Another year has passed since Kelleys Islanders--resident, visitor, resident-to-be-gathered around the tall flagpole as two flags towered over us, flapping in the morning breezes. We gathered to remember our friends and family who gave their lives in battle.

Members of Kelleys Island VFW Post 9908 paraded from the Hall to the cemetery in sync--a proud group of men and a few women who served in the Army, Navy, Marines, Air Force,or Coast Guard and saw action all over the world. Standing erect and proud behind their flag, the memories of their private skirmishes tucked away from public view, these men and women were the visual testimony to what the national day of memorializing is all

Solemnly lowered to half staff, the vibrant Stars-and-Stripes and the dark reminder of those who haven't returned silenced the gathering children, young families, and inter-generational clans scattered among Kelleys Island graves. Many waved little flags. Even the dogs settled down.

Wreaths were laid by Commander Don Pat Seeholzer, and George Homegardner to fallen comrades, often their

own friends and family. Acting Quartermaster Bob Schwartz's booming voice, his faithful dog settled at his side and listening just as intently as the people gathered near, recalled the reason for this day of recognition, its history, and its enduring significance. He visualized for us the sight at Flander's Field, one of the most poignant visual memories for those of us who never saw a battlefield. Chaplain Bill Gorchester read a prayer, and Jim Wojtowicz retold the tragic story of the origins of playing taps, which came about because of a Union officer's mercy for a groaning Confederate soldier dying in the night, not knowing it was his own son whose body he tried to rescue. Haunting bagpipes, played by John Carrig, and patriotic songs offered by the Island Singers under the direction of Jennifer Koba framed the celebration and its reverent mood.

Post 9908 lost two members this year, L. J. Greek and Jim Hodgson, whose memorial funeral services were conducted with honors by their VFW fellows. Membership in the VFW is available to servicemen and women who participated in an overseas deployment. Those interested should contact Mike Feyedelem.

Hancock Wood reaches out regarding cap and trade allowances

The following went to all KI home and business owners in early May:

Dear Hancock-Wood member: We Need Your Help!

Congressional hearings are already underway on energy and climate change legislation, which centers on a proposal to create a capand-trade program to limit carbon and other greenhouse gas emissions. If passed, the program would set national limits on these emissions and force electric generating plants such as Buckeye Power to obtain emission allowance credits to continue to operate its coal plant. Under

this proposal, allowance credits would either be allocated to each entity or auctions off to the highest bidder.

The problem with either approach is that they increase costs on the electric consumer in advance of the development and deployment of a viable technology that allows for the capture of carbon. T his program is essentially a tax that is created to generate a revenue stream that Congress can use to fund other government initiatives.

There are those in Congress who feel that electric rates must rise in order to force consumers to change their behaviors as it pertains to protecting the environment. U.S>Representatives Henry Waxman of California and Ed Markey of Massachusetts intend to have a climate change proposal ready for a vote by May 31, 2009. Their proposal, under its current language WILL INCREASE YOUR ELECTRIC RATES. Utilities support Climate change legislation, but feel that any proposal must consider the cost impact on consumers.

It is crucial for Congress and electric cooperatives to work together. I urge you to review the enclosed brochure and take action immediate by support "Our Energy Our Future" campaign and by joining "Co-Op


Owners for Political Action. Grassroots support from cooperative consumers across the U.S. will ensure that our voices are head in Congress.

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

WE DID IT! Yes, we did! The count by Mike Feyedelem and Chief Ehrbar on March 1, 2009 was 128. On April 25, 2009 131 of the full time winter residents of Kelleys Island, Ohio read "To Kill a Mockingbird."

The celebration was hosted by the Sandusky Library on April 30. It began soon after the arrival of the 3:30 p.m. ferry. David Kipen, Program Director of the National Endowment for the Arts arrived in The Big Read Mobile and bought the pizza he promised if we neared our goal. Members of Sandusky Library Board of Directors, administrative staff, guests and staff arrived in the browns backers bus, followed by news media and other special guests.. Mayor Rob Quinn even flew in through a short break in the rainy fog.

The welcome came from Larry Corbus as he remembered how KI passed its first Sandusky Library levy by 94 to 4. He thought they were speaking of a percentage, NO, that was the actual count.

Kelleys Island's support of the library has always been phenomenal. Mr. Corbus then introduced Mr. John Hancock, President of the Sandusky Library Board of Directors. He spoke of the board's appreciation of Kelleys Island and the library's patrons. Bob Quinn spoke on behalf of the Kelleys Island School Board. Not enough can

be said of their support, participation and encouragement. All of the school staff participated from the Principal/Superintendent, administrative and teaching staff, students, secretary and janitor, but only counted were the staff living on the island, no day-flyers.


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2009 KIHA Home Tour announces homes



In other news, we are working on a plan to rehabilitate the basketball court at the park on Addison into a combination basketball and tennis court. The present condition of the court is poor and the addition of tennis should be a welcome component to our village. 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Nest With the Birds goes to school

On Tuesday, May 12, eager islanders and visitors appeared at the Kelleys Island Library for a special Nest With the Birds afternoon presentation by the Kindergarten through Fifth grade students from Kelleys Island School, led by their teacher, Mrs. Erin Sandvick. The community

members became the students, as Zuri O'Dee, Octavia Schnittker, Olivia Schnittker, Collin Nunn-Strassner, James O'Dee, Layne McNeal, and Gage Peterson became the instructors for the hour-long lesson on birds, focusing on beaks.

Mrs. Sandvick explained to

the crowd how the love of birding entered her life and curriculum through an encounter three years ago with a chance meeting of Mr. Tom Bartlett. She was hooked, and found that birding could become a spark for her science students at the end of the school year, right as their steam begins to run out and interest shifts to summertime! Students have continued with their studies of birds, through multimedia and partici-

of bird might have each type of beak, and why they were not best suited for each of the simulations.

The Ohio Department of Education has issued the Ohio Academic Content Standards (OACS) for grades K-12, which dictate what students should learn in each grade level, in each subject. The OACS states that "by the end of the K-2 program, students should be able to: A. Discover that there are living


pation in Nest With the Birds. (Girl Scout) Daisies Zuri O'Dee, Octavia Schnittker, and Olivia Schnittker have gone on bird walks as part of their nature activities for a patch.

Just as it is usually possible to look at a tool or a kitchen utensil and tell what the item is used for, the same is true for bird beaks. Each species has a beak with a particular shape and size that says a lot about what and how that type of bird eats. The youngest instructors answered a series of questions about the four things that living things need, and how the birds' beaks help them to eat, drink, bathe, feed their offspring, and build their nests.

Olivia and Collin led the first activity, with enthusiastic audience participation, a simulation of different types of birds attempting to get "food" (gummy worms and raisins) out of a "tree" (a modified egg carton) and put it in their stomachs (plastic cups) using only a tool meant to model a beak: wooden skewer, salad tongs, and chopsticks. The participant with the skewer was the survivor, because they had collected the most food with their beak, which was, as Olivia noted, supposed to replicate a woodpecker's beak. The student instructors explained the outcomes of each activity, what type things, non-living things and pretend things, and describe the basic needs of living things (organisms), B. Explain how organisms function and interact with their physical environment, and C. Describe similarities and differences that exist among individuals of the same kind of plants and animals. In addition to accomplishing the Life Science standards, these hands-on activities led by the students also helped them to hone their public speaking skills.

After the youngest students had completed their lesson, Layne, Gage, and James stepped up to the SMARTBoard and guided the audience through 2 spirited rounds of Avian Jeopardy. This game put the knowledge of the birders to the test, with categories such as birdcalls, markings, and the ever-popular "Warblers."

All of the students did a fabulous job, and were rewarded by Pat Hayes with some official Audubon patches and a round of applause from the audience. Mrs. Sandvick is very proud of her young birders. Thank you to the community members and guests that attended the lesson - the students hope that you certainly walked away with at least one new piece of information.


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CNT, Manufacturing Tech Students Earn 100% assessment passage rate

Ohio Core: Not Your Parent's High School Curriculum

It used to be that anyone could be a backyard mechanic. Remember how you could tune up your car, adjust the carburetor, and diagnose trouble just by listening to the purr or rumble of your engine?

Not anymore. Today's cars are loaded with high-tech electronics and computer components that babyboomer parents and grandparents couldn't even have imagined as youngsters. Higher-level mathematics, science, engineering and technology skills are now the norm for today's automotive technicians and other skilled laborers.

Technology has gone mainstream. Our handheld calculators have more computing power than early space capsules. In fact, the computer technology in today's vehicles is nearly 1,000 times more powerful than what guided the Apollo moon mission. (Auto alliance.org).

Even Ohio's largest industry, agribusiness - what we used to call farming - is now dependent upon sophisticated satellite connections, computers and mathematics to figure acreage, tillage, fertilizer dispersal rates and a host of other calculations.

Our kids are wired to one another through MySpace or Facebook. They've even replaced talking for hours on the telephone with shooting text messages between cell phones in nano-second. E-mail is already passé with adolescents - YouTube is the newest medium of expressive communications.

Yet, for all the technological changes in our children's everyday lives, many parents don't realize that education must change to keep up.

For the reality is that education that was sufficient for parents isn't what today's students need. To compete and collaborate in a global marketplace, students will need advanced skills and knowledge that are far different from what adults learned in high school or college even 10 years

Jobs and careers in the 21st century will demand even more technologically savvy students, creative and innovative thinkers, and young entrepreneurs who can communicate and collaborate across cultures, countries and continents.

To meet these demands, Ohio educators and legislators have reviewed and updated core education requirements and established the "Ohio Core" to ensure students will be ready to succeed in the world they will face.

Under the new requirements, today's seventh-graders - the Class of 2014 - will need an additional year of math and lab-based science to get a diploma.

In addition, these revised standards are a bit more challenging than in years past.

- Students will complete 20 credits that include more rigorous courses like Algebra II or its equivalent.
- Financial literacy instruction must be provided to all students before they earn a diploma.
- Science will involve questioning that is open-ended with an inquirybased laboratory experience, asking students to engage in science to solve real-life problems.
- And even though it's still an elective, speaking a foreign language will be basic to anyone's education as our U.S. population continues to become more diverse.

To help parents, students, teachers and school administrators understand what's expected of our high school students, the Ohio Department of Education (ODE) created nine indepth Web pages that explain the Ohio Core, provide answers to frequently asked questions, and give guidance to schools and districts about what courses should be offered. These found can www.ode.state.oh.us, keywords search: Ohio Core.

"The Ohio Core will give our high school students the kind of preparation they need to succeed in entrylevel jobs, apprenticeships, military service and college," said Stan Heffner, associate superintendent of the Center for Curriculum and Assessment at ODE.

"There's an economic-workforce driver here, but there's also the individual empowerment of Ohio students to believe in themselves, find how their learning is relevant to their lives, and have a core knowledge-base that allows them to find solutions to complex issues when they become adults," Heffner said.

ODE mathematics expert Brad Findell agrees. "Not all students will need calculus or even pre-calculus, but we know geometry and introductory algebra are not enough," Findell said. 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Energy-efficient ventilation - circulating fans

Circulating fans include ceiling fans, table fans, floor fans, and fans mounted to poles or walls. These devices create a wind chill effect that will make you more comfortable in your home, even if it's cooled by natural ventilation or air conditioning. Ceiling fans are considered the most effective of these fans.

If you use air conditioning, a ceiling fan will allow you to raise the thermostat setting about 4°Fahrenheit with no reduction in comfort. In temperate climates, or during moderately hot weather, ceiling fans may allow you to avoid using your air conditioner altogether. Install a fan in each room that needs to be cooled during hot

Ceiling fans are only appropriate in rooms with ceilings at least eight feet high. Fans work best when the blades are seven to nine feet above the floor and 10 to 12 inches below the ceiling. Fans should be installed so the blades are no closer than eight inches from the ceiling and 18 inches from the walls.

Larger ceiling fans can move more air than smaller fans. A 36- or 44-inch diameter fan will cool rooms up to 225 square feet, while fans that are 52 inches or more should be used in larger rooms. Multiple fans work best in rooms longer than 18 feet. Small- and medium-sized fans will provide efficient cooling in a four- to six-foot diameter area, while larger fans are effective up to 10 feet.

A larger blade will also provide comparable cooling at a lower velocity than a smaller blade. This may be important in areas where loose papers or other objects will be disturbed by a strong breeze. The fan should also be fitted to the aesthetics of the room-a large fan may appear overpowering in a small room.

A more expensive fan that operates quietly and smoothly will probably offer more trouble-free service than cheaper units. Check the noise ratings, and, if possible, listen to the fan in operation before you buy it.

When buying window fans, look for the ENERGY STAR® label. Fans that earn the label move air 20 percent more efficiently, on average, than standard models.



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

Swine flu/H1N1 virus Things to know

H1N1 virus symptoms are similar to those of seasonal flu in humans and include:

- fever above 100
- sore throat
- cough
- stuffy nose
- chills
- headache and body ache
- fatigue
- some patients have reported diarrhea and vomiting associ ated with H1N1

People with symptoms should see their doctors and stay home from work or school.

Respiratory illnesses such as H1N1 virus are easily spread when infected individuals cough or sneeze around others. While ODH is doing what it can to protect the health of all Ohioans, individuals play an essential role in limiting the spread of disease. ODH advises that employees can take the following everyday actions to stay healthy:

- Practice respiratory etiquette and cover coughs and sneezes with a tissue and throw the tissue away.
- Wash your hands with soap and water. If soap and water are not available, use alcohol-based hand sanitiz-

- Do not touch your eyes, nose or mouth, as this is an easy way to spread germs.
- If you are sick, stay home and try to maintain distance -at least six feet from people who exhibit flu symptoms, such as coughing or sneezing.

Pork continues to be safe for consumption. Remember to follow proper handling an d cooking instructions. Cooking pork to an internal temperature of 160°F kills all viruses and food-borne germs.

Finally, because it is unclear how pervasive this virus may become, I recommend that all employees take time to understand the needs of their household and to make a plan that attempts to lessen the impact of a potential influenza pandemic on you and your family. 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

• Review your insurance policy for your responsibilities, any named storm exclusions, and/or coverage alterations.

- Tie dock lines high on pilings and rider poles to allow for rising

- If tying off on cleats, slack the line as much as prudent.
- Disconnect shore power and verify that batteries are fully charged to run bilge pump(s).
- Secure or remove all antennae, gear, chairs and other loose deck items.
- Secure all windows and hatches with duct tape.
- Check and double up spring lines and whip lines to ensure they will be able to handle the load of fending the boat away from mooring structures.
- Hang fenders from the side of vour vessel.

If Your Boat Is Out Of The Water

- If the boat is in rack storage, make sure the structure can withstand hurricane-force winds.
- If trailering your boat, store it and the trailer near a house or other fixed structure to avoid wind damage.
- Ensure the boat is secured to the trailer.
- Lash trailer down with heavy rope and/or chain, block trailer tires and let some air out of the tires to help prevent the trailer from floating, rolling or even flying away during strong wind and heavy rains.

jump more than 40% this year compared with just two years ago, projects the National Gardening Association, a non-profit organization for gardening education.


"As the economy goes down, food gardening goes up," says Bruce Butterfield, the group's research director. "We haven't seen this kind of spike in 30 years."

With a separate retail value of \$20, the pack sells for \$10 and under the right conditions, Burpee claims, can produce \$650 worth of veggies.

Other seed companies, Park Seed, Renee's Garden, Harris Seeds, and Ferry-Morse Seed are all showing increased of sales. The veggies are apparently squeezing flowers for space in the nation's gardens. Ask Serving Our Seniors

Serving Our Seniors is a local, not-for-profit organization funded by the Erie County Senior Services Tax Levy. Serving Our Seniors is a geriatric social service agency that provides a variety of help to Erie County residents age 60 and better. The organization's purpose is to assist older people in maintaining their independent lifestyle.

Q: How does someone get a Golden **Buckeye Card?**

A: You have to be age 60 or older and a resident of Ohio. Ohio residents who hold current Ohio Driver Licenses or State ID cards should automatically receive a Golden Buckeye card in the month of their 60th birthday. According to the Ohio Department of Aging, "...individuals who do not have a current license or State ID, as well as people under age 60 who are eligible due to disability, or who otherwise do not receive their card automatically, may apply for a card by calling Serving Our Seniors 419-624-1856 or the Erie County Senior Center 419-626-2560. Due to ID, age and disability (when appropriate) verification requirements, you cannot apply for a Golden Buckeye Card online or by phone."

Q: I bought a car, took possession and since that time my spouse has passed away. I no longer need or want the car. We have hardly driven it and I have had it for less than one month. Can I someone make the dealer to take it back.

A: This is a legal question that Serving Our Seniors cannot answer, but we do know of place to get free legal advice. Pro Seniors 800-488-6070. They will give you a ½ hour of time to discuss your question and give you advice for this problem.

Q: What is a Drug Repository?

A: This is a program where medications are donated to help people who cannot afford to fill their prescriptions. In Erie County, Serving Our Seniors helped to establish its Drug Repository with the generous cooperation of Buderer Drug Store. It's located inside Buderer Drug store at 633 Hancock Street -Sandusky. The medications are available to those who qualify for \$7.40/prescription.

Q: How do I find out if I qualify to use the Drug Repository?

A: It is a case by case assessment. The regulations require that the Drug Repository be restricted to helping only those people who would not otherwise afford to purchase their prescription medications. If you are an Erie County resident age 60+ you would call Serving Our Seniors at 419-624-1856 to set up an appointment and see if you qualify.

Q: I have medicines that I no longer take. I have three full bottles of a cholesterol reducing drug. Can I give it to the Drug Repository?

Unfortunately the Drug Repository cannot accept your donation of medicines. The rules and regulations surrounding who a Drug Repository can accept donated medications from stipulates that the medication can never be in the custody of the patient. The reason for this is to prevent the medications from being tampered with. Medicines that are donated to the Drug Repository come from nursing homes or the institutional pharmacies that package medications for the nursing homes

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
