SUMMER MEMORIES OF KELLEYS ISLAND

Andy Ernie loved to dance. In fact, he probably still does...Before the Kellile Club came along, and before dancing was part of the scene in other Island "spots", Andy would promote his own dances...using the Town Hall. It meant getting a band over from the mainland, renting the Hall and a few other out-of-pocket expenses.

As they say, you win a few and lose a few. So it was with Andy's dance ventures...occasionally making a few bucks and, too often, going in the hole. But when things looked bleak, a lot of folks would kick in on the expenses. All had a great time at his dances, too!

At the outbreak of WWII, it was decided to have a dance at Town Hall and invite the servicemen over from Camp Perry. Mrs. T.C. Hamilton (mother of Jeanette Cleary and Capt. Frank Hamilton) was in charge. A number of us went out in the quarry to dig up pine trees to decorate the stage. Now, Mrs. Hamilton was strong in her beliefs about the merits (or lack of them) of FDR. However, putting aside her own political convictions about Roosevelt, she felt it would not only be Proper, but mandatory, that his picture appear on the decorated stage with it's pine trees and flags. "After all, he IS our commander-in-chief," she insisted.

A special boat went over to gather up the soldiers for the dance. Many of the single gals on the Island that summer acted as dance partners for the boys. All went well until later in the evening when Mrs. Hamilton fell and broke her hip! That was the tragic ending to an otherwise happy occasion. Don't think Mrs. Hamilton ever really recovered from that fall. But the entertainment for the soldiers and her strong patriotic guidance put the whole thing over, she was quite a woman.

There used to be a troupe of actors who came to Kelleys each summer to put on several plays at the Town Hall. Can't for the life of me remember their names. One year they were doing a mystery play with oodles of suspense in the style of Alfred Hitchcock. Being short in numbers, they obtained some of us to act as extras and do non-speaking roles. At one point of the thriller, one of the leads opened a cupboard door and out fell a body..."Who's that?" the actor screamed.

Then about half the audience yelled in unison... "That's Dutch!"

Turned out to be Roy "Dutch" Elfers. That incident broke us all up and the thespians had difficulty getting back in the mood of their suspense filled drama.

Years ago, before he and Liz Lange were married, Charlie "Red" Martin had the Casino. He put a movie screen out on the dock and would show movies (silent, of course) from a projector on the porch of the Casino. Believe Charley Himmelein, who was in the business, provided the projector and the films. Joe Matso, Russ's dad, had a small theatre set up in back of his place and would show films on Friday or Saturday nights. One time the advance ads stated the movie would be "Casey at the Bat" starring Wallace Berry...a real goodie thought we all. But, as things happen some times, the Wallace Berry movie failed to arrive. There was a love story (which I suppose today's kids hate as much as we did) and we suffered through it. There were the ten or fifteen minute breaks periodically as the reels were changed.

The church lawn fetes and bake sales were great fun. At St. Michael's Church they had raffles for candy, cotton blankets, and all sorts of items...Recall that Stella Lange (Don and Gini's mother) was a real activist. She loved to spin the big old wheel (wonder what ever happened to it) and call out the winning numbers. One year, my family donated boxes of Mullane's taffy from Cincinnati and we took turns running the booth.

At the Community Church the folks stayed clear of raffles, but had wonderful baked goods, candy, and ice cream available at their socials. Nearly everyone on the Island, regardless of church affiliation, went to the lawn fetes at both churches.

These were happy days and we were all young and innocent...not realizing the threatening storm in Europe would before too long separate us...and youth would be gone forever (as we knew it). We were to return (most of us, that is) but things would never be the same. On the memorial in the park are the names of Island boys who gave their all in the years to follow.

Island Council

The island could lose its present insurance rating with state fire regulations if reports of a recent survey of hydrant pressure is correct. An inspector from the state fire marshall tested pressure in hydrants downtown and found them reduced from 750 gal. per min. in 1967 (when last tested) to 160 gal. per min. now. Water Dept. mgr. Oscar reported to council that the hydrants out of town near Navorska's were in good shape, but he emphasized the poor output of those intown. "If the latest fire had developed during the daytime when we face heavy draw on the lines, the most we could have hoped for would be to keep adjacent buildings wetted down, we could never have contained the jail fire", he said. Councilman Russ Matso suggested that since '67 extensions to the lines have been minimal pointing to the fact that the problem could stem from obstructions in the lines, or an engineering problem caused by construction of new water treatment plant. A special meeting of council will determine the next step toward investigating the problem. Council agreed to absorb $\frac{1}{2}$ the cost of installing a new drain tile near the Casino. They tabled for a special committee meeting the bill from Police Chief McKillips covering room and board for deputies (special police) utilized on Memorial Day, 4th of July, Homecoming and Labor Day. Special dispensation has been granted Dr. Heinz Boker in the past years regarding airport landing fees. At one time, Dr. Boker was stationed at Put-In-Bay and the emergency use of his plane to serve Kelleys Islanders was an important element in the island's well being. He also resided at Lakeside, Ohio and flew back and forth to administer Kelleys residents on a regular basis. Council agreed to continue this dispensation for another year and review the situation again next year. Helen Marchky was appointed Grants Officer for one year. Her new position entails researching available state and federal funds available to villages such as this for the benefit of the general public. Her first job may be that of locating revenue to finance an engineering study of the island's present low-water pressure in the downtown area. Mary Schock heads a committee looking into benefits for senior citizens. There will be a FLOOD INSURANCE public meeting at the Town Hall Thurs. October 2 at 10:30 AM. A total of \$12,000 was received from Mayor's Court from the first of the year. The money was deposited in the general fund. Council passed Ordinance 318 regarding the violation of operating a motor vehicle, bicycle or walking on island runways. This excludes emergency and maintency equipment. If found guilty a fine of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500 shall be imposed

Building permits were issued to; Franklin Clark, Al Rumel and Mike McCune. Council passed ordinance 320 regarding re-zoning the 6.78 acres residential of Richard Sennish to commercial.

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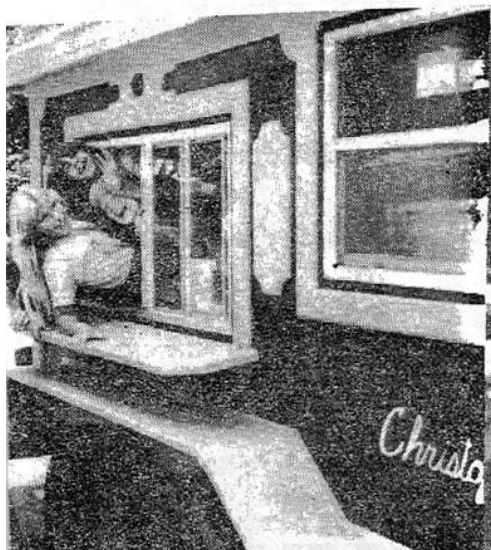

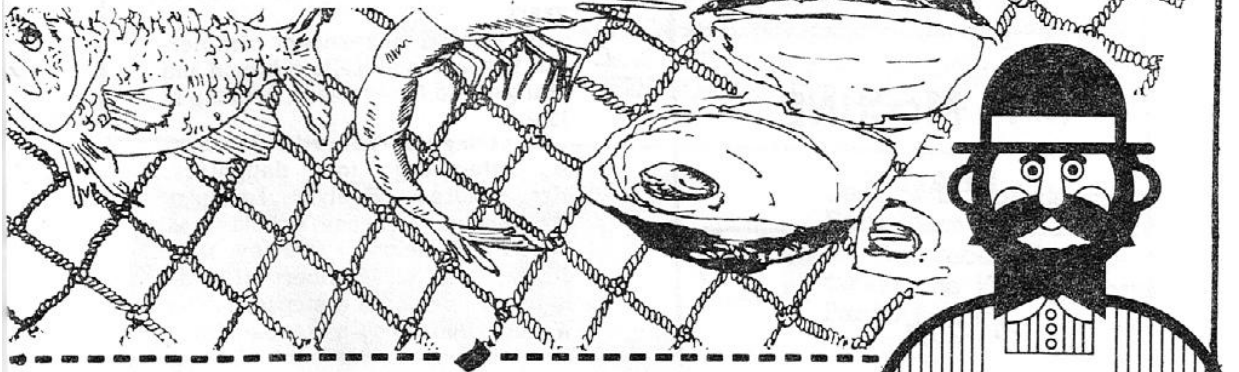

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Leonard Bickley, 92, 200 72nd Ave. North, St. Petersburg, Fla., died Tuesday in St. Anthony's Hospital, St. Petersburg, of an apparent heart attack.

Formerly of Sandusky, he had resided in Florida for the last 26 years.

He was an independent commercial fisherman at Kelleys Island and Marblehead for 49 years, retiring in 1954.

Surviving are his wife, Pauline, St. Petersburg; four daughters, Mrs. George (Evelyn) Laeppl, Mrs. Norman (Theone) Windau and Mrs. Paul (Delores) Ordway, Sandusky; and Mrs. Albert (Cleon) Hetrick, Fremont; a stepson, John Weber, California; a stepdaughter, Mrs. Nelson (Eleanor) Reese, Florida; 15 grandchildren; 34 great-grandchildren; three great-great-grandchildren; three step-grandchildren; four step-great-grandchildren; a brother, Logan Bickley, Sandusky; a sister, Mrs. Leo (Marguarite) Lauber, Sandusky; a stepsister, Clara Schaufelberger, Sandusky; and a stepbrother, John Keating, Sandusky.

He was preceded in death by his first wife, Laura, in 1955, a son, Leonard, in 1945, two grandsons, four brothers and a sister.

JAMES LEO, 64, died on the island recently of an apparent heart attack. He founded Kamp Kellile here 36 years ago. Survivors include his wife, Angela, daughters Kathleen Yatson, Carol Ann Tanzer and Bonita Roller, a son, Victor and six grandchildren.

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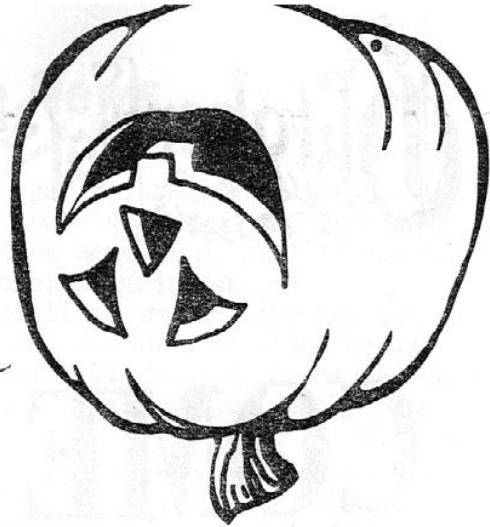
