# **1940 Kelleys Island Girl's Basketball Team**



We published this photo of the Kelleys Island Girl's Basketball Team, circa 1944, in our last issue and asked readers to respond with the names of all the girls included. We promised that anyone who responded correctly (by July 29,2010) would receive a certificate good for a hotdog at the upcoming Kelleys Island Landowners Association (KILA) Homecoming festival on Aug. 21. So far we've received correct responses from Ferne and Bill Gorchester, Logan Bickley, Ted and Bonnie Blatt, and Herbert Bickley. Here are the correct names: Top row lr: Laura Jean Seeholzer Pohorence, Rosemarie (Tucky) Elfers, Nancy Ward Ritchey, Elaine Martin Galloway. Ila Dick supplied us with the story to go with the photo--In 1944 Father Charles Haley, Pastor of St. Michael's Catholic Church, was one of the most ardent boosters for the Island Sports Program. He sponsored the trip for the girls, who competed with 18 other counties in a tournament of the Northeastern Ohio A.A.U. Women's basketball at Cleveland, Ohio. The girls received the Runners-up Trophy when they played Stella Walsh's Junior Team from Cleveland. Coach for the island team was Melbourne (Puddy) McKillips.

Team members Mary Perruchon Schock and Mary Seeholzer Betzenheimer were not present for the picture. Ila thought they hadn't come to the games in Cleveland, but they were on the team.

When asked who provided the


nice looking uniforms, Ila recalled that the team wore the boys' uniforms with white blouses and the boys' jackets. In addition to supporting the girls basketball team, Father Haley started a girls softball team, but, says Ila, "It didn't last very long, because everyone had jobs in the summer."

# A Love Story: Laura Jean (Seeholzer) and Frank Pohorence

Laura Jean welcomed me into her kitchen with a generous smile. She motioned me to the dining room (which she suggested was cooler and more comfortable). She cheerily called Frank to join us, and we settled around their friendly table. Their home, like Laura Jean's ready smile, radiated that kind of openness that puts even a stranger immediately at ease, welcomed.

In bits and pieces, their island story unfolds, from their childhood days in island families through their marriage of 60 years, celebrated last April. Laura Jean shares stories with good humor and pleasure, turning lovingly to the "older" man she had a crush on from the time he returned to the island with five Bronze Stars after World War II. Her eyes still twinkle as she looks at him with all the love in the world.

Laura Jean Seeholzer was born Dec. 18, 1928, the sixth daughter of ten children. Two brothers and a seventh sister followed, five of whom survive today. Her father, Carl Seeholzer, was a fisherman; her mother, Laura Martin Seeholzer, a homemaker. Laura Jean is the third generation of Seeholzers to live on Kelleys, her father's father (Charles) having come to the island from Switzerland. Like others of his generation, Laura Jean's father Carl made his living as a fisherman, but he supplied his family with all the food they needed-including chickens ("everybody had chickens," remarked Frank with a smile), and two pigs, every year. Laura still likes pork, she laughs.

Franklin J. Pohorence, eight years her senior, was born Oct. 31, 1922, to Joseph and Anna Chevany. They lived near the ballpark. His father came to the island from Marblehead, ice skating across the lake in winter where he met Anna, married her, and stayed put. Also a successful fisherman, Joseph Pohorence "was able to grow food for the whole table," Frank recalls proudly. (Laura remembers the strawberries from Joseph's bountiful gardens.)

Both Laura Jean and Frank started school at St. Michael's Catholic School, Frank going on to Estes School in 8th grade; Laura Jean only attended the Catholic school one year, and then it closed. (Her father teased her that she closed the school!). After she finished school, Laura Jean went to live with her grandmother in Sandusky for two years and worked in a cake shop. It was typical for island youth to go off the island after they graduated, to experience a little more, then come back home.

After Frank graduated in 1941, he went to work at Cleveland National Carbon, then received a draft notice in 1942. At the recruiter's office in Toledo, he didn't get a "pass" at first, so he was told to run around the block again, and passed. "I wanted to go," said Frank. "I didn't want to go home and be the one that didn't go [to the war].'

In Europe, he became the quarter master in his unit, and took care of all the materials his company used. "I was always in some kind of store business," he says with a laugh. From 1942 to 1945, he was in England, France, and Germany, and he says he "walked all the way." Arriving in the second wave landing at Omaha Beach, he watched the guys before him jump into the water. But they were tall, and

when he jumped, he got a surprise at how deep the water was. He still remembers the feeling of walking through the sand in wet clothes.

The families on the island heard that island boys were coming home from the war, and word spread. When the boat landed at Kelleys, the whole island was at the dock waiting for them. It was just before Thanksgiving. Still, what he remembers even now is the sound of the tanks rolling as they hid from the enemy in the trenches.

Frank was home barely two weeks when Sonny Elfers asked him if he'd like to run the Island Market that winter. In spring, Sonny asked if Frank wanted to buy the store: he said he couldn't pay Frank for all the work he had done at the store. Frank did buy it and then he ran it from 1945 until 1983.

Meanwhile, Laura Jean had come home to the island, too. She helped her mother, and went to the market to shop. She admits she had a crush on Frank, and married him at St. Michael's Church on April 15, 1950. "I married him for his pork chops!" she laughs.

The house on Division Street has been their home their entire married life. Years before they married, Frank used to help a man who lived there. In those days, folks used to stay at the camp at the other end of the island from where the ferry docked. If someone had a good car, they'd go down to the dock and meet folks who wanted to visit at the camp. This man had such a car, and Frank would drive it for him, to make money. Frank told the man, "If you ever want to sell that house, I'd like to buy it." After the man died, his widow told Frank he could

buy it, so Frank went to the bank (he was already buying the store) and his banker just gave him a book to make payments. "I didn't even know what I paid," he laughs.

Life on the island was like that: what are such important and complicated decisions today just seemed to fall into place in a close knit community where people knew each other and were comfortable with their neighbors, their neighbors' sons and daughters. Where opportunities came up and people looked around for someone to do a job, to take on a project, or take over a business.

"Our age group had a lot of fun," says Laura Jean. They ice skated in winter, and Frank and Ben Elfers took an ice boat "sailing" on one memorable occasion-but it broke through the ice. People on shore ran out to help. Frank says, "I was in water over my head. I thought, I made it through the war and Omaha Beach, and here I'm going to drown in front of my own house!" He didn't.

In the evening of their rich and satisfying union, their eyes light up with thoughts of the life they have shared so faithfully, with so much magical joy and simple, gentle happiness. They've raised a son Brad and a daughter LuAnn, and enjoy three grandchildren and six great-grandchildren, whose visits they look forward to. After retirement, they traveled around the country for two months each winter. One winter they tried three, but Frank wanted to come home. He just "couldn't stay away" from his island, his home.

"The secret," says Frank, "is that I liked what I was doing. I worked at something I liked." And Frank smiles-"Smiley", a nickname of endearment from his loyal, loving wife and those who know him best.

# Island Daughters: Celebrating their collective 270 years of life experiences

July 17, 2010, was a hot summer's day on the island with little air moving. Still clouds were a glare in a sky bright blue. Air conditioners were a small success at keeping sweaty brows dry. What was this July day like 90 years ago when Anna Mary (Feddersen) Riedy gave birth to the last of her seven children with Henry Riedy, Cecilia (known today as "Ann Brown")?

There is no one here who can recall the events of that summer's day, but we can bet it was not a cool delivery in air-conditioned comfort. Ann was raised by her sister Mae and brotherin-law Jay Norris after their parents died. Ann survived, thrived, as her life took both predictable and unexpected turns.

Who knew then that Ann would marry an Island son, have one daughter (Claudia), and raise that daughter in Cleveland? Or that she and husband Charlie would follow Claudia to New York after Claudia finished degrees at the Cleveland Institute of Art and the University of Minnesota? And who could have foreseen that she would return to her island roots and live out her later years with friends of her childhood, in a comfortable little home on the site of earlier family homesteads and losses?

On July 18, eighteen members of her extended family-nieces and nephews, their children, relatives-bymarriage-gathered to share a Sunday noon dinner at Ann's small home on Woodford. Celebrations of this sort can be tiring at any age, but when you are 90, a little nap is a good thing. And that's just what Ann needed to revive her and keep her animated enough to receive a house full of friends from near and far at an afternoon dessert reception.

Sitting sedately in her little chair by the front door, Ann indulged in fruit and birthday cake, chocolates and minty ice tea. All around her was the hearty chatter among those who don't often see each other-those gathered to celebrate and honor Ann's life.

Missing from that happy celebration was her childhood best friend, Ruth Seeholzer Perrechon, who is also celebrating her 90th birthday this year. After graduating Estes School, Ruth went to New York and stayed with an aunt, reports her "little" sister Laura Jean. When Ruth returned to Kelleys Island, she opened a beauty parlor, and was very popular as the island beautician to residents and visitors alike.

Ruth married William "Bill" Perruchon (known as "Hops"), and they raised two sons and a daughter. Both her husband and two of her children passed away in their 50's. One son, living in Indiana, survives. Ruth has been cared for by a niece, Nancy

Florence (her given birth name) was born in the parsonage of what used to be the Reformed Church on Division Street (now a museum), the only daughter and a twin among three brothers. She alone survives. The men in her family were all fishermen, trap-net or gill-net, and one of her brothers also was a captain for the Newman's Boat Line. She was just 13 when her father died, and her mother and all the children went to work.

Sis once told me about ice fishing in winter, nearly a century ago, without the electronic connections and gadgets available today. They cut a hole in the ice and dropped a string or rope down. If the string stayed 'straight,' the ice was ok, but if the string started to sway left or right, they knew it was time to get off the ice because that meant the current was flowing. Their ice shanties were homemade, too. Women-older women

# The story of the Cross

As a child I remember the excitement of getting an island telephone. It wasn't even necessary to dial the entire phone number, just the last 4 digits and everyone's number began with "2." As kids, we thought that was just one more thing that made the island unique. To make things more interesting, we shared a party line with Frank and Laura Jean Pohorence. I remember picking up the phone to find them on the other end and having conversations with them. They were so patient with us, only wanting to use the phone, and ending up talking with the "Kaempfe kids." The Pohorence's were also the owners of the Island Market where we would ride our bikes to, pick out candy and only had to pause long enough for them to write in a mysterious book kept behind the counter. No money necessary! The Pohorence's were and continue to be two of my most favorite people on the island. Over the years, I have enjoyed chatting with them and have asked them to retell the story of the cross.

As you drive past the Pohorence's meticulously maintained house on Division Street, you'll notice a wooden cross in their side yard. The cross stands on the lot where the Greek Catholic Church once stood. The cornerstone of the church was laid in August of 1904 with the first service held in December 1904, according to an article provided by Laura Jean. Church services were led by Russian priests who came from the Russian Orthodox Church in Marblehead and were under the leadership of Bishop Tikhon.

The church was demolished around 1943 and some of the timber was used to build Marie Tomko's house on Division Street. The Pohorence's maintained the lot for many years after the church was demolished, mowing, removing weeds, poison ivy and branches. For years, the Pohorence's were interested in purchasing the property, as it was next door to their home.

Frank recalled that one day some-

time in 1985, the Pohorence's looked across the yard and noticed a Bishop had arrived. They watched as the Bishop donned his ornamental garb, set up a table, erected the cross, and proceeded to bless the land including the buildings and boat nearby. Frank jokingly recalled, he never did catch many fish in that boat after the bless-The Bishop ing! removed his vestments, and spoke to Frank and Laura Jean, saying he would put in a good word for them regarding their interest in purchasing the property. Soon after, they were approached with an offer to purchase the lot with one stipulation. The erected cross would remain on the blessed property until they decided to build on the lot. If the lot was

built on, the cross would be returned to the church. The Pohorence's agreed and they purchased the property. The cross has stood since 1985 in the very place erected by the Bishop. There is

# Island Daughters: Celebrating their collective 270 years of life experiences

-went out on the ice as well as the men, but Sis's brothers wouldn't let her go, telling her "girls didn't do that."

Except for a few years in Sandusky, Sis has remained on Kelleys her entire life, living most of it on Division Street. Her children were born and raised here, too. After son-in-law Russ Matso died and with daughter Bea in the Erie County Care Center, Sis was persuaded to move into the "big house" as they called it-a gracious, comfortable home with high ceilings and lots of memories among the stately elegance of an earlier way of keeping a home.

Sis's work life started when she was barely a teenager, and Sis has kept at it with an energy and vitality that put lots of younger folk to shame. She served as Clerk of Courts for the KI Police Department and was Clerk to the Board of Public Affairs (often called simply "the water department"). She also served on the Elections Board.

When elected by her community to the KI Board of Education, Sis was elected by fellow board members to the role of president. She served on the Board for a decade (or more-who can keep track of so much service, over so many years??). However, Sis is not one to take on a job just because of the title or what it signifies. She took her responsibilities to the community, to her neighbors, to the school and its students as a serious duty that required wide reading and informed decisions made to benefit all.

At Zion United Methodist Church,

Sis was the faithful record keeper, maintaining meticulous financial accounts in carefully recorded ledgers. She kept minutes and sent out correspondence, until her eyes were overly strained by such bookkeeping and accounting demands. Behind the scenes, she maintained the altar with love and reverence, changing cloths as the season or event dictated, removing tarnishes from brass candle sticks, arranging flowers on the altar, polishing the pews' rich wood. She washed and put away dishes others left behind, hauled out trash, made dinners for a pastor arriving on a cold winter evening, shoveled snow from the parsonage door. With no fanfare, diverting attention away from herself or her gifts, Sis was the wind that buttressed the church's life.

As you drive up Division Street, you might find Sis pushing the mower in her yard, with clippers pruning the tree limbs, or sweeping her walk. She just can't seem to sit still. Urged to take on another role a few years back, she declined because she just "couldn't sit still" for long periods of timewhich she attributed to a broken hip. That phrase seems to be a metaphor for Sis McKillips life: when there is work to be done, she just can't sit still.

Kelleys Life congratulates these three women on this milestone accomplishment, and thanks them for their individual and collective parts in keeping Kelleys the community it is today. Thank you, Ann, Ruth, and Sis.



# Erie County Metroparks purchases 18 acres on Kelleys Island

More than 18 acres of coastal land in Erie County will be preserved with a \$476,000 federal grant from the National Oceanic & Atmospheric Administration. The grant was awarded to Erie MetroParks and the Western Reserve Land Conservancy to acquire 18.5 acres of red cedar forest on the east side of Kelleys Island.

"It's critical that we preserve the coast of Lake Erie," said Sen. Sherrod Brown, who announced the grant award yesterday.

The land is on the southeast corner of the island and untouched by development. It's adjacent to the 677-acre Kelleys Island State Park and the Cleveland Museum of Natural History's 23-acre Woodford Woods Preserve.

According to the grant application, MetroParks would acquire the land title and then grant a conservation easement to Western Reserve Land Conservancy's Firelands office. The MetroParks would then be preserved

in its current state, though some hiking and bird-watching trails may be added and connected to the adjacent parks.

The property is currently owned by Kelleys Island Land Co., and valued at less than \$200,000, according to the county auditor's Web site.

Kelleys Island Mayor Robert Quinn is listed as the contact person for Kelleys Island Land Co., according to Ohio Secretary of State's records.

The MetroParks grant application

submitted to NOAA said the owner of the property "is actively seeking a buyer and has signed a letter of intent to sell, but Erie MetroParks does not have the cash on hand to purchase the property immediately."

"It's one of those cases where the property came looking for us," Dice said. "We weren't looking for it."

Kelleys Island resident Cathe Wise said she's all for the MetroParks acquiring the land as long as no one develops the property.

"If it would keep it in a natural state, I think it sounds like a very good idea," she said.

Dice said he was uncertain why the property was valued at less than \$200,000 on the auditor's Web site, but said the land conservancy is brokering the deal and negotiating the price with Quinn and another partner at Kelleys Island Land Co.

"Lake Erie is an invaluable resource - providing a source of water for countless households, generating economic activity for the region, and providing jobs through commerce, fishing and tourism. These funds will help preserve more of Lake Erie's coastline for future generations," Brown said.

The property is northeast of the intersection of Woodford and Monagan roads, with Monagan Road running parallel to the east boundary of Kelleys Island State Park. The site is owned by the Kelleys Island Land Co. LLC.

"It's not a big property but for an

The parcel also is adjacent to land owned by the Cleveland Museum of Natural History, which will donate conservation easements.

Erie MetroParks eventually hopes to acquire two parcels, a \$2.95 million project to lead to permanent protection of 130 acres; it also would contribute to the creation of an 825-acre interconnected system of protected property, which would be almost 1?3 of the land area of Kelleys Island.

The money will be administered by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources. It is part of an award of \$1.21 million to Ohio, with the remainder of the money going to Lake Metroparks to acquire and protect 1,310 feet of Lake Erie shoreline in Perry Township.



# A "wee bit" of Kelleys Life



**EMS Training Session** 

Summertime and the weather is HOT! As nice as a dip in the lake sounds, remember the sun can burn you even in the water. Use sunscreen to prevent skin damage. Many are available that will stay on even in the water or while sweating. Remember to re-apply throughout the day to get continuous coverage. It is possible to

get sunburn even in the shade; the reflective rays can do the same damage as direct sunlight. Small children are especially susceptible.

The continuous heat is starting to affect islanders and visitors alike. You need to drink lots and lots of water and electrolytesports drinks to maintain your fluid levels. Pop and alcoholic beverages will not do the job and may actually lead to further

dehydration. A good guideline to follow is to drink 8 ounces or one cup of water for every hour you are working or playing in the heat. If you feel extremely tired, hot or thirsty, then you already are starting to become dehydrated. Get out of the sun, cool off, and sip small amounts of liquid until you feel better. Try not to drink large amounts at any one time, this can lead to vomiting.

Just a reminder: House numbers must be properly displayed so Emergency Responders: EMS, Fire, and Police, can respond in a timely fashion. It is very frustrating trying to locate someone requiring assistance when there are no house numbers or the numbers are not visible from the road, especially after dark. Numbers must be a minimum of 3.5 inches in height and located on the building. If the building is situated more than 60 feet from the road, the number must be displayed at the entrance to the driveway.

Have you visited the EMS Station lately? Have you ever visited the EMS Station, located off Division Street behind the Town Hall just south of the Kelleys Island Police Department? The small white garage which is used to house the Emergency Medical Services and the EMS Clinic is just that. Small. Too small to hold training sessions to keep all the EMTs current on their required continuing education. Too small to park both ambulances inside, out of the weather. Too small to train new EMS providers. Too small to store all the equipment needed to keep the system running at the state approved level. And too small to adequately meet the needs of the public. One possible solution is a new facility, which could happen IF the fire department is moved to a new building.

Stop in and visit sometime, we look forward to seeing you in a nonemergency. In the meantime, stay cool and stay safe.




# Tall ships love our bay



# Don't let the air out

Children running in and out of the house on a hot summer's day may hear a common warning: "Don't leave the door open-you'll let the air out!" But how many adults do the same thing without realizing it?

While you may not leave your front door open, air leaks in the attic and basement let valuable air in-and out!of your home.

Matney, a Building Laura Performance Institute (BPI), certified building analyst, advises electric coop consumers to look into weatherization before investing in other energy efficiency measures. "I certainly encourage the selection of energy-efficient appliances, but they don't provide the amount of savings that proper sealing of air leaks can. We're trained to look at the basics of building science-seal, insulate, and then look at the equipment. If a homeowner only has money for one area then nine times out of 10 I recommend sealing."

For example, the U.S. Department of Energy's ENERGY STAR program advises addressing air leaks and duct work in your home before investing in a new heating and cooling system; sometimes, those are the real sources of problems rather than your equipment.

If air leaks are generally hidden, where do you start?

Most leaks occur in the basement and attic. Starting in your basement, look for gaps and cracks where your cement or block foundation meets the frame of your home. Joists (building supports which are smaller than beams) between the floor and the foundation (called rim or band joists) create cavities, small empty spaces that are hard to insulate and may leak. Not all of the gaps are visible, so ENERGY STAR suggests sealing the top and bottom of cavities around rim joists. Use caulk to seal cracks that are 1/4 inch or smaller; spray foam works best to fill gaps from 1/4 inch to about tightly into any cavities.

Pay attention to dirty insulation; it's a big clue that air is moving through the area. And just like the basement, be sure to seal gaps between the attic ceiling and the rooms below, including holes for wiring, lighting, and the attic door.

Weatherizing your home will save you money down the road-an average of \$358 each year according to the U.S. Department of Energy Weatherization Assistance Program-but some people may not be able to pay for improvements. As a result of the federal stimulus package, families with household incomes below 200 percent of the national poverty level are eligible for up to \$6,500 in energy efficiency improvements. For a family of four, that's an income limit of \$44,100.

For co-op consumers not eligible for the program, the stimulus bill provides a homeowner efficiency tax credit of up to \$1,500, or 30 percent, of the cost for upgrades, including insulation that meets the 2009 International Energy Conservation Code.

There are many more ways to protect your home, including weather stripping doors and windows and sealing ducts. For step-by-step instructions on how to weatherize your home and to start saving energy dollars today, download Sealing Air Leaks and Adding Attic Insulation, a do-ityourself guide to weatherization from ENERGY STAR. It's also a good idea to seal gaps between the basement ceiling and the floor above, like holes for wiring and water pipes.

In the attic, there are many small areas where air may come in, but focus on large spaces. For example, if your home has dropped soffits-part of the ceiling that has been lowered for lighting design-be sure they've been properly sealed. These design elements, common in bathrooms and kitchens, are often built before your home's drywall is installed, leaving part of your wall open to air from wall or floor cavities.

Even though there may be insulation covering dropped soffits in your attic, be sure all cavities around the soffits have been properly plugged. To do this, place fiberglass insulation inside plastic garbage bags and stuff it






Fefe and her husband Richard have a vacation home on Kelleys Island near the airport.

# **SERVING OUR SENIORS** Preved Upon by the Unscrupulous and the Criminal

Serving Our Seniors is a local, not-for-profit organization funded by the Erie County Senior Services Tax Levy. Serving Our Seniors is a geriatric social service agency that provides a variety of help to Erie County residents age 60 and better. The organization's purpose is to assist older people in maintaining their independent lifestyle.

In the year 2000, there were 35 million people age 65 and older according to the US census. Within that age group 3,180,165 are age 85 and older. Over that last 10 years that number has only gotten larger. And so has the number of different tactics used to exploit older people out of their money.

Exploitation of older people is a growing trend. Older people - especially those aged 80+ grew up in difficult times and valued the practice of hard work and saving as much as possible. Scammers and con artists are very aware that many prudent older Americans do have a nest egg. And they aren't the least bit shy trying to trick them out the money that they worked so hard to save.

In June 2010 Serving Our Seniors received 19 calls from senior citizens 2010 regarding experiences that caused the senior citizen to suspect that someone was out to scam them out of their money. Below are a couple of scenarios to make you aware of the tactics that are being tried.

TACTIC #1: A young female calls the senior citizen and speaks quickly using only initials to identify the name of the business she supposedly represents. The senior citizen notices that the number is not coming up on caller ID and asks the young lady for the business' phone number. the young lady says she can't give it out. (CONSUMER BEWARE!!)

The young lady says that they have someone who is available to stop by your home and look over your investments free of charge and see if you are benefitting for the tax saving advantages that exist. Sometimes she says this is free of charge and we are being sponsored by senior citizen organizations to have this service made available to you FREE of charge. (CONSUMER BEWARE!!!) When the senior citizen asked to list the names of some of those senior citizen organizations, the caller hung up. TIP - ANY LEGITIMATE BUSI-NESS SHOULD NOT HESITATE TO GIVE YOU THEIR FULL NAME, ADDRESS, PHONE NUMBER. TACTIC #2 The most popular tactic being used right now is the bogus check trick. Most recently we learned of a scammer who sent a bogus \$24,000.00 check delivered by UPS. With the check was a letter asking the recipient to deposit the check and \$8,00Õ.00 "wire" (CONSUMER BEWARE) to the company awarding the prize money. The \$8,000.00 was to cover taxes for the \$24,000.00 check that senior citizen just received. The senior citizen "wires" (CONSUMER BEWARE) the \$8,000.00. The \$24,000.00 check bounces. So the \$8000.00 comes out of the senior citizen's pocket. The money was "wired" to another country, i.e, Canada, arrived as planned. The US law enforcement has no jurisdiction in another country. The senior citizen is out \$8,000.00, plus the bounced check fee that the bank charged for cashing the bad check. TIP: If you received a large check that you didn't expect investigate it. Don't cash it. Don't wire money to anyone you do not know. Report the scam to local law enforcement and the Ohio Attorney General's office. The only way to figure out a way to beat the culprits at their own game is to study their tactics. That's why it is very important to file a report with law enforcement. 
