Erie County announces 2010 Health Clinics

Sliding fee scale for charges is also available for the uninsured.

You will be asked to bring a Driver's license or other photo ID, current health insurance card and a utility bill or other correspondence showing current residence if the photo ID does not show the current address.

2010 Census to Begin: Exercise Caution with Info Provided

With the U.S. Census process beginning, the Better Business Bureau (BBB) advises people to be cooperative, but cautious, so as not to become a victim of fraud or identity theft. U.S. Census workers will count every person in the United States and will gather information about every person living at each address including name, age, gender, race, and other relevant data.

The big question is - how do you tell the difference between a U.S. Census worker and a

con artist? BBB offers the following advice: If a U.S. Census worker knocks on your door, they will have a badge, a handheld device, a Census Bureau bag, and a confidentiality notice. Ask to see their identification and their badge before answering their questions.

Census workers are currently only knocking on doors to verify address information. Do not give your Social Security number, credit card or banking information to anyone, even if they claim they need it for the U.S. Census.

Remember, you really only need to tell them how many people live at your address.

Eventually, Census workers may contact you by telephone, mail, or in person at home. However, the Census Bureau will not contact you by Email, so be on the lookout for Email scams impersonating the Census.

Never click on a link or open any attachments in an Email that are supposedly from the U.S. Census Bureau. For more advice on avoiding identity theft and fraud, visit www.bbb.org.

Governor Signs Midwest Agreement to Promote Regional Passenger Rail Service

Joined by the governors of seven other Midwest states, Ohio Governor Ted Strickland today signed a memorandum of understanding to coordinate regional efforts to secure federal funding for development of the Chicago Hub High-Speed Rail Corridor, including Ohio's 3C Passenger Rail Plan, at the Midwest High Speed Rail Summit in Chicago.

The agreement signed today demonstrates the importance of Ohio and the 3C Corridor to the Chicago Hub. It also commits the Midwest to work together to bring high-speed rail to our region," said Strickland.

The memorandum of understanding was signed by Governor Strickland, Illinois Governor Pat Quinn, Michigan Governor Jennifer Granholm, Iowa Governor Chet Culver, Wisconsin Governor Jim Doyle, Missouri Governor Jay Nixon, Minnesota Governor Tim Pawlenty, Indiana Governor Mitch Daniels and Chicago Mayor Richard M. Daley. Ohio Department of Transportation Director Jolene M. Molitoris also participated in the event.

 $\mbox{"}A$ modern transportation system that includes passenger rail service

enhances the quality of life for those in its proximity, revitalizes our cities and boosts the economic development and growth potential of a region," Strickland said. "I thank President Obama and the Congress for their visionary leadership and commitment to expanding passenger rail service in the United States."

Ohio's 3C Corridor will connect Cleveland, Columbus, Dayton, and Cincinnati as part of President Barack Obama's nationally-prioritized Chicago Hub Network - which connects with Toledo, Louisville, Indianapolis and Chicago to the western United States.

"Ohio's central location makes our state the connection between the Chicago Hub to the west and the Northeast Corridor to the east," Strickland said. "I look forward to collaborating with my fellow governors and U.S. Transportation Secretary Ray LaHood to make the Midwest a regional leader in high-speed rail and move our state into the future."


The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act has made \$8 billion in funds available for passenger rail service, and this MOU establishes a Midwest Rail Steering Committee to coordinate the region's efforts to secure resources.

U.S. Senator Sherrod Brown also offered his support of the collaborative effort. "You can't have a nation-wide passenger rail system without Ohio," Brown said. "This agreement, coupled with new federal funds through the economic recovery package, will make the 3C corridor one step closer to becoming a reality. High-speed rail is critical to the long-term economic competitiveness of our region. By connecting Ohio's

largest cities with others cities in the Midwest, we can bring jobs and economic development to our state."

Restoring passenger rail service at conventional speed is Ohio's first step toward implementing a high-speed rail network connecting Ohio to the Midwest and the rest of the country.

With ARRA funding, Ohio would have initial conventional-speed service running by 2011. Ohio is seeking at least \$250 million and up to \$400 million in ARRA resources for the 3C "Quick Start" Passenger Rail Plan.

The Keeper of the Keys: *the*

Bonnie (Bickley) and Ted Blatt return each spring to their unassuming yellow house on Division Street, much like the swallows returning to their coastal California origins. Ted (born in 1925) traces his family's arrival on the island to the 1890's when mother Pauline (Kurtz) and father Norman Blatt came here. Finding work first in the quarries, later as clerk of courts, and then as a grocer, the elder Blatts made a living doing the kind of work needed in the new community they found themselves in.

Bonnie's heritage includes the Feyedelems who immigrated from Hungary and the Bickleys, wellknown island stock, her father Herbert Sr, described as "one of the most successful commercial fisherman" of Kelleys. Island trades like fishing made Kelleys "self-sustaining"

during the Great Depression years, so no one ever wanted for food here, recalls Ted. Dairy herds, chicken, fish, field crops and orchards kept tables full and appetites satisfieduntil the quarry shut. The last hourly employee had the job of keeping water out of the quarry. At church, when the collection plate was passed, a man might put in fifty cents in, and take twenty-five cents out-giving what his family could afford. Adults were proud of their community's two churches, and the kids were active in church-sponsored activities.

Ted remembers the 'birthday jar' kept below the pulpit in Zion. Kids came down front to put in their pennies in when their birthday came around, and the money went to Flat Rock, island kids mindful of charity to others. He was happy to hear Zion's bell ring again this fall-a bell

he rang for many years-a bell that not only called folks to Sunday service but rang as "cars went to the cemetery" or when there were accidents at the quarry or in fishing (like Charles Schnittker losing his arm or nets entangling fishermen). He remembers the amazement when a man went through the stone crusher, and lived! There were accidents on the roads, too, such as a child getting run over, but people went up to a family and apologized-it was an accident, and people recognized that fact, unlike the litigation-reaction today.

In winter, coal that fueled the train to haul limestone from the quarry might fall loose, especially if the engineer jerked the throttle over an especially rough patch. Suspicions about the 'accidental' nature of just such a jerk were rumored to be the cause of a stove blowing up, perhaps from a little dynamite placed in amongst the coal

Keeping your investment portfolio properly balanced

While most people know the importance of regular investing, they frequently overlook the crucial role their investment mix plays in reaching their financial goals. It is best to develop an appropriate combination of asset types in your portfolio; stocks, bonds and cash. One size does not fit all. It's important to remember that there is no standard solution that will determine the right investment mix for every individual. As you determine your investment mix, two key factors to consider are your time horizon and risk tolerance.

If you are in the accumulation or saving stage, your investment mix should be determined primarily by when you will need to use the money. If you are in the distribution stage, such as retirement, your investment mix should be determined primarily by the need for income from your port-

All investments carry risk, some more than others. The amount of risk you are comfortable with should also play a role in the makeup of your investment mix. For example, if you are a risk-averse investor, you may prefer more conservative investments in your portfolio, even if that means forgoing the potential for greater returns.

While your time horizon and risk tolerance are important, other factors can also influence how you should be invested, including how much money you have already saved and how much you can afford to invest.

Maintaining an appropriate asset mix is a lifelong series of shifting goals, life changes and fine tuning. When your personal circumstances change, your goals, time horizon and risk tolerance are also likely to change, sometimes significantly. It is always a good habit to evaluate your portfolio on an annual basis - regardless of whether or not your situation has changed. Let us take a look at your investment mix to determine if you need to rebalance your portfolio.

island love story of Ted and Bonnie Blatt



to catch a thief?

Winter meant everyone went skating, and kids participated in two or three school plays at year. They took long walks through the quarry, even in 36 degree temperatures, and danced in the back of Martin's Ice Cream Store (with a nightly curfew of 9:30). In summer, teenage boys learned to swim, as Ted described, "bare tail" in 'the cut' at the end of Trout Line Road. (This stopped when women started showing up there in the 1940's, he said). The cut or the lake were the places to get a bath, too, as the island water supply was limited to rain collected in buckets and cisterns. At the school, students used outdoor facilities until 1947.

After graduating in 1943 (Bonnie in 1947), Ted enlisted in the Navy and landed in Pearl Harbor-"Going from one island to another," he says. Of all the island men who went off to that war, only three were killed.

After the war (WWII), a lot of the local men used the GI bill to take up flying instead of going to college. Aviation made sense for living on the island. The list of pilots included Bob Schnittker, and Bonnie's uncle Logan Bickley who had the first pilot's license on Kelleys. Unofficially, there were as many as eight hangers and landing strips, mostly muddy fields.

In 1950, Ted married Bonnie in St. Michael's -an 'inter-religions' marriage that some said would never last. (Bonnie reports that after 59 years together, she doesn't think it's likely to stop now!) After their marriage, Ted and Bonnie moved to the mainland where they worked for most of their adult lives, returning to Kelleys on weekends, until both retired and were able to 'come home' again.

A prominent brass key dangles as a marker on the Blatt's kitchen door-a marker of Ted's best known hobby, but he also makes lists, keeps records, counts and compiles. Five or six albums with nearly 100,000 photos capture life on Kelleys from the turn of one century to the next. He's photographed nine sets of carriage steps around the island, and he tracked down his brother-in-law's WACO plane, photographed in its original state and its restored condition after being bought in disrepair in New York state and restored by its present owner in West Virginia (see letter), having made its own journey.

Ted calculates there are 443 alumni who have graduated Estes, 94 of them still living, among them his brother Milton who returns from California for Homecoming every summer. The oldest living alum is Mary Ellen Bauman Wilke, Judy DuShane's aunt, who graduated in 1934. The largest graduating classes were 1914 and 1934, he states, with twelve graduates each; at the other extreme, there were no graduating classes for thirteen years. Ted reckons that 50 Estes graduates have earned higher education degrees. Despite his interest in Island facts, he dis-

claims being a historian-that title belongs to his late friend Kurt Boker.

Ted's accumulated 642 bottle openers-just one other category of his inventory, neatly recorded by hand, and compiled in folders, notebooks, zip lock bags, and other containers. (Bonnie smiles kindly and proudly as she indulges her husband's past-times-maybe a secret of a long successful marriage?) According to Ted's count, there are 150 people on the island these days after the boats stop-"that's the REAL ones [islanders]" says

But of all his collections, Ted is the keeper of keys--31,604 of them! Ted reports he has identified who gave each key to him, when, and what the key is for. He may just have a key to the VFW, a glider, a church. And he has never had to buy even one of those keys in his possession. Story goes, if you can't get a door open, go to Ted: he's likely to have just the thing.

As autumn chills threaten indoor plumbing pipes, the Blatts pack the car with winter needs and head across the water to Sandusky. Come spring, you'll find them scooting along in their golf cart en route to senior lunch, or charging up Division St. for happy hour at the VFW, an Island institution they've supported for over 25 years. With clear blue eyes, ready and cheery smiles, the Blatts are comfortable with who they are, what they have, and the rich life they've shared on this island since childhood. No doubt, they've found the real keys to happiness.

Please do not let all this great news stop you from further donations. We will be collecting items through the winter and into the spring. Please feel free to bring them to the school whenever we are in session.





The students walking adventure

Do we take the time to keep God in our life?



Investments in efficiency deliver strong returns

In today's troubled economic climate, people are searching for places to sock away money that offer the promise of a healthy return. While no one can predict when, or if, the stock market will fully recover, crunching a few numbers does show one safe investment alternative: energy efficiency.

Even in good financial times the annual Wall Street return on stocks averages 14 percent, followed by 4.2 percent for 30-year bonds and 3.5 percent for money market accounts. Upgrading to compact fluorescent lightbulbs (CFLs) and fixtures in a typical home costs about \$200, but with an annual savings of \$80 the initial investment pays for itself in 2.5 years with a 41 percent

rate of return. Proper duct sealing, which can cost up to \$250, pays for itself in 2.6 years and matches lighting's high rate of return.

Your next purchase should be an ENERGY STAR front-loading clothes washer. Even though one costs an average of \$194 more than a non-efficient model, you reap a 37 percent rate of return- allowing you to recoup the extra expense in less than three

A programmable thermostat provides another boost to your bottom line. With a 30 percent return it pays for itself through energy savings in 3.7

A water heater tank wrap with an R-12 insulation rating should be your next step; the initial cost of \$85 saves you \$23 every year, offering a 28 percent return on your investment. An ENERGY STAR refrigerator, heat pump, and dishwasher follow with rates of return ranging from 18 percent to 27 percent. Finally, adequate air sealing and increasing wall and attic insulation offer between an 8 percent and 9 percent return.





Ask Serving Our Seniors

Serving Our Seniors is a local, not-for-profit organization funded by the Erie County Senior Services Tax Levy. Serving Our Seniors is a geriatric social service agency that provides a variety of help to Erie County residents age 60 and better. The organization's purpose is to assist older people in maintaining their independent lifestyle.

Q: What is the income limit to qualify for HEAP (Home Energy Heating Assistance Program)?
A: The total household income

is what is counted. So it depends on the number of people in the household and each person's GROSS annual income.

Household size of 1 the total household income for 12 months must be less than \$21,660.00

Household size of 2 the total household income for 12 months must be less than \$29,140.00

Household size of 3 the total household income for 12 months must be less than \$36,620.00

Household size of 4 the total household income for 12 months must be less than \$44,100.00

Household size of 5 the total household income for 12 months must be less than \$51.580.00

Household size of 6 the total household income for 12 months must be less than \$59,060.00

If you want to receive an application to apply for HEAP, call Serving Our Seniors at 419-624-1856 and ask us to mail you one.

Q: I heard that there is a program that will insulate a senior citizen's home for free. Is that true?

A: It's partially true. There is a program called HWAP. Weatherization Assistance Program. It does insulate homes for people who fall in the income brackets list-

If you would like an application to apply for free "weatherization" call Serving Our Seniors at 419-624-1856 and ask for an application. Or you can contact the organization that manages the weatherization service. They are called WSOS-CAC, Inc. 1-800-775-9767. They are based out of Fremont, Ohio.

O: Is it too late to sign up for Medicare Part D? (Prescription Drug Coverage)

A: If you turn age 65 in the last 3 months or if you are going to turn age 65 in the next three months, it is not too late for you to sign up for Medicare Part D. If you are older than that, you missed the deadline to sign up for Medicare Part D.

Q: Is a Medigap Policy the same things as a "Medicare Supplemental Insurance Policy"?

A: Yes, they are the same thing. Medigap means the same thing as Medicare Supplemental Insurance.

Q: Can Serving Our Seniors help me understand the differences between the Medigap policies that are available for me to buy?

A: Medigap Insurance is something is not our agency's area of expertise. However, we do know who is. Her name is Barb Roth. She works at Firelands Regional Medical Center. She wears many hats. One of her responsibilities is to advocate for senior citizens to make sure they understand what their Medicare coverage and their Medigap coverage does and does not do. She is a wealth of information. I suggest you set up an appointment to speak with her. Since you live on the island, it may be something you can accomplish by phone. Give her a call at 419-

Q: I tried to get a ride from Serving Our Seniors to an appointment at Firelands Regional Medical Center and I couldn't get a ride. Why?

As a resident of Kelleys A: Island age 60+, you do qualify for the Out of Town Medical Transportation Program. We recommend that you call no later than 7 days before the date of your appointment. Some days are filled to capacity. This is why Serving Our Seniors could not accommodate vour request. A volunteer will pick you up in one of Serving Our Senior's vehicles, take you to your appointment and bring you back to the Marblehead Ferry Service. The cost of using this service I an anonymous donation.. Whatever you care to donate is gratefully accepted.

Q: If I have been a victim of Medicare Fraud, can I just give it to Serving Our Seniors to handle? I tried to handle it myself and I have to be on the phone for an hour just to get through to someone at Medicare to hear my complaint. It's so frustrating. I have difficulty hearing the automated voices and when I get a live person, its hard for me to hear them, too.

A: Yes, you can make arrangements for Serving Our Seniors to function in your place to file a complaint of Medicare Fraud. We will need to you the first phone call to Medicare. At that time we will need to ask for a document. The document is from Medicare. You would sign it verifying that you are giving Serving Our Seniors and the specific name of the employee to work on your behalf on the Medicare Fraud complaint. Give our office a call. We would be glad to help you with this. 419-624-1856.

Q: Serving Our Seniors was going to do a Memory Screening, as a way to make people more aware of Alzheimer's Disease and related disorders - and not to ignore signs of memory impairment. This was going to take place in November 2009, but the Ferry Service had to suspend service that day due to rough water. Will Serving Our Seniors offer this when the weather


warms up?






