Islanders leap into action when Lafarge proposes dredge dumping

Few things can kick Kelleys Islanders into gear as actively or as vehemently as a good controversy or a threat to island safety. In the late 60s it was the state's threat to take over even more island property than they already had-much of it by eminent domain--that prompted the creation of the Kelleys Island Landowner's Association (KILA). Voting challenges in the 80s and the early 2000s generated lawsuits; and a proposal for an underwater preserve, which on the face sounded like a lovely thing to encourage a growth in diving tourism; but, in fact, when drawn up on papercreated in essence a preserve of not only the dive site areas but of the whole island and all its surrounding shores-drew up a large island contingent who strongly protested the preserve.

protests apparently Government people that matter, do listen. The state never took over any additional island lands---except those donated to them or purchased outright by them from willing landowners. To assist those island residents with more than one home to choose from which home they wished to vote, then Ohio's U.S. Congressman John Kasich submitted a bill which would allow homeowners to be the sole chooser of which community they owned property in they wished to vote from...with, of course, the option to only vote from one. The bill didn't end up being passed, but someone was listening. The underwater preserve proposals just went away.

In early June The Cleveland Plain Dealer and other area newspapers ran stories on the Kelleys Island Quarry lessees Lafarge North America offering up the island's pristine, water-filled, idle 182-acre western quarry to the Cleveland and Toledo Port Authorities as a dredge dumping site.

Ports must be annually dredged to allow entry for larger ships. Dredged materials are on record as repeatedly containing many toxins-including pcbs and lead.

The Lafarge proposal offers up to 24 years of dredge dumping opportunity for Cleveland and Toledo port muck rakings and proposes covering the then solidly filled quarry with up to two feet of Marblehead stone, and finally planting the area with the rare Lakeside Daisy, creating a "nature preserve."

When the articles appeared, virtually every island group hurled themselves quickly into action, letter writing, contacting council members and making "The Dredge Proposal" the topic of conversation all over the island and anywhere else islanders happened to be. The Kelleys Island Audubon Club quickly sent off a letter of protest to a wide list of local, state and national legislators, the two port authorities, and the EPA. The letter stated the club's belief that contaminants from the dredging would quickly enter the groundwater of the island due to the porous nature of its limestone bedrock; that once the area is poisoned there will be no remediation and that the dumping of toxic dredging would have a negative effect on the overall economy of the island, which relies heavily on tourism. KIAC president Pat Hayes was quoted in various newspaper articles as stating that the dumping would seriously threaten the island, "Bringing in 100 years of the worst stuff that Cleveland has to offer and putting it smack dab in the middle of this pristine habitat is enough to make you sick."

A mere three days after the first articles appeared, the Ohio EPA rejected the proposal, stating that the Kellstone Quarry was unsuit-

They don't bite, but they sure do manage to get in and onto everything. I've found them in every room in the house because they hitchhike in on clothing or shoes.

There are definite moments while sweeping off the house and wiping up the bug's dark gooey guts off my white siding that I think-well maybe if the lake was a little dirtier....naw---I love it just as it is and will happily, well grudgingly, put up with the mayflies every year.

What gets a little more difficult is explaining them to visiting guests. I've had a visiting friend and her daughter run screaming through downtown-I told them not to wear white shirts. I've had neighbors refuse to come in my front door-hadn't swept

able for storage of the contaminated toxic sludge where it could negatively sediment...and would render the island's groundwater undrinkable.

Lafarge North America was reported afterward as saying they would continue to seek ways to negotiate to allow the dumping, such as offering to provide water lines to island residents not currently on the village's water system. KILA, under the signature of their president Pete LeGere, sent off a letter of protest to the two port authorities and the Ohio EPA. KILA's objective/mission statement says that the organization was founded to "preserve the tranquility and beauty of this island by remaining constantly alert and vigilant to any situations that could adversely affect the needs of our members and the island itself..." He received a response that stated that the "Cleveland/Cuyahoga Port Authority would not approve the dumping of impact the health of a community or its environment.'

At the June 10 Council meeting, an almost packed house was anxious to hear council and the mayor's reaction to the proposal. Village solicitor Dave Lambros stated at the session that the area was not zoned for dumping and that any zoning changes would have to pass through the Planning Commission and Village Council. It seems doubtful that any such proposal could ever flv.

Personal protest letters to elected officials and letters from island neighborhood developments have also been sent. With Lafarge stating their desire to pursue the issue, it is not dead, but if history proves accurate, the powers that be are listening. It's pretty certain that islanders will keep talking.





Even before you enter the door on the East side of the store, you will get a glimpse of the rainbow of colors shining through the sun-catchers arranged in the bay window and first aisle. The feast for the eyes continues you as you turn around and head South, towards the counter; JEWELRY!! A truly unique treasure featured only at Vi's is the 14kt gold "KI" and island-shaped charms. 





Led by Melvin Reyes and Daniella Rosati, QuickFlicks has quickly evolved from just an idea into a venture with potential for expansive growth. Kelleys Island was chosen as the first location for a kiosk, with three locations to follow, including the East Side Farmer's Market, John Carroll University, and Uptown Solon shopping center. With these kiosks in place, QuickFlicks will use the opportunity to hone business skills to further their understanding of the business world. In service and memory: Veterans on Kelleys Island

Kelleys Island Post #9908, Veterans of Foreign Wars, marched once again to our cemetery on Monday, May 30, to conduct a service of remembrance. As the community gathered closer around the flag pole to honor fathers, brothers, sisters, mothers, sons, and daughters, the brief and solemn ceremony began. Short, sincere recitations by Post officers remind us, as always, that "freedom isn't free."

The classmate who didn't come home from Vietnam, the great uncle known only from a name etched into the town monument, the ancestor whose letter describing battlefield sadness is tucked into the pages of the family Bible. Only recently has Bob Schnittker known where his uncle's remains are buried in France. churches, we pray by name and collectively for those serving today in harm's way around the world, especially in the most dangerous battle fronts. On graves, little flags flutter from Memorial Day to Veteran's Day to mark the final resting place of those who served their neighbors. Graves tended silently and without need for recognition by a faithful servant who keeps his eye on those hallowed resting places.

Sustaining an armed force costs a lot in human suffering and lives cut short. It is fitting and proper that we, the living, gather to remember sacrifice, courage, pain, that the soldier, sailor, pilot endured for our benefit,

while we stayed home.

Post #9908 was chartered on
November 27, 1948, by 27 servicemen,
the majority having recently returned
from World War II service. Four of
those founding members are still alive
and connected, committed to island
life: Herbert, Lyle, and Logan Bickley,
and Frank Pohorence.

In its early years, Post #9908 was given the use of a quarry building, the current facility on Division Street having been purchased in the early 1950's. Additions in 1981 and 1995 expanded the facility and extended what the VFW offers on site to islanders and visitors. Money raised from the canteen, annual dinners and turkey shoots have made these expansions possible. It has also supported activities in the community, especially those which help kids. The post has donated to both churches, to scouting and drill teams, and made sure that every island child had a Christmas present in years past, especially when times were hard and money tight.

Today, there are 107 members, the majority of them life members. Post #9908 has members all across the

country, from California and Arizona to Florida, and even among those currently assigned to overseas duty posts.

Yearly elections provide leader-ship. This year's officers include Post Commander Paul Finnegan, Senior Vice Commander Charlie Burns, Junior Vice Commander Bill Koenigseker, Quartermaster Bob Schwartz, and Chaplain Bill Gorchester. Don Koshla, Ted Blatt, Jim Sennish, and John Carrig are among the faithful proudly joining their brothers around the flagpole.

VFW membership is defined by the organization's national charter. Military service personnel, male and female, who have served overseas during a time of conflict are eligible to join.

Accounting for finances is strictly maintained through a system of checks and balances as well as audits overseen by three Trustees (currently Lyle Bickley, Mike Feyedelem, and Wayne Meyers) and governed by compliance with state codes, the lottery commission, and the state attorney general's office rules for social clubs. By state law, alcohol can be served only to VFW members, and the club honors the state "no smoking" law.

The VFW serves the entire community by permitting weekly potluck dinners to be held onsite during the winter months. The Post furnishes flags to the Village of Kelleys Island for Memorial Park and the Village Offices, maintains and repairs grave markers.

The VFW is vital to island life, especially in winter when it is a gathering place for families. Just ask about the Kelleys Island Bowling League. It is pleased to have the support and cooperation of the school staff and the students' participation in Memorial Day and Veteran's Day services. Showing the upcoming generations how to display the flag and how to dispose of flags no longer fit to be in service educates and communicates understanding of and respect for national symbols.

From Memorial Day through Veteran's Day flags are put on service members' graves by that anonymous caretaker. Post #9908 has pledged to continue their vigil for reminding the community of veterans' service "as long as there is one person left," because they "take care of [their] own." And in turn, Post #9908 has the respect and gratitude of a community enriched by the continuing service of those who have already given so very much. Thank you, VFW Post #9908 for all you have given this community and all of us these past 62 years.

How much life insurance is enough?

Your life insurance needs often depend on a number of factors, including whether you're married, the size of your family, the nature of your financial obligations, your career stage, and your goals.

There are a number of approaches you can use to figure out how much insurance you should have. One method, called the "family needs approach," focuses on the amount of life insurance it would take to allow your family to meet its carious financial obligations and expenses in the event of your death.

Family needs approach

With the family needs approach, you divide your family's financial needs into three main categories:

- Immediate needs at death, such as cash needed for estate taxes and settlement cost, credit card and other debts including mortgages (unless you choose to include mortgage payments as part of ongoing family needs), an emergency fund for unexpected costs, and college education expenses.
- Ongoing income needs for expenses related to food, clothing, shelter, and transportation, among other things. These income needs will vary in amount and duration, depending on a number of factors, such as your spouse's age, your children's ages, your surviving spouse's capacity to earn income, your debt (including mortgages), and whether you'll provide funds for your surviving spouse's
- Special funding needs, such as college funding, charitable bequests, funding a buy/sell agreement, or business succession planning.

Once you determine the total

amount of your family's financial needs, you subtract from this total the available assets that your family could use to defray some or all of their expenses. The difference, if any, represents an amount that life insurance proceeds, and the income from future investment of those proceeds, can

Example: John and his wife, Wendy are estimating the appropriate amount of life insurance to buy on John's life. They first estimate their immediate needs as follows:

Final medical expenses: \$5,000 Estate settlement costs including funeral and burial expenses: \$37,500 Debts, including credit cards and mortgages: \$317,000

Emergency fund: \$100,000 Subtotal: \$459,500

Next they estimate ongoing income needs, such as:


Providing for their dependent children's needs for a period of time: \$500,000

Wendy's income needs until her retirement: \$450,000

Wendy's retirement income needs: \$380,000

Subtotal: \$1,330,000

Adding the subtotals together, John and Wendy estimate that, should John die, their family would need \$1,789.500. They determine that assets available to offset their needs include:



Bank savings: \$40,000 Investments: \$220,000 Retirement assets: \$250,000 Existing life insurance on John's life: \$300,000

Subtotal: \$810,000

The difference between their family needs (\$1,789,500) and their available assets (\$810,000) equals their life *insurance need (\$979,500)*

Review your coverage

Trying to figure out how much life insurance is enough isn't always easy, and that amount will likely change with your changing circumstances. By examining your family's anticipated expenses during various periods after your death, you get a more realistic estimate of your life insurance needs.

Unfortunately, many people underestimate their insurance needs and are underinsured. Often, the purchase of life insurance is based on cost instead of what's needed. By the same token, it's possible to have more

insurance than you need. You may have purchased a large policy during a particular point in your life, and then didn't adjust your coverage when your insurance need was reduced. Both of these circumstances are reasons to review your insurance coverage periodically with your financial professional. Doing so can reveal opportunities to change your levels of coverage to match your current and projected life insurance needs.

Health Clinic Open Twice A Month In cooperation with Firelands Regional Hospital and the Erie County Health Department, the Public Health Outreach Clinic is open twice a month on Kelleys Island. The clinic is open from 9 AM to 3 PM on the second and fourth Fridays of each month year 'round. Services provided include child, adolescent, and adult vaccines, blood pressure screening, individual health assessments which include lipid profile, blood glucose, hemoglobin A1C, and health risk assessment. Using compact fluorescent light bulbs safely

There's no doubt that compact fluorescent light bulbs (CFLs) are better for the environment-and our pocketbooksthan traditional incandescent bulbs. ENERGY STAR qualified bulbs use up to 75 percent less electricity than incandescent bulbs, last up to 10 times longer, cost little up front, and provide a quick return on investment.

However, concerns over the mercury in CFLs have raised questions about the proper disposal of them. CFLs contain a very small amount of mercury-an average of 4 milligrams-sealed within the glass tubing. By comparison, older thermometers contain about 500 milligrams. Mercury is an essential part of CFLs: it reacts with the coating on the inside of the glass tube to produce light using very little electricity.

In that mercury is toxic, follow these tips to safely handle, dispose of, and clean up a bulb should it break in your home:

Handling

- Always take care when removing the bulb from its packaging, installing, or replacing it.
- Hold the bulb by its base and not the glass part.
- Never forcefully twist the CFL into a light socket. If it breaks, follow the tips

Recycling or Disposal

- The Environmental Protection Agency recommends that consumers recycle CFLs. Local recycling options are listed at www.epa.gov/bulbrecycling or www.earth911.org. Home Depot also accepts intact light bulbs for
- If the state or local agency allows consumers to put CFLs in the garbage, the bulbs should be sealed in two plastic bags and put into the outside trash or other protected outside option.
- Never put a fluorescent light bulb or other mercury-containing product into an incinerator.
- If the bulb burns out before it should, contact the manufacturer. ENERGY STAR qualified bulbs are required to offer at least a two-year warranty. Cleaning Up If a Bulb Should Break
- Open a window and have people (including you) and pets leave the room for at least 15 minutes.
- Shut off central forced air heating/cooling system.
- If the bulb is broken on a hard sur-

face, carefully scoop up glass fragments and powder using stiff paper or cardboard and place them in a glass jar (with metal lid) or sealed plastic bag.

- Use sticky tape to pick up any remaining pieces and powder.
- Wipe the area clean with damp paper towels or disposable wet wipes. Place wipes in the glass jar or plastic bag.
- Do not use a vacuum or broom to clean up the broken bulb on hard sur-
- Immediately place all clean up materials outdoors in a trash container or protected area for trash pickup.
- Wash your hands after disposing of the materials.
- · Check with your local or state gov-

ernment about disposal requirements in your specific area. Some states require broken and unbroken mercurycontaining bulbs be taken to a recycling





New trend in later life: STD

The amount of research on sexually transmitted diseases (STD's) and later life is low right now, but probably won't be low for long. There is a new trend in health problems affecting "the young-old" (people 60 - 69 years of age). That new trend is the growing incidence of sexually transmitted diseases - most startling the incidence of

Western Society has long assumed that senior citizens don't need or want romantic intimacy because of their older age. Nothing could be further from the truth. People of older age are just like people of younger age - provided they have their health. Age doesn't eliminate the need and desire to feel close to someone and to feel loved.

Age can, however, increase the probability of feeling alone and unloved through death of a spouse or divorce after many years of married life. Couple these facts with the human need and desire for intimacy and that "...76 million will turn age 65 in 2011" (http://pewresearch.org/ pubs/1269/aging-survey-expectationsversus-reality) -- should we really be surprised that STD's are growing in prevalence in later life.

Health Erie County Department is receiving communications from the Centers for Disease Control reporting that 11%-13% of the new HIV cases are occurring in those who are age 50 and older. The reasons, according to Della Brown, Public Health Educator for HIV, Erie County Health Department, are more people age 50+ are in the dating market again. Although today's "young-old" population is the cohort responsible for the sexual revolution, this is the cohort that didn't receive health education about the benefits of using condoms to prevent sexually transmitted disease.

Since older adults are not at risk for pregnancy, this population group is more likely to have unprotected sex. This explains the increase in HIV in later life.

Q: Where can I go to get tested for a sexually transmitted disease and be assured that my confidentiality will be respected?

A: You can go to your doctor or you can go to the Erie County Health Department. For more information about testing for HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases call 419-626-5623 ext. 174.

Q: How can I get transportation if I wanted to see a doctor or the clinic at the Erie County Health Department?

A: If you are an Erie County resident age 60+ you are entitled to use "Out of Town Medical Transportation Program". It is a service for independently functioning older adults (no caregiver is provided) to get to medical appointments that are located out of the town from where they live. The cost is an anonymous donation. Please call Serving Our Seniors at least one week before your appointment (more advanced notice the better.)

Q: I heard that Serving Our Seniors gives away diabetes testing strips for blood sugar. Is that true?

A: We accept donated diabetic supplies that have not expired and have not been opened. If we have the type of testing strip that works with your glucometer, and you are an Erie County resident age 60+ you are welcome to free testing strips. Call our office for more information at 419-

It's barbecue time!

Beef Brisket Barbecue 4-5 lb well trimmed beef brisket

1 1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 cup catsup

1/4 cup vinegar

1/2 cup finely chopped onion

1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce 1 1/2 tsp. liquid smoke

1/4 tsp. pepper

1 bay leaf, finely chopped

Rub surface of beef with salt. Place on 20x15-inch piece of heavyduty aluminum foil. Stir together remaining ingredients; pour over beef. Wrap securely in foil. Grill 5 inches from medium coals, turning once, until tender, about 1 1/2 hours.

Cut thin diagonal slices across grain at an angle. Spoon any remaining juices in aluminum foil over sliced beef, if desired.

Note: Beef Brisket Barbecue can be baked in the oven. After rubbing surface of beef with salt, place in ungreased 13x9x2 pan. Stir together remaining ingredients; pour over beef.

Cover and bake in 325 degree oven until tender, about 3 hours.

Rum-plugged Watermelon

Cut hole 3 inches square and 3 inches deep in center of 1 ripe watermelon (about 10 lbs.); pour in 3/4 cup rum. Trim pink flesh from plug, leaving 1/2 inch rind; replace plug in watermelon. Refrigerate, plugged side up, until rum permeates watermelon, about 8 hours.

As the summer season begins, we would like to share with you some items of interest:

Kelleys Island residents and visitors alike enjoy one thing in common. This is a location which provides relaxation in what we all perceive as a beautiful, safe and secure environment. With time moving at a slower pace and people from all walks of life sharing our island space, we should all be able to enjoy and appreciate this stress free environment.

To make this possible, your police personnel (as well as other safety forces on KI) will be highly visible. There is no location which is completely crime free, and Kelleys Island is no exception. Enforcement of city and state ordinances are no different here than

on the mainland. Drunk driving, public intoxication, operating a motor vehicle in an unsafe manner (which includes golf carts) on the roadways of Kelleys Island and a multitude of others are all chargeable offenses. Please remember although golf carts operate at a slower pace they are not toys for children to drive. Golf carts drivers on our roadways must be licensed drivers. In the State of Ohio you can be licensed at the age of 16 (Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles rules & regulations), but all KI golf cart rental businesses require drivers to be at least 18 years of age.

Protecting this island is only possible with the help of our residents and visitors alike. Our officers cannot be everywhere and we need your help. Kelleys Island officers (full & part time)

have a wealth of experience and education. Some are retired from major agencies in the State of Ohio as well those who are working part-time at other departments. Please call the KI Police Department if you experience or witness something that would require their attention




