Lake Erie algal blooms very heavy They came home

Massive floating fields of algae, big enough to be seen from space, are floating throughout the western basin of Lake Erie, surrounding Kelleys and the other Lake Erie islands, and

moving to the east. Scientists are trying to figure out why the blooms are happening lake when the appeared to be so much cleaner than it was back in the 60s when blooms first appeared, but after which clean water acts and lowered phosphorous levels

were put in place.
The blooms are toxic to fish and small animals and at least irritating to humans,

but can be more dangerous if swallowed. Northeast Ohio papers have recommended not to swim within the blooms and posted signs at area beaches over the past month.

"Algae is a big deal, especially the microcys-

tis, what is often called the blue-green algae,' said Tom Bridgeman, a professor of environmental science at the University of Toledo's Lake Erie Center. "It's not aesthetically pleasing

when it gets on boats or rots on the shore, but it can also be a health hazard."

Nine of 11 samples taken Sept. 3 from near West Sister Island, northeast of Toledo, were more toxic than guidelines set by the World Health Organization, said Geoffrey Horst, a Michigan State University graduate student who studies the algae. It won't kill people, but at minimum it's going to give

swimmers a rash.

Water utilities along Ohio's Lake Erie shore spend thousands of dollars a day to kill the thick algae and to treat the bad smells and bad tastes that the organism causes, officials said.

plete. This project was funded in part by a grant we received under the direction of Erie County. Be sure to recognize council members Gary Finger and Pat Seeholzer for their hard work and dedication on the Lands and Building Committee in helping steer this project to completion.

The second project started years ago when we successfully landed a State Capital Fund Grant for a downtown restroom project. The original grant was for \$150,000. Two years later we requested additional funding for the project and we were awarded an additional \$50,000. The design phase of the project was grueling and involved sev-



eral high-level meetings with County Health officials and the State EPA. After many rounds of meetings we worked out an acceptable solution with the help of county Health Commissioner Pete Schade for the installation of a peat style sanitary leaching system as opposed to having another downtown sewer treatment plant. This project involved getting special easements from both Jackie and Gary Finger and from Fran and Ed Kuchar. Both of their families' willingness to offer these easements made this project viable. Additionally, the Kuchars were willing to sell the village--for a very fair price--the land required to install the system behind the water treatment plant. Please thank both of these families for making this project possible.

The public restroom project is located attached to the rear of the Dwelle House, next to the Police Station and Town Hall, where it will have great oversight from the Police Department.

Water Department

Presently our engineers are in the design phase for a waterline replacement project on Huntington, north of Lakeshore. Presently that line is not built to state standards and the result of which is poor water, poor fire protection and regular and very costly leaks.

The new line will address all of these issues.

We are also working to secure funding for the upgrading of the water intake pipe. For years we have known that the intake is in need of replacement and we have made several grant applications for the replacement. Presently, the Village Administrator Scott Stevenson is working with our engineers to secure a grant, or partially forgivable loan for the project. By extending the intake line out further into less turbulent water and pulling all of our water from the extension, we will get better quality raw water which allows for a better end product with less filtering and chemical costs.

The biggest news is that we have recently made application for and been preliminarily awarded a large loan/grant for the installation of a waterline project beginning at the school and ending at Camp Patmos. The details of the project are only preliminary and there are a number of issues and hurdles we need to address to move the project forward. So far we have been awarded a 1.2 million dollar loan at 0% for 30 years with a 40% forgiveness factor. This essentially means that, provided we meet the projects specs, 40% of the 1.2 Million, or \$480,000 will not be required to be

repaid. This waterline project will allow us to finally address the providing of municipal water to the large number of homes in the Kaempfe Subdivis-ion and service all the other homes along Ward, Hamilton, and Monaghan north of Hamilton. We are scheduling design and planning meetings this fall with county health officials and our engineers to work out the details. Our hope is that this will be a 3rd quarter 2012 project.

We are in the final phase of developing a cost effective sidewalk replacement project. In an effort to make this program as affordable for the property owners, I am asking council to subsidize the cost per foot of replacement sidewalk, provided that the property owners partake in the pro-

ject when it is rolled out. As you are aware, property owners are required to maintain the sidewalks in front of their land. Over time some sidewalks require maintenance or replacement. We are in the process of negotiating effective replacement costs per foot that will take advantage of bulk transportation, mobilization, and large scale labor savings. Then in attrition to these savings, I am asking council to subsidize the cost per foot so there will be no better deal for the residents and property owners. Once this program is accepted by council, we will be marking the areas of concern and alerting the property owners of the final bolts and nuts of the pro-


Village Administrator

I am happy to report that I have had a number of residents stop me and tell me how happy they are with their interaction with the new Village Administrator. Scott Stevenson has jumped into the position with both feet and has been overseeing the Water Department, and now also the Maintenance Department. The addition of this supervisory position, in addition to taking a spot on the five member Board of Zoning Appeals, has allowed for the merging of two very similar departments, those being general maintenance, and water. Since both of these departments are labor intensive, and both of these departments are very seasonal, we have experienced large scale manpower cost savings by having one supervisor permitted to oversee three full time employees that are now capable of working in each other's departments. To give you an idea of the savings, Ten years ago, we had THREE full time maintenance workers and TWO Water Department employees. Today we have ONE full time maintenance worker and TWO in the Water Department. We have essentially cut our manpower by 40% while maintaining the same or better level of service.

Not going away

"It's now blooming in the proportions that it was in the bad old days of the 1960s and early '70s," Bridgeman said. Even dead, the algae poses a problem: Decomposition of dead algae uses up oxygen and creates oxygenfree dead zones in the lake.

"There has already been a fish dieoff in Lake Erie this season," said John Hageman, laboratory manager at Ohio State University's Stone Lab on Gibraltar Island.

Researchers suggest the algae might be blooming because it's fed by abundant phosphorus, which is running into the lake from increased suburban development and farm run-off.

"The same nutrient-rich fertilizers which cause our grass and crops to grow can cause the algae to grow in the lake," said Bridgeman, who calls the algae "Green Kool-Aid." Canadian and United States Governments have supported a "hold the line on phosphorus levels" position to help prevent further deterioration of Lake Erie. In addition, much more effort must be expended on preventing exotic species, like zebra and quagga mussels, from entering the Great Lakes.

Currently, there is much uncertain-

ty as a result of insufficient knowledge of how the Lake Erie ecosystem is functioning and the factors and processes driving the ecosystem. The major, poorly understood changes in Lake Erie is teaching government agencies that management programs, research, and monitoring must be sustained and closely coupled in order to achieve goals for Lake Erie.

Lynn and David Hand of Middle Bass and Cincinnati, are urging a letter writing campaign to all elected officials to get them to react, respond and fix this issue before Lake Erie and its tourism industry is shattered. We join Lynn and David in that prodding. 

Island notes, thoughts and follow ups

Ash borer and Asian Longhorn Beetle (ALB)-a couple people have commented in the past month that since reading about the ALB in the August issue of Kelleys Life, they believe their maple trees might be failing. They asked if it could be the ALB, or could the ash borer be jumping over? Mike Monnett the head ranger/director of the Kelleys Island State Park, says, "The ash borer is specific to ash trees, not maples. This hot and extremely dry summer has put stress on many of the island's trees." He also stated that ALB has been found in Clermont County in southwestern Ohio. Areas of that county, as well as Stonelick and East Fork Štate Park, are now in the quarantine area for ALB, but he has not heard of it any-

where else in the state. For anyone seeking the most up to date information from the state, please visit the Ohio Department of Agriculture's website: agri.ohio.gov. Ŏhio is the fifth state to have ALB infestation...it has been confirmed to have come from firewood brought in from an infected area....DO NOT BRING FIREWOOD OVER TO KELLEYS ISLAND AND DO NOT ALLOW ANYONE TO BRING FIREWOOD TO YOUR HOME!!!

There is a strong possibility that Erie County and thereby, Kelleys Island, will be added to the state's ash tree removal grant program (assists with removal of up to two trees, provided homeowner can pay percentage of removal). We tried to get an answer from Congresswoman Marcy Kaptur's office, but once again, did not receive

a response in time to print.

Village Tree Ordinance-The ordinance that village council had proposed earlier this summer to insure islander's safety for the future removal of diseased or dead trees, passed at the September council meeting. The ordinance was altered after a meeting with Kelleys residents that Landowner's Assoc. (KILA) had held in August. The final ordinance was a compromise based on listening to resident concerns and suggestions.

Kelleys Island Ferry Boat Line-has landed a \$2.7 million federal grant for a new ferry boat to serve Kelleys. The Federal Highway Administration grant was awarded to a partnership of the Kelleys Island ferry operator and Erie County to build a 160-foot vessel.

According to The Plain Dealer, the diesel-powered ferry will serve increasing demand on the route between Marblehead and Kelleys Island. The line handles about 175,000 passengers and 60,000 vehicles annually. The boat is estimated to cost \$6 million. The grant announced Wednesday is in addition to \$1 million in federal funds that was awarded last year. The ferry operator is expected to cover most of the remaining cost.

A second grant for \$790,000 will be used to improve a terminal dock at South Bass Island.

To the Kelleys Island Community: While the 2011 season is drawing quickly to its end, I would like to take a few moments to reflect back on the season and report to the village residents on some issues revolving around the department.

For a number of years, specifically for budgetary reasons, we have purposely operated the department with entirely part time personnel. Presently we are working with Mayor Quinn's office in the application process for a COPS grant that will allow us to hire a full time officer and pay the full time annual salary for three years, provided we keep the position filled for an additional one year. This Grant will permit us to dollar cost average our payroll over a period of four years to cost us only 25% of what it would normally cost us to hire a full time employee. It is our expectation to hear very soon the results of this grant and hopefully we will be able to enact the position before the year's end.

With the local government funds drying up from the State Budget, we are expected to either cut expenses or fund internally our budget shortfalls through other means. I have met with Mayor Quinn and our Clerk Treasurer, Claudia Brown several times to assess our department's financial needs and to address its needs for 2012 and beyond. I expect to be able to report more on this issue as we move through the process.

I am saddened to report that there were two separate incidents involving department employees that have made island news recently. I want you to know that these incidents should not be reflective of the department or the other officers here at the department. All of our officers are adults and are responsible for their actions both on

and off duty. The department and my office should not be judged based on these events but rather on how we handled these events. Both incidents were handled swiftly and professionally and both were immediately assigned to the Erie County court system off the island to remove any inference of impropriety. I felt it necessary to report on this as the rumor mills have generated some rather juicy and completely inaccurate versions that needed to be squelched.

Regarding the Police Boat, we are bringing to an end the 2011 season and we are excited to report that we have assisted a number of boaters, we have inspected and certified just short of 100 boats as part of our boaters safety program, and we have patrolled both the island perimeter, and all the way up to the Border, all as part of a NBI grant program that permits us to offer these services at virtually no cost to the Village. The Boat was donated to the Village two years ago, and this year we were reimbursed for manpower, maintenance and expenses for the operation of the boat.

Lastly, I want Island residents to know that I always have an open door to anyone who has questions, comments, or suggestions regarding the Police Department. I am a firm believer that tourism is our island's only remaining viable industry, and that our officers are both ambassadors for the island, while at the same time have as their first priority to keep Kelleys Island the safe, peaceful family oriented island that people have come to enjoy.

I appreciate all of the support you have offered in the past years and promise to continue to serve you in the years to come.

Kelleys Island EMS joins state coalition in observing Falls Prevention Awareness Day

Kelleys Island, Ohio - KELLEYS ISLAND EMS will join with the Ohio Older Adult Falls Prevention Coalition to recognize Fri., Sept. 23, 2011, as Falls Prevention Awareness Day, and encourage all individuals on Kelleys Island to use the autumn season to educate themselves and their loved ones about the risk of falls and fall-related injury that

increases as we age.

"Falls among older Ohioans can negatively affect the individual's health and sense of security, but also can have an impact on the entire family," said Kelleys Island EMS. "We're using the first day of autumn to mark the beginning of an ongoing effort to help Ohioans become aware of the risks and do what they can to prevent them. Doing so will help our older neighbors remain safely in their homes and our community."

Five easy things you can do to prevent falls are:

1. Increase your physical activity. Simple exercise, like walking or swimming at least 15 minutes a day can help build muscle strength and improve balance, which can prevent falls. Exercise programs like Tai Chi that increase strength and improve balance are especially good.

cially good.

2. See your eye doctor once each year.
Age-related eye diseases, such as cataracts, macular degeneration and diabetic retinopathy, can increase the risk of falling. Early detection is key to minimizing the effects of these conditions.

3. Review your medications. Talk to your doctor or pharmacist about the medicines you are taking and whether they may cause drowsiness or dizziness. Discuss things you can do to ensure you are taking your medicines safely.

4. Remove environmental hazards. Look around the house for anything that could increase the risk of falls, including poor lighting, loose rugs, slippery floors and unsteady furniture. Remove or modify these hazards.

5. Think, plan and slow down. Many falls are caused by hurrying. Slow down and think through the task you are performing. Be mindful of possible falls ricks and act accordingly.

risks and act accordingly.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, 30 percent of adults age 65 and older living in the community, and more than half of all older adults who live in residential care facilities or nursing homes, fall each year. Falls are the leading cause of injury-related deaths and the most common cause of nonfatal injuries and hospital admissions for trauma in older adults. Risk factors for falls include poor health status, prescription drug interactions, impaired cognitive function, use of alcohol, history of falls and impaired vision.



Keeping your head in the midst of uncertainty

When faced with disaster, markets often become volatile, especially when the scope of the adversity isn't clear. For some investors, adversity may represent a threat; for others, it may spell opportunity. Not every crisis requires a reaction; sticking to a long-term plan is still the best strategy for most people.

Here are some examples of factors that investors sometimes overlook when considering what to focus on during a crisis.

Watch the global supply chain

Companies and economies increasingly operate in a global context. The more heavily an industry or company relies on global partners, the more it might be affected by crisis conditions. Think not only about companies that are affected directly by turmoil, but about other companies that rely on

For example, China has become in many ways the world's factory floor, and many information technology services are now outsourced to India. How would a crisis in either country affect global supply chains or communications infrastructure? Might competitors not affected by the crisis pick up at least some of the slack? How might a particular industry be hit by

shortages of parts or raw materials? Is a large multinational so geographically spread out that a crisis in one part of the world may have little impact on its overall operations? Oil is perhaps the most obvious example of how a crisis can affect global supply chains. A perceived threat to supplies can affect prices of other assets.

Consider currency fluctuations

Currency fluctuations are another factor to consider. Crises in one part of the world can affect that region's currency. That in turn can affect companies located elsewhere. The 2010 panic over potential default by several eurozone countries strengthened the dollar, and though that may sound like good news, a stronger dollar can hurt U.S. exports.

Currency issues are also important because of what's called the "carry trade." This happens when investors use money from a country where interest rates are relatively low--the Japanese yen and the U.S. dollar have been prime examples in recent years-to invest elsewhere at a better rate of return. However, if the cheaper currency suddenly increases in value, the carry trade can reverse as investors put their capital back into the so-called

funding currency. That can affect assets denominated in other currencies. For example, the yen soared as investors anticipated that money would be repatriated to deal with Japan's earthquake/tsunami /nuclear disaster. Some investments denominated in other currencies suffered when investors sold them to invest in yen.

Think both long term and short

Nothing lasts forever. A crisis could create opportunities that eventually peter out, or challenges that later seem trivial. Or it could have little short-term impact but mean profound change over a period of years. When considering whether a crisis represents a challenge or an opportunity, think both short term and long term.

A crisis with potentially long-term opportunities or harmful consequences may mean you may be able to take more time with a decision. If the window of opportunity is smaller or the potential devastation more short term, remember that there are alternatives to an all-or-nothing approach. For example, you could take a small position and see how your investment thesis plays out before committing more. Even if the window of opportunity slams shut, new opportunities often emerge during even the worst of times; missing one now doesn't mean you won't find others later. If you're worried about a potential downturn, you could use other investments to hedge your exposure while retaining a longterm stake, or take profits to protect part of your holdings but leave some money invested in case the crisis is short-lived.





ning
The '11-'12 school year began on Wed., Aug. 31st for Kelleys Island School. Our staff this year consists of Miss Shannon Leary who is beginning her eighth year at Kelleys Island School. Miss Leary will be the instructor for our two elementary students. Mr. Jude Lill will be starting his fourth year at Kelleys Island School. Mr. Lill instructs our three 8th grade students in language arts, world history, and physical education.

Mrs. Linda Spayd will be starting her second year at our school. Mrs. Spayd, who is a full-time resident of Kelleys Island, handles the math, science, and health education courses for the 3 junior high students.

Mrs. Bonnie Shoff is starting her 9th year teaching art classes for our students one day a week along with her popular adult classes after school.

Mr. Dave Slosser works one day a

week as our guidance counselor. He works with our students and staff to make sure all students achieve and gain success during the year.

Mr. Gene Kidwell, our curriculum director, also works one day a week to guide our staff in choosing the best textbooks and materials for our school. He also helps the teachers in their classroom instruction to assure Kelleys Island School is meeting all the statemandated standards for public education in Ohio.

Finally, I am starting my ninth year at Kelleys Island School. Our school system is very fortunate to have all of our employees back for another school year. Continuity is an important ingredient for success in the classroom for our students.

Laptops for each student at Kelleys Island

The Kelleys Island Board of Education voted this year to purchase for each student in our school system

their own laptop. The board is fully aware of the importance of each of our students receiving the best possible education we can provide. To help accomplish their goal, the board feels the importance of each student having their own computer for assisting in their instruction is a key element.

The money used to purchase these computers was fully funded through the REAP Grant we receive each year. Kelleys Island School receives approximately \$19,000 a year in federal funds, which can only be used, for technological hardware. This amount of money each year goes a long way in our school

Board rescinds land lease agreement for a wind turbine

At the September board of education meeting, the board voted to rescind the land lease agreement with the company that was going to erect a wind turbine for our school. Even though the board felt this project

would be very beneficial for the school, they never wanted to divide the community. The board looked at this project as a means to save on energy, along with educational instruction for the students. However, after hearing from a number of various interested citizens with different issues against a wind turbine, the board did not want to create negative feelings towards the school. The school has been, over the years, a positive asset to the residents of Kelleys Island. The board of education did not want to jeopardize this relationship to the island community.

The board did vote to keep looking into other alternative energy saving ways for the school to save money and teach our children about being "green"
