



On Saturday, September 28, The Kelleys Island School Running Club attended the Vermillion Cross Country Invitational at Vermillion Schools Athletic complex. All of the Elementary school age children ran in one race. The course was short of one mile. Vik Skeans was the first KI runner across the finish line. She out sprinted another runner for a very fine finish of 12th girl, in 6.40. Not far behind was Charlie Poston finishing as 13th boy in 7.07. Caleb Poston was 15th boy in 7.46 and Nik Skeans was 17th boy in 8.33. They all received purple finish ribbons. All of the runners felt positive about their race and even stated that they felt like they could run more!

On October 5, The Kelleys Island Running Club participated in their last Cross Country meet of the 2019 season. They went to Fostoria, Ohio and ran in the Elementary races as part of the Fostoria HighSchool Cross Country Invitational. Following the High School races, a ½ mile cross country race was held for runners in grades K-3 and a one mile cross country race was held for the runners in 4-6th grade. The course was flat and wove around ball diamonds, across fields and around a tennis court.

Charlie and Caleb Poston and Nik Skeans were in the ½ mile race with 89 other runners! Charlie ran a personal Cross country ½ mile best of 4.00 minutes and placed 22nd in the K-3 boys race. Caleb ran a personal cross country ½ mile best of 4.44 and was 33rd in the K-3 boys race and Nik Skeans ran a personal cross country ½ mile best of 5.08 for a 36th place finish in the K-3 boys race.

Fall is the time of year when visitors to the island slow down and it's time to relax and enjoy the Fall weather. Unfortunately, it is also the cold and flu season.

Seasonal Influenza, otherwise known as the flu is caused by a virus spread through droplets from a contagious person coughing or sneezing. These droplets can travel through the air and be inhaled, land on your face or in your eyes and be absorbed into the system. Indirect contact can be made when the droplets land on any surface and you inadvertently touch them, then put your hand on your face, nose, or rub your eyes.

Signs of the flu include a runny or stuffy nose, muscle or body aches, fever, chills, a cough or sore throat, headache and fatigue. Children sometimes have nausea, vomiting and diarrhea along with these symptoms. On rare occasions, an allergic reaction may develop.

At greater risk are the elderly,

anyone over age 65; anyone with a chronic disease such as asthma, diabetes, cancer, or heart disease. The very young or very old with a neurological condition, or a pregnant female are also at risk.


Prevention: The best prevention is an annual flu shot. Each year the seasonal influenza is a different virus, so annual immunization is the best prevention. Frequent hand washing, especially if you have been around anyone sick or in a public place, such as a store. The flu vaccine is an inactivated virus. This means it will not give you the flu but allow your body to develop the antibodies needed to fight off the flu, should you be exposed. Common side effects are soreness, redness or swelling at the site, a low-grade fever, and body or muscle aches. These usually go away in a short period of time and you are not contagious because of them.

The current recommendation for a flu shot is everyone 6 months of age and older, anyone who is at high risk or lives with a high-risk individual, health care providers, and anyone with a chronic health problem. Now is the time of year to receive your flu shot to avoid spreading the flu around the island.


Life Flight Membership

Kelleys Island Park Board Bulletin

The Village of Kelleys Island Park District and Recreation Board is a volunteer advisory board established by ordinance. The Board consults with and makes recommendations to Village Council, the Mayor, and the Village Administrator regarding the Parks and Recreation policies for the planning, development, conservation and use of the island's park and recreational

The Village of Kelleys Island park District and Recreation Board is a fivemember citizen advisory board, serving five-year terms. The composition of the board is three members appointed by the Mayor and confirmed by Village Council, and two members appointed by the Kelleys Island School Board.

Chairman, Robby Zettler, Chairman, Lisa M. Klonaris, Secretary, Marvin Robinson, Tom Pieratt

The present Kelleys Island Park Board has made tremendous progress in organizing the board, researching projects and planning for future upgrades to the island parks and recreational spaces.

The Kelleys Island Park Board has created the Park Review Design Committee which is presently designing a Master Plan for the Addison Park area.

Accomplishments of the Park Board in 2019 include installation of signs at two Preserves, Huntley-Beatty Preserve and Curilla Preserve, both made of recycled plastic milk bottles and donated to the Park Board, re-striped the tennis court for 3 games -- tennis,

basketball and pickle ball, upgrade the electric system at the Pavilion from 40 amp to 200 amp and all new GFI outlets. Working with the Mayor and Village Clerk, developed a handout for hunters defining the rules for hunting in the Preserves, the permission slip to be signed by a Village official, and a color-coded map showing Preserves, Cleveland Museum of Natural History Preserves and State Park lands.

The Village of Kelleys Island Park District and Recreational Board would like to extend an invitation, to all interested, to attend the scheduled meetings and become involved in the planning of the tentative projects. The Park Board is open to input and ideas. The more people that can be involved in the form of committees and or resources the more successful the Board will be in attaining the projected goals. Our only request is that guest refrain from interruption of the meeting and wait until open discussion to participate. 2019 Last Scheduled Meeting:

The Board would like to inform the public that in order to make any changes or additions to the park properties, a Project Request Form, which can be obtained at the Village Office, must be completed and submitted to June Campbell, President. The Park Board will then review the request at the next scheduled meeting. If the request receives approval, the Park Board will present the request to the Village Council.



Note: It is with a great sadness that I learned my friend and Kelleys Island sisterly companion has died after a sudden, severe onset of a debilitating cancer. In the days before she died, Carole Turner shared details of her life orally with her family, who compiled a picture of Carole's life and its journeys. I combined those details here with memory of our nearly 20 years' friendship. As we each "arrived" on the rock with a collection of previous-life careers

Carole B. Turner was born in Pittsburgh, PA., July 21, 1944 to Jack and Georgie Brown of Verona, PA. After graduating high school, she worked as a legal secretary until she met and married Steve Turner. Together they raised three sons--Ben, Doug, and Dan—all of whom graduated college, moved away from home, found their careers, and then built their own lives and families. Carole continued working in secretarial positions in medical and church offices until Steve retired from teaching at a community college in southern Ohio, and they travelled extensively, including a trip to Steve's ancestors' communities of South Wales. During those travels, they discovered Kelleys Island and developed a connection to the community and its people, esp. dear friend, the late Dottie Simonds.

During "retirement," Steve designed and built their house on Harbor Lane, while Carole tended the backyard garden and the flowerbeds surrounding the house. They fast became well known "fixtures" in their own ways, and each contributed significantly to community life of the island. While Steve wrote an annual April Fool's Day fantasy for Kelleys Life, Carole provided book reviews each issue, and volunteered in the library. They were regular potluck and Senior Lunch participants, Carole always bringing her own plastic container for the other half of the modest meal she ate, carrying the rest home for another day. Many houses and residents of Kelleys Island were assisted by Steve's ready handy-man, "on call" skills during the decade the Turners called KI home, until they moved back to the Columbus area to be near their son. After Steve's death in November of 2011, Carole then and her companion cat moved to Upper Arlington where she was able to walk to visit her beloved grandsons, volunteer in a local library, and keep fit with yoga, walking, and a simple, modest, and gentle lifestyle. In spare time, she continued reading and reviewing books, having published

over 200 book reviews while maintaining modest gardening habits and conversations with neighbors.

Her illness came on suddenly but aggressively, she moved into Westminster-Thurber, where she lived her final days with grace and dignity. To the end of her earthly days, Carole was grateful and thankful to others, esp. the Upper Arlington Public Library, Adult Services Section, "for giving her a place to volunteer and feel most welcome every Saturday morning." Her simple, gentle life is a model of peace of joy for all of us.

Carole's family currently consists of Benjamin Turner (David Schlansker III) of Arlington, VA; Douglas Turner (Emily Krebs) of Upper Arlington; and Daniel (Christina Marie) Turner of Akron, OH. Two grandsons, Simon and Oliver Turner, "made her heart smile just at the mention of their names" Carole also leaves one brother, Larry (Susan) Brown of Sunnyvale, CA, who was able to spend a week with her before her death. Family was her love and her heart.

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
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KI Chamber Fall Update
