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From the Mayor's Desk

Spring is in the air on the island, the ferry started regular hourly service on April 1, and Council had its third meeting of the year. Returning Council members welcomed new member Lance Marchky who was elected last fall and council thanks past member John Kilko for his 8 years of service to the island.

As many of you know, the Village unexpectedly lost Village Maintenance employee Vance Mowrey at the end of 2009. On behalf of the village, and personally as well, I would like to express my gratitude for his ten-years of service as well as my sympathies to his wife Ruby and their daughters Valerie and Marie.

For those returning to the island you will notice the airport repaving project was completed last fall. My Father, Robert Quinn Sr. (Bob), the Airport Manager at the time, worked diligently to see the completion of the project. His unexpected death, just days after the project's completion, was also a shock to our family and friends, and the island. He will be missed

The Safety departments report that their equipment and vehicles have been inspected and are ready for the 2010 season. Both EMS and Fire are conducting training sessions this year, anyone interested in becoming a volunteer fireman please contact Acting Fire Chief Jack Hostal. Police Chief Ron Ehrbar reported having completed interviews for two replacement officers that have moved into permanent full time employment elsewhere and announced the rehiring of the majority of last year's officers in anticipation of the need for their increased presence and services during the busy summer months.

New camping ordinances have been adopted. Camping fees have changed and permits are now available through the police department as opposed to the village offices. This change will allow the police department to have better access to the permits to allow for better monitoring of camping violators. Some tent camping will no longer require a permit provided it meets criteria. For a complete list of changes and new fees, contact the Police Department or visit the village web page www.kelleysisland.us.

Transfer Station hours and days have also increased to include Saturday, Sunday, Monday, and Wednesday. This increased availability facilitates trash disposal after weekend stays.

The village website is being updated. Look for village forms, council and Planning Commission minutes, Council member committee assignments, and details of Village hours and contact information at www.kelleysisland.us. Information about burn permits, transfer station hours, as well as links to county services will also be found on the village website in coming weeks.

Council discussed the hiring of a Village Administrator. The revised code allows for Statutory Villages to employ an administrator to help with the ever-increasing compliance issues that face the political subdivisions. The solicitor was asked to prepare discussion on this topic for council.

The solicitor was also asked to discuss the viability of the village purchasing a parcel of land behind the Island House Restaurant for public parking and other village expansion needs. The owner of the parcel has expressed the desire to either sell the property or allow its use for parking while it is offered for sale. The village solicitor will investigate the opportunities for the village.

Council was also asked to consider selling the cell tower agreement they have with AT&T to a third party administrator. The proposal was agreed to by council and the solicitor has some legal and descriptive issues to work out. Time constraints may require council to hold a special meeting to approve legislation for the sale

The next regular council meeting is scheduled for Saturday, May 8th at 10am at the town hall.



Passover is the oldest festival of the Hebrew liturgical calendar. It has been observed by the Jewish people for more than three thousand years. It celebrates the release of the Jewish people from the Egyptian Pharoah, after a series of plagues. family names, and a wedding date.



Do you have all the pieces in your puzzle? Long-term Care

Anyone who has ever assembled a large jigsaw puzzle knows that all the pieces dumped on the table can be overwhelming. It is not until you look at each piece individually that the complete picture begins to come together, and so it goes with your retirement planning. A much more important picture!

When the subject of long-term care comes up, it usually gets one of two reactions. "When I get to that point, just shoot me" or "we went through that with my mother and we used up all her money two years before she died."

Long-term care insurance is not inexpensive. However, BY NOT ALLOCATING ANYTHING TO PAY FOR LONG-TERM CARE......YOU HAVE ALLOCATED EVERYTHING.

The failure to not consider the consequences of long-term care risks

your family's emotional and physical wellbeing. It also jeopardizes your ability to fund a post-retirement lifestyle and keep commitments. Sooner or later you may have to reallocate funds to pay for care.

Most long-term care is provided at home. "Long-term" generally refers to assistance a chronically ill person needs to get through the day. Most people go to nursing homes only when the caregiver becomes so ill that the children have to take the decision away from him or her. There are, of course, childless couples, singles and people who sadly will outlive their children. Everyone must consider what they would do if long-term care became necessary. In most cases, caring for a parent does NOT bring siblings closer together. When you bring second marriages and stepchildren into the situation, I've witnessed catastrophic situations.

Families provide care. Most caregivers are middle-aged women with full-time jobs and their own families. This is also a good time to approach our parents about long-term care if nothing has ever been discussed. My mother did not purchase long-term care insurance until after my father passed away from lung cancer. Her premium is expensive but every year when she complains about paying the premium I remind her that it is equivalent to the cost of one month of care at home or in a nursing home.

The person who ends up needing care rarely expects to live a long life, never thinks he will need care if he does have longevity, and has no idea what providing care will do to his family. Mitigate the consequences by having a plan. Long-term care insurance provides a predictable stream of

income in illness just as your careful retirement planning provides one in health. Don't spend the assets you've spent a lifetime acquiring to pay for long-term care. Make long-term care planning a piece of your retirement puzzle.

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High School Graduation 1954

Geraldine Erne Betzenheimer, born and raised on Kelleys Island, has lived here for all but four of the last 70-plus years of her family-centered life. Along with younger brother Robert (now deceased) and older sister Renetta Matso (who resides in Sandusky), Geraldine traces her island-family roots through father Roy Erne (1910-1989) and mother Iva Riedy (1913-1989) great-grandparents Federsons and Sturm, back to the very beginning of the settlement of Kelleys Island in the 1830's-nearly 200 years.

Geraldine, the second of her parents' children, was "island born." The practice in those days was for a new mother to go to the mainland hospital for the birth of a first child, and if the birth was uncomplicated, she had any subsequent children at home on the island. The island doctor delivered babies at the mother's home, and mothers had help come into the house for some days after a new baby's arrival. Her mother had a ten-day helper's stay after her brother Robert's birth. She recalls her early home life thus:

"I was born in the house up the lane that Bradburns tore down. McKillips lived in the house on the other side of the lane. My earliest memory is when we moved to the Division Street house. I was four. There were two men there installing the furnace. Renetta and I were playing in a sand box in the back yard. Two dogs started fighting and the furnace men broke them apart with brooms."

Geraldine started at the KI Estes' School in 1943 with eight or nine other children. There was no kindergarten in those days, and "School was 9 a.m. to Noon, and 1 to 4 p.m. We almost always went home for lunch. We always ate dinner at five. Renetta loved fried bread and we sure had it a lot. I still hate it."

Like most families, they raised at least some of their own food needs. Geraldine remembers the task of collecting eggs:

"We always had chickens. They were okay in summer when you just threw the feed over the fence and then went in and gathered the eggs. Winter was a different story. You had to heat the mash and corn. The chickens were kept in the coop. Then you had to put the mash in a trough type thing and warm the water also. You had to walk around the chickens and collect the eggs. Then you also had to clear your

boots."

When the quarry closed in the 1940's, families who couldn't find work on the island moved away so her class dwindled. Four graduated in 1954 with her. Families who were able to stay on the island found or invented lots of local activity to occupy their time throughout the year.

There was basketball in the Town Hall, perhaps against a Put-in-Bay team. They played softball at the ball diamond behind the doctor's house, ping pong in the Community Church's recreation area (now Zion's Sunday School section), or pool in the Island Market. There were movies at Marquette Hall (upstairs in the now-demolished Catholic school on Woodford). In winter, they ice skated on the quarry pond behind where the condos now sit or other island ponds. In summer, they rode bikes and walked the beaches.

To keep her little brother busy, her mother sent him to buy a five-cent bag of nails from Semansens Hardware store, which young Robert would then spend the day pounding into the step on their front porch-a step very well nailed when the house was later sold. Geraldine and sister Renetta had larger responsibilities, like shopping at Trieshmann's Meat Market (now owned by Rob and Kim Watkins) or

Brown's Grocery Store, now the General Store: "One time mother sent us to the store. I had a small tricycle and Renetta's was a little bigger trike. At that time meat came wrapped in paper with a string. On the way home, the paper on the meat ripped and the meat fell out. Renetta was very innovative; she wound the wieners (the kind that come in a long string, each one tied was tied off with string) around the handle bars of my tricycle and the roast over the handle bars of hers."

Martin's (now the Pump) had the first television on the island, and kids could go certain nights to watch "Ed Sullivan" or "I Love Lucy." Along with Martin's, the VFW and Matso's (now Captain's Corner) were open all year

and served sandwiches and chips along with drinks and camaraderie. There was an ice cream parlor in Martin's, and Vi Haig's restaurant across from Newman's Dock in the yellow house between the post office and Venture's Resort. Kaemphe's restaurant (now the Watkin's Ward Street home) served great apple fritters.

Island Airlines and Griffing both served the island, and Newmans ferry ran from Sandusky. There were three gas stations downtown: two on Division Street (one at the post office, which was at what is now the General Store, one where the Schodowskis live) and one in front of Martin's (the Pump).

The Riedys and Ernes were both family-oriented folks. When Iva's mother Anna Mary Federsen died, her brothers came to live with her, so Geraldine grew up with her uncles Mike and Gene Riedy as part of their family. Iva's sister Cecilia (Ann Brown) was raised by their sister Mae (see earlier Kelleys Life article about Ann Brown). The brothers loved pinochle, and taught their nieces and nephew to play, who also became avid fans.

Mother Iva ran "Geraldine's Gift Shop," named for her daughter, first in what is now the Fudge Shop and later in the Erne's home. The shelving used to this day in the Fudge Shop was built by her father and the building's owner Philip Calahan. Geraldine recalls rented bikes for five cents an hour. Her father, like many of his generation, was a commercial fisherman.

"Dad was a trapnet fisherman so we always had fish twice a week, sometimes three times during World War II. Perch and catfish usually. Occasionally white fish and sturgeon. Very seldom pickerel (walleye).

"My uncles were gill netters and we used to string nets in our living room. My dad also made dip nets. I went out in the gill net boat several times when I got older.

"My Uncle Mike Riedy built the boat house (later called "Kelleys Cove" and now "Kelleys Landing"). He had two boats-Rene Dene named after Renetta and me, and the Pal named for his brother Gene. He was a gill net fisherman, and took out charter fishing parties.

"During the war when he was in the service, my dad did the charters and I remember the men would bring us sugar, tires, etc. when they came from Cleveland and Columbus to go on these fishing charters.

"Uncle Mike also ran Kampe Kellile (now West Bay Inn) for awhile. All I can remember is that there was a bar and then you went down some steps to a garden with tables and chairs.

"My Uncle Gene and Jake (Charles) Martin were real good friends. I remember one time they were going to Sandusky and wanted to know if mother needed anything. She was in bed because she wasn't feeling well so they went and when they got home with the things she wanted she told them she had the measles. My uncle said 'Gee, Sis (he always called her sis), I thought you looked funny this morning'."

In later life, Roy Erne ran a garage, fixing tires and lawn mowers and then became the janitor at the school. Geraldine married Lawrence

Betzenheimer (twin brother to Florence, known as "Sis"), and raised daughter Pam on the island. Lawrence worked for Lake Erie Electric, the electric co-op which became Hancock Wood Electric. Geraldine tended bar at Martin's before becoming the island postmaster, a job she retired from in 1999, having posted mail on and off Kelleys for 25 years. Like their parents, Geraldine and Lawrence found work to do where they could on the island, and stayed. For them, the island was home-to begin with, and forever.

Geraldine proudly remarks that she has never spent a holiday anywhere but this island. She cared for her husband and her parents as they aged and became sickly. After Lawrence died in 1988, her parents passed away within months of each other in 1989. Her brother Robert came to live with her for many years until he died in 2007. Pam came home to help with care for Lawrence, and has stayed, like HER mother before her, putting commit-

ment to family first.

Today, Geraldine lives in a home designed for HER interests, past-times, and needs. A well-polished collection of silver tea, sugar, and soup spoons decorates her walls-states and international collection, and Kelleys Island vintage. Puzzles-crossword, jigsawknitting and crochet yarn, computer games, and her 'soaps' keep Geraldine busy and amused these days. After years of taking care of people, those she loved through sickness and health and those she served in business, Geraldine enjoys her independence. She maintains a lively, happy, and healthy disposition, and a ready smile. Neighbors look in on her, and daughter Pam comes by every day. There's no segregation of generations here. At home, on her island, having still the time of her life in the best place she knows.

Amateur radio, often called ham radio, is a hobby and a service in which hams use various types of radio equipment to communicate with other radio amateurs for public services and recreation. Amateur radio operators are able to support their communities with emergency and disaster communications if necessary. There are an estimated six million people throughout the world who are regularly involved with amateur radio.

North Bass Island is isolated enough to qualify as an International Island; Kelleys Island and South Bass are too populated to get an IOTA (Islands on the Air) designation. Jack Wade is currently helping several islanders get licensed to be operators. If there are enough islanders who are interested in earning a license, Phil Thiede is willing to help us set up a "radio shack" at the Kelleys Island School, where classes and training could be held.

It would be comforting to all islanders and visitors to have emergency communications capability via licensed volunteers on the island if there is a major weather situation, long term power outage, or disaster (natural or manmade). Emergency planners prepare for the worst case scenario, and hope it is never needed. Whether there is an emergency or not, amateur radio is a very educational and worthwhile hobby for kids of all ages; 9 to

Keep electricity from going down the drain

Water use and electricity go hand in hand. Heating water can account for 14 percent to 25 percent of the total energy consumed in a typical home. What's more, systems used to clean public water supplies and deliver it to homes require large amounts of electricity. If your home receives water from a well or spring, the pump also draws power. So when we use water, hot or cold, we're also using

Techniques for trimming water use in your home are surprisingly simple. For one, you can significantly reduce hot water consumption by simply repairing leaks in fixtures-faucets and showerheads-or pipes. A leak of one drip per second can cost \$1 per

You can also reduce water heating costs in a matter of seconds by lowering the thermostat setting on your water heater. For each 10° F reduction in temperature, you can save between 3 percent and 5 percent in energy costs. Reducing the setting also slows mineral buildup and corrosion in your water heater and pipes.

Although some manufacturers set water heater thermostats at 140° F, most households usually only require them set at 120° F. However, if you have a dishwasher without a booster heater, you may require water temperature within a range of 130° F to 140° F for optimum cleaning.


Adding insulation to your water heater can save around 4 percent to 9 percent in costs. To determine if you need to insulate your water heater, touch it. A tank that's warm to the touch needs additional insulation.

Insulating your water heater tank is fairly simple and inexpensive, and will pay for itself in about a year. You can find pre-cut jackets or blankets available from around \$10 to \$20. Choose one with an insulating value of at least R-8. In addition, don't set the thermostat above 130° F on an electric water heater with an insulating jacket or blanket-the wiring may

Installing insulation on gas- and oil-fired water heaters is more difficult. For these appliances, it's best to have a qualified plumbing and heating contractor perform the work.

Asian carp update

In late April the U.S. Supreme Court announced it would not take up Michigan's case against Illinois to try to stop Asian carp from entering the Great Lakes. Michigan, in a case joined by six other Great Lakes states-including Ohio--, argued that closing Chicago-area shipping locks is the

best bet to keep out unwanted carp and other invasive species.

While there's no debate about the prevalence of Asian carp in the lower section of the Illinois River, there's considerable debate about how close the carp are to Lake Michigan. Tests have found the carp's DNA inside

Lake Michigan and along the waterways leading to the lake. But the only confirmed Asian carp sighting was actually 40 miles inland.

Easy Ham Bake

1 (16-oz) pkg. frozen broccoli cuts, rinsed and drained

1 can cream of mushroom soup

1 can cheddar cheese soup

3 c. ham, chicken, turkey or beef, cut up

2 c. Bisquick

1 c. milk

1/2 tsp. onion powder

1 1/2c. milk

Heat oven to 450 degrees. Mix broccoli, soups, 1 cup milk, meat and onion powder in ungreased 9 x 13 inch baking dish. Mix Bisquick and 1 1/2 cup of milk. Pour/spread evenly over the mixture in the pan. Sprinkle with parsley, if desired. Bake 27 to 30 minutes or until light golden brown. Let stand at least 5 minutes before serving. Serves 8 to 10.

Pepper and Sausage Casserole

2 pkgs. Italian sweet sausage

3-4 sliced onions

3-4 red or green peppers

1 lg. can tomato sauce

Cook sausage for about 1/2 hour to soften, then drain. Mix sausage and all other ingredients well. Pour into a casserole, cover and bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Slice sausage into bite size pieces before serving.

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


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Winter on Pine Island

Since we can't control the weather,



can't control the weather but we can our reaction to it.





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Memory Screening: It's not a diagnosis, but it's worth your time--KI screening May 24

Every year the Alzheimer's Foundation of America holds a National Day for Memory Screening. Serving Our Seniors was set to provide a Memory Screening on Kelleys Island on November 17th, 2009 at St. Michaels. Because of weather conditions, the ferry service was unable to dock and this prevented Serving Our Seniors from providing the free Memory Screening services to Kelleys Island residents.

Before I go any further, let me explain what a Memory Screening is and what it is NOT. A memory screening consists of a series of questions that are asked, in private, in an environment that does not have distractions. The questions are simple in nature and used to detect if there is a problem with memory, the ability to recall information, the ability to organize thoughts and the ability to think in abstract terms.

A memory screening is not a conclusive diagnosis and it does not replace the need for consulting with a qualified health care professional if you do have concerns about your memory and your brain's ability to process information. But it is helpful information for your health care professional to use as they work to identify the cause of any cognitive deficits.

Who should have a memory screening? The Alzheimer's Association of America recommends a memory screening for anyone. It's a great for those who do not have a con-

cern right now, but who wants to see how their memory is now for future memory screening comparisons. Memory screenings are also appropriate for people who do have concerns about memory loss, their ability to concentrate, and/or decline in their desire to do things that they used to like to do.

Why is a Memory Screening worth my time? Unfortunately, too many people assume if they have memory impairment it must be that incurable disease known as Alzheimer's. This is not true. There are some forms of memory impairment that are treatable - if detected in time and when they are properly diagnosed. Some examples of reversible memory impairment are: Vitamin B deficiency, urinary tract infections, depression, and medication interactions. But if the patient does not know that some forms of memory impairment can be treated, the person will usually choose not to seek the attention their memory problem deserves. A memory screening may be the impetus they need to understand memory impairment and its treatment.

Erie County Health Department Semipublic Sewage Program

In 1984, House Bill 110 (HB110) was approved by the Ohio General Assembly, creating the Ohio EPA's HB110 program. The program is a contractual partnership between Local Health Departments (LHDs) and Ohio EPA, whereby LHDs conduct, on behalf of the Agency, inspection and enforcement services for commercial sanitary waste treatment/disposal systems discharging between 0-25,000 gallons per day (semi-publics). Ohio EPA operates the HB110 program to better protect the public health and

welfare, and to protect the environment. Ohio EPA believes that due to the proximity, the multitude of facilities, and the availability of resources, oversight of operations for sanitary waste disposal at semi-publics may best be accomplished locally by qualified personnel. To offset costs of local oversight, State law (Revised Code 3709.085) authorizes LHDs to charge fees for inspection services to be paid by the semi-publics operators.

The Erie County Health Department (ECHD) has entered into contract with the Ohio EPA to conduct routine operation and maintenance inspections of all semipublic sewage systems in the county where sanitary sewers are not available. A semipublic system is defined as Semipublic disposal system means a disposal system that treats the sanitary sewage discharged from publicly or privately owned buildings or places of assemblage, entertainment, recreation, education, correction, hospitalization, housing, or employment, but does not include a disposal system that treats

sewage in amounts of more than twenty-five thousand gallons per day. ECHD will issue a permit on an annual basis and provide semiannual inspections of these facilities.

We will be inspecting these systems routinely and working with the owners/operators to determine the most efficient and cost-effective methods to treat the wastewater

SPEED LIMIT: 25 MPH

BICYCLES: No more than 2 abreast in same direction of travel as vehicles.

GOLF CARTS: Licensed as motor vehicles. Operators must be licensed. There are no exceptions. When practical, please drive closer to berm of roadway so vehicle can safely overtake slower moving vehicles.

• Seat belts apply.

• All State driving laws apply.

- A 4 person golf cart is meant for 4 people, not more.
- Passengers must remain seated when in operation

• No horseplay on a golf cart

- They are not to be used off-roading
- Driver's License: Golf carts require a valid operator's license.

OPEN CONTAINER LAW: Ohio law prohibits consumption of alcohol on public sidewalks & roadways. LEASH LAW: All dogs are to be leashed and kept under control. Please clean up after your dog.

CURFEWS: Minors must be accompanied by parents, legal guardian or other adult person having care & custody of said minor during hours specified: 16&under between 10P-6A. 18&under: between 11P-6A
