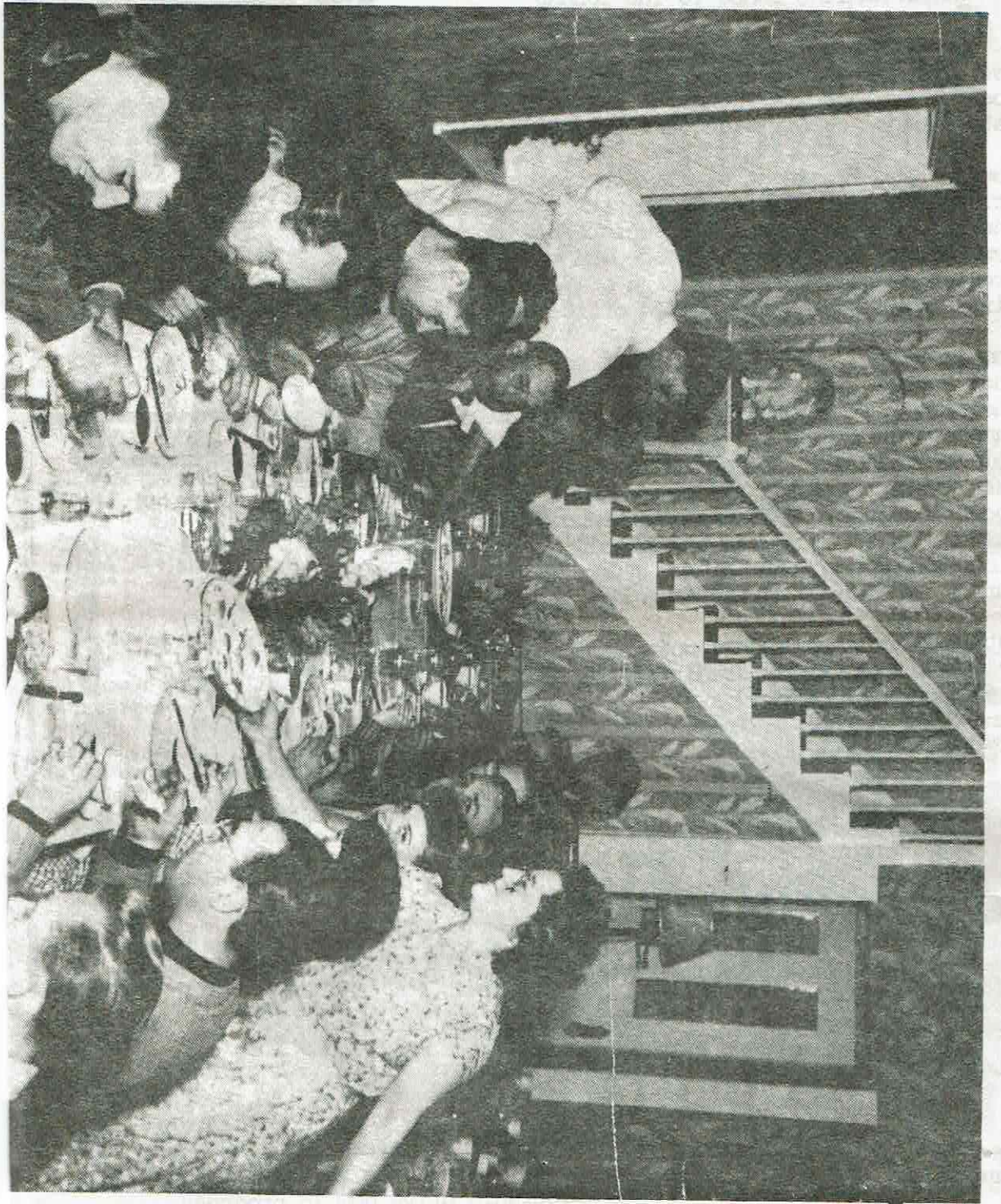
Council voted on recent results of public hearing regarding three re-zoning requests; Sennish, yes, Lenley remains residential and Miller, denied.

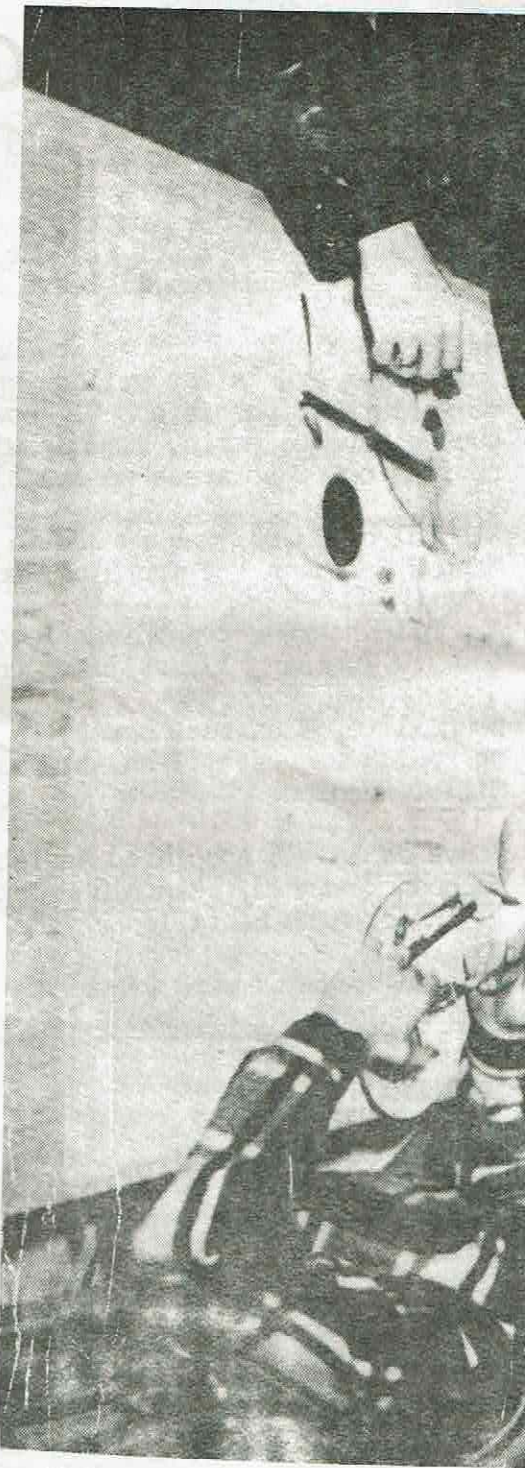

Howard and Rosetta Navorska serve a hearty breakfast to a hungry group of pilots and their wives. These "Fly Ins" became a popular passtime with many during the 1940's and "Rosie's" great cooking was a taste treat looked forward to with great anticipation. In the spacious dining room of their lake front home, the Navorskas catered to banquets and other special occasions.

Delicious aromas wafted from the adjoining kitchen. SOLAR HEATING COMES TO THE ISLAND

The first solar heating unit to be in use on the island has been installed in the roof of Mr. and Mrs. Frank E. Rom next to Estes School on Division Street here.

Founder and President of Rom-Aire Solar Corp., Mr. Rom formerly directed the early solar energy programs at the NASA before his retirement after 27 years of service. He was the project manager for the design of NASA's first solar heated and cooled office building.

Rom installed the system himself and says that anyone with construction ability can do the same. He reported the fuel saving alone can pay for the unit in a few years. The Rom's heated their island cottage with solar last winter, keeping the temperature just about 45degrees. "Nothing freezes and the mildew cannot form", he explained. In addition, the Rom's obtain all of their hot water during the summer months from the solar unit.

Estimated cost of such a unit is \$1,400 Rom said. A federal tax credit of 40% and a state credit of 10% is available at the present time which could result in a 50% saving in the unit according to Rom.

If Mr. Rom looks familiar to you, he has been coming to Kelleys for many years, staying with Fr. Ehrbar and before that Mary Schwede. He purchased the present house in 1972.

Rom lectures on solar energy to groups of interested persons and is available to do the same here if the interest is generated.

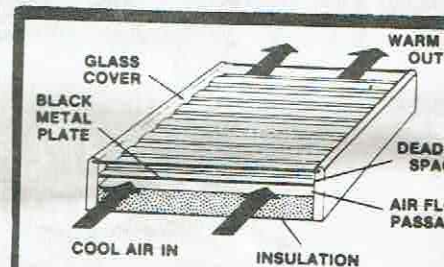

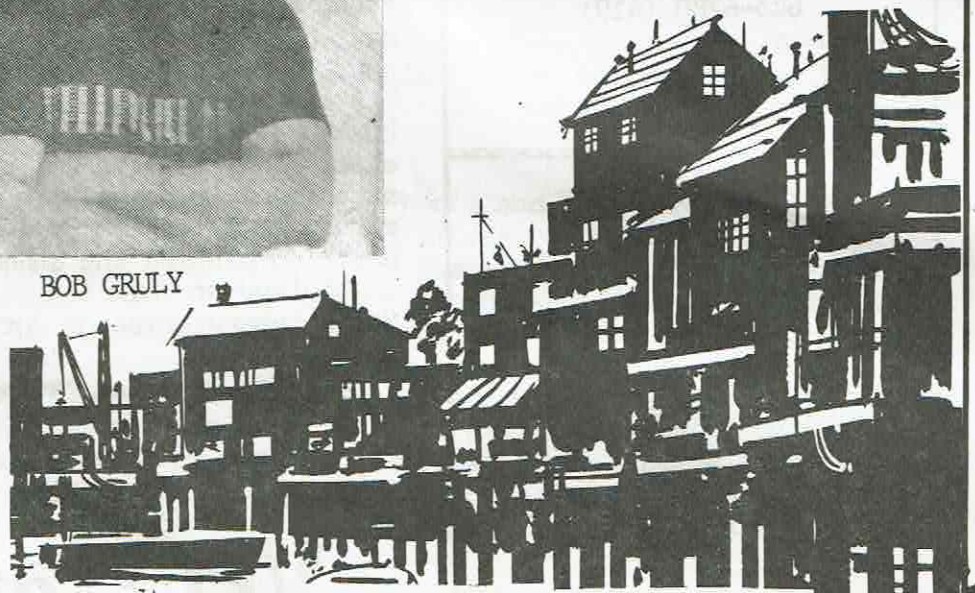

Father Frank of St. Michael's was a spirited rooter and I recall the many times he would get "red" Martin's blood pressure up by making suggestions on how to play the game.

A personal thrill I had as a kid was striking out Ossie McKillips in a soft ball game. Ossie, like most baseball players, was used to fast pitching and had a time of it getting his swing straight on slow floating pitches such as I tossed underhanded. Understand Ossie hasn't been too well. Perhaps he and his dear Mary will get a kick out of that memory.

And I hope all who played on or watched the old ball team will feel a touch of nostalgia at this mention. From time to time, if there is sufficient interest, I will pass along other memories of days gone by.

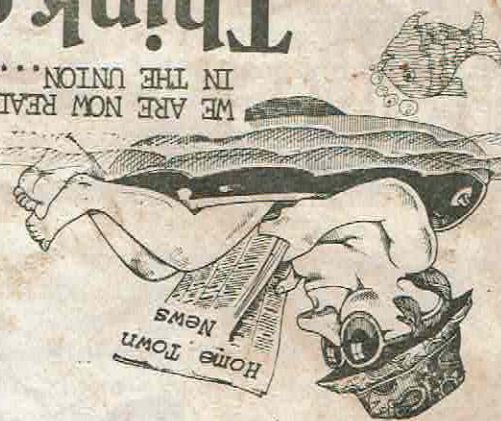
