Upon my return to Syracuse and realizing I didn't have my change purse, I started calling places I had been in while on the island. I was so


relieved when I called Kelleys Cove and as soon as I mentioned my name, they said they had my change purse. I gave them my address and within days I had my change purse back along with its contents.

A Redwood Tree on Kelleys Island?

Yes, it is true, but of course it didn't grow here. Allen's Original World Famous Redwood Log House, is made from a limb of a 1900-year-old giant California Redwood tree. While everyone has probably heard about the phenomenal size of Redwood trees, at the West Bay Inn islanders and visitors will be able to experience a Redwood tree that's not only as large as a house, but has also been turned into one.

The Redwood Log house is truly a unique exhibit. It took two men nearly a year to construct this rare home.

A fully furnished hand-carved three room home, including the furnishings, was made from a hollowed limb of a Redwood tree. It is 33 feet long, 8 feet wide and 9 feet 4 inches in height at the largest end. The limb was cut from a Redwood at the Georgia Pacific Lumber Co. near Eureka, California, when Redwoods were still being legally harvested.



Kelleys Island's horticultural past to be celebrated at The Getaway Subdivision

Kelleys Island was once known for growing grapes and fruit. John Kuyoth explained to naturalist Walt Reiner that five (5) acres is what a German needed to survive economically and grow grapes. Mr. Kuyoth described how his five (5) acres has the old grape mounds running north and south in his woods, whereas the two Getaway tracts of five (5) acres plus have the mounds running east and west.

The Getaway 13 lot subdivision and two waterfront lots now have approximately five (5) fruit trees planted on each lot. They include a disease resistant apple, two types of sweet cherries, two types of sour cherries good for pies, two types Asian

pears and a European plum. The trees were selected by naturalist Walt Reiner and a nursery for ease of grow-

Neighbors assisting in the project were John and Jean Kuyoth who supplied the raw material for making hackberry stakes to support the tree cages. Mr. and Mrs. Glen Holzhauser donated some of their chain link fence that is wrapped around the stakes. Hopefully this fence will protect the trees from deer and rabbits which particularly like the bark of young trees in winter.

Walt Reiner hopes that the trees will prosper and the healthy fruit will be enjoyed by residents.

In December Kelleys Island School received a grant from the National Endowment for the Humanities. The teaching materials provided by the "Picturing America" initiative gave students the opportunity to study the work of famous American artists in the context of American history.

7- 10 graders chose an artist from the work of 40 artists provided by the grant. Students were given a 3-part assignment which included a 2 page biography, a 20 slide power point presentation and a studio project inspired by the work of their artist. Michael did an excellent job reporting on the work of John Audubon and creating a beautiful drawing of a bird in oil pastel. Additional artists chosen to study included: Ben Krzynowek studied Norman Rockwell, Billy studied Charles Sheeler, Crystal studied Thomas Cole, Rusty studied M.C. Wyeth, Tyler studied Edward Hopper, and Ty Bell studied the life and work of Winslow Homer. Overall the lengthily project proved to be very successful and students discovered how the work of these artists often reflected events in American history.

Avoid electrical hazards around water

• Keep outlets near hot tubs, spas, and pools covered and dry between uses. New outlet covers are available that offer weather protection while a plug is inserted into the outlet.

• Keep cords and plugs away from hot tubs, spas, pools, and puddles from wet bathers. Never handle electrical items, plugs, or outlets when wet. If an electrical product falls into water, do not reach into the water for it. Make sure you are dry and not in contact with water or metal surfaces, and unplug it immediately or shut off the circuit powering the item.

• Outlets on or near hot tubs, spas, and pools should be protected by a ground fault circuit interrupter (GFCI). Many older swimming pools that pre-date the introduction of GFCIs in the 1970s should be upgraded to add GFCI protection for branch circuits supplying power to underwater pool lights operating above 15 volts, and outlets within 20 feet of the pool.

Note, however, that when a person gets immersed in an isolated body of water, like a hot tub, the water could become electrified without involving a ground fault as the electric current passes through water (and perhaps a person) from one electrical pole to the opposite pole. In this case, the GFCI may not provide shock or electrocution protection.

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All Boat Trailers Are Not Created Equal

You researched your boat before you bought it. The trailer you use to transport it is just as important, so you should research it before you buy it as well. The type of trailer you buy will depend on factors, such as the size, weight and style of your boat, what type of vehicle you will be using to haul the boat and how often you will be towing your boat.

There are two basic types of boat trailers: bunk and roller. The bunk trailer is the less expensive of the two and is suitable for deeper water. The roller trailer is suitable for shallow water. Some trailers combine the two types of technology but are more expensive.

Along with the type, you should

consider the hauling capabilities of the trailer as well as its construction. The trailer you choose should be able to haul boats heavier than yours. It may be made of galvanized steel or aluminum, neither of which will rust but may decay.

Features can run the gamut. Brake and turn lights are required by law. Safety chains are essential, and the hauling vehicle must have a trailer hitch. It's illegal, not to mention dangerous, to attach a trailer to the bumper of a vehicle.

Other features are not required, but having them will make loading and unloading easier. A locking feature will attach the trailer to your boat. A load guide will help center the boat on the trailer. Smaller trailers typically have a guide hoist to get the boat on the trailer, while larger trailers have a one- or twospeed mechanical winch. A transom saver will support the boat's engine by reducing pressure. A swing tongue, swivel jack and hitch swivel will also help.

The tires on the trailer need to be weather resistant. They can be radial or non-radial. Radial tires will last longer than ply tires and offer better traction and stability and less rolling resistance. Non-radial tires are designed for use in extreme driving conditions, such as dirt, sand, snow and mud. They offer little in the way of shock absorption. You can reduce wear and tear by selecting tires with a high ply number and a large diameter.

You spent all that money on your boat. Doesn't it make sense to tow it using the best possible trailer you can afford? Imagine what would happen if you didn't.

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

Hard to appreciate Canadian Soldiers/Mayflies are indicator of improved lake quality

Background Mayflies are abundant throughout the world but that's no consolation when we get buried with them up here on Kelleys. The presence of the nymph (aquatic stage) of this insect in stream or lake sediment is an indication of good water quality because of their sensitivity to pollution. Mayflies were very abundant in Lake Erie waters until the early 1950s when pollution from various sources contaminated the sediment. The discharge of nutrients into Lake Erie caused excessive growth of nuisance algae. As the algae died and rained down on the sediment, oxygen was depleted. This led to a drastic reduction in the annual Mayfly invasion. (Our family and most other families I know of, have always called these bugs Canadian Soldiers. I don't even understand the Mayfly designation because they don't come until the end of June--usually.)

In 1972, the International Water Quality Agreement was developed between the United States and Canada to curb pollution. As a result of that agreement and other pollution abatement programs established by the bordering states and Canadian provinces, mayflies are now making a comeback along the shores of Lake Erie. The massive resurgence of these mayflies was first noticed in the shal-


low western basin in 1994 and has now moved to the central and eastern basins. The presence of mayflies is an indication that pollution controls established on Lake Erie have greatly improved the water quality and sediment conditions. In 1997, the return of the large mayfly, Hexagenia spp. provided continued signs that the water quality was good enough to support large populations of this insect. And the numbers for 1999 assured us that the mayflies were firmly established.

Before severe pollution plagued Lake Erie, mayflies were familiar to most lakeshore dwellers. Several kinds of mayflies lived in the soft bottom mud of shallow regions of the lake; others crawled on submersed bedrock and boulders along the shoreline and the shallow reefs of the western basin. However, only one type, Hexagenia, known locally in the United States as "Canadian sailor" usually drew the attention of the nonbiologist. Winged Hexagenia emerge from the lake, often synchronously and in huge numbers, forming swarms along and inland of the shoreline. The insects don't bite, but their swarms are generally considered a nuisance. They are attracted to and congregate under bright lights, and decomposing piles of the insects

smell fishy and serve as breeding grounds for flies. Swarms of Hexagenia can also pose a traffic hazard. Thousands of mayflies resting on the pavement in the glow of streetlights get flattened by cars, making the roads dangerously slick.

Hexagenia virtually disappeared from Lake Erie in the mid-1950s, but in a surprise comeback, the insect reappeared in the western basin in the early 1990s. Now, its numbers are once again commanding public attention. At least one south shore city on the western basin posted road signs in the summer of 1996 warning motorists of slippery conditions due to the "mayfly hatch." In June of the same year, Hexagenia caused a brownout over much of northwestern Ohio when many of them were attracted to the lights of a major electrical substation near the lake shore, settled on the equipment, and conducted electricity across the insulators. Although in general there appears to be no direct impact on human health caused by the mayfly swarms, a few accounts refer to an allergic reaction called "Junebug fever". For most people, though, the mayfly swarms are just an annoyance, as the insects fly into people's mouths, or land on their clothes, or crawl into their hair and behind their eyeglasses.

Before their disappearance in the 1950s, the bottom-dwelling nymphs of Hexagenia were important in the diets of Lake Erie sport and commercial fishes. In addition, these larger fish ate forage fishes, which also ate Hexagenia. Fishes that fed on nymphs included yellow perch (Perca flavescens), freshwater (Aplodinotus grunniens), channel catfish (Ictalurus punctatus), trout perch (Percopsis omiscomaycus), spottail shiner (Notropis hudsonius), silver chub (Hybopsis storerianus), and mooneye (Hiodon tergisus). The nymphs were especially easy prey for most kinds of fish when they swam from the bottom sediments up to the surface of the lake to molt. Fish also seized the winged mayflies as they rested on the water or flew over it. On shore, many birds devoured them, making Hexagenia an important part of both the aquatic and near-shore food webs. With its comeback, evidence since the early 1990s indicates that Hexagenia once again is becoming a major component in the diets of several Lake Erie fishes, including vellow perch, freshwater drum, and trout perch.

Listen to a Vet...it may save a life

Their stories are legion. The stress behind their stories, stress that combat veterans often hold tight inside, can be painful and destructive.

There was the Marine in Afghanistan who told me he has post-traumatic stress disorder so bad he can't stand to be safe at home, where he sometimes drops to the floor, thinking a loud noise is an incoming mortar. He keeps volunteering to return to combat, where his hair-trigger reflexes make sense. Where he's comfortable.

For veterans, telling their stories can be helpful. Having someone listen? Priceless.

With a new generation of veterans returning from combat and military suicides on an alarming rise, listening is the idea behind a global alert from the Veterans of Foreign Wars to its 2.2 million members. Find a vet. Offer to listen

"The need has overwhelmed the capacity of government and civilian mental health centers," said VFW Commander Glen M. Gardner, Jr., who served as a Marine in Vietnam.

"I urge every VFW member to get immediately involved by seeking out and extending a hand of friendship and help" to local veterans. "Our government cannot battle this enemy alone, nor should that 22-year-old combat veteran," Gardner said in a May 29 appeal to his members.

For most combat veterans, the stress of wartime deployment eases over time.

"Whether people have full-blown PTSD or just some of the symptoms, most people do get better over a short period of time with the support of family and friends," said Dr. Sonja Batten, deputy director of the Pentagon's Center of Excellence for Psychological Health and Traumatic Brain Injury.

For returning combat vets, that's called "beer-pizza-sex-sleep" therapy.

For those whose adjustment difficulties persist, acknowledging the problem and accepting help can be difficult. There is a stigma attached to asking for help, even if it's self-imposed.

Military people "are trained to be

self-sufficient and strong, and the idea of asking for help can feel like it's going against that training," said Batten.

In fact, being self-sufficient and strong is critical to success in battle, said Dr. William Nash, a psychiatrist who ran combat stress programs for the Marine Corps. "Stoicism is necessary for survival," he told me.

"But everybody has a breaking

One night before a combat mission in Afghanistan, Marines were giddy with laughter telling me the story of an Iraqi dog they named Molly who picked up and carried around the leg of a suicide bomber who'd blown himself up at a checkpoint in Ramadi. Laughter was how these hardened combat veterans steeled themselves against the horror of war. "We were going, 'Bad dog! Put that thing down!"" one Marine chortled through tears of glee. "Bad dog!"

There was the GI on patrol in

There was the GI on patrol in South Vietnam. A sudden 'crack' and the radioman went down, and the soldier turned to see a young boy with huge brown eyes and a smoking .45 taped to his hand by Viet Cong. Without hesitation, the GI stitched the boy in half with his M-16. The patrol resumed. But the soldier was never the same, and held that awful experience deep inside for decades until I offered to listen.

"Until tonight," he said over beers at a smoky VFW Hall, "I hadn't thought about this stuff for 30 years." But holding it in can be harmful.

A World War II veteran in his 80s held his terrible secret until it nearly killed him. Landing at Normandy on D-Day he fought his way across the beach, but many of his buddies died in the sand. The next day he was assigned to go back to the beach to collect body parts. He soldiered on across France and Germany, came home after the war, started a family and worked a full career as a firefighter, retiring with honors -- and grand-children.

He never talked about his wartime experiences. But one night several years ago he woke up screaming, seeing in his nightmares the broken bodies of his D-Day buddies. The agony continued unabated until he sought help.

VFW Commander Gardner tells the story of a combat veteran who twice weighed suicide before wandering into a VFW hall where a couple of Vietnam vets were standing around the bar. They offered to listen; the Iraq veteran talked – gratefully.


Having fellow veterans listen is special – critical, said Gardner. "We have walked in their shoes," he said. "We have to look them in the eye and

say, 'Everything is going to be all right.'''

But therapists advise that it's best to just listen – and not try to "fix" a veteran's stress.

"Someone who's always trying to look on the bright side," said Batten, "can be really annoying."

Summer reading: It's A Page Turner

Want to get your kids' heads way from the video game and computer screens this summer? Take them to the library and help them find some books. There are many great children's books available, some of which are Newbery and Caldecott Medal winners.

In 1921, Frederic G. Melcher came up with the idea of presenting an award for the most distinguished children's book. Backed by children's librarians, the American Library Association's Executive Board approved the proposal for the award in 1922 and the Newbery Medal was born. The award was named after 18th-century English bookseller John Newbery and was first given for The Story of Mankind by Hendrik Willem

van Loon in 1922.

Concerned that the artists creating children's picture books weren't getting the awarded to the most distinguished picture book of the year. The medal was named after 19th-century English illustrator Randolph J. Caldecott and was first given for Animals of the Bible, A Picture Book, illustrated by Dorothy P. Lathrop with text selected by Helen Dean Fish in 1938. There have been many other Newbery and Caldecott Medal winners. Some of these include the

following.
Sarah, Plain and Tall by Patricia MacLachlan won the Newbery Medal in 1986. The book deals with loss, love and abandonment, as Sarah from Maine answers an ad

placed by a widowed midwestern farmer with two children. The children become attached to Sarah and fear she is leaving them when she goes to town. Sarah is not and returns home with colored pencils to show the children how beautiful Maine is.

Maniac Magic by Jerry Spinelli won the Newbery Medal in 1991. The book tells the story of a boy named Jeffery Lionel "Maniac" Magee in folk tale form. Magee can outrun dogs, tie a knot that can't be untied and hit a home run off the best pitcher in the neighborhood. In addition to doing all of this, Magee confronts the issue of racism in his small town of Two Mills, while trying to find a home where none exists and soothing tensions between rival factions from the rough side of town.

Out of the Dust by Karen Hesse won the Newbery Medal in 1998. The book tells the story of an Oklahoma girl in stanza form, as she battles the heat, dust and wind during the Great Depression.

The Higher Power of Lucky by Susan Patron won the Newbery Medal in 2007. The book tells the story of Lucky, a 10-year-old girl who lives with her dog and her French guardian in Hard Pan, CA, a town of 43. Lucky eavesdrops on various 12-step meetings in Hard Pan in the hopes of finding something to help her through her difficulties.

The Fool of the World and the Flying Ship illustrated by Uri Shulevitz and written by Arthut Ransome won the Caldecott Medal in 1969. The book is based on Russian

folklore and tells the story of the third son, who thanks to magical powers granted to him by the Listener, Swift-goer and Drinker, performs tasks the Czar has given him and wins the princess.

The Funny Little Woman illustrated by Blair Lent and written by Arlene Mosel won the Caldecott Medal in 1973. The book tells the story of a little woman who is captured by wicked creatures while chasing a dumpling. The way she escapes gives her the means of becoming the richest woman in

Song and Dance Man illustrated by Stephen Gammel and written by Karen Ackerman won the Caldecott Medal in 1989. The book tells the story of a grandfather, once a vaudeville song and dance man, who receives a visit from his three grandchildren. In the attic, the children find an old trunk and Grandpa proceeds to put on show for them, revising his old act.

Kitten's First Full Moon by Kevin Henkes won the Caldecott Medal in 2005. The book tells the story of Kitten who thinks the full moon is a bowl of milk and proceeds to try to lick it, but instead gets a bug on her tongue and falls down the stairs while trying to catch it.

"Our Father Who Art on Kelleys - Always"

My Dad, James Robert Kiskin, passed away this year on March 19. He loved Kelleys and he always told me that his fondest memories during his life were spent right here on Kelleys Island. For me, it all began in 1966 when our family had our first summer vacation at my Aunt Juanita's cottage on Keampfe Lane. My Aunt Karol still lives in the same cottage today.

Back then, we drove up to Neuman's Ferry Dock in a white Chevrolet Impala station wagon loaded down with all the food and gear our family would need for a week's vacation. I was wearing a pair of brand new Red Dot Keds and my mother embraced the style of Jacquelyn Kennedy. Seeing the Island for the first time across the waters of

Lake Erie was truly exciting.

The ferry wasn't due for back at the dock for a while. So, my dad drove up to the bait store and bought a bucket of shiners. We all got our Zebco fishing poles out of the station wagon and began fishing. Before the ferry got there, my two older brothers, my little sister and I caught a bucket full of perch in pure enjoyment.

I have been back to Kelleys every year since then because it is a special place filled with many fond memories of my own and also of my "Dear Ole Dad". The following is a poetic verse that my dad scribed 14 years after our first family vacation at Kelleys Island while he was camping at the State Park.

"And Let There Be Light" Still dark enough outside the tent for a flashlight

Outside, birds beginning to stir

Opened the tent door and glanced toward the eastern Lake Erie sky.

Standing there, awe stricken with the sight, suddenly I felt gripped with a momentary sensation that God and all His majestic powers had indeed sent down a piece of heaven for my exclusive viewing.

A broad ribbon of blazing pink tucked between two bright fluffy cloud layers extended from the northeastern tip of the isle northward beyond Pelee Island and the Canadian mainland. There it disappeared over the horizon.

As if rising from the lake depths itself, a blazing crown pierced the distant horizon and slowly cast its gold-

en-tinted rays in a westward path, reflecting a mirror-like brilliance over the placid waters of the tranquil cove.

Encompassed by this celestial panorama, tiny white clouds, streaked with shades of luminous pink dotted the morning sky, appearing like so many golden-fleeced swans, supported by the brilliant rays of the rising sun.

And within minutes, glittering sunbeams filtered through the trees, bathing my campsite with their early morning warmth.

Yes, the sun is shining and it is once again beautiful outside. What can each of us do to keep that sun shining brightly in our world? Look to Jesus Christ - the True Light and Peace of the world!



Ask Serving Our Seniors

Serving Our Seniors is a local, not-for-profit organization funded by the Erie County Senior Services Tax Levy. Serving Our Seniors is a geriatric social service agency that provides a variety of help to Erie County residents age 60 and better. The organization's purpose is to assist older people in maintaining their independent lifestyle.

Q: What is this "Drug Repository Program?" I hear some people talking about it, but I don't understand what it is?

A: It is a program that helps people who cannot afford to fill their prescriptions. The medications come from nursing homes and institutional pharmacies that package medications for use in nursing homes. Each pill is individually packaged so it is tamperproof, when donated to the Drug Repository Program. The Drug Repository was started by Serving Our Seniors and Buderer Drug Store. If you are an Erie County resident and you cannot afford your medicines, you should call Serving Our Seniors at 419-624-

Q: I have blood pressure medicines and cholesterol medicines that I don't take any more, because my doctor changed me to something else. How do I donate them to the Drug Repository?

A: You can't. By law, the Drug Repository can only accept donations from nursing homes and institutional pharmacies that package medication for use in a nursing home.

Q: Do you know someone who needs Lipitor and Norvasc? I no longer take these medicines and they are expensive. Who can I give them to, if I can't give them to the Drug Repository Program?

A: By law you cannot give prescription medication to someone who needs those medicines. If you did, you would be dispensing prescription medications without a license. Only a doctor or a pharmacist are licensed to dispense prescription medications. Your intentions are good, but unfortunately Serving Our Seniors knows of no place these valuable medications can be put to good use.

Q: I read something about donating cancer medications to the

Drug Repository Program. Is that allowed by law?

A: Not yet, but soon I hope. Thanks to Ohio Senator Mark Wagoner, he introduced an amendment that would make it legal for unopened bottles of pills that treat cancer, to be donated to Drug Repository Programs. At the time that this question is being answered, this change is still in "Conference Committee." I'm told that it looks very promising. (Cross your fingers!)

Q: My mother died of cancer. We had a lot of unused pain killers in the house when she died. Is that something that I can donate to the Drug Repository Program if this law is changed?

A: No. Although pain killers are used in the care of cancer patients, it is a drug that is not allowed to be donated. It is a controlled substance and there are a lot of rules and regulations that surround how to dispose of these drugs. They have a high street value (\$\$\$) and are heavily regulated to prevent the misuse and the illegal sale of these controlled substances.

Q: I live on Kelleys Island, I'm 60 years old and I will need to go to the Cleveland Clinic in late July for an appointment/ check up. Does Serving Our Seniors help with that?

A: Yes we do! If you are an Erie County resident, age 60+ call our office at 419-624-1856. Be prepared to tell us the following information: Date and time of appointment, the specific address of where you need to go (Cleveland Clinic has many buildings on its campus and it has many satellite campuses, too), the name and proper spelling of the doctor you will be seeing. Tell us if you are in a wheelchair, so we can use our handicapped accessible mini-bus. We will pick you up at the Kelleys Island Ferry Service and take you to your appointment and bring you back to the ferry. The earlier you call our office to request a ride, the easier it is to find a driver. The cost is an anonymous donation.

Q: I heard there is going to be a Senior Citizen Talent Show at the Erie County Fair. Is that true?

A: Yes!! I hope you Kelleys Islanders get together and plan a fun act to perform. We love vari-

ety!! This talent show is taking place at SENIOR FEST. Senior Fest is a day-long special event at the Erie County Fair specially designed to celebrate older ages. It starts at 9am on Friday, August 14th and it ends at 4pm.

Admission to the fair is free of charge, compliments of the Erie County Agricultural Society. Serving Our Seniors and Share A Ride would be happy to provide any interested senior's (age 60 +) with transportation to the Erie County Fair on that day.

There is something special about this talent show .. its open to the talented and the untalented.

There is a \$100 prize for the best act!! Participants just have to know how to be fun. Depending on how many entries we receive, we may have to do auditions to keep the talent show to 1 hour. For more information call Sara Warner, Talent Show Coordinator at Providence Care Center – 419-627-2273

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
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American Legion Post 555 holds the Flag Day ritual

The ceremony closed with a gun salute by the VFW Honor Guard and taps by Earl Davis.

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
