Novelists return to KI

Like the Monarchs returning to Mexico, a group of novelists return to Kelleys Island.

"It's a beautiful and peaceful location, perfect for writing," says C. C. Finlay, Ohio resident and organizer of the annual weeklong retreat that has attracted authors from all over the United States and Canada and as far away as Puerto Rico, England and Switzerland.

The group is called "Blue Heaven" after Himmelblau House, the bed and breakfast where they had their first workshop in 2003.

The authors write mainly science fiction and fantasy, for middle grade students, young adults, and adults. In the past few years, the group has had remarkable literary success.

Tobias Buckell, who has come to Kelleys Island every year since the workshop started, reached the New York Times Bestseller List for his novel HALO: The Cole Protocol, based on the popular video game. And Paul Melko won the Compton Crook Award and the Locus Award for Best First Novel for his book Singularity's Ring, about a future where some of the last remnants of humanity live in Ohio.

"Paul is not the only award winner," Finlay said. "The last three winners of the Crawford Award for best fantasy book are all Blue Heaven writers — Mary Rickert, Christopher Barzak, and Daryl Gregory. It's been amazing."

Other writers are building steady careers. Sandra McDonald, a retired U.S. Navy officer, writes military space adventures. The Stars Blue Yonder, the third novel in her space travel trilogy, was released in 2009.

McDonald lives in Florida but looks forward to her annual visits to Lake Erie. "I may one day be tempted to move to Ohio," she said. "I like the place!"

William Shunn, co-author of the ghost story Cast a Cold Eye, enjoys late afternoons at the Village Pump. "After the intensity of our daily critique sessions, it's a great place to settle down with some food, drink, and wi-fi and dive back into the writing itself. Several of us usually gather there late in the day. The camaraderie is terrific."

"Most people look forward to vacation time so they can get away from their co-workers," explained Greg van Eekhout, author of Norse Code, a novel

about the old Norse gods and a very modern apocalypse. "But writers generally work alone, spending hours at our computers without talking to another soul. So when we have time off, we like to gather with other writers to exchange thoughts and ideas."

Tobias Buckell echoed that thought. "Coming to Kelleys is part of my yearly process," he said. "Being around other working writers for a week gets me juiced back up for another year of writing novels in a more solitary environment."

The tiny island has become the source of some big careers. "Blue Heaven made all the difference for me," said Sarah Prineas. "The workshop enabled me to take that next step, from being a writer to becoming a writer with a book contract and a career"

Prineas, who was an English professor at the University of Iowa before she became a writer, is the author of The Magic Thief, an E.B. White Read-Aloud Award honor book and an NCTE Notable Children's Book for 2009. Her children's books have been translated into seventeen languages and are read around the world.

Heather Shaw, who is making her second trip to Kelleys Island from California, has yet to sell her first book, but she hopes good things are in store for her too.

"I've learned so much about how to structure, pace and create a novel, not just from the superb critiques I got on my own work, but also through the process of giving feedback to the other authors in the group," she said. "It was encouraging to realize that every novel goes through a long process of hard work and revision."

It's not all hard work. "The week is really, really fun," Shaw admitted.

Last year, some of the Blue Heaven authors donated books to the Kelleys Island Library as a way of giving back to the island. Himmelblau isn't operated as a bed and breakfast any longer, but the writers continue to stay at the Eagle's Nest. This fall some of them will also be staying at The Old Stone House for the first time.

"I love it here," said Finlay, who is the author of the Traitor to the Crown series about the American Revolution. "It's my favorite week of the year. I can't wait to come back, where I always feel relaxed."







11th District Court rules in favor of lakefront property owners

In late August the 11th District Ohio Court ruled that the public owns the land beneath the water at any given moment, and that lakefront property owners own all dry land above the water. This ruling upheld a Lake County Common Please Court ruling from 2007.

The Ohio Lakefront Group called the decision a victory in The Cleveland Plain Dealer. "This ruling takes away a question mark I've had over my property," Tony Yankel of Bay Village, the group's president said.


Members of the Ohio Environmental Council were quoted as saying the ruling was bad for the public.

In essence, the law means that the public can have their feet in the water but cannot tread anywhere landward beyond that.

the National Wildlife Federation and the Ohio Attorney General's office had argued that the public owned up to the high water mark.



The KIHA board me with Thompson Landscaping during the month of May to plan and design a brick memory walkway, and to choose the shrubs, trees and plants to enhance our new landscaping. The lilacs in front of the Old Stone Church were in such bad shape that they could not be saved, so they were replaced with two pink flowering dwarf dogwood tees that are appropriate for the island. A permanent location for the stone bench in memory of Betsy Walcott which was given to us by the Mad Hatters was included in the design plan.



Landscape work was done when weather permitted on July 7th through the 10th with eight men carefully hand carrying the thousand pound granite bench to its new, permanent location. Other plantings included: dwarf red

barberries, winter gem boxwoods, blue princess hollies, sea green junipers, stella doro lily, and a flowering beech.

Now that the 4 foot x 91 foot limestone/sandstone mix brick walkway is complete, the Kelleys Island Historical Association is selling engraved bricks to replace the blank bricks in the "Memory Walk." You can purchase a blank brick - two different sizes are available for purchase-, and we will have it engraved for you with your name, boat, or a loved one to leave as a permanent mark on the island. 

News from your Hancock Wood Trustee

Finally after continuous insistence to get something moving on the other side (the mainland) Buckeye Power personnel from our G&T (Generating & Transmission) Co-op met with management of Ohio Edison (First Energy) to discuss our supply reliability.

Since Hancock-Wood's Substation at Lakeside (Mainland) is supplied by Ohio Edison's 34,500 Volt line, we had to go to them for relief in eliminating our major outages here on Kelleys Island.

Word has it that the meeting recently went exceptionally well. Ohio Edison noted that this 34.5 KV Line has been a problem for them also and that they are committed to improving reliability.

They are doing several things to accomplish this. The Planned Improvements are:

- 1.) Infrared the entire line
- 2.) Implement a 3-year trim cycle
- 3.) Add a tie line between Marblehead & Pamona Substations (next year). This will provide flexibility and reduce exposure.
- 4.) Install fault locators to expedite outage restoration
- 5.) Build a 138 KV to 34.5KV Substation in the future.
- I will let you know if we receive any updates on their progress or any new information.

Use your space heater safely

Many people turn to space heatersboth electric models and those powered by kerosene or even wood- as a convenient source of warmth in winter months. However, space heaters can be dangerous if not used properly.

The Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) estimates that more than 25,000 residential fires every year are associated with space heaters. More than 300 people die in these fires. In addition, an estimated 6,000 people annually receive hospital emergency care for burn injuries connected with space heaters.

Space heater hazards stem not just from fires caused by contact with or close proximity to heating elements. They also include fires started by flammable fuels used in the heaters; defective wiring in the appliance; and carbon monoxide poisoning caused by

improper venting or an incomplete combustion of fuels.

Here are some tips for using your electric space heater safely:

- Keep the heater at least 3 feet from flammable items such as curtains, furniture, or bedspreads.
- Select a space heater with a guard around the heating element.
- When buying a heater, choose one that has been tested and certified by a nationally recognized testing institution such as Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Buy a heater that can handle the area that you want to heat.
- · Read and follow the manufacturer's operating instructions.
- Keep children and pets away from space heaters.
- Never leave a space heater unattend-
- Never go to sleep with a space heater

- Never use or store flammable liquids near a space heater.
- Do not use a heater in a bathroom-it's a high-moisture area that could cause damage.
- Keep heaters away from water to prevent electrocution.
- Do not use an extension cord with a space heater.
- Do not use the heater to dry clothes.
- Be sure the heater's plug fits snugly in an outlet. The cord and plug may feel warm when operating since the unit draws so much power, but they should not feel hot. If they do, unplug the heater and have a qualified repair person check for problems.
- Do not attempt to repair a broken heater yourself. It should be checked and repaired by a qualified appliance service center.

2009-2010 School Year Off and Running!

The '09-'10 school year began on Mon., Aug. 31st for Kelleys Island School. For the past three years, Kelleys Island School has started the school year after the Labor Day weekend since tourism is an important part of our economy. The Kelleys Island Board of Education has been and continues to be very pro-active for our island businesses and residents.

However, this year Labor Day falls on Mon., Sept. 7th. To complete our state-mandated 180 days of instruction time for the students, if we were to begin after Labor Day, the end of the school year would fall in the middle of June next summer.

Michigan's legislature mandated a few years ago that all schools begin after Labor Day no matter when it is on the calendar. Ohio has not decided to go this route. Two factors which are used as an argument against this after Labor Day starting date are statewide required Ohio Graduation Tests (OGT) for Ohio students and the football playoff schedule.

The OGT is always administered the last week of Oct. School systems are usually evaluated by their communities and throughout the state by how well their students perform on these tests. Many schools like the idea of starting before Labor Day to add instructional days prior to the testing dates in Oct.

A second reason for schools starting before Labor Day is high school football. The state championship for the six divisions in football are always scheduled the weekend after Thanksgiving. Since the games are played outdoors, the OHSAA (Ohio High School Athletic Association) schedules the dates before winter weather becomes too cold for outdoor activities. For high school football teams to play their ten individual games before the four weeks of playoffs (14 total weeks), their first game

must start the week before Labor Day. A football game not only involves the players on the team, but also the cheerleaders, marching band, student fans and community. To generate more revenue for the athletic programs, having school in-session usually brings more people to the games. Cleaning Up (Again)

After a successful springtime island trash clean-up, students and staff will again head outside and take to the streets for two Autumn clean-ups: tentatively scheduled for Fridays Sept. 18 and Oct. 16. These cleanups will be held after lunch time, with all collected plastic, glass, and metal items taken to the mainland for recycling. Students and staff have worked on recycling items from classroom use and lunches since the spring cleanup. Some teachers even recycle (slightly) used paper in their classrooms.

Hola!

Beginning this fall, our elementary students will be taught Spanish each day. This will not be a graded subject, but more an opportunity for our students to be exposed to another lan-

This program will be coordinated through Jefferson County Virtual Learning Academy. Our students will be instructed each day for a single lesson over the course of the school year. We have been working for the past two years to initiate this program. We will keep everyone updated throughout this school year.





When do I call 9-1-1 for EMS?

EMS stands for Emergency medical Services. It is a service provided to anyone who needs it, at any time of the day or night. Too often we hear:

- I didn't want to bother you
- I had to suffer all night...
- It was breakfast, lunch, dinner time and I didn't want to disturb you.

If you or someone around you is ill or injured and you are concerned about what is happening, then you should call for help.

When should you call 911? Ask

yourself the following questions:
• Is the victim's condition life or

- Is the victim's condition life or limb threatening?
- Could the victim's condition worsen and become life or limb-threatening on the way to the hospital?
- Could moving the victim cause further injury?
- Does the victim need the skills or equipment of paramedics or emergency medical technicians?
- Would distance or traffic conditions cause a delay in getting the victim

to the hospital?

Why shouldn't I just drive the patient myself?

Calling 9-1-1- immediately connects you with an emergency medical team, who are all trained to handle these situations.

Once they arrive, paramedics and emergency medical technicians have been trained to begin assessing and administering emergency care. They can communicate with the hospital's and alert them to the patient's condition prior to their arrival.

They are trained to know when a patient needs to be transported to a hospital capable of providing the care that is needed for a specific illness or injury. Driving the patient yourself may put others in danger if you are distracted if the patient suddenly gets worse.

Make the right call. If it's potentially life-threatening or if you're in doubt, call 9-1-1.

Are LEWS still protected? YES, but...

If you think that over the past few years, more and more Lake Erie Watersnakes (LEWS) have been showing up along the shoreline, you are probably right! Annual population censuses performed by Dr. Rich King and Kristin Stanford (the Snakelady), Northern Illinois University (NIU), show adult LEWS numbers steadily increasing over the past 8 years.

The most recent population estimates demonstrate that true recovery of the LEWS population is happening. This is good news for several reasonsfirst, it indicates that LEWS may no longer need protection under the Endangered Species Act anymore. Additionally, it indicates that shoreline habitat important for the snake and many other fish and wildlife species is available and providing the right mix of food and cover. Endangered and threatened species recovery is about more than just numbers of critters. Habitat is important, too.

Part of the LEWS Recovery Plan is to ensure that suitable habitat sufficient for protecting a portion of the LEWS population in perpetuity is available on each of the large islands. A number of partners in LEWS recovery have been working diligently to protect habitat on the islands, and as a result, the habitat protection goals included in the LEWS Recovery Plan have been met. Major partners in land protection and management include the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, Lake Erie Islands Chapter of the Black Swamp Conservancy, Putin-Bay Township Park District, Western Reserve Land Conservancy, and Cleveland Museum of Natural History.

So, the numbers of LEWS are up and LEWS habitat is protected, isn't that all we need to say they are "recovered" and remove them from the endangered species list? Not quite. In order to determine that LEWS are no longer threatened with extinction, we must address ALL past, present and future threats to the species. One of the main threats to the species past, present, and likely future, is intentional persecution by humans.

Surely you have seen snake signs on the islands, read an issue or two of LEWS News, spoken with the Snake Lady, or seen THE episode of Dirty Jobs on TV. All of these media encounters have been specifically planned and aimed at...YOU. The goal of the public awareness campaign has been to expose people to the snake, and convince you that, like a cardinal, rabbit, monarch, or walleye, LEWS are part of the island environment that you live in. They have their place, and we have ours, and we can co-exist. You don't have to like the LEWS, talk about them, or even notice them--you just have to let them be. Several public opinion surveys of the island residents were recently undertaken to see

if the message was reaching folks, to assess the opinion of island residents towards the LEWS, and to help determine if the threat of human persecution has been sufficiently abated.

Responses from the 2008 NIU survey of a subset of island residents on Kelleys, Middle Bass, North Bass, and South Bass indicate that 99% of respondents are aware that it is a protected animal. It also showed that 83.5% of respondents indicate that their knowledge of LEWS has increased since listing in 1999. Generally, these data indicate that our outreach and education campaign is reaching the vast majority of island residents, and helping to increase their access to information about the watersnake.

Opinion surveys seem to indicate that most people do not now and will not in the future kill Lake Erie Watersnakes.

We have also considered other potential threats to the LEWS, including contaminants, invasive species, roadkill, fishing by catch, and LEWS population demographics, however recent research indicates that none of these are threatening the population.

It is important to understand that the "endangered" and "threatened" classifications are not just about numbers of animals. All threats to the listed critter must be addressed such that, if it were to be removed from the endangered species list, it would not become endangered or threatened again within the foreseeable future.

The process may seem slow to island residents, but it takes time and effort to ensure that t a population of animals is secure. After all, the 10 years that the snake has been listed is only a small fraction of the time that the snakes have been present on the islands, and subject to a variety of threats that drove the numbers down to record lows. As we work through the de-listing process, we hope that you will continue to provide input on the status of the LEWS. We hope that you will try to appreciate the LEWS for

what it is, an animal not unlike a squirrel or fish, that we share the island with. Most importantly, we hope that you as an individual will be one of the many that contribute to the LEWS's survival and recovery, whether threatened or endangered, or not.

So, is LEWS still a federally threatened and state endangered species? The answer is..."Yes, BUT..." The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is the federal agency tasked with evaluating the status. A document is currently being written to remove the LEWS from the Federal threatened species list. After internal review it should be available for public review in the winter of 2009-10. Once the comment period closes, a final ruling will be made and published in 2010.

Until a final desisting ruling is published, the LEWS has the full protection of the Endangered Species Act. Hopefully it will have the full protection of all human residents for the rest of the future.

Ask Serving Our Seniors

Serving Our Seniors is a local, not-for-profit organization funded by the Erie County Senior Services Tax Levy. Serving Our Seniors is a geriatric social service agency that provides a variety of help to Erie County residents age 60 and better. The organization's purpose is to assist older people in maintaining their independent lifestyle.

Q: I'm age 62 and drawing early Social Security Retirement. Can I sign up for Medicare, too?

A: No. As a healthy (non-disabled) person retiring at age 62, this does not make you eligible for Medicare insurance.

Q: Since I don't get Medicare at age 62, when do I become eligible?
A: At age 65.

Q: I'm 57 years old. (My birthday is April 13, 1952) When does the age of eligibility for Medicare increase beyond age 65?

A: It doesn't. I think you are confusing the "Full Retirement Age" for Social Security retirement with Medicare. There is no planned increase in "Full Retirement Age" to qualify for Medicare. As best as anyone can tell, it is still age 65 years old.

Q: I heard that when I'm on Medicare I have to pay a monthly premium for it? I thought Medicare was free?

A: There are 3 parts to Medicare Insurance--Part A, Part B and Part D. Part A pays for care in the hospital. This insurance coverage does not require a monthly premium – if you are on "traditional Medicare."

Q: What is Medicare Part B?

A: Medicare Part B is insurance that you don't have to take. To get it, you do have to pay a monthly premium. Today, that monthly premium is 96.40/month. It pays for "outpatient" care. So if you go to see the doctor, have out-patient physical therapy, speech therapy, occupational therapy, bloodwork.... These are the type of things Part B pays covers. All are examples of care you need, but

and mind

you aren't a hospital patient, so Medicare Part A won't pay for it.

If you don't buy Part B when you are first eligible, to purchase it, later it will cost you a penalty. And believe me, we have seen senior citizens decide after the fact that they need this insurance, and they are paying a hefty price in penalty costs for buying into it late.

If you don't have medical coverage, Part B is a good value compared to the alternative. The alternative is paying for all of your outpatient services yourself.

Q: What is Medicare Part D?

A: Medicare Part D is PRESCRIP-TION DRUG COVERAGE. This is insurance you do not have to take, but if you don't take it the day you are eligible for Medicare, and want to buy it later, it will cost you more. You will have to pay a 1% penalty compounded for each month for not buying Medicare Part D. The 1% penalty is calculated based on the date that you were first eligible for Medicare Part D coverage. You see, the federal government doesn't want to insure just sick people who need prescriptive health care - they want people who don't use medications to buy the insurance, too. So, by warning you that you will pay a penalty on your monthly premium, the hope is that you will choose to buy Part D BEFORE you need it.

Q: How much is Medicare Part D insurance?

A: That cost varies, depending on the insurance plan that you select. Some plans are as economical as 16.00 or 17.00/month other plans are more comprehensive in their coverage and cost over 100.00/month.

Q: I don't take any medications. Why would I buy Part D?

A: The easiest way to answer it is to give an analogy as a homeowner. Even though you have never had a fire at your house -- did you buy fire insurance? The answer is probably yes. You hope you will never use this insurance, but if a fire ever occurs you know you can address the problem

through your fire insurance. The same concept applies to prescription drug coverage. You may be as healthy as a horse today, but what happens if you have a heart attack tomorrow and need 5 different medications. Could you afford those drugs without insurance? Do you want to risk it?

Q: How much coverage does Medicare Part D give you?

A: This year (2009) Medicare will help you pay for the first \$2,700.00 in medication purchases. After that... you are on your own for the rest of the calendar year. They call this "falling into the donut hole." However, they do make provisions for those who are in the donut hole and are spending an excessive amount of money on med-

cations.

If you spend a lot of money after you fall in the donut hole, there is a provision for "catastrophic coverage." This "catastrophic coverage" definition could cause your Part D insurance to begin covering your medications later within that calendar year. The way this works is too complicated to explain via Q &A's, but if you call our office we would be happy to tell you more.


