THE CONTINUING SAGA OF E. KELLEY HUNTINGTON

(Direct decendent of the original Kelleys of Kelleys Island) .....

One day, July 20, 1837, George Kelley, G.C. Huntington and I took a lunch and proposed to walk around the island. Taking a rest on Lovers Point or Long point, we ate our dinner. To my surprise, G.C. Huntington asked me if I would spend my life with him!!! I told him I would have to think about that. He said "All right", and I was to let him know as soon as I could.

Next day he had to go back to Cleveland and asked me to write to him. I said I would and did, but gave him to understand I was favorably inclined towards him and in the 7 of Nov. 1837 we were married in the school house on Cunninghams Island (Kelleys Island) by the Rev. Mr. Cran of the Episcopal Church Ohio City and boarded at Dr. Hills until near New Years when a house he was building was finished. We moved into it.

We lived in Ohio City until Oct. and then hard times came on and we sold out the store and moved to the Island. We were worth about \$10,000. During that year we lost everything and commenced without a cent! Father had given me half of our farm and we owed Uncle Irad Kelley for the other half 1200 dollars. The summer before I was married, I refused Capt. Blackler and he left. At Buffalo, he wrote me one of the pleasantest letters I was ever to read and I kept it for years. He went that year to the Sandwich Island as envoy minister for the US government and died there.

The horse Zenobia brother Julius kept for me, and brought him to the island when he moved up. The horse died of old age in his care. After I was married I had all the horses I wanted without the one Capt. Blackler gave me, and I did not care to keep any reminder of my old beaux after I was married.

As to my married life....I will say very little...I think I was as happy as most married women are. The first winter we lived in Ohio City. We went to concerts, lectures, Balls and had a gay time generally. All my husband friends called to see me, and I was treated with much attention. We read most of Scotts works evenings when alone. I had a horse and carriage if I wanted to go out, a good girl to do my work. And the store porter used to come to the house to take any errands I might have. My husband was worth about \$10,000 which was considered very well to do in those days. Very few had more.



I never scrimped in money that winter. Next summer, my old chum was married (Loretta Wood married Geo. Merwin) and we attended their wedding. Geo. was a rollicking, good hearted, good company worth \$10,000 or more, but would get drunk occasionally and it was reported his morals were none of the best. Loretta is my authority for saying so. They lived together about 40 yrs., pleasantly when sober and miserable when he was drunk, and for the last 20 years drunk in a more or less degree all the time.

They bought the farm father owned when he bought the island. Mrs. Merwin out-lived him three or four years and sold their farm to a man for \$7,000. Loretta died in Georgia where she had gone for her health in 1885 of cancer of stomach.

In August 15, 1838, Erastus was born. The same fall, we bought 200 acres of land on Cunninghams Island (Kelleys). We lived with father until 4 rooms were finished so we could move into our own house.

During that winter, each mail delivery contained letters of someone failing financially. Not one cent did we ever get out of any claim we had against anyone. We were obliged to go into bankruptcy with our creditors. My husband was very dispondent over the prospect ahead, though I never lost courage, and went to work with a will to get a living. Our second son, Simon was born the next Dec. 15, 1840, in the half-finished house. We cleared up our farm, and did sell steamboat wood to pay our expenses. Had all the necessaries of life, good health as a rule and happy.

Five years after we went to Norwich Conn. with the two boys to see Father Huntington. We stopped in N.Y. City over night. Simon took ill with small pox and 2 weeks after we arrived in Norwich he broke out with it. We were hustled up in our room and there we stayed until Erastus came down with it. Neither were very sick, but we must not expose others. We kept our room a month and the scabs came off and we fumigated well and were pronounced well again to appear in public. While we were in Norwich, a man having some lots in Ohio City to sell and offered my husband quite a percentage to sell the lots. Dan was born the next March 27, 1845. My husband rented a store in Cleveland to go again into the crockery business with Mr. Andrews who had some money to offset my husbands time and knowledge of business. The store was not finished according to contract. My husband was sick all summer and we concluded to go back to our farm. In Feb. 15 1850 Joseph was born. All four boys lived to be men grown and good members of society.

Erastus married Elzina Hamilton and has a store on Kelleys Island. Has two children, Simon and Stella. Simon went into the army the first year of the Rebellion, was wounded at the battle of Stone River, Dec. 30, 1862, died in Nashville, Tenn. aged 21. Daniel married Emma Farr and now lives on a farm in Olmsted. Has had 5 children, three living, Fannie, Allie and Agnes.

Joseph married Theophania Haines who died Jan. 24, 1880 leaving an infant four days old Theophanie. She now lives in Denver Colorado with her father.

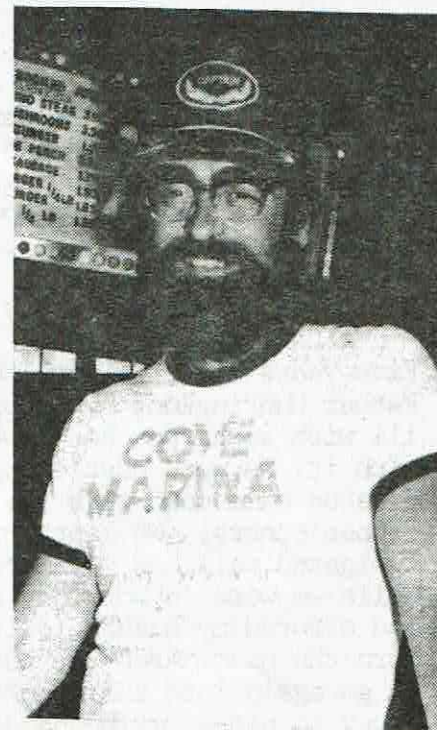
My husband died in Wallace, Kansas July 3, 1876, and is buried on Kelleys Island and I am here in Denver with Hoe and Phanie. I am now 75 years old on Jan 25, 1895. This is all. E.K. Huntington

Jerry follows the sun and says his total personal wealth can be packed into the car in a matter of minutes. He began his cooking career as a young boy of 10 in California. Later, life found him in Austin Texas where he operated the Stallion Restaurant. "I just decided to see the world one day and ended up in Florida", he explained. It was there that Don Nowalk discovered the pair and invited them to Kelleys Island.

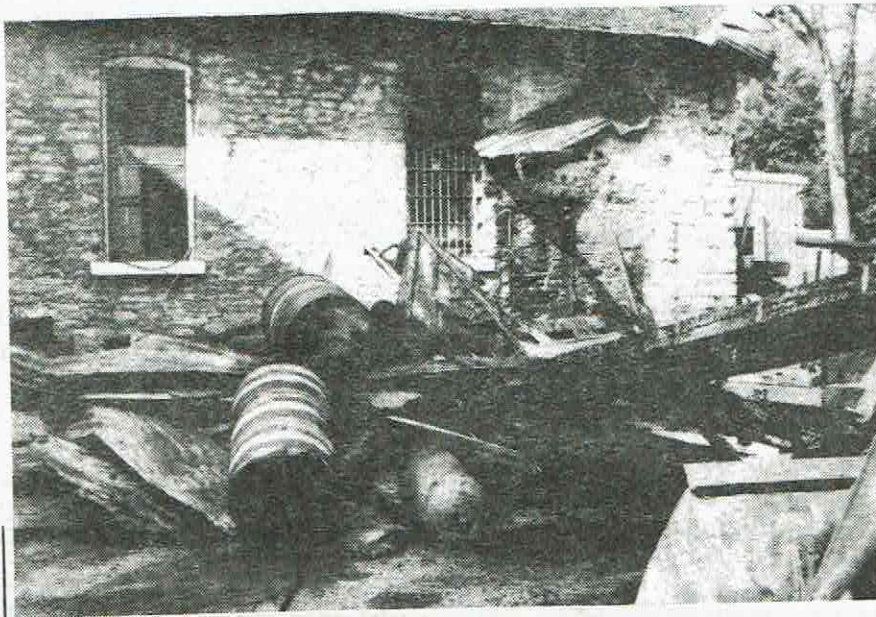
"We have enjoyed the quietness of it and the historical aspects", Jerry said. When the season draws to a close where will Jerry be headed? No one knows...especially not Jerry.

# Arson: The Burning of Kelleys Island

**KELLEYS ISLAND** — Village officials were to meet with their insurance adjustor today to find out just how much was lost in a recent arson fire which cindered two village buildings and part of the jail.

No estimate has yet been made of the value of buildings and equipment destroyed in the July 20 blaze, but an official of T.W. Steinemann and Associates, the Sandusky insurance firm covering the village, was expected to calculate the loss after his visit today.

The night fire destroyed the village's maintenance building and storage shed and damaged an exterior wall and roof of the jail and the roof of the ambulance garage.

The village ambulance was not in the garage at the time, but three other village vehicles, including a 1960 4-wheel-drive Jeep, were destroyed. The storage shed primarily held supplies and equipment for the village water department.

Village Council met in a special session Wednesday to go over a rough list of articles lost in blaze, which officials suspect was set by gasoline spread along the outside of the storage shed.

Jack Dunkle, an arson investigator for the State Fire Marshal's office is investigating the fire and a \$10,000 reward has been posted for information leading to the capture of the arsonist.

# POST SCRIPTS

Dear Editor:

Suzanne Milley Mellinger came on her yearly pilgrimage to the island today. She was delighted that she could view her childhood home (now Taylor's Toehold...behind post office) without having to push her way through poison ivy, brush and chiggers. She remembers her happy childhood home having been so cozy despite the very cold Kelleys winters, and nine Milley children under the same roof.

How these Russian Orthodox folks got placed in Italian Village is a mystery but Suzanne says she was born in one of the Craft cottages and moved here to this place in her cradle. The rest of the Milleys, eight girls and a boy, were all born here to Peter and Mary Milley. Neighbor children like to peek through the closed kitchen shutters at Russian Orthodox Christmas to view the colorful festivities in the Milley home. A large potbelly stove heated the entire home from the middle room just like what we've now stored.

An old neighbor, Josephine Bianchi, is making up a bouquet from her beautiful flower garden for Suzanne to place on her maternal grandfather, Lucas Volk's grave. He was killed in one of those dangerous quarry blasts, and except for several brothers buried here, these are all of the family that are buried on Kelleys.

Suzanne says it was always so healthy living on the island, they were so tan and played in the lake all summer. The family left in 1922 when the quarry slowed down, and a son-in-law, Peter Semkoff, found employment for Peter Milley in the steel mills in Joliet, Illinois....And that's a strange story too... Jean Dwelle attended my daughter, Holly's, wedding here in the summer of '78. Some months later, when Jean came over to share supper with me in my kitchen, she remarked that this house seemed so familiar, and that she was sure she attended a Milley wedding here...She recalled that the tables were set up in the form of a cross, and that the groom was a priest...Russian Orthodox...and the people were so good, kind, and polite to her, and gave her the guest of honor seat...she was just a young girl, and was attending the wedding with her father. I checked last summer with Suzanne, and by golly, Jean remembers correctly!!!

Suzanne's sister, Mary, was married here, at age 16, to Peter Semkoff, Russian native and Orthodox priest, who studied in N.York, and who met lovely young Mary on Kelleys Island. There were 28 bridesmaids, since Mary did not want to slight any of her friends, and they all walked to the church and back in a grand procession, the bride and 28 bridesmaids! The marriage lasted 62 yrs, until their deaths, several years ago.

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Suzanne asks the name of the Russian Orthodox church. I said Jean Dwell might know. The church was on Division Street just before the school, and all that remains is a large rock upon which a cross sat, and another large rock that was an entrance stone. Anna Milley had her wedding outside in front of the cross on the stone, for no one was permitted inside the church because of a flu epidemic.

Then there was Ella Milley's boyfriend that tried to walk across the ice to see here the day before Christmas. Tragically, he floated up to the surface on Good Friday with his coat still on and his suitcase in his hand. He is buried at Kelleys. Yes, he came up on the shore down by Crafts. Seems there is a current goes through there that hinders freezing.

I get asked frequently by old-timers if any of the beautiful yellow roses remain. This cottage was, at one time, surrounded by yellow roses. There was a barn in back, and pigs and a cow, and lovely gardens everywhere. No, I've never seen anything surround this cottage except the healthiest, most abundant, and menacing growth of poison ivy, and red, hairy stems as big around as my wrist. I have a watercolor I painted of the cottage before we started restoration. Suzanne wants it, and says she'll hang it in her living room. I almost parted with it..almost. Oh, and Suzanne also hiked eagerly to the brink of our backyard swamp and looked for a stonecrusher. She used to go back there and wave to her father.

Also mentioned was Andrew Semention or Semanson, who was called "Sam" by everyone here and kept the cemetery and Kelleys looking beautiful. He and his mother were the last Russian orthodoxers around, so 'tis said.

Since I know not the name of the church, or the location of the stone crusher, I did the next best and sold Suzanne and hubby a subscription to our HOMETOWN NEWS...now I'm going out to look for those church stones.

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# Island Council

ISLAND COUNCIL MEETING 8-7-80...A preliminary report on fire damage was given from a special meeting village officials had with insurance adjustors.

The side walk in front of Lee Myers home was damaged recently when the water department was repairing lines. Jake Martin, councilman, suggested that the matter be discussed and the walk replaced. Council will discuss this with the water board and the decision will be announced.

Three new members were taken in by the fire department: Charles Herndon, Paul Finnegan and Joe LaLond. Fire Chief, John Kilko emphasized again the need for all able persons to join this group. There has been a problem with non-members operating the fire department equipment during an emergency. These people are not covered by liability insurance held by the department, it was pointed out, and the results of injury during fire fighting could present liability questions. Everyone is urged to attend the fire meetings and to JOIN THE DEPARTMENT, Kilko said. "We need the help of everyone, but are worried about those who run to help us and are not members of the organization...the situation could be solved if more men would join us", he continued.

No report on the new pump. Clerk reported the delay in receiving hose company's fault. They had to put a new coupling on hose, delaying delivery. John Kennedy was appointed Captain. He replaces Frank Parks who recently passed away.

Planning commission report included information regarding a variance requested by the Department of Natural Resources for a trail along the east quarry bank for a "Volks Walk" scheduled to be held September 28. More information regarding this event in next issue of H.T. News. The Burt Miller property which has been discussed by council and the planning commission this summer is presently "on hold" pending a decision by the Erie Co. Court.

A report from the chief of police reported 67 calls for the past month.

Councilman Charles Martin suggested the purchase of a Breath testing device to assist in police enforcement. A discussion followed and was basically against the suggestion because of difficulty experienced in some of the surrounding communities proving effectiveness of the device.

A pay raise for the water department supervisor was passed.



ISLAND COUNCIL MEETING CONTINUED .....

Noxious weeds were discussed at great length. Persons owning property 200 feet from residential areas are responsible for the weeds growing on that property. The lots must be kept mowed to eliminate weed seeds from spreading to accompanying properties. Open acreage is not included in this ruling. Reports against property owners who do not comply with this rule will be handled individually by council. This winter council will draw up an ordinance to deal with this problem.

The Village Clerk's office was recently broken into. A lock was broken and office door kicked in. Petty cash was stolen. No abuse to the office. The door will have to be replaced. Incident under investigation by police department.

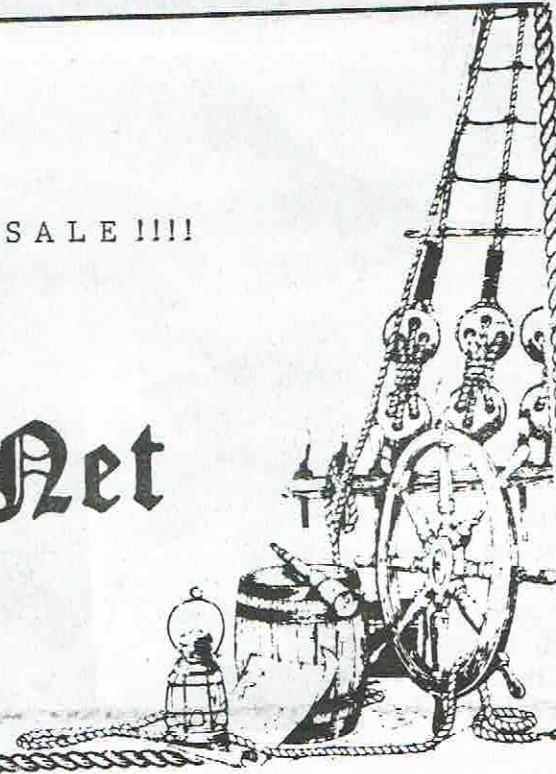

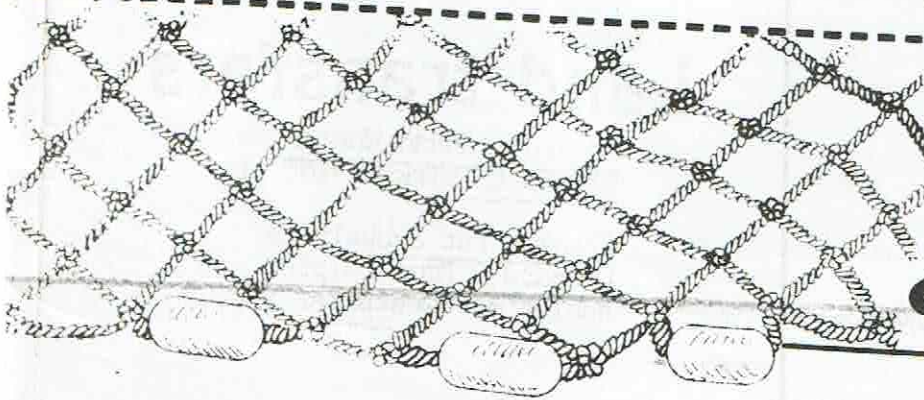
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# OBITUARIES

# swimming holes

I doubt that there has ever been a boy or young man on the island who hasn't succumbed to the temptation to take a swim "in the raw" on a hot summer night or afternoon. Must confess, I was guilty of such folly myself. Other culprits were Don Lange, Sam Bauman, Frank Brown, my late brother, Gene, and dozens of others, including a couple of guys named Warrick who stayed each summer at one of the houses on the Minshall property on the west side.

At night, Koster's dock was our favorite spot. Next to that was the sand beach (if we could figure a way to get there). The old quarry pond was a likely place, as well as "the cut", a spot in the old quarry area off Division Street. The latter sports were actually for daytime dipping.

One night, about 4 Or 5 of us had ridden bikes back to the beach for a swim. We left our bikes on the embankment (near that old brick oven used many yrs. ago for baking bread). Down the beach we popped out of our clothes, usually a pair of shorts and a shirt and pair of shoes. Leaving them in a pile, we dashed out for our swim. We were having a grand time of it when three cars drove down to park. They left their headlights on so they could bring all their gear on to the beach for a party. There were BOYS AND GIRLS...what a revolting development!

We decided to wait and see how long they would stay. A half hour went by, then another half hour. They built a huge fire to roast weiners, corn and other goodies. We were getting chills and knew we couldn't wait them out. So, in desperation, we swam over to the old north dock and climbed out onto the gravel road. Shivering, frustrated and inwardly angry at the bleak turn of events, we slowly headed back the road from the dock. The problem was... how to get our clothes without anyone seeing us. We decided upon our approach...It was pretty wild, I'll admit...to make a run for it, get down to the clothes, scoop em up and RUN LIKE HELL. It didn't matter who got what clothes. REady, set, go...the wild dash was on! The party group was caught off guard, so busy eating and drinking. We ran like mad toward the clothes, about 50 ft. from the bon fire. It was pretty bright from the flames. Once we reached our clothes, we grabbed all we could get and took off down the beach. By this time the girls were screaming, curses from the boys as we dashed on into the night leaving them all behind....bewildered.

Once we had a safe distance between us we picked our own clothes out and dressed. We never did know who the folks were on the beach party, and to my knowledge, none of them to this day were able to identify the four or five uncovered derrieres that were last seen moving rapidly into the darkness beyond the fire.....

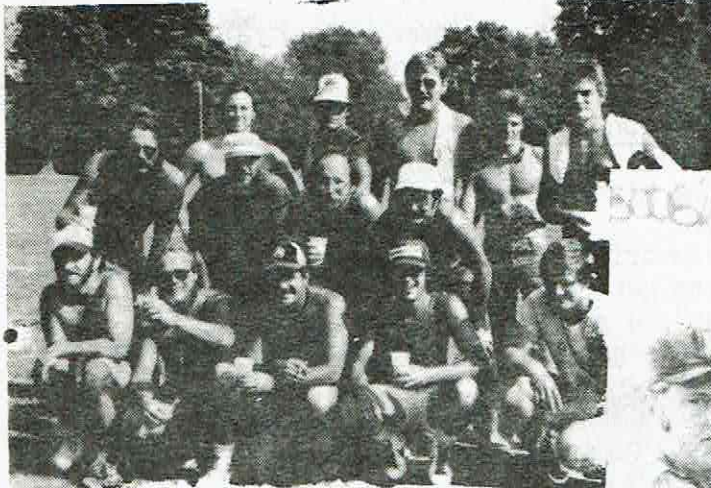
