

HIGHLIGHTS OF VILLAGE COUNCIL MEETING

Thursday, January 7, 1982 Compiled from minutes by Carol Vogler

Councilwoman MARY SHOCK was appointed by MAYOR MCCUNE to act as secretary in the absence of PAT HAIG, who was absent due to a death in the family.

A letter from JAKE MARTIN was read requesting that he be excused from the meeting as he is vacationing in Florida. Roll Call: BIANCHI, No; MATSO, Yes; MYERS, Yes; SCHOCK, Yes; YOSCOVITS, No.

No report from Finance Committee.

LANDS AND BUILDINGS

MATSO reports broken window damage in Town Hall due to athletic activities and a need to repair the fish netting which hangs from the ceiling as protection from basketball and volleyball damage.

A rate increase from \$15.00 per hour to \$30.00 was approved by council for the services of the Village Solicitor.

MAYOR McCUNE reported that the village will receive \$26,000 from the Ohio Litter Control Grant. He appointed LEYROY MYERS and YOSCOVITS as Financial Committee members to meet with him and discuss what machinery or equipment will be purchased from money alloted.

VILLAGE CLERK APPLICANTS

The Mayor reported that four applications were received for the position of Village Clerk. SHARON BIANCHI was appointed to fill the position beginning April 1, 1982. She will work with the present clerk, PAT HAIG, to prepare for the job.

TAXES

A letter from Representative FRED DEERING was read concerning the piggyback tax in connection with the business tax. A citizen's vote will be needed if the tax goes over a 1½ percent tax. Issue tabled for more study.

OIL AND GAS BIDS

Bids for oil and gas will be accepted by the council. Solicitor BILL SMITH is preparing the necessary legislation. Those interested may obtain more information by contacting council members or the Mayor.

LINCOLN ROAD

A letter was read from Bay Title Research statin that Lincoln Road is the property of the village a the way to the lake. This was recorded in 1859 i the county office according to the report. The Mayor read a latter from BURT MILLER stating he has never stopped a village employee from getting stone. Also he is willing to give the Fir Chief a key, allowing them access to his road o Division Street in case of fire emergency. lengthy discussion followed. FOX and YOSCO VITS desire the road open at all times. MATSO would rather see them abide by MILLER's wishe rather than a lawsuit. Mayor explains the necessity of opening Island Market and Grul roadway also. If they force the opening of MILLER's right away, he emphasizes that all should be treated equally.

SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL LICENSE FEE

BIANCHI reads a letter from the Environmental Protection Agency concerning Housebill 692 regarding solid waste disposal license fees being raised from \$1.00 to \$1,300.00. Mayor responde that the village has already paid the \$1.00 fee, swill not be immediately subject to the raise.

The Board of Public Affairs' letter was read concerning the hiring of GEORGE BUTTS for Water Consultant in 1982. Council voted unanimously to have Solicitor BILL SMITH draw up necessary legislation.

Castle Inn burns down

PUT-IN-BAY — A fire Wednesday afternoon leveled the Castle Inn, a landmark hotel and restaurant on South Bass Island.

A spokeswoman for the Put-in-Bay Police said the blaze apparently started about 4:30 p.m. in the upper area of the two story building, and burned for about 15 minutes before it was discovered.

Firefighters were sent to the scene, but were unable to save the wood and brick structure, which burned to its concrete foundation in less than an hour. Fire crews remained at the scene all night.

Several occupants, all believed to be employees, were in the inn when the fire started, and were able to get out of the building safely. Several of the occupants were treated for minor bruises and smoke inhalation.

The cause of the blaze and the estimated damage have not been determined. It is not believed the cause of the fire is of suspicious nature, but investigators from the office of the state fire marshal will probably be contacted.

Wiring blamed

PUT-IN-BAY — An electrical malfunction is thought to be the cause of a Wednesday afternoon

fire which destroyed the Castle Inn on South Bass Island, but investigators from the office of the state fire marshal are officially ruling the cause unknown.

Put-In-Bay Police Chief Thomas Ohlemacher said arson was never suspected, but investigators were called because of the value of the loss, estimated to be between \$100,000 and \$150,000. The 100-year-old building burned to its foundation in less than an hour, despite efforts by island firefighters.

The operators of the inn, A and Joanne Poulous, lived ther and were in the process of purchasing it. The building is owned by Robert Yarborough Cuyahoga Falls, Ohio.

Ohlemacher said the Poulouses had put a lot of mone into refurbishing the interior of the inn and had planned to make exterior improvements this spring.




ISLAND LADIES TO HOLD BALL February 9, 1934

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

REPORT LARGE FISH CATCHES NEAR KELLEYS Arthur McKillips Sets New Hook And Line Record of 90 In Single Day February 9, 1934

At the first report of a large catch the number of fishermen on the island began to enlarge and now there are over thirty fish shanties about the island with each fisherman reporting a large catch every day.

The record for one day is held by ARTHUR McKILLIPS who has caught 90 fish. The largest fish caught was a five pound pickerel, which was snagged by FRANK SENNISH. The average catch at present is about 60 per day, and that is very close to the record held by the old timers of the island.

Winter fishing on the island is merely a winter sport and the catches are usually distributed among friends and relatives.

The first successful crossing of the ice by iceboat from this island to Lakeside in about five years was accomplished here today by RAY ELFERS, local iceboat enthusiast.

Elfers made the four mile trip today after having tried unsuccessfully Thursday. He made good time in a brisk wind, but suffered considerably from the intense cold.



It is reported that the ice is from eight to ten inches thick, sufficient to hold the weight of an automobile and passengers.
