Highlights of October 8, 1981 Council Meeting
Compiled from Minutes by Carol Vogler

Councilwoman Mary Shock made a motion that the bid for repair of Town Hall roof be kept under \$5,000 and the contract not exceed \$5,000. The motion was seconded by Nick Bianchi and council voted unanimously to accept it.

Jake Martin reported on the new building and stated that windows and doors requested by the Fire Department will be added with restrooms for all three rooms.

A motion was made to pay Gallaway \$500 for removal of old fire shed building and to Keith Stober and John Kilko \$75.00 for 1½ days labor.

Fire Chief Roy Fox asked for information concerning a furnace for new fire station. Council stated that they will utilize the existing furnace.

No report from Street and Sidewalk Committee or the Planning Commission.

The Chief of Police reported 30 calls for the month of September.

No report from the Airport Manager.

The meeting was interrupted at 8:30 PM by Mayor Mike McCune to hold a public hearing concerning Ordinance 355 - Flood Insurance. Mr. J. Brems, of the Division of Water was introduced and invited to present his input on the issue of flood insurance. Mr. Alan Berman of Chicago was spokesman for the Flood Program and explained its function along with Peter G. Finke. A long discussion followed with question and answers invited from the audience. The Mayor explained that the vote for or against the flood insurance program will be held at the next regular session of council, November 5, 1981.

Solicitor Bill Smith explained Ordinance 341 pertaining to amending Ordinance 325 to allow for the transferring of Money Funds.

The Mayor explained a Litter Control Grant of \$86,000 which was requested by the village to generate revenue to offset the cost of an end loader and wages to operate the equipment.

Del Ehrbar stated from the audience that he does not approve the new building nor the site. Jake Martin stated that he has asked the county to consider supplying 75 ft. of tile to cover the ditch in front of the new building site.

Four new building permits were approved and issued for the month.

From the Floor: Richard Wingate ('Windy') stated that Police Chief McKillips refuses to answer calls he has made to him. He also stated that the village is lax in form set up and collection of new tax. Mrs. George Cleary stated that she is also against the site of the new building. Helen Marchky questioned the Water Board and the Police Chief concerning their need for new license plates for their vehicles. Rob Watkins questioned the amount of bid for repair to the Town Hall roof.

The Mayor answered that no bid is necessary if the cost is \$5,000. Nancy Kelley reports a chair taken from her premises during her absence. She stated that nothing had been done about it. The Mayor replied that he and Councilman Nick Bianchi and Jake Martin will contact Police Chief McKillips concerning the missing item. Bud Yoscovits stated that the Fire Department will take care of refilling any 10 pound pressure extinguishers on the island if they are contacted for an appointment first.

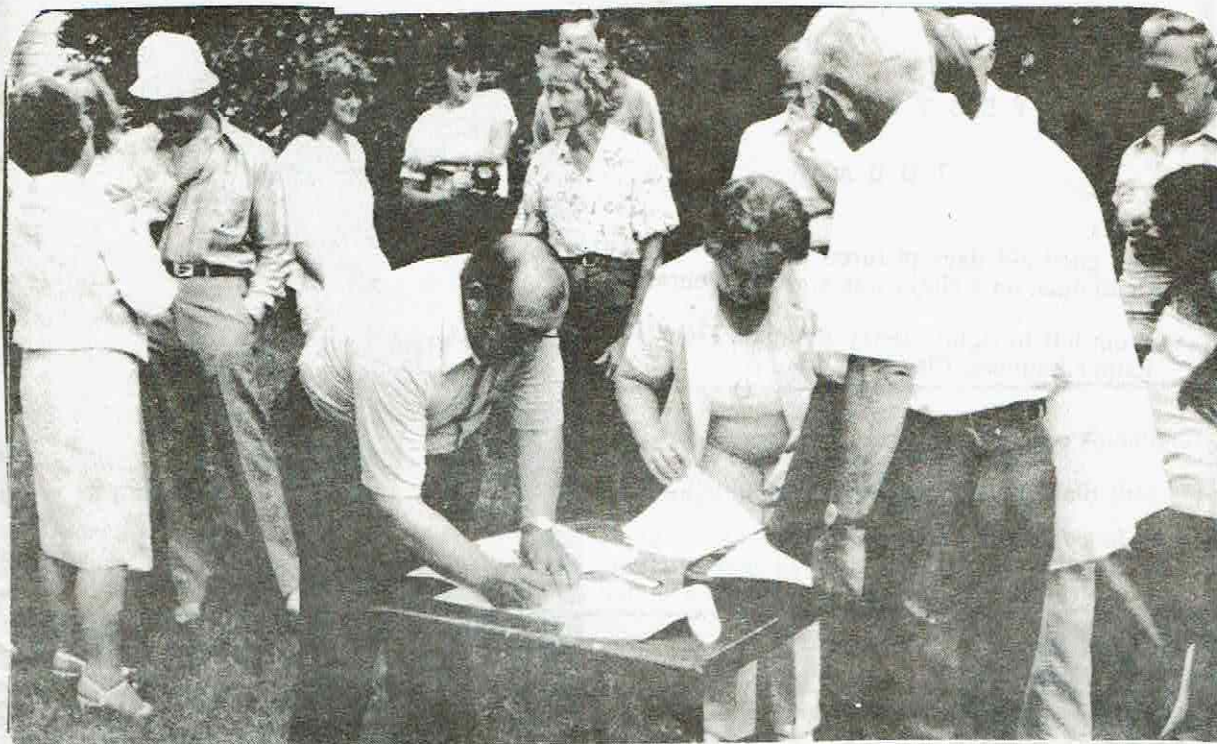

CROSSES LAKE IN OPEN FISH BOAT

*Kelleys Island Woman Rests Easily Today
in Marblehead Hospital*

MRS. ALLEN McKILLIPS, 40, was resting easily in Marblehead hospital today after a chilly early morning ride across the lake in an open fish tug.

MRS. McKILLIPS, who is about to become a mother, became suddenly ill yesterday afternoon. Her condition failed to improve during the night, and DR. H.A. CROSSETT, island physician, called the Marblehead Coast Guard

at 2 o'clock this morning for a fast boat to transfer his patient to the hospital.

The coast guard craft, which arrived at the island about five o'clock, was found to be too small for the purpose and DR. CROSSETT commandeered a local fish tug in its stead.

The crossing, while slow, was reported to have been satisfactory, and MRS. MCKILLIPS, unshaken, had breakfast this morning in the hospital.

All local merchants have reported increased sales this summer. More people were here than usual, and hotels have been filled most of the time.

Additional Provisions are being laid in this week to care for the large crowds anticipated for the three day homecoming centennial and park dedication programs this weekend.

The Lakeside III has been running regular evening excursions to Kelleys all summer, and in addition to the regular tourist and summer resident trade, merchants have profited this summer through the transient corps camp, which now contains about 200 men who spend the greater portion of their pay checks locally



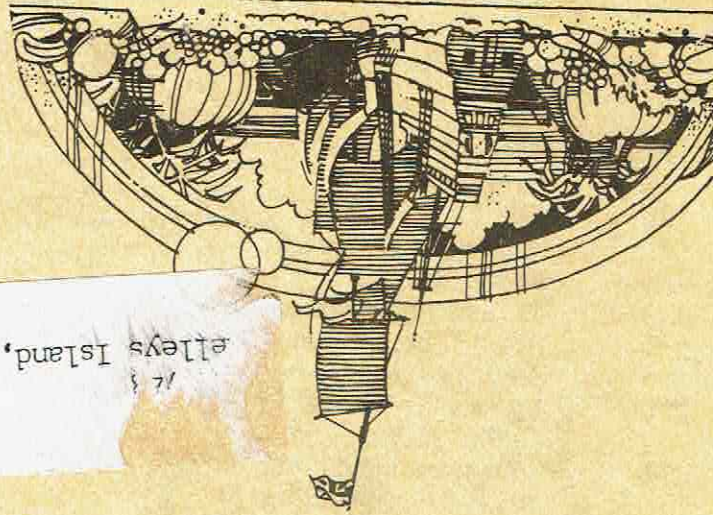
