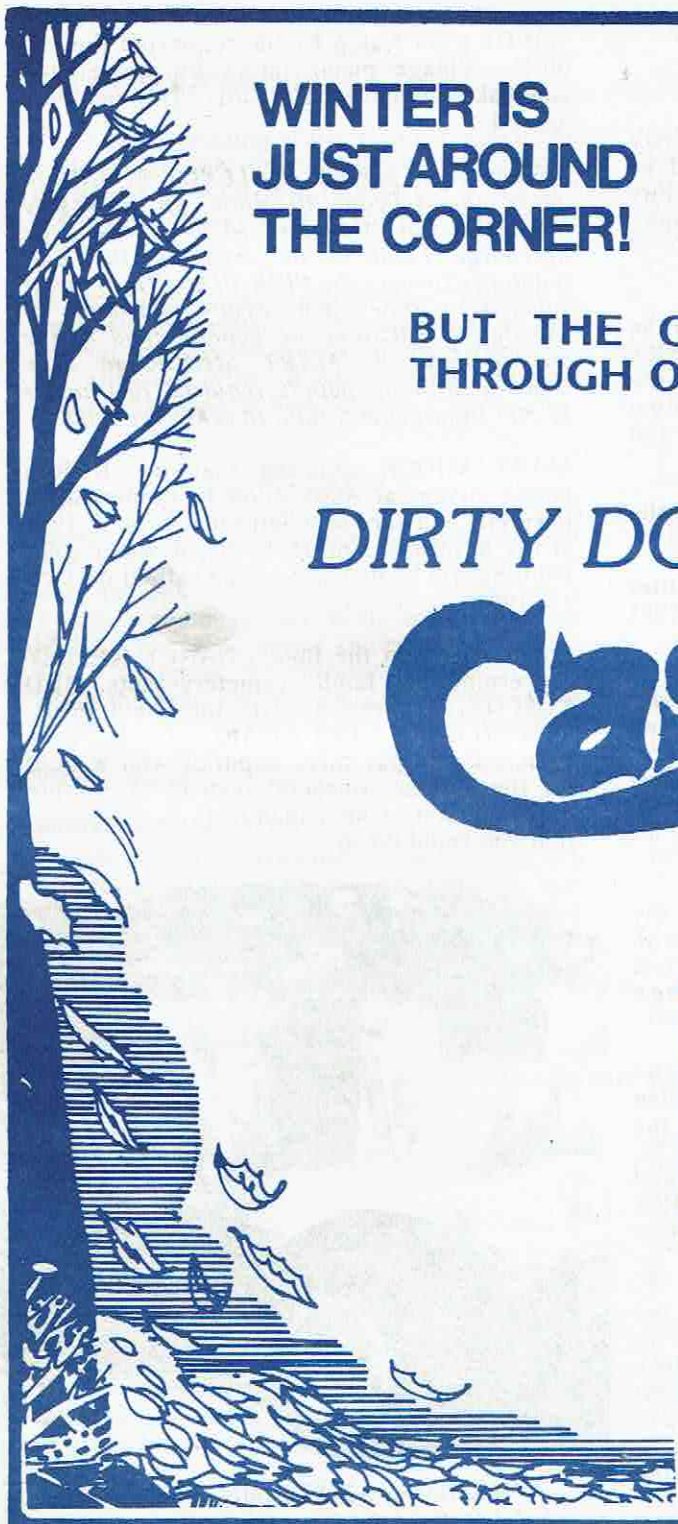

HIGHLIGHTS OF COUNCIL MEETING

September 10, 1981

The new Fire Chief has been appointed. ROY FOX will take over the position and will be assisted by BUD YOSCOVITS, Assistant Fire Chief. ROBERT WATKINS will be Captain, and KIM WATKINS will take the reigns of Secretary.

Airport Supervisor KEN HAIG reported that he received a letter from FRANKLIN CLARK concerning removal of junk cars from the airport. The Mayor responded that arrangements have been made for a barge to arrive and other debris this month.

The Chief of Police report contained 30 calls and 41 arrests for the month of August.

A public hearing for a grant for Ohio Litter Control will be held Friday, September 18, 1981 at 7:00 P.M. in the Town Hall.

Another public hearing will be held Friday, October 16, 1981 at 7:00 P.M. in the Town Hall for the purpose of discussing the property belonging to NANCY KELLEY. The proposal is for this property to be re-zoned to commercial and the Baptist Camp Patmos has requested for camping variance change to family units.

Mayor MIKE McCUNE announced that the new building project has been approved with the stipulation that both men and women's rest rooms must be included in the new building. The new building is to arrive October 9, 1981.

SALLY FRESCH, Vice-President of the Kelley's Island Business People's Association requested the use of the Village Park for the following dates: May 15, 1982, July 24-25, 1982, (alternative July 31-August 1, 1982) and October 2, 1982. Motion by MARY SHOCK was seconded by JIM SEEHOLZER, motion passed.

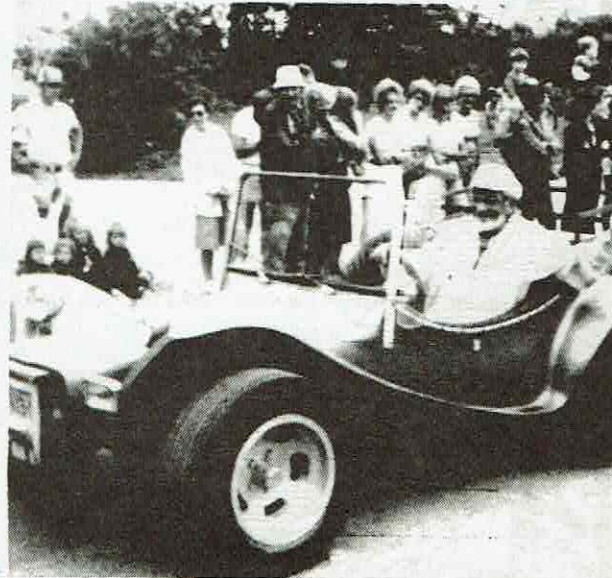
The Mayor stated a letter was received from the Kelleys Island Landowners Association requesting the Park for their Homecoming which they are apparently planning to sponsor next year on August 21, 1982. Landowners opted to disengage themselves from the annual picnic this year and the event was hosted by the Business People instead.

WINDY from Kamp Kellile requested the use of the Village picnic tables for his annual clambake September 26, 1981. The members agreed.

Motions were passed: by LEROY MYERS to direct the solicitor to draw up necessary legislation to transfer \$4,500 from the Surcharge Fund to be used for the new building expenses; by NICK BIANCHI to direct solicitor to draw up necessary legislation to transfer \$3,000 from the general fund to the airport fund; by MARY SHOCK to have solicitor draw up papers required to transfer \$2,500 from general fund to cemetery fund.

MARY SHOCK reported that the Kelleys Island Historical Association is sponsoring a bake sale and yard sale Saturday, Sept. 2, 1981 at the Reformed Church lawn. A water color painting will be displayed to be raffled off Oct. 17, 1982.

Comments from the floor: NANCY KELLEY concerning her family cemetery plots, BUD YOSCOVITZ questions date for Flood Insurance Hearing, PAT HAIG, Clerk, asks permission to pay three deputies who worked for the Holiday weekend instead of waiting until the first of next month. Council agreed that she could do so.

PUT-IN-BAY HIGHLIGHTS

The August meeting of the Village Council had a standing room only audience to discuss a presented petition objecting to the horse and carriage business which recently opened on the island.

Reportedly 90 persons signed their objection to the business because of the alleged smell and damage done by the horses. Council discussed the situation with citizens present, but no action was taken at that time.

The replica of a Viking Longhouse has been constructed by EADWERT HYL, better known as ED HILL. You'll recognize the entrance by the mounds along the road and the entrance booth with a sod roof. 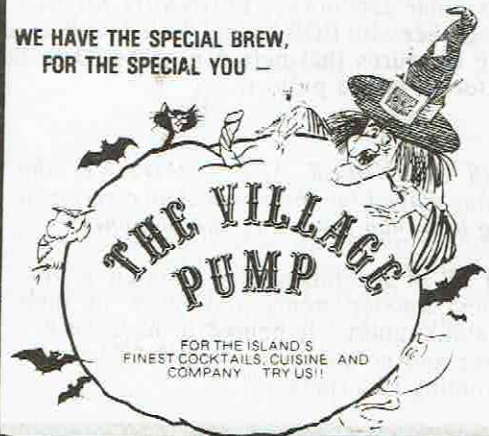

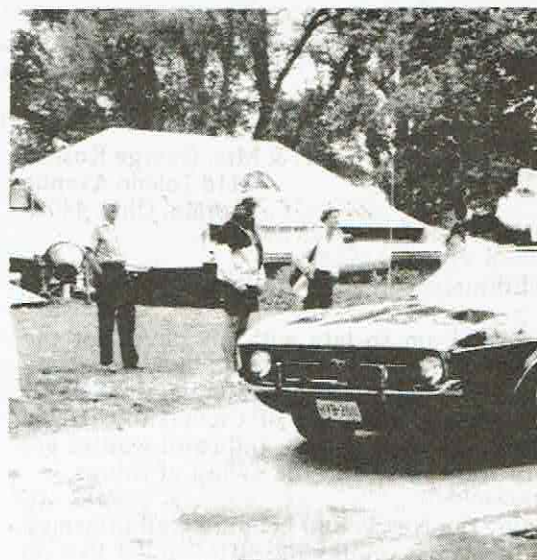
The first 8 kegs of beer we sold were donated by SAM AT THE PUMP.

ISLAND PEOPLE ARE HELD HERE
Ice Prevents Boat Making
Return Trip to Kelleys

Twenty one of 30 residents of this island were forced to stay in Sandusky tonight because of the failure of the MASCOT to complete a return trip to the island late this afternoon.

The MASCOT made a round trip to Kelleys this morning, arriving at 3:30 o'clock and departing to Sandusky with 30 passengers. The boat left Sandusky at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, but when two miles off Kelleys encountered ice too thick to yield to the boat and the latter was forced to return to the mainland at 5:30.

Two boats of LAY BROS. fishing fleet of Sandusky were in tow of the MASCOT in the afternoon trip and it is believed the boats were mostly responsible for the MASCOT not being able to complete the trip to the island. Nine passengers came over early in the evening from Sandusky by airplane, while the rest will board the Mascot Sunday morning at ten o'clock to return home.

Kelleys Island this evening was bordered on all sides by about two miles of drifted ice. The moving ice has held up the opening of the commercial fishing season for the islanders. Most of the fishermen are ready to set nets as soon as the ice disappears. A few boats have already been brought here from Sandusky where they are wintered.

Let's be merry and gay.

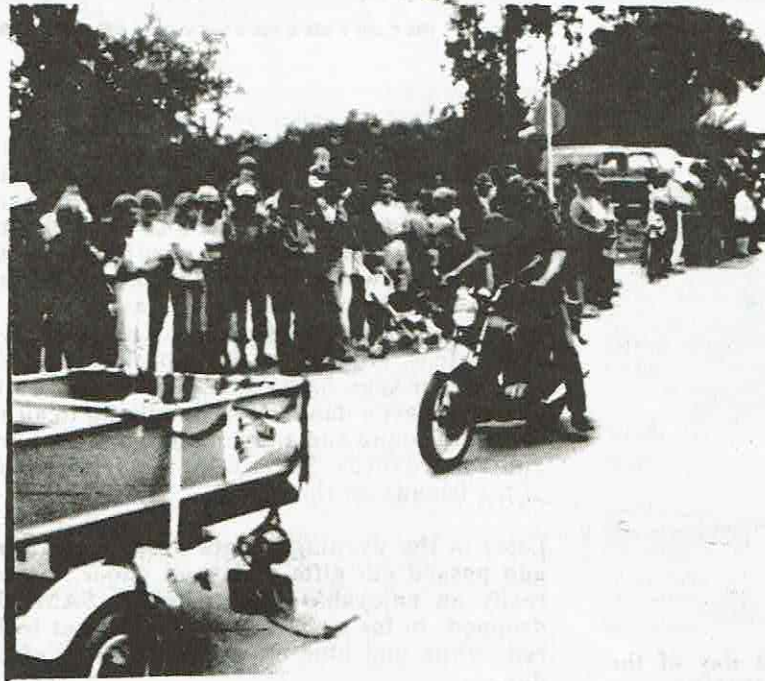

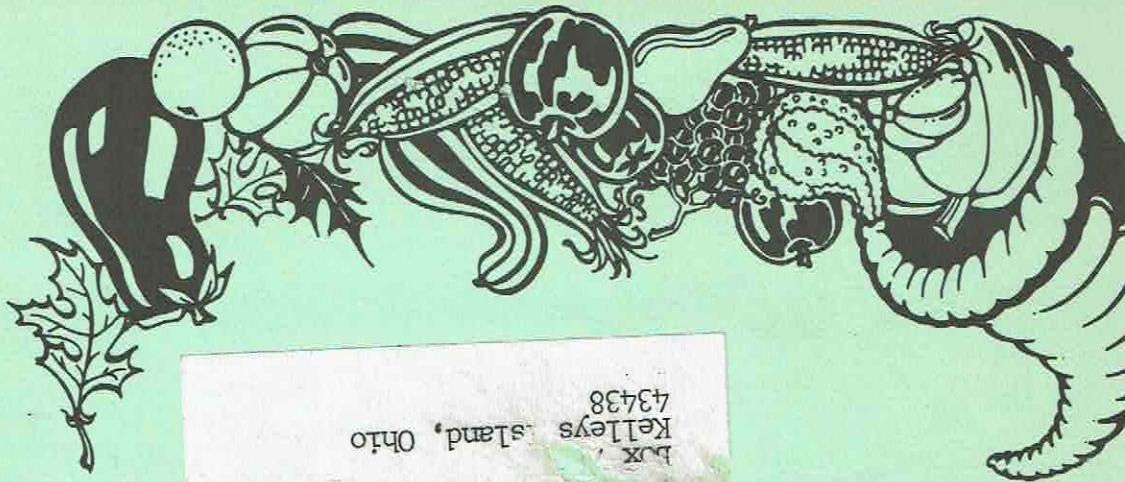
