Open letter from Mayor and Council on Airport Resurfacing Levy

Dear neighbor,

On Tuesday, May 5, the voters on Kellevs Island will be asked to consider a small but very important levy to ensure continuing safe operations at the Kelleys Island Airport.

For years the Village officials have been working with the Federal and State government to obtain grant dollars for the future improvement of the airport. During this time the condition of the airport surface has continued to deteriorate. Today we are faced with a dilemma, a landing surface that is in dire need of resurfacing, while at the same time, we are several years away from accessing Federal dollars that will address the issue. Additionally, these grant dollars are not guar-

Griffing Flying Services has officially notified us of our need to take more immediate action to preserve their ongoing flight opera-

The only solution is for us to take immediate action and have the East-West Runway resurfaced. This solution is not eligible for FAA grant dollars since it is not within the scope of work or the order of work allowed by

The end result of this project will give us a 10 to 15 year runway surface which will allow us to continue to work with the FAA on our long-term goals and projects.

We are asking the voters to fund this project with a very specific .38 mil levy. The term of the levy will be for five years and the funds generated are specifically earmarked for this project only.

An example to determine what this levy will cost each property owner is calculated in the following formula.

(Taxable Value) x .35 = assessed value x.00038 = annual levy cost.

A \$250,000 home would compute like this. 250,000 x .35 = 87,500 (accessed value)x.00038 = 33.25 per year for the levy.

We are additionally under the impression that islanders will also be enjoying an additional 1.6 mill reduction as a result of the school paying off the library addition, along with the possibility of an additional 3 mil reduction from the school as a result of the board's continued ability to operate on far less than available funds.

In all, the net reduction in school taxes

Griffing Sandusky looking at land sale to Metroparks

A possible deal between Griffing Sandusky Airport and Erie County Metro parks may turn into a reality within the next few months.

Discussions are under way regarding the possible transfer of up to 110 acres of airport land to Metroparks. The deal would set up the ability to fold the land into the 1,200-acre East Sandusky Bay Nature Preserve and then restore it to wetlands.

The possible sale is contingent on the outcome of a \$9 million grant the Metroparks applied for last month through the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Steve Dice, executive director of Erie MetroParks was quoted as saying the NOAA funds are designed to finance ready-to-go projects that improve or restore habitats throughout the Great Lakes. Also involved in discussions on the proposal is the Firelands office of the Western Reserve Land Conservancy.

Tom Griffing, owner of the airport, reported to the Sandusky Register that his interest was piqued by the MetroParks offer but that nothing certain had been arranged.

The grant wouldn't require any local matching funds. Officials at the

Metroparks and the nonprofit conservancy worked feverishly to write and submit the grant since NOAA first announced the grant opportunity in mid-March.

This grant is part of the stimulus package and the funds would be the first step in acquiring new ecotourism dollars for Erie County. The park systems' application ensures the creation of 19 new jobs, the eradication of invasive plant species and the restoration of coastal wetlands habitat.

A potential purchase price hasn't been disclosed. There is a high

demand for the funds, so the organizations are uncertain about the odds of obtaining the money. If awarded, the NOAA could start doling funds out within the next four to five months.

The Sandusky Register reported that Andy McDowell, field director for Western Reserve Land Conservancy's Firelands office, said his agency would act as the temporary landholder of the airport acreage if a sale went through, but the property would quickly be transferred to the MetroParks.

Griffing Flying Service voices concern over KI Airport runway

As far back as last September, Tom Griffing wrote to the Mayor to express the grave nature of disrepair that characterized the KI East/West runway.

To quote just a bit of his letter, "The current condition of the pavement at the KI Airport is what I would consider poor. There are large areas of loose puck-size chunks of asphalt that, from time to time, get knocked out of their respective places and become large rocks that can cause serious damage to

the aircraft. If a propeller at high (takeoff) power picks up one of these chunks and damages the propeller, requiring the propeller to be repaired by a prop shop, the engine must also go through a complete teardown at the cost of \$7000 to \$15000, depending on the engine model.

"At the very least, now that you are being officially notified of the poor condition of your runway, I would think that...the Village of Kelleys Island could potentially be liable for the repair of the damage.

"If your hole becomes large enough like the one that was recently filled with cold patch....a flat tire could easily be the result.

"In the event that permanent repairs are not made to the runway surface in the near future, commercial air service could eventually be jeopardized. At a point where potential risks outweigh possible profits, it would not make sense to continue operations."

He closed by offering his help in any way he could.

Kelleys Life is certain that islanders will give serious consideration to this vital issue. To avoid losing air service, it appears necessary to pass the Airport Resurfacing Levy. Please see accompanying article which describes the cost per household

will far outweigh the much needed additional airport tax levy necessary to ensure continued air service to the island.

For those who spend time on the island in the winter, you are aware of the vital necessity of air service. For one entire quarter this year and most years, the island is serviced entirely

by air. Please consider this small price to pay for the safety and security that the airport offers the residents of Kellevs Island.



Spring into boating at the Catawba Island Boat Show

PORT CLINTON, OH – Ken Alvey, president of the Lake Erie Marine Trades Association, cannot think of a better location than the Catawba Island Club in Port Clinton, Ohio, for a spring boat show. "The location is perfect," he said while drawing up plans for the fifth annual Catawba Island Boat Show that will be held May 1-3. "The golf course, restaurant, tennis courts and other amenities are all located right on the water, making it easy for us to come in and put on a boat show with fun attractions.'

There will be no charges for admission or parking, features Alvey hopes will appeal to the public in the current economic downturn. At no cost, visitors will be able to board and even test drive a broad selection of power and sail boats that will be displayed in the water and on land.



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Wine tasting event added to Catawba **Island Boat Show**



In 2006, under the coaching of Kruse Academy of Mixed Martial Arts, Kevin again started grappling, but now in the study of Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu. As a white belt, he won many gold medals in competitions, such as the North American Grappling Championship and even won first place and an inscribed sword in the Naga Tournament.


Holmes attends the University of Toledo, majoring in Athletic Training

Exercise Science. To maintain an academic scholarship, he must carry a heavy course load as well as have over 1200 clinical hours between hospitals and on-field. He uses jiu-jitsu as a way to de-stress and focus on college challenges.

This spring brought forth many rewards for Kevin. On March 7th, at the Arnold Schwarzenegger Tournament in Columbus, Kevin won gold in the blue belt division. Now under the direction of Chris Blanke, Mixed Martial Arts world champion. Kevin has been noted for submissions by using moves like the flying arm and foot locks. Not only did Kevin win a gold in no-gi and a bronze in gi, he also assessed a fellow grappler's

injuries when medics were unable to get there. It was exciting to see all those years of science put to use to help an injured athlete.

On April 17th, Saulo Ribeiro, sixtime world champion, flew in from San Diego to test six men for their purple belts and bestow two brown belts. Former island resident Mary Oblinger described the event like "watching a crucifixion." Intense heavy exercise was intermixed with grappling with brown belts for over 90 minutes without a break. Determination and skill overcame exhaustion and Kevin was among the six men who achieved the honor of the advanced level of purple belt in the most disciplined of all martial arts; Brazilian Jiu-Jitsu.

Legal Beagle

Party host may be liable -Beware when alcohol is on the menu

Most people are aware that businesses like restaurants and bars have legal obligations to stop serving alcohol to visibly intoxicated patrons. You may not be aware that in some states, individual hosts have legal responsibilities if serving alcohol.

Legislation called "social host" laws makes you responsible for the actions of your inebriated guests after they leave your party.

Ohio is among 33 states and the District of Columbia that have social host laws according to Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD). All 50 states have laws regarding the serving of alcohol to minors. Social host laws vary from state to state. To learn more about them, visit www.socialhostliability.org.

HOST must be aware--

There are specific circumstances

that must be present for a social host to be liable. These include: (a) The host was aware, or should have been aware, that the guest who caused the injury/damage was intoxicated; (b) The host knew that the guest would

There are some ways to protect yourself from liability if you do serve alcohol at your next party:

• Stop serving alcohol after a couple of hours and serve coffee instead.

 Make sure there is plenty of food available for your guests to eat while they are drinking.

• Have designated drivers to take intoxicated guests home.

 Keep a list of cab companies' phone numbers by the telephone so that it is accessible if you need to call a cab for a guest who shouldn't drive

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Postal Mailing Services prices to change on May 11

Annual Pricing Review Results in 2¢ Increase in First-Class Mail Stamp

WASHINGTON — The Governors of the U.S. Postal Service have approved new prices for mailing services, including a 2-cent increase in the price of a First-Class Mail stamp to 44 cents. Prices for mailing services are reviewed annually and adjusted each May. The new prices will go into effect Monday, May 11.

Customers can continue to mail letters at today's prices by purchasing the Forever Stamp before May 11. Forever Stamps were developed to help consumers ease the transition during price changes. Forever Stamps do not have a denomination and will be honored whenever they are used with no need for additional postage for a one-ounce letter mailing. On May 11 the price of the Forever Stamp will be 44 cents.





Be safe - Make sure your address visible

KI Police Department

In an emergency a properly posted address number can determine the difference between life and death!

Although address numbers may not seem important, they can be critical in the event of a fire, sudden illness, or other emergency. Regardless of it is your home or a place your are renting or visiting. Another perspective on the visibility of house/building number may be stated this way: Can your address be seen from the street that fronts the property while sitting in a vehicle in the middle of the night, or during inclement weather? Remember during an emergency, seconds count when emergency personnel are trying to locate you.

What are the requirements for posting street numbers?

The Village of Kelleys Island's ordinance states:

B§ 95.14 HOUSE NUMBERING

(A) Manner of numbering. The Village Council Safety Committee shall have charge of house numbering. Generally, and as nearly so as practicable, buildings shall be numbered in the following uniform manner:

(1) Buildings on the streets running north and south shall be numbered north from East and West Lake Shore Drive;

(2) Buildings on the streets running east and west they shall be numbered eastwardly and westwardly from Division Street.

(3) The basis for all numbering shall assume that Division Street runs north and south.

(4) Even numbers shall be used for the easterly and southerly sides of streets and odd numbers for westerly and northerly sides.

(B) Display of numbers.

(1) Upon notification by the Village Council Safety Committee of the proper number of a building, the owner of the building shall cause the number to be placed and continuously maintained in a conspicuous place on the front of the building. The address letters shall be a minimum of 3½" in height and shall be in arabic numbers only.

(2) If a building stands back more than 60 feet from the street right of way line, the number shall be conspicuously displayed at or near the sidewalk, driveway or common entrance to the building at the street line on a gate post, fence, tree, post or sign placed at least 10 feet, but not more than 20 feet, from the street right of way line so as to be easily legible

from the roadway.

(3) If the front door of the building does not face the street or roadway, the address numbers shall be placed on the right corner of the building.

(4) In regard to individuals residing on private roads, streets or lanes which are not maintained by the village, a sign shall be placed near the entrance from the public roadway with a listing of all of the addresses of the residents on the private road, street or lane not maintained by the village.

(Č) Change of numbers. The Village Council Safety Committee shall be authorized to change the house numbering of any street or part of a street or any individual building, when the change shall be necessary by reason of readjustment of any kind such as, inaccuracy, mistake, or for any other cause.

(D) Removing numbers. No person shall remove, alter or deface any building address number, properly assigned and placed on or near a building, or place or retain on any building any number other than the one duly assigned by the Village Council Safety Committee.

(Ord. 589, passed 4-11-92) Penalty, see § 95.99

Solar heat absorbed through windows and roofs makes your air-conditioner work harder and gobble up more electricity. But incorporating shading concepts into your landscape design can help reduce this solar heat gain-and your cooling costs.

Shading from trees can reduce surrounding air temperatures as much as 9° F. Because cool air settles near the ground, air temperatures directly under trees can be as much as 25° F cooler than air temperatures above nearby blacktop.

Trees can be selected with appropriate sizes, densities, and shapes for almost any shading application. To block solar heat in the summer but allow much of it in during winter, plant deciduous trees. To provide

continuous shade or block heavy winds, use dense evergreen trees or shrubs

Deciduous trees with high, spreading crowns (leaves and branches) should be planted on the south side of your home to provide maximum summertime roof shading. Trees with crowns lower to the ground are more appropriate to the west, where shade is needed from lower afternoon sun angles. Trees should not be planted on the southern sides of solar-heated homes in cold climates because branches will block some winter sun.

Although a slow-growing tree may take many years before it shades your roof, it will generally live longer than a fast-growing tree. Also, because slow-growing trees often have deeper roots and stronger branches, they are less prone to breakage by windstorms or heavy snow loads. Slow-growing trees can also be more drought resistant than fast-growing trees.

A 6-foot to 8-foot deciduous tree planted near your home will begin shading windows the first year. Depending on the species, the tree will shade the roof in five to 10 years. If you have an air conditioner, shading the unit can increase its efficiency by as much as 10 percent.

Trees, shrubs, and groundcover plants can also shade the ground and pavement around the home. This reduces heat radiation and cools the air before it reaches your home's walls and windows. Use a large bush or row of shrubs to shade a patio or driveway.

Plant a hedge to shade a sidewalk. Build a trellis for climbing vines to shade a patio area.

Vines can also shade walls during their first growing season. A lattice or trellis with climbing vines, or a planter box with trailing vines, shades a home's perimeter while admitting cooling breezes to the shaded area.

Shrubs planted close to the house will fill in rapidly and begin shading walls and windows within a few years. However, avoid allowing dense foliage to grow immediately next to a home, since the resulting humidity will create maintenance-related problems. Well-landscaped homes in wet areas allow winds to flow around the home, keeping surrounding soil reasonably dry.

Zebra Mussels-0, Quagga's winning, phosphates continue to rise

Just a little over 15 years ago, islanders and everyone in every city along Lake Erie was deep into concerns over the effects of the invasive zebra mussel to our lake. The zebras, prolific as all get out, and dumped into our lake from eastern European ship's ballast, had, in a few short years, established colonies in the gazillions throughout the lake. They clogged water intake pipes and screens, city water departments had to come up with expensive and inventive new ways to get rid of them and to go around them. This process was difficult because most of the solutions to kill the zebra mussels could be of harm to our treasured fish populations.

A little while later, it was noticed that the lake was getting cleaner at a much quicker rate than our human improvements could account for. Scientists and specialists in the know informed us that the zebra mussels were responsible. They were eating the bad things we had put into the water, and eating then at a very high rate.

We still didn't like the zebra mussels but we learned to live with them. We wore water shoes into the water whenever we knew there were rocks around, because we got tired of getting the paper-like razor-type cuts on our fingers and toes, while in the water. Zebra mussels can only live if they can attach to an object in the

water and they couldn't live in deep or the colder waters. We spoke of how eventually the shoreline on the east side of the island would turn into a pretty pinkish colored sand because of the many feet-deep mussel shell carcasses that had washed ashore.

But that's all over now.

The more recently introduced invasive quagga mussel has won. The quagga has choked out the zebra mussel and most likely will have it completely eradicated very soon, scientists say. To the casual observer, the quagga is a washed out looking big sister to the zebra. The problem is that the quagga, because of its size, is expelling more and more phosphates into our lake. The central basin "dead"

zone" is increasing in size and that's bad.

In addition, the quagga doesn't have to attach itself to anything in the lake to live. It can survive almost anywhere in our lake, including the deepest waters and the coldest spots.

While there were some surprising benefits of cleaner water with both of the mussels, they are an invasive species that we will never be able to get rid of. Overall they are killing foods that our perch and walleye count on and the effect, years down the road, especially with the phosphate discharge, can be grim if some solutions aren't found.

Commander Bob Peroni offered his congratulations and spoke of his pride and appreciation of our VFW Post 7572 and the wonderful citizens of our community.



Island Recipes

Unstuffed Cabbage Soup

8 servings

1/2 medium head green cabbage, chopped

1 medium onion, chopped

1 1/4 pound ground turkey (93% lean)

1 cup celery, chopped

14 1/2 oz. can diced tomatoes

1 cup whole grain brown rice, cooked

2 cups fat free beef broth

1 cup canned tomato soup, made with water

1 tsp garlic powder

2-3 bay leaves (remove before serving)

1 tbsp apple cider vinegar (optional)

salt and pepper to taste

Using non-stick spray, in a 6 quart soup/stock pot, saute chopped onions until lightly browned.

Add chopped cabbage, celery, beef broth, diced tomatoes and tomato soup diluted with water. Bring the pot of soup to a soft boil until all vegetables are cooked to your liking, cover and reduce to a simmer, stirring occasionally.

Meat preparation: In a separate pan, brown ground turkey. Heavily season the meat with seasonings above. The meat should be prepared in a nonstick pan. Add 1/2 cup to 1 cup of the beef broth. Bring mixture to a simmer for about 10 minutes. This will help to infuse the seasoning's flavors into the turkey. Combine the cooked meat and seasoned broth to the soup pot.

Then add the cooked brown rice to the soup mixture.

This soup will reheat very nicely. As with most soups or stews the next day always tastes better because the flavors have time to enhance each other.

What is swine flu?

Swine Influenza (swine flu) is a respiratory disease of pigs caused by type A influenza viruses that causes regular outbreaks in pigs. People do not normally get swine flu, but human infections can and do happen. Swine flu viruses have been reported to spread from person-to-person, but in the past, this transmission was limited and not sustained beyond three people.

Are there human infections with swine flu in the U.S.?

In late March and early April 2009, cases of human infection with swine influenza A (H1N1) viruses were first reported in Southern California and near San Antonio, Texas. Other U.S. states have reported cases of swine flu infection in humans and cases have been reported internationally as well. An updated case count of confirmed swine flu infections in the United is kept cdc.gov/swineflu/investigation.htm CDC and local and state health agencies are working together to investigate this situation.

Is this swine flu virus contagious?

CDC has determined that this swine influenza A (H1N1) virus is contagious and is spreading from human to human. However, at this time, it not known how easily the virus spreads between people.

What are the signs and symptoms of swine flu in people?

The symptoms of swine flu in people are similar to the symptoms of regular human flu and include fever, cough, sore throat, body aches, headache, chills and fatigue. Some people have reported diarrhea and vomiting associated with swine flu. In the past, severe illness (pneumonia and respiratory failure) and deaths have been reported with swine flu infection in people. Like seasonal flu, swine flu may cause a worsening of underlying chronic medical conditions.

How does swine flu spread?

Spread of this swine influenza A (H1N1) virus is thought to be happening in the same way that seasonal flu spreads. Flu viruses are spread mainly from person to person through coughing or sneezing of people with influenza. Sometimes people may become infected by touching something with flu viruses on it and then touching their mouth or nose.

How can someone with the flu infect someone else?

Infected people may be able to infect others beginning 1 day before symptoms develop and up to 7 or more days after becoming sick. That means that you may be able to pass on the flu to someone else before you know you are sick, as well as while you are sick.


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Seeing light in the Resurrection?

in 1950 and made it his home there year 'round following his retirement. He served for many years as the island zoning inspector.



Ask Serving Our Seniors

Serving Our Seniors is a local, not-for-profit organization funded by the Erie County Senior Services Tax Levy. Serving Our Seniors is a geriatric social service agency that provides a variety of help to Erie County residents age 60 and better. The organization's purpose is to assist older people in maintaining their independent lifestyle.

According to the Alzheimer's Association website "It is estimated that as many as 5 million people in the United States are living with Alzheimer's. That includes 13 percent over the age of 65 and nearly 50 percent who are 85 and older." (www.alz.org/espnol_about_alzheimer s.asp) With this diagnosis brings a caregiving responsibility most family members are not prepared for. The spouse/family member(s) are often baffled by the personality change in their loved-one, the change in their relationship with the loved-one, and the caregiver is often overwhelmed by all that they are trying to do as they try to help and care for the person with the impaired memory.

To help Erie County residents in such a caregiving situation Serving Our Seniors is seeking family caregivers to be part of University Memory & Aging Center of Case Western Reserve University & University Hospitals Case Medical Center upcoming research project to benefit caregivers. The project is called the Caregiver Knowledge & Skills Project and it is studying how to best help family members of persons with Alzheimer's Disease or a related condition.

If you are caring for someone with mild to moderate memory impairment, and that individual is still living at home, and you would like to learn more about the Caregiver Knowledge & Skills Project, then Serving Our Seniors can help you.

The goal of the research is to increase the knowledge and the skills of family caregivers. If you decide to participate, you will:

- Take part with other caregivers in a weekly workshop for six weeks. Each workshop lasts two hours. The workshops are designed to provide knowledge and skills for family caregivers. "If 8 of Erie County caregivers register to participate in the project, University Memory & Aging Center will bring the workshops to Erie County."
- Read materials and practice what was learned in the workshop between weekly sessions;
- * Take part in an 8 month followup program – either by postal mail or computer – designed to extend and

enhance benefits of the workshop, with the type of follow up determined randomly.

- Answer questions by mail four times throughout the course of the project. The questions will focus on your well-being and your experiences as a caregiver; and your attitudes toward caregiving.
- Be asked to give your opinions about the workshops and follow up programs when the study is completed.

There is no cost for participation. The study has been approved by the University Hospitals Case Medical Center Institutional Review Board.

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
