From the Mayor's desk...

The big news is that Kelleys Island now has a Village Administrator. For years we have discussed the potential need to create the Administrator's position to better serve the village. As we move into an era where more compliance is required rather than less, and more record keeping and more potential liability exists, it has become overwhelmingly evident that there is an increased need to have someone in place to oversee these issues, more closely than my Mayoral role allows. Over the course of the last few council meetings these discussions manifested into the creation of the position and the unanimous Council appointment of Greg Ritchie to the job.

Greg has deep roots on the island having spent summers here with relatives growing up. In 2005 he completed his own home in the Southaven subdivision and since 2009 has resided there full-time. Earlier this spring, Village Council discussed and approved the position of a "Village Administrator." Greg Ritchie was approved unanimously at the May Council meeting to become Kelleys Island's first Village Administrator, a position other similar government units (e.g., Milan and Putin-Bay) utilize to provide oversight of utilities and related personnel. Greg's background is in accounting and these skills will be invaluable as he takes on the tasks associated with the Administrator's job description. First and foremost in his list of activities will be to take over the daily operations for the Villages Water Department/Board of Public Affairs-as mandated by the Ohio Revised Code for a Village Administrator's position. Greg has already met with the department's employees and has the commitment of the past BPA members to help him transition into the job. Both Don Alexander and Ralph Kunar, BPA board members, have expressed their desire to help in any way they can. Don and Ralph, and Terry Kranyak before his passing last fall, have spent many years donating their time to the Water Board and their dedication and hard work is sincerely appreciated. Thank them when you see them. The Village administrator Position is part time and will pay \$18,000 per year. (For further information on Greg please see "Meet Greg Ritchie" story elsewhere in this issue of Kelleys Life.)

towards completion. At council member Pat Seeholzer's motion, council unanimously approved letting the bids out as soon as possible.

I recently met with FAA, State of Ohio aviation, and village engineers here on the island to close the airport repaving project and to meet to discuss strategic planning for the airport. The new Airport Layout Plan is presently being reviewed by the FAA and when complete will be the blueprint for airport projects in the future. Incorporated in the new ALP are projects including relocating Monaghan Rd. around the west end of the airport into the Ohio State Park property and a shifting northward for the east/west runway to better center the runway in the airport parcel.

Council also discussed the need for road repaving in critical roadways around the island and we will be identifying the most urgent needs in upcoming committee meetings.

May 16-23 was proclaimed Safety Week to recognize the dedicated service of our EMS, police, and volunteer fire personnel. On behalf of the village, I would like to personally thank each of these individuals for their remarkable contribution to the welfare of every visitor and resident alike.

Undoubtedly without them, island life could be precarious.

As of June 1, Knut Lahrs retired from his long-time service at the Transfer Station. The Village thanks Knut for faithfully giving up his weekend days to serve his neighbors.

Last year Police Chief Ehrbar successfully negotiated with Homeland security on the donation of a Police Boat and village officers were trained on the boat (see above). The boat was delivered to the village in the late fall. The chief and his officers spent the last several weeks cleaning and preparing the boat for service and the boat was officially launched on May 20th. The Chief will be working with EMS to coordinate water rescue training skills in the near future. Most of the manpower and consumable costs for the boat's operation will be paid for by the Department of Homeland Security. Lastly, it should be noted that the boat's safe winter storage was donated by The Palladino Family and the summer dockage has been donated by the Finger Family. The success of the boat program is reliant heavily on these donations and our appreciation for these donations should be well noted.

basil, olive oil & garlic; served with nutritional yeast or Parmesan cheese), T's Wilted Vegetable Salad--\$8 (cast iron sautéed vegetables, pecans, hardboiled egg & avocado over seasonal field greens with house dressing-a champagne vinaigrette); Pastas-4 Cheese, Pear & Walnut Ravioli--\$13, Mac & Cheese--\$10 (Beth's secret recipe baked with chilies, cheddar cheese & elbow noodles), Seafood Linguini-\$18(Arrabiata sauce, pan fired garlic & shallots tossed with shrimp, scallops and mussels-quick-baked in parchment paper; Side Dishes all \$4-Island House rock salt, cracked peppercorn and vinegar Kettle chips; the loved smoked gouda scalloped potatoes are back; Entrees-Lamb Chops 3 for \$18 (aged and marinated in secret rosemary marinade, Chicken Lemonatto-\$15 (another old favorite). This is just a small sampling of the many flavors offered. In addition a dessert tray will entice even the fullest patrons.

Open every day for lunch at 11 a.m., the lunch menu features burgers in every form of dress-which can be served in a turkey, garden, Kobe beef or spicy shredded chicken variety with flavorings from bleu cheese to nacho and "garbage" (chef's choice of toppings-not for the meek)-for \$8.75. Lunches also offer flatbread pizzas in delicious flavors for \$8-Chicken Waldorf, Santa Fe or White Caprese Pesto. Salads for \$6 including a beets & goat cheese selection and a caprese.

Restaurant manager Jesse Kranyak plans to eventually also include a weekend breakfast menu that will include most of the regular breakfast foods, plus pancakes in a multitude of flavors like-pumpkin pie & pecan or butterscotch & Bailey's streusel, or French Toast Kielbasa and a number of different omelets.

Lest anyone think the martini portion of the restaurant's name has been forgotten, Jesse is offering 31, count 'em-31 flavors-no apologies to Baskin Robbins. Think of almost any dessert you love and the Island House will more than likely have a martini to match it. A few of the-taste just like they sound--flavors include: Birthday Cake, Godiva Chocolate, Mochachino, Neopolitan, Banana Split, Key Lime

Pie, Peanut Butter Cup, Lemon Drop, Nutty Apple and 22 more. Of course there are over 40 varieties of beer also available and a full bar for additional and traditional mixed and soft drinks.

The restaurant also plans to offer a late night weekend menu of nostalgic-remember those good old bar burgers of the 80s?--late-night sandwiches of pizza burgers (burger with mozzarella and pizza seasonings) and sizzlers-a flavorful shaved sirloin on a bun. Late night hours will be: 10 p.m. to close. Luncheon will be 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. and dinner from 4 to 10 p.m. Breakfast when started, shortly after Memorial Day, will be 8 to 11 a.m.

Married 55 years, Robert and Carol (Schlesselman) Schnittker are the fifth "island born" couple interviewed for Kelleys Life about their childhood and formative life experiences on this very special village. Born in 1929-delivered by Dr. Haas, Bob was the only child of Charles and Ruth (Lange) Schnittker, whose ancestors had immigrated to the US from Europe-ancestors now buried in the Division Street cemetery.

Bob's father, Charles Schnittker, was born in Pittsburgh in 1895, where his parents had emigrated from Germany in 1886 to work in the steel mills. Charles and his brother served in World War I, his brother dying in France. After Charles returned from the war, he went to seminary in Illinois, and came back to Kelleys Island in summer where he worked in the quarry, and started dating Ruth Lange. They married in 1925.

Bob's mother, Ruth Lange, born in

1901, was one of five children born on Kelleys to Frederick and Marie (Gimber) Lange, who married after Marie came to visit her cousin, a Koster, on the island. The Langes bought property at the northwest point of the island and raised grapes, went into the grape business, and then into fishing. Ruth's mother died when Ruth was four years old, so her older sisters took care of her and other young siblings. Later, Ruth took over the homestead at 408 Division Street, where her father had a lot of acreage, and cared for her father until he passed away in 1937.

Bob's parents had only been married about a year when Charles was critically injured in a quarry accident behind where Russ Matso's house is now, on Division Street. Dynamite used in the quarry didn't always explode when it was supposed to have gone off, and the shovel on the crane struck an unexploded stick which went off. Bob said, "The blast blew Dad into the gears of the steam shovel-his arm was lying across the huge chain that turned gears, and his arm was pulled in." The accident tore his father's shoulder off. As he was pulled into the gears, the action actually saved him: it pinched the main artery from the heart which coagulated the blood and miraculously kept him from bleeding to death. Collie Lange, the crane operator, was also injured, and their coworkers carried them on the doors of the steam shovel (an improvised stretcher) to the doctor's office, who didn't think either would live. Both men were rushed down to the store

dock by the Casino, and onto a speed boat across which boards were laid to carry the men to Sandusky. No one expected them to survive.

Charles's arm was wrapped into his coat, and when they took his coat off at the hospital in Sandusky, the arm fell onto the floor, and his left side was ripped open so that his heart was visible; some of the nurses fainted. The arm was later buried in the island cemetery. The accident occurred in early November, and he stayed in the hospital until after Christmas. There wasn't penicillin to treat the open wound but silver nitrite was applied regularly to kill bacteria around it.

Bob reflects on the hardships his father faced: going off to war and losing his brother, Max, coming home, and losing his arm in a freak accident that almost killed him when he was only 31. There was no compensation in those days-no unemployment or workers comp, and his dad "went through life with one arm." His left side was weakened, and only three fingers were usable on his right hand. And yet he lived to be 78.

The quarry gave him a "life-time job" as a boss, which ended twelve years later when the quarry shut down in 1940. Bob's parents were planning to move to Bellevue; they didn't want to leave the island but didn't know what work he could find. Then, the fellow who had the water department job went off island to take on some other work, and Charles got the water department job, paying \$25 a month, in 1941.

Charles' disability left an impression on little children, who would see him, and walk around him, curious, then ask, "Where you have your other


arm at?" But his father shoveled and dug and did plumbing in his work for the water department for the rest of his working life. He wasn't a man who smoked or drank, and the clean body helped him stay alive, Bob believes. And his father led a productive life in his community. He was school board president, and Sunday School Superintendent. He wanted to help out in ways he could. That was important to him

When Bob entered Estes School, there were 100 students, 32 in first grade. The grades were paired: first and second together, third and fourth, fifth and sixth, and the high school students were upstairs. After the quarry shut down in 1940, there were only eight in his class: Elaine Martin (Jake's sister), Geraldine Beatty (Lyle Bickley's late wife), Bonnie Bickley Blatt, Dena Gennari Bianchi (Nick's sister), Carl Beatty, Jim Seeholzer, and John Mazur. There were four girls and four boys when they graduated in 1947.

Bob recollects two clubs, the Sportsman Club and the Athletic Club, which sponsored boys and girls basketball games throughout the winter. High school teams flew off island in a trimotor plane to compete against Put-in-Bay and mainland teams in Wakeman, Danbury, Port Clinton, and elsewhere. Bonnie Bickley, Gerry Beatty, and Elaine Martin were members of those teams.

The Sportsman Club was a hunting club. They set muskrat traps in the quarry which earned the boys good money-up to a few dollars per pelt-when they sold their skinned catch to a Sandusky store. Pheasants were popular game, and Bob remembers that

hunters would go house to house asking permission to hunt on a property owner's land, for which a fee was paid the owner. Boys brought their shot guns to school and kept them in the boiler room, taking them up to hunt straight after school, sometimes even at lunch time. He and his friends-Jim Seeholzer, John Mazur, Carl and Don Beatty-lived for hunting season.

Until the Tri-Motor planes arrived in the 1930's, mail was hauled to and from the mainland daily in iron clad boats that sailed where there was open water and were pushed by the passengers when they reached ice. A typical crossing might take as many as five hours, sometimes stranding the travelers or mail carrier on the mainland if it was too late to venture a same-day return.

Carol Schlesselman, also born on Kelleys Island, was a few years behind him. Her parents were also born on the island. Her father, Oliver, was a boss of fisheries on the north side of the island, one of two commercial fishing operations owned by the Lay Brothers of Sandusky. Carol's grandmother, Ida Reinheimer was a school teacher and the post mistress for many years. Her three siblings all eventually made their homes off-island: Mirran Haynes (Sandusky) Ardith Enlow (Vermilion), and Hank Schlesselman of Pt. St. Lucie, Florida.

But like Lyle and Gerry, Ann and Charles, and Geraldine and Lawrence, Bob and Carol did not marry right after high school. Instead, like their island friends and classmates, they, too, went off island to work and train and travel before coming back to the island.

Bob went into aviation. He took

courses at Ohio State, learned to fly at Griffing Flying Service, obtained a commercial pilot's license in 1949, and bought a plane for \$800 in Columbus which he kept for four or five years until he was shipped off to the war in Korea. For a few summers during high school, he worked for the Village of KI, trimming trees and patching roads. When Carol graduated, she went to airline school at the Gale Institute in Minneapolis, then to Washington D. C. where she worked for the U.S. Navy.

After the service and their marriage in 1955, Bob flew commercially, to Cleveland, Kelleys Island, and Pelee Island. He flew for Harry Griffing (Tom's father, of Griffing Flying Service) from the old Columbus Ave. airport, for Cedar Point, and for companies such as New Departure, Ford, and Maytag. He spent 62 years flying.

Carol and Bob have three sons, all of whom pursued college training and professional careers: Paul, who is an investigative detective for the prosecutor's office in Erie County; Dale, who is an engineer for Tenneco in Milan; and Ron, who works for the Erie County Sheriff. Smiling photos of their ten grandchildren line their living room wall, and they speak proudly of two great-grandchildren, with two more "on the way."

"After raising our family," Bob says, "Carol worked for Sandusky Metal Products as an accountant for 15 years, then office manager for twenty more years. During this time, she served many churches, including Zion as organist. Still today, her talents and services are in use at Columbus Ave. United Methodist Church in Sandusky. She also accompanied the Island

Singers for many years.

Where you were born, where you were raised, will always be home," says Bob. He describes Kelleys Island as a "big family, the way we grew up...we learned from our experiences. Didn't have a lot of money but we were a big, happy family." He describes the island as being 'staked out' into neighborhoods where kids would hang together and play together: the school house and cemetery down to Teddi Blatt's place, then the ball park, down around the churches, and "the marsh" where the marina is now. There was a west side neighborhood, too. "There were grape vineyards galore, and wine cellars, cleared land, farm land. You could see clear down Division Street to the lake. It's all grown up now," he said.

Bob has seen a lot of changes over the eight decades since he 'arrived' on Kelleys Island. There were four churches: a Greek church, a Congregational Church, a Catholic Church, and Zion. Zion used to be Evangelical, and then it became United

Brethren, and then United Methodist. They were married at Zion in 1955 by Rev. Firestone, a District Superintendent who returned to serve Kelleys after his retirement from the district office. Both Bob and his wife Carol were active in their churches, and they worked to keep their church, Zion, going as others left the island or passed away. One time, when the church was going to be closed by the church administration, Bob and his father, Charles, and Carol's aunt, Dorothy Schlesselman flew to St. Mary's and argued with the authorities to keep Zion open. When Rev. Walton and his wife, Mary, came, they worked hard to build Zion up again.

Yes, Bob has seen a lot of changes, family orientation, a "looseness" coming in. He misses the ice fishing and ice boating when the ice was thicker before Mother Nature warmed up the climate. Lots of fond memories frame a life time that began from the commitment of his parents to make their life - their home on Kelleys Island, so long ago.

self with the village Water Department.

Greg brings a successful history of financial oversight and planning, dating to the point at which he entered the financial world in 1974. After twelve years working with Johnson & Johnson Health Care, he became a self-employed CPA and CFP (Certified Financial Planner). Local residents have already given good reports after using his accounting services this past year.

Greg's wife, Dee Dee, works in the banking industry. They have five

adult children, and five grandchildren. He holds a B.A. in Accounting from Cleveland State, and a Masters from the College of Financial Planning in Denver. A veteran of the U.S. Air Force, Greg received an Honorable Discharge after having served 3 ½ years (1971-74) with an overseas assignment in Turkey.

As mentioned in Mayor Quinn's column on page 1, Greg is not a new-comer to Kelleys: he began coming to the island as a child visiting his maternal grandparents' home here. His grandmother, Kathleen Brennan

and her brother Carl were recently pictured in a 1907 photo of a class at the Catholic School, his great grandparents having emigrated to Kelleys from Ireland in the late Nineteenth Century (1800's).

In his new role as Village Administrator, serving at the pleasure of the mayor and council, Greg is committed to "doing things that make sense financially" and assisting the mayor and council in providing better services to the residents and visitors of Kelleys Island.

Ask the experts: How can I diversify in a difficult market?

• Deflation vs. inflation: Many economists--including those at the

Federal Reserve Board--are concerned about the potential impact of prolonged drops in stock or housing values. However, efforts to combat deflation also raise the specter of potential inflation. Your portfolio should take both possibilities into account.


• Currency fluctuations vs. stability: Risk aversion last year boosted the U.S. dollar. However, that trend could reverse at some point if investors tire of Treasuries' low returns or become more concerned about rising U.S. deficits. Balance that possibility against potential instability in over-

seas currencies and markets.







Make the most of your memories...on and off the wall

Whether you are a day-tripper, weekend warrior, once a year vacationer, summer islander or year 'round resident, this place will become a part of you.

It's important to express that and what better way than in your home's décor. We used to document our memories in scrapbooks and photo albums and although those are still viable alternatives, there are a lot more visually expressive methods to display our snapshots and mementos. The most obvious are photo frames filled with family, friends and favorite places. However, there are some interesting alternatives for showing off what you love most.

To name a few:

If you haven't experienced one of the new digital frames, I highly recommend them. They've come down considerably in price and they are an impressive way of showing off your favorite pics. You can fit hundreds of pictures in one frame and they shuffle and stream your memories for hours on end right there on your countertop without ever having to sit down and pick up an album. They also make great gifts for that "person who has everything."

Shadow boxes are a great alternative to scrap books. They can be purchased at the local craft store and with a little creative prowess they make an eye-catching wall hanging in your home. Shadow boxes are most striking

when presented as a theme. For instance a beach motif can include, pictures of kids at the beach, sea shells, postcards, a nautical knot, a child's beach shovel or small toy, beach glass or even a pair of sunglasses. You can even line the bottom with some sand if it has a glass cover. This arrangement is most striking when it's kept authentic. I wouldn't suggest adding scrap book trinkets or themed paper. Compile items and images you've collected that are significant to the scheme.

Although it may seem obvious, children's artwork is one of the most memorable displays of collectible art. As Picasso said, "All children are artists, the problem is how to remain an artist once they grow up." Kirt and I have professionally framed and matted about a dozen select pieces our kids created as young children. Except for Abbey, our oldest who grew up to become an artist and we continue to showcase her work. Some of it is on display at the winery.

those pictures from their youth, it brings back a flood of memories. You needn't spend a lot of money on professional matting and framing. Most craft stores now carry pre-cut mats in an array of colors and a good selection of frames in different sizes. TIP: choosing more than one mat color will add interest to a room but when selecting frames, style can change but color or material should be the same throughout your house to create continuity. For

example, I frame everything in my house in different styles of black wood frames.

If you choose to go with traditional framed photos of family, friends and nature, a grouping of six or more on the wall will draw guests to the arrangement. Level in hand. I used to think I had to have my frames lined up exactly, but actually they're more interesting if they aren't perfectly squared and the frames are different sizes. Mix 4x6, 5x7 and 8x10"s. TIP: Measure the wall space where the pictures will hang. Create that same wall size with newspaper and lay it on the floor. Move the pictures around on the newspaper until you come up with a layout you like. Trace the frames onto the newspaper. Mark the hanger on the back of the frame onto the newspaper as well. Tape the newspaper to the wall (use a level to make sure it's squared) and nail the picture hanger right through the newspaper. Tear the newspaper off the wall and hang your pictures.

Most importantly, when you are on Kelleys Island, always remember to have a camera within reach. Don't stow it away in a drawer. Some of the best photos are the candid ones of people enjoying a good laugh together or one of the eagle landing in your backyard. Don't take one picture. Take ten. In this digital age you can delete seven if they didn't turn out but chances are you'll have at least one that you want to add to your Kelleys Island collection of memories.



Operation and maintenance of private water systems

Mark Janowich, Erie County Health Department

A portion of Kelleys Island does not have access to a public water supply; therefore drinking water is commonly obtained from privately owned and operated private water systems. The most common private water systems are drilled wells that draw water from an aquifer below the ground, and hauled water storage tanks which use a concrete or plastic holding tank to

hold water, which is obtained through a licensed water hauler and from a public water supply.

Owners of a private water system are reminded that an ounce of preven-

tative maintenance can go a long way towards optimizing the performance of their private water system.

The Erie County Health Department recommends that owners of seasonal residences with a well perform an annual disinfection of the well before potable use each year.

The benefits from routine disinfection of private water systems include the removal of the following: naturally occurring bacteria, lime scale, and encrustation or sedimentation that may occur on the interior surface of a well casing or borehole. Proper disinfection of the water system will also disinfect other components associated with the water supply including the pressure tank and water distribution lines

Instructions for proper well and hauled water storage tank disinfection are available on the Erie County Health Department website: ECGHD.org

After the well disinfection has been completed the Erie County Health Department recommends obtaining a bacterial analysis of the water to determine if it is safe for drinking and cooking purposes. Bacteria sampling of private water systems is offered by the Erie County Health Department Monday through Wednesday. Contact Craig Ward with the Erie County Health Department at the phone number below if you are interested in testing your water supply.

Property owners can also find information about private water wells on the Ohio Department of Natural Resources (ODNR) website (web address). On this site, homeowners can obtain information about existing wells including: date of installation, well depth, and geological formations encountered during the well drilling process, static water level, water test rate, and the name of the well driller.

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

Report on 2010 Nest with the Birds Week-May 9-17

Nest with the Birds Week was showered with birders and birds and yes, at times, showers. Everyone had a great time, including the Kelleys Island School students. The week kicked off on Mother's Day with a Wildflower Walk by retired State Chief Botanist, Allison Cusick. The botanical tour of the North Pond was amazing and the boardwalk made everything possible as the area is now covered in several feet of water for the first time in over 10 years.

Monday started the daily guided bird walks and Great KI Bird Hunt. For the week the birders observed a grand total of 127 species of birds. Some of the highlights were: yellowthroated vireo, black- billed cuckoo, scarlet tanager, northern parula warbler, Canada warbler and the very colorful black burnian warbler. saw a total of 28 species of warblers.

On Tuesday the Kelleys Island School students entertained 35 people with a fascinating owl program. Each student featured an owl found on Kelleys and afterwards the audience was invited to participate in owl lab. We all got to dissect our own owl

Wednesday's program was brought to you by our very own board member Shane Roberts. He had some wonderful photography of birds on Kelleys Island. And on Thursday, Cleveland Museum of Natural History's Biodiversity Coordinator, David Kriska gave a program on the Museum's Natural Areas. Did you know that the Museum has 6 properties on Kelleys Island with a total of 118 acres? The Scheele Preserve is only one of three preserves open to

Thursday night we had a Welcome Back Pot Luck. There was delicious food and a bird feeder door prize.

John Pogacnic's program on Friday gave insight into weather conditions and helped explain the mysteries of the timing of migration.

Saturday was Bird Banding all day at the Jones Preserve. Visitors and locals alike were entranced by the close up and personal encounters with the birds and 19 birds were put up for adoption. A total 175 birds were banded over a two day period.

Mixing sailing adventure with the Haiti Relief Effort

Our Winter, though we refer to it as our "summer" began in late January when we purchased and collected from amazingly generous citizens, an enormous amount of donations in the form of clothing, blankets, coats, shoes, paper products and the most needed freeze dried # 10 cans of strawberries, peaches, apricots, vegetables, pilot bread, celery, spinach and a myriad of all sorts of others (also freeze dried and amazingly wonderful). Along with these items we also had over 100 jugs of pure water, antibiotics, tooth brushes and toothpaste, soap, towels, baby food and formula.

Surprisingly, despite the nasty weather, our supplies, and Tim and I, endured the long, wet and miserable sea conditions along the way. Usually the winds are pretty nice this time of year, but we did not luck out in the crossing this time.

Our stops allowed us to meet up with a few friends along the way, all of whom added to the bounty we were carrying.

We did not have UN official permission to enter the Haitian waters, but we were able to stage on islands north of the area where we loaded and reloaded ships that were bound for the affected areas.

Many Haitians, who had managed to escape their desperate island, traveled on makeshift boats and used the Gulf Stream and other favorable winds to float them to islands in the southern Bahaman chain, primarily Exumas. Many Refugee Camps on several islands were not talked about and pretty much hid from public eye, so as to not deter or reduce the vacationers and visitors who bring the islands their primary source of income.

Children and women were usually kept in separate areas from the men. The orphanages were often found in the basements of churches and "hospitals" were Mash Units of tents. In many cases, the only way to find the needy was to talk to the locals or listen on Saturday evenings and Sunday as they sang their hymns from wherever they were being kept.

So many sailors who had no inten-

tion whatsoever found themselves involved in rescues, donations, fundraisers, cooking, cleaning, tending and supplying. It was a wonderful "awakening" for many and the needs of these survivors are beyond belief. The simplest item can actually save a

We were discouraged from taking any pictures, but we do have a few that we need to retrieve from our phone that took a beating. So I have one or two, but the Haitians are very proud, French speaking and superstitious folks who do not appreciate their situation to be made into a freak show, so we respected that as best we could.

Obviously, we also spent time in George Town, and had great fun with the Regatta and Beach Church. Our time was not all work, it was mixed with play and pray....some snorkeling, diving, cave diving and lots of exploring the little uninhabited islands along the hundreds of little islands that make up the chain of the Exumas.

kind pieces. With the increasing use of plastics and environmental awareness, beach glass is becoming harder to find which makes this jewelry all the more precious.



In September 2009, students in grades 7-11 at Kelleys Island School started a project, coined "Move More." The project is for the technology class taught by Miss Amy Krajnak. Every day of the week students recorded if they walked, rode their bike, or got a ride to/from school. As of May 22, there are 3 students who have walked over 300 miles! This project has gotten students out and about and being less dependent on motor vehicles and more on themselves. This project will continue the whole school year.

So how is technology involved? To begin the project, the students were given a world city. For example, Crystal was given the city of Philadelphia. She walked 60 miles, which was multiplied by 10 to give her six hundred miles to travel. Crystal found out that Jacksonville,

Celebrated as a culmination of this project, all of the students and staff participated in a fun-filled day on May 6, 2010. The event began at 9:30am when students arrived, dressed in color-coordinated t-shirts provided by the school, and assembled into 4-member teams in the gymnasium. Students participated in relays and other team games before gathering with community members to hear a summer cooking presentation by Chef Michael Edwards from EHOVE's Culinary Arts program, with some of his senior class students.

Chef Edwards brought along samples of various fresh herbs and let students smell and taste them, as well as how they can be used in cooking for best flavor. His students made a pita pizza with caramelized onions, toma-

toes, and feta cheese, as well as a warm asparagus salad with citrus vinaigrette and an asparagus soup shooter.

After the presentation, students had a few more games, then a nutritious lunch and received special goody bags stuffed full of donated items from various companies,

including a magazine, food samples, first aid kits, toothbrushes, and hand sanitizer. Jeanie Wertenbach and Troy Chaffin from the Erie County District Board of Health came in after lunchtime and worked with small groups of students on stretching activities, hand washing, and the dangers of sun exposure with a SkinScope, which is an education screening tool used to teach people about the dan-

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



Protect yourself from lightning

According to the National Weather Service, lightning kills an average of 62 people each year in the United States. In 2008, 27 people died from a "bolt out of the blue." The majority of these fatalities occurred outside, but caution must be taken indoors as well.

Follow the tips below to keep you and your family safe from lightning this summer:

- Seek shelter immediately if you hear thunder; lightning is not far away
- Find shelter in a substantial building or in a fully enclosed vehicle with the windows rolled up.
- Do not seek shelter under trees, picnic or rain structures, or in open-frame vehicles. Avoid objects like electric wires or metal fences.
 - If you cannot find shelter in a

building or closed-frame vehicle, keep your feet together and crouch on the ground using the "lightning crouch:" feet together, squat low, tuck head, and cover ears.

- If you are inside, do not plug or unplug anything during an electrical storm.
- Do not use corded telephones phone use is the number one cause of indoor lightning injuries in the

United States. Avoid contact with other electrical equipment like computers.

- Avoid contact with water, pipes, washers, or dryers.
- If a person is struck by lightning, call 911 and care for the victim immediately. You cannot be harmed by touching the victim after he or she has been struck by lightning.

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North Pond has/had water again

The KI State Park's North Pond Nature Preserve-on Ward Road-which features a one-mile wooded, trail, a good portion of which is on a recycled wood boardwalk, had water in it again this Spring for the first time in over 10 years. As a natural embayment pond--one that holds all the runoff from surrounding land--and one of only a very few such ponds left on the Great Lakes, the water in the pond and around it, which necessitated the boardwalk, comes and goes based

upon the depth of the lake. About 10 years ago Lake Erie's depth reduced to a point where the pond was completely drained and the outlet to the lake was filled in with a wall of sand. Over the years the dry pond bed has filled with all manner of island foliage and animals-especially birds-and the boardwalk's featured lookout has not lost any of its potential as a fantastic viewing site for birders and hikers with or without water.

Pat Haves, president of the island's

Audubon Club, says that as of May 22, the pond has re-emptied. He explains that this happens when the water level in the pond is so high that it breaks the sand bar holding it all in. It empties into the lake. Be sure to take a hike back and see it for yourself. Look for muskrats, frogs, nesting birds and other animals on your way-and be sure to leave nothing but footprints.




Obituary

Senior Citizens are a Large Segment Caught in the "All Electric Home" **Electric Rate Debacle**

Are you an all-electric home owner? If so, mark your calendar now for July 23rd 4pm - 6pm-- location to be determined. Serving Our Seniors is coordinating a public meeting/forum with our Ohio legislators. The forum is entitled: From the Consumers' Perpective: Fair Electric Rates for All-Electric Home Owners. Senator Mark Wagoner Representative Dennis Murray, Jr. have accepted Serving Our Seniors' invitation to discuss the plight of all electric home owners - a large segment of who are senior citizens. Rep Murray asked Serving Our Seniors to at least invite First Energy to participate in the discussion - and we did.

For those of you who are not aware, all-electric home owners experienced unaffordable rate increases in January 2010. Customers were paying double and triple the costs they had paid in prior years. Some were billed as much as \$1,000 for one Governor Ted Strickland month. intervened and required that First Energy return all-electric home owners to the "all-electric rate" they had in December 2008. This retroactive rate ends after the winter heating season of 2010/2011. At that point in time, a new and different rate (whatever that may be) is supposed to be charged to all-electric home owners.

Because there is so much uncertainty around what this new and different rate is going to cost all-electric home owners; and because such a large number of all-electric home owners are senior citizens, Serving Our Seniors is advocating for Erie County's older adult population on this issue.

The reasons are many:

1. The majority of a senior citizen's net worth is their home

2. Selling their home is one of a senior citizen's options for tapping into their equity - free & clear

3. If the "all-electric home" rate per KWH is not affordable, senior citizens cannot sell their home

4. If senior citizens cannot sell their home, this is detrimental to their financial stability

Other state senators and legislators from Lorain County and Huron County are also being invited to participate in the forum/discussion. Citizens of these neighboring communities are encouraged to contact their Ohio Representative and Ohio Senator and ask them to participate in the Serving Our Seniors forum From the Consumers' Perspective: Fair Electric Rates for All-Electric Home

Erie County residents age 60+ are asked to call Serving Our Seniors (419-624-1856 or 800-564-1856) now to RSVP. Serving Our Seniors will take your name and mailing address in order to stay in communication with you as the location is finalized. Erie County residents age 60+ needing transportation to attend this forum should also call Serving Our Seniors to make this request no later than June 30, 2010.

Summer is finally here and it's time to relax, enjoy friends, and keep the house cool! So, bring out that crock-pot and let it work for you.

Crock Pot Chili

2 lb. lean ground beef 2 (14 oz.) cans whole tomatoes

2 (11 oz) cans tomato soup 1 (15 oz.) can light kidney beans

1 (15 oz.) can dark kidney beans

Garlic salt Black pepper Chili powder

1 red pepper

1 green pepper

Brown ground beef (season to taste with garlic salt and black pepper while browning). Drain grease from beef. Combine in crock pot tomato soup, kidney beans (with liquid), whole tomatoes (with liquid), peppers (cut into strips), onions (cut into eighths) and chili powder (1/4 to 1/2 teaspoon or to taste), Add drained ground beef. Mix in crock pot; cook on MEDIUM heat 3 to 4 hours. Serves 6.

Great the next day, too. Serve with green tossed salad and crackers or corn bread.

Crock Pot Stew

2 lb. beef stew meat, cut up 1 can cream of celery soup

1 can onion soup

1 can cream of mushroom soup

Mix together all cans of soup. Place stew meat in crock pot. Pour soup mixture over meat and stir. Do not add any water! Allow to cook 5 or more hours at 250 degrees to 275 degrees in crock pot.

This year marks the 10th season of our annual Lake Erie water snake population monitoring, also fondly known as "The Nerodio" which is scheduled for the first two weeks of June this year. It's hard to believe that ten years have blazed by, but boy have

10 years, Over 10,000 Snakes Served! Announcing the 10th Annual Lake Erie Water Snake Census

we been busy! Since we started our annual census, more than 100 volunteers have successfully captured and processed over 10,000 individual Lake Erie water snakes (LEWS) on the Lake Erie islands, and educated more than 20 million people!! (That's impressive!)

These 10,000+ captures form the bulk of the data we use to generate current island population estimates, survival rates and population growth parameters. As I mentioned last year, we've shown that we have reached and exceeded the number of adult LEWS needed for recovery on all islands, which in turn, has lead the

USFWS to proceed with the de-listing process! (An update on the proposal to delist to come soon!)

Our goal now and in the coming years will be to show that the populations are remaining stable, a requirement of proposing de-listing. A personal goal of mine is also to get more islanders involved with our census and education programs! I'm inviting all island residents who are interested in learning more to call or e-mail me and hopefully set something up.

In the coming weeks, please keep an eye out for my snake crew and me as we census the Bass Islands (June 1st - 4th) and then Kelleys Island from June 6th - June 10th. Following Kelleys Island, we will return to the Bass island area to finish up any unchecked sites.

I sincerely want to thank all of you who have been supportive of our census over the past 10 years! Without you, we really would not have been able to come as far as we have in the recovery of this species!

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
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


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
