

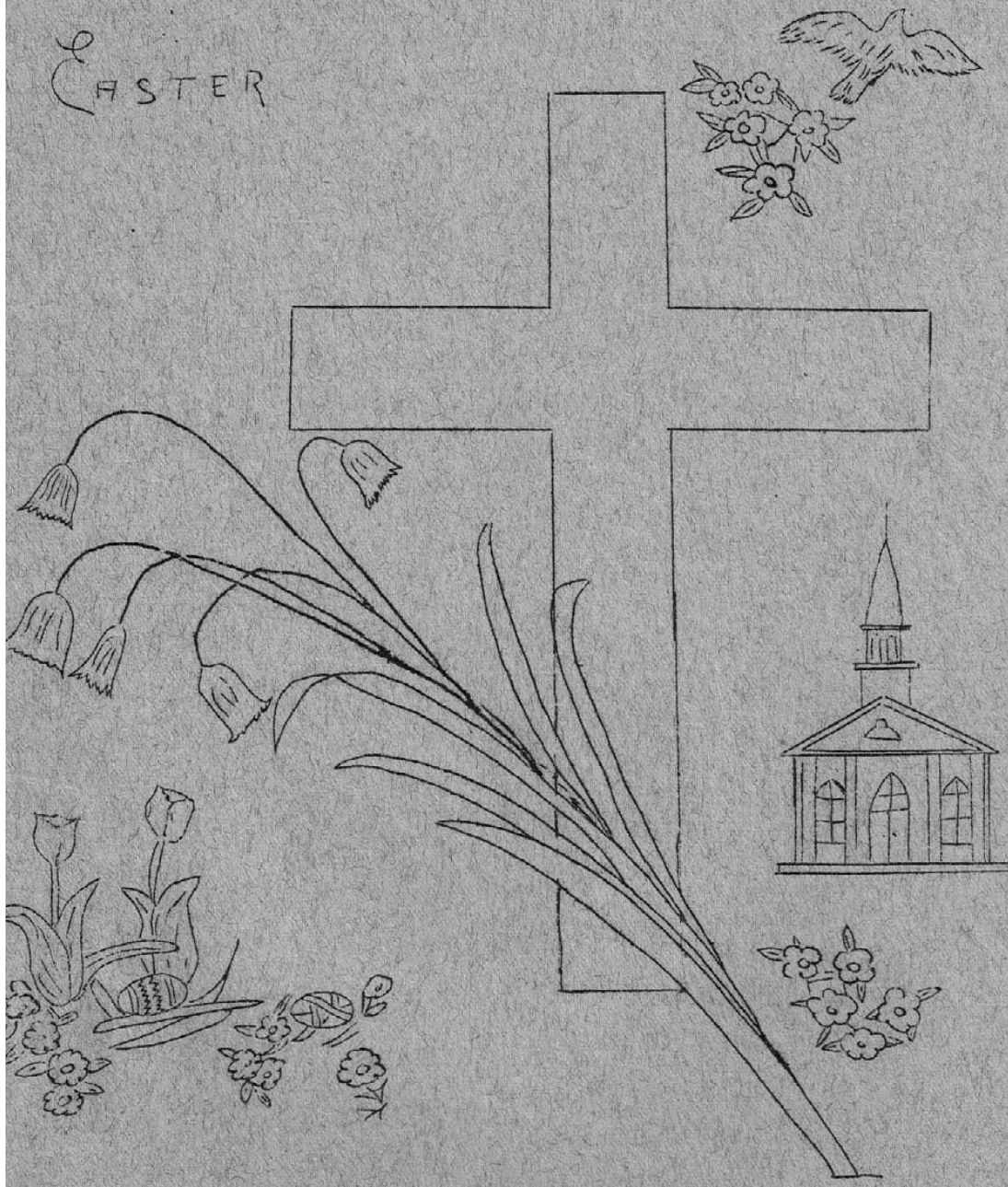

The Staff hopes that every one had a very nice Easter, although it was quite cold for some of the new spring outfits.

We also hope that the Easter Bunny was very generous with his colored eggs and nicely decorated Easter baskets.

Saint Patrick was a patron of Ireland and a Saint of the Roman Catholic Church. He was born at Bannavem which may have been in England near the Severn estuary or in Scotland near the modern city of Bumbarton. He lived from about 387 to 463.

Saint Patrick had a romantic, adventurous life. At the age of sixteen he was captured by privates from Ireland. They carried him back there, and set him to tending the flocks of a chieftain in Ulster. After six years of slavery he became a devoted Christian. Later he escaped to France and became a monk. In 432 a vision led him to return to Ireland as a missionary bishop. He became known as the one who "found Ireland all heathen and left it all Christian." Over 300 churches were founded by Saint Patrick, and more than 120,000 people were baptized.

There are many legends about this saint. One is that he charmed the snakes of Ireland down to the seashore so that they were driven into the water and drowned.

For a thousand years many of his relics were held sacred, but during the Reformation some of them were destroyed. A four sided iron bell is in the Museum of Arts and Sciences in Dublin and an ancient stone chair is on the Rock of Cashel.

Saint Patrick's feast day is celebrated throughout the world, wherever there are Irish people. It falls on March 17th.

March, the third month of the year, is called the windy month and blows in the spring and ends the winter. The name March honors Mars, the war god of Roman Mythology.

The vernal equinox falls on March 21. On this day the time between sunrise and sunset is exactly twelve hours.

On the ancient Roman Calendar, March was the first month. Julius Caesar made it the third month when he changed the calendar. But for a hundred years afterward, some countries in Europe continued to count March as the first month of the legal year. England did not make the change until around the middle of the 1700's.

There are many superstitions about the month of March. A saying which is frequently quoted is "If March comes in like a lion, it will go out like a lamb." Another saying is that the last three days of the month are "borrowed" from April. Still another calls the first three days "blind days" because they are "unlucky". Some farmers are so superstitious about the three "unlucky" days that they will not plant seed on those days.

March has no national holidays. Before the "lame duck" amendment of 1933, March 4 of every fourth year was inauguration day for the President of the United States. He is now inaugurated on January 20. March 17 is celebrated by the Irish as the feast day of St. Patrick. In the United States, income tax returns are due, as everyone well knows.

The birthstone for March is the aquamarine or bloodstone. The flower is the violet, but in the northern part of the United States and in Canada, it does not appear until the month is past.

## EASTER

Easter is the springtime religious festival which honors the resurrection, or rising from the dead, of Jesus. To Christian people, Easter is joyous for three reasons. One is that it marks the return to life of Christ. The second is that it means the end of the forty days of Lent. The third means that in the North Temperate Zone it comes in early spring. It is the time when flowers and warm sun and green grass push aside the snow and dreary cold of winter. Even before the holiday had its religious meaning, people greeted spring with celebrations.

Easter takes its name in English from that of an Anglo-Saxon goddess, Eostre, who represented light, or spring. A festival in her honor was held every April.

The Anglican and other Protestant churches observe Easter with special services, music, and flowers. Many of the churches hold a special baptismal service. The celebration of Easter in the Catholic church is prepared for from Ash Wednesday. From that day until the end of Lent, fasting is prescribed, special devotions are held, and many entertainments and amusements are given up by the faithful. Holy Week (the seven days before Easter) is a time of deep religious feeling and worship. A joyous mass on Easter Sunday closes the Catholic observance. The Jewish Passover comes at about the same time as the Christian Easter. It is also a time of rejoicing, and is celebrated with feasts, stories, folksongs, and games.

Many Easter customs are quaint, and others are full of meaning. Just as the earth is dressed in a new cloak of greenery, people too are expected to wear bright new clothes. The Easter parade is always

a gay one. The idea of Easter eggs originated in Persia. The eggs are a sign of new life, and legend has it that they are laid by the Easter rabbit on Easter eve. In every celebration of Easter a picture or model of the Cross is present to remind one of the day's religious meaning. White lilies decorate every church altar, as a symbol of purity and light.

The first Nicene Council, A.D. 325, fixed Easter as the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after March 21. The earliest possible date of Easter is March 22; the latest is April 25.

## EASTER LILY

The Easter Lily is a beautiful flower which has come to be a sign of Easter. It is a tall plant with long pointed leaves. The large, fragrant flowers are a waxy white in color, and are shaped like a trumpet.

There are many kinds of Easter lilies. The Madonna lily of Southern Europe was formerly grown by American florists. Its periods of blooming, however, are not regular, and the flowers often do not bloom until several weeks after Easter. New kinds of Easter lilies have been brought to America from China, Japan, and Bermuda. The Bermuda Easter lily blooms early in the season. The Chinese and Japanese lilies bloom in June or July when grown in the open ground. Both these kinds can be forced to bloom just before Easter when grown in hot-houses, however. The Chinese and Japanese kinds are hardier than the Bermuda Easter Lily.

All kinds of the Easter lily are produced from *Lilium Longiflorum*, which belongs to the family Liliaceae.

Mr. Seeholzer was born August 15, 1888 at Kelleys Island, Ohio. He went to St. Michaels' school for the first seven years and finished the rest of his education at Estes School.

In 1907, he went to work for the Kelleys Island Lime and Transport Company and worked for that company until 1940 when they suspended operations at the Island.

In 1918, he received and accepted an invitation from Uncle Sam to attend a party he was having in France.

On January 28, 1928 he was married to Miss Henrietta Lange and to them was born a son James on August 12, 1929. Jim is now serving with the U. S. Army at Fort Lewis, Washington.

The Seeholzers were blessed with the 1951 Senior Class of Kelleys Island High School on March 12, 1933.

"Hooks" has been the school janitor since 1940.

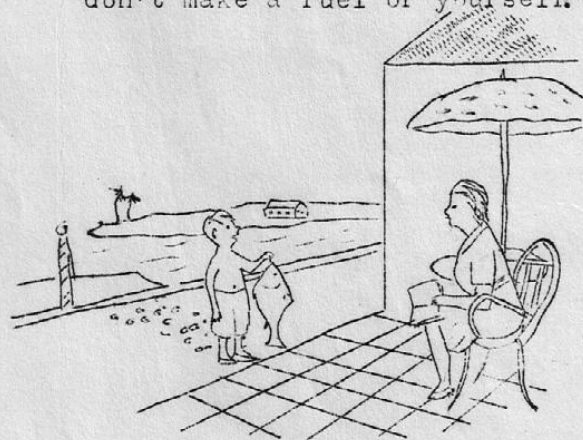

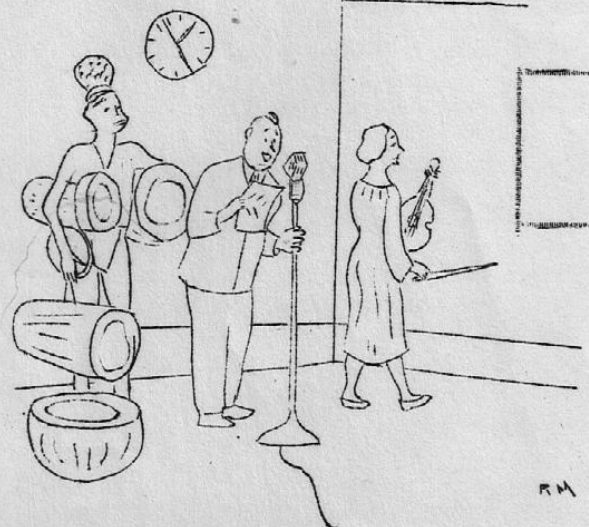

Recipe For March

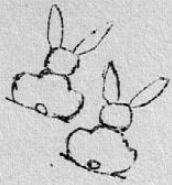
Blend strong winds and snow-

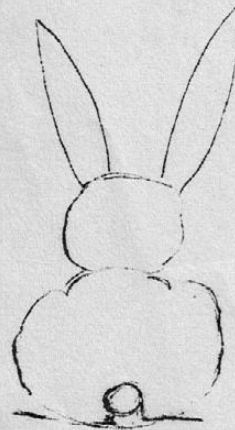
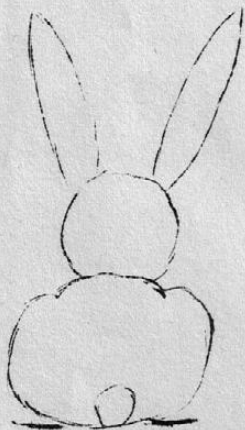
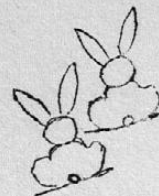
