Devastation!

Great sadness struck the island on August 19, when a fire broke out at the currently empty Country Store. Property owner Ed Kuchar surmised to media that perhaps a work light, from workers who had been renovating the store, had ignited insulation in the store's attic area. Loss of the store was total and the much loved Vi's Island Treasures and Papa T's Ice Cream stores were lost as well. The large garage

behind the store was consumed, also. Fortunately no one was injured.

Vi Feyedelem, owner of Vi's Island Treasures, was talking with a customer about 2:30 p.m., when she noticed that the porch appeared hazy. She then looked in the back and saw smoke and fire. She quickly ran next door and alerted Tony and Carm Vacca, owners of Papa T's, to get out of the building. Tony called 911, as did Grant Grayson the chef at the Island House Martini Bar/Restaurant and Inn

Rob Sweet, a waiter at the Island House had stepped outside to check on a table when he smelled smoke, turned and saw a big cloud of



it by the Country Store. He said within 10 minutes flames had engulfed the roof of the building. The whole North side of the building was on fire by the time the fire department was able to arrive. Fire Chief Jack Hostal began to fight the fire with only seven people available from the volunteer department. Mutual aid quickly arrived from Sandusky, Huron, Lakeside, and Marblehead. The Kelleys Island Ferry Boat Line provided free transport to all firefighting teams and equipment. (Please see the Mayor's story for names of those that helped.)

Chief Hostal said they had the bulk of the fire contained after 40 minutes of work, but had to put out "hot spots" for several hours to keep them from re-igniting.

Town Hall goes Greene

Once again, Stan Greene and his loval team of building professionals are responsible for getting the job done. This August, Town Hall got its elevator, providing safe and much needed ADA access up those steep stone steps to Kelleys Island landmark building. Stan was the builder to get the job done, the one the Village could count on as Kelleys Islanders have done for decades.

The elevator project was spear-headed by Pat Seeholzer, who faithfully nursed the project along with monthly Council updates, with the invaluable help of fellow Council member Gary Finger. They selected Stan Greene because of his excellent quality of work and his established dependability.

Stan comes to his superior reputation from both nature and nurture. His father Charles started Greene-Russett Construction in 1948, buying the business outright and establishing

Ŝtan's work is "a tribute" to his father Charles, whose building business Stan bought in 1974. It continues today as "Greene Construction," located in Castalia. But make no mistake: Stan Greene's work is well known and his work evident all over the island, lakeshore or inland.

Next time you are downtown, check out the new elevator--fully enclosed so it is operational year 'round. Access to the elevator requires a key available through the village offices. The system

provides access from the street level to both the basement (where Town Hall's restrooms are located), and to the central performance and event chamber and stage of Town Hall.

deployed on active duty, ready to deploy, or coming home from deployment around the world. Their story is also featured in this edition of *Kelleys Life*

Village Administrator Greg Ritchie brought to Council the matter of underground breaks in private-property water lines that result in massive water bills. Mr. Ritchie indicated he polled several area villages and the consensus was that water passing through the meter is ALL billable regardless of circumstances. Council discussed the issue and agreed. That unfortunate situation should remind all property owners to arrange for regular property inspections during planned absences from their island residences or business properties. The Administrator reminded folks to have their meters removed during the winter months if they are not planning on being here.

The island suffered a major setback on August 19th when the strip center owned by Ed and Fran Kuchar burned down destroying two retails stores and an empty storefront (photos and more

from other contributors elsewhere in this issue). Both Vi's Island Treasures and Papa T's Ice Cream store were destroyed. The Kelleys Island Volunteer Fire department responded and was able to contain the blaze and prevent it from spreading to neighboring buildings. There were many additional local and visiting volunteers ranging from bystanders, to locals, to vacationing firefighters who all were helpful in containing the fire. Additionally, mutual aid responders from Huron Fire Department, Sandusky Fire Department, Marblehead Fire Department and Lakeside Fire Department assisted in the blaze. Both Sandusky Police and Erie County Sherriff's office also sent manpower to assist.

Heartfelt thanks go out to those who assisted locally and to the following officers from neighboring departments: Sandusky FD: Capt. Bill Mohr, Lieut. Gary Zakrajsek, Firefighters Derrick Shepherd, and John Strachan: Sandusky PD: Lieut. Phil Frost: Eric Cty Sheriffs: Eric Longbrake, Chad

Much was learned from the event about mutual aid, communication issues arising from our being in Erie County but being closer to Ottawa County potential responders. We will be meeting to discuss how these circumstances can be tweaked to serve us better in the future. Additional thanks go out to the Water Department and Village Maintenance Department, their involvement was also essential in helping with the Blaze.

Lastly, the EMS personnel were standing by in full force helping administer oxygen to fatigued firefighters during the event and were ready to help with any injuries, and I'm happy to report there were none.

As devastating of an event as it was, I am very proud to report that the combined efforts of the Fire Department, the Police Department, The EMS, The Water and Maintenance Departments, the additional volunteers, and the Mutual aid responders made the best out of a potentially deadly and more catastrophic scenario. Next time you see one of our volunteers, be sure to thank them.

Summer draws to a close on a high note. Events planned by merchants and businesses on Kelleys Island were a great success for all who attended, both from over the waters and from around the island. There certainly was plenty to do for children and adults, families and friends just looking for a comfortable place to enjoy recreation and leisure. Walking trails, the beach, cruises et al offered something quiet or exciting for every taste. Safety officers were a positive, visible presence in helping to maintain good health and peaceful order on the sometimes crowded village streets-special thanks to Chief Ron Ehrbar and members of the village police department.

an exceptionally hot and dry summer and that the firefighters did a commendable job.

A busy tourist day, there were dozens of people trying to get an upclose look at the devastation. Regrettably many would not pay attention to the police officer on site or to fire crews and insisted on putting themselves and even their children in some cases, into harm's way to get a closer look. "The fumes were highly toxic, and yet people just kept trying to get closer to them," reported island police officer Jack Wade.

The restaurant closed for the day and guests staying at its Inn were moved elsewhere on the island. A crew of 15 fire damage repairers was brought in the next morning and coowner Jesse Kranyak reported that they were up and running both the restaurant and Inn by 2 p.m. the next after-

A state fire marshal is investigating where the fire started, as is required.

Vi Feyedelem has built a reputation over the past nearly 20 years at her own and other stores she was associated with for having the

finest quality, biggest selection of unique and beautiful jewelry, vases, glassware, candles, clothing and a myriad of other items. Not everything was burned up, but what was left was heavily smoke damaged and wet. "The loss was complete," said Vi to the

I have seen firsthand that Vi is the type of person who has worked an average of 7 days a week 8-10 hour days for as long as I can remember-first at Neumans Boatline, at other shops on the island, and finally at her very own store. I also know how much of her blood, sweat and heart she poured into Vi's Island Treasures. It's reported that she's received cards, letters and notes

Subject: Safe conduct at an incident scene


I would like to compliment all of the firefighters that fought the fire on Division St on Aug 19, 2010. I was on the scene from 2:30 to 6:00 pm and watched these brave firefighters risk their personal safety and lives to protect this community fighting this fire in extreme heat. The dry hot weather conditions contributed to the dangers of HYPERTHERMIA they endured. The Kelleys Island Fire Department kept this extremely hot fire from spreading to other structures. I felt the radiant heat generated by the fire. This infrared radiation or radiant heat burned the grass on the south side of the Island House, except in the shadow of the bushes that prevented the grass in the shadows of the bushes from igniting. I believe that the Fire Department prevented the Island House from burning in spite of many environmental conditions that made this feat nearly impossible. I saw the vinyl siding on the Country Store building change from a solid to a liquid and ignite. The burning siding created a thick black smoke reducing the visibility to near zero. The KI firefighters were exposed to these conditions for over an hour when mutual aid arrived from the Huron,

Sandusky, and Marblehead Fire Departments. The KIFD was assisted by these brave firefighters and succeeded in knocking down the fire before anyone was hurt or killed. These firefighters need to be thanked by everyone on KI. Several of the fire fighters suffered from heat exposure, but they returned to fight the fire until it was controlled and finally put out.

The ICS, Incident Command System worked at the scene with the Fire Chief in command and the Fire Department assisted by Village Council members, the Mayor and the Village Administrator, the Water Department, Maintenance Department, Hancock-Wood Electric Co-op, the EMS, and Police Department. Private citizens also came together to assist in many ways; i.e. dragging hoses to be charged, providing drinking water, and moving vehicles to allow emergency vehicles access to the scene. Hancock-Wood's linesman Jeremy Gonzales shut off power to prevent an energy source to reignite the building and Tom McNeal, village maintenance man, used a backhoe to help knock down a burning tree and walls to prevent hot-spots that could reignite.

There was one sad part of the equation. Private citizens were asked to stay out of the emergency scene perimeter by Police and Fire Department personnel. Dozens of people ignored the

Military Kids invade Camps Patmos and 4-H

It was no hostile take-over when 241 youths came from all regions of Ohio (and a few from bordering counties) to Kelleys Island for an awesome week of supported activities under the direction of Dr. Theresa Ferrari (OSU's Extension) and Camp Director Sue Ann Carroll from Ohio National Guard Headquarters in Columbus.

In its 6th year of operations, this year's camp continued the team-building, sporting, physical fitness, and camp activities of previous years. Supported by National Guard officers, the weeklong camp welcomed children of mothers and fathers who are in pre, current, or post deployment to active duty sites on US or foreign soil. Parents serve in all branches of the military including Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard,

and they may also be on active duty, as well as in the National Guard, or Reserves.

"Separation" of these children from a parent is what qualifies them for the unique fellowship this camp offers. The younger participants (aged 9 to 11) were housed at the Erie County 4-H Camp, while the older youth stayed at Camp Patmos.

Navy SEALS swam in to demonstrate water rescues. Ohio National Guard Recruiting and Retention Battalion ferried over a climbing wall under the leadership of Sergeant 1st Class David Ybarra, quite a sight on an afternoon's ferry trip! And a Chinook Helicopter glistened in the sunset as its huge prop washed the skies midweek, bringing Major General Matthew Kambic and Major General



Harry (AJ) Feucht, the Assistant Adjutants General for the Army and Air National Guard, respectively, as well as military leaders from the Navy and Coast Guard to the camps. The unmistakable sounds of those powerful blades dominate the skies wherever they go.

Command Sergeant Major Al Whatmough and Major General Greg Wayt, the Adjutant General of the Ohio National Guard (top-ranking military leaders in the Guard) visited the island camps Wednesday and Thursday. Meeting the officers who oversee their parents' roles in the military links these children to the important work their mothers and fathers are doing for all of us in their absences from family.

The camp also offered 'the usual': scavenger hunts, disaster preparedness (courtesy of the Greater Columbus American Red Cross), assembling your own personal disaster kit-the things we all did as kids, right? And of course, polar bear riseand-shine swims, kayaking, sailing, tubing, wakeboarding, waterskiing, along with crafts, drama, and community service.

The climax of the camp was a project that benefits all who come to the island: a new stone walkway from Lakeshore to the Park's Memorial in the village's downtown Memorial Park. It was a labor of love and a physical gift from children who are absent their parents.

That walkway was dedicated to a


proud crowd gathered August 13 when Lt. Colonel Robert (Buck) Bramlish addressed the crowd clustered along walk, flanked by Captain Toomer from the Ohio National Guard Columbus operation offices, Camp Directors, and of course the children whose hearts and hands are forever a part of that walkway. Dr. Ferrari noted last summer's walkway (from Division Street to the Memorial, at right angles to this year's work) was the shorter route-a sort of practice leading up to this larger, more involved, more demanding task.

In moments like these, we remember that it really does take a village to raise children, and these children, like all children, are, after all, ours to guide and love and care for in whatever moments they enter our communal lives.

And OUR grateful communal thanks to Dr. Theresa Ferrari and Camp Director Sue Ann Carroll for envisioning and sustaining such a program which benefits so many.

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August 14: Phyllis Pahler left today...

She's loved this island from the first time she came here 50 years ago. She and her husband lived in Sweetbriar, then down Lakeshore before moving full-time to their new home on Woodford twenty-two years ago. She's been here ever since.

At St. Michaels, she's played the organ for its regular services and at special events like funerals (weddings are too stressful, she says). And she recalls with good humor that it was Del Erhbar, LaVerne's husband, who persuaded her to play there at all. Del and his cousin Father Joe liked to sing, often trying to outdo each other. Del played the guitar, but he coaxed Phyllis into accompanying them, dying a short time later. Phyllis attributes her career at St. Michael's to that brotherly competition and Del's influence.

A regular at what Bob Coulon refers to as "Bible School" each Wednesday morning at St. Michael's, Phyllis listens, asks, comments. She's crocheted and knitted with Christian Crafters that meet Wednesday afternoons at Zion, and she's taught others her craft, patiently, cheerfully. The arts of her trade appear in hats and sweaters she wears in winter, graceful and yet vibrant in their design and stitchery.

She's also part of the Senior Lunch crowd that gathers year-'round wherever Dot Simonds gets willing restaurateurs to host them. In earlier years, she taught new computer users basic skills, but laughs with a wave of her hand that they are all too sophisticated now. She volunteered at the library for ten years. And she's been a friend to many.

In her younger years, she joined a rifle club and loved the natural world and outdoors, preferring it to the boring world of housework. Her mother even bought her a statue of St. Martha, the patron saint of housekeepers, hoping it would stimulate a dedication to house cleaning. But Phyllis set the statue high on a ledge, from which it fell a few times, suffering blows and sporting repairs but otherwise having no effect on Phyllis's interests or habits.

Hazel eyes smiling above rosy cheeks framed by coiffed silver hair, her kind demeanor respectful of newcomers and neighbors, you've probably seen Phyllis walking with deliberate step along Woodford for daily exercise, or riding her bike perhaps down Addison. She'll wave a little (not to lose balance) and smile a gentle and friendly greeting. Her walking days are behind her now, she fears, a major factor in her decision to leave the sanctity of her island world.

She knew it was time, but put off setting out the sign her son made. When a neighbor came by, she asked him to hammer it into the ground, expecting it would take a few years for a sale to occur. Not 48 hours passed until a family who'd rented on the island a week each summer month noticed it and stopped to inquire. The sale was completed at the end of July.

Roses in varying shades of pink line her entrance deck, daisies and other wild flowers shading St. Francis in her garden. Her walls hold artists' prints and canvases of her son, her grand-daughters, and her own Kelleys Island counted-cross stitch sampler.

As we talk, her housemate of 18 years, her cat Downey, cuddles into her arm, burrows and rubs his grev-tabby head on her shoulder. A paw stretches out lovingly across her arm, and Downey looks up with adoration, purring to calm and comfort the stress he feels building in his protector-ess. He knows her moods, and the anguish that this necessary move brings Phyllis. Even though she knows, practically, that it is time to seek a different homestead, the decision doesn't mean her emotions coincide with sensible thinking. Phyllis will be missed, and she will miss her friends in the island community where so much of her life has been spent in making happy, wholesome



Just before the first movie-James Cameron's AVATAR--started Friday night, a waterspout that had formed




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2010 Swim lessons

September is Nature Month for Kelleys island Audubon. 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
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



Stock Dividends: An income alternative

Since 2003, when the top federal income tax rate on qualified dividends was reduced, dividends have acquired renewed respect. When (or if) that tax rate increases (under current law, dividends will once again be taxed as ordinary income in 2011), the long-term demand for high-quality, reliable dividends will likely increase as baby boomers approach retirement and focus on income-producing investments.

Why consider dividends?

Because they can add to a stock's total return, dividends can be especially important if the market produces relatively low or mediocre returns. According to Standard and Poor's, dividend income has represented roughly one-third of the total return on the S&P 500 since 1926, though that percentage has declined over the last decade. Dividends also may mitigate the impact of a volatile market by at least partly offsetting price fluctuations to even out a portfolio's overall return.

Many experts also look at dividends as a relatively reliable indicator of a company's financial health. Investors have become more conscious in recent years of the value of dependable data as a basis for investment decisions, and dividend payments aren't easily restated. Because dividends are one sign of a company's financial health, boards of directors generally are reluctant to send investors a negative message by cutting dividends.

Also, many dividend-paying stocks represent large established companies that may have significant resources to weather economic hard times, which could be helpful if you're relying on those dividends to help pay living expenses.

Finally, dividends become even more valuable if they're reinvested rather than used to supply income. A dividend that's used to purchase more of the company's stock means you'll receive a proportionally greater share of the company's earnings the next time dividends are paid, which in turn means a larger dividend payment to be reinvested (assuming the company continues to do well and the dividend rate remains the same).

Look before you leap

Investing in dividend-paying stocks isn't as simple as just picking the highest yield. If you're investing for income, consider whether the company's cash flow can sustain its dividend. Dividends on common stock are paid at the discretion of the company's board of directors, and there's no guarantee they won't be cut.

Also, some companies choose to use corporate profits to buy back company shares. That may increase the value of existing shares, but it sometimes takes the place of instituting or reiging dividends.

raising dividends.

If you're interested in a dividendfocused investing style, look for terms

such as "equity income," "dividend income," or "growth and income." Also, some exchange-traded funds (ETFs) track an index that's comprised of dividend-paying stocks, or that's based on dividend yield. Be sure to check the prospectus for information about expenses, fees, and potential risks, and consider them carefully before you invest.

All dividends are not alike

Some dividends, such as those paid by real estate investment trusts (REITs) and master limited partnerships, don't qualify for the same maximum federal income tax rate as quali-

fied dividends, and a portion may be taxed as ordinary income. Also, the 15% maximum rate is scheduled to expire at the end of 2010, and there is no guarantee dividends will continue to receive favorable tax treatment.

The 15% rate applies to qualified dividends (those paid by a U.S. or qualified foreign corporation). Also, you must have held the stock for more than 60 days during a 121-day period (60 days before and 61 days after the stock's ex-dividend date). Form 1099-DIV, which reports your annual dividend and interest income for tax accounting purposes, will

indicate whether a dividend is qualified or not.

Be aware that some so-called dividends actually are considered interest for tax purposes. These include dividends from deposits or share accounts at cooperative banks, credit unions, federal savings and loan associations, and mutual savings banks

Windows provide our homes with light, warmth, and ventilation. But when winter sets in they can have a downside.

Placing your hand against a window pane on a chilly fall morning proves the point: if the pane feels cold, it's a good bet you can reduce energy costs by either insulating your existing windows or installing new, energy-efficient upgrades.

Insulating with draperies is a lowcost quick fix to drafty windows and can reduce heat loss from a room up to 10 percent. And they're just as helpful in hot summer months by blocking sunlight. White plastic-backed drapes can reduce heat gain by up to 33 percent.

Interior storm window panels are another low-cost fix (available at most hardware stores), and consist of flexible or rigid plastic installed over or adhered to existing window panes. Installation is fairly simple, and panels are either taped on or mounted with Velcro, magnetic strips, or snap-in seals. Put them up in

autumn and remove them in spring to reduce winter heat loss by up to 50 per-

If you're in the market for new windows altogether, be sure to choose energy-efficient models that will shave heating, cooling, and lighting costs year

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In simple terms, U-Factor measures how easily heat can flow through a window, not counting direct sunlight. The lower the number is, the more energy efficient the window.

On Oct. 21, 1950 Marilyn and Frank Rom took their marriage vows at St. John's Cathedral in Cleveland, because, as Marilyn recalls, "At the time, there was no Catholic Church where we lived in Avon Lake, so our church services were held at a local movie theatre," not exactly the place they wanted to be married. The young couple had a beautiful reception at her

parent's home in Avon Lake after the service at the Cathedral.

In 1972, Frank and Marilyn came to Kelleys Island as tourists and fell in love with the island. There wasn't an empty bottle in the house--they were all outside piled in the yard," laughed the girls.

The Rom girls recalled many happy times on Kelleys and considered the school playground their private domain. They recalled baseball games, climbing on the glacial grooves, swimming in the quarry and just sharing fun times together as a family. "the island was more laid-back" recall Marilyn and Frank, "we

shopping at the Pohorence Market [Island Market] there were many old cottages, gardens lovingly cared for personally by residents and just a much more relaxed atmosphere."

Marilyn first met Frank when they

request of emergency personnel and wandered into the thick clouds of smoke and interfered with emergency crews. Some of these people took their young children into the area and into thick clouds of smoke. A number of people had to be ordered out of the emergency scene several times before they would comply. Several of these people were aggressive and argued with emergency personnel.

I have spent over 30 years working in the Public Health field {as a Registered Sanitarian at a Health Department} dealing with environmental health factors. One factor is exposure to air pollution. Vinyl siding contains Polyvinyl Chloride (PVC) that can create many toxic compounds if it burns including dioxons, phthalates, CO, and organontins (these compounds can cause cancer, reproductive, developmental, or immune problems). The machinery in the building were probably the source of airborne heavy metals including cadmium, mercury, and/or lead in the smoke. It is sad that parents would deliberately allow their children to be exposed to toxins and display aggressive behavior to emergency personnel for requesting that the children be taken to relative safety. I hope these people will not repeat their behavior in the future.






