While the winter weather here in northern Ohio have remained fairly mild, the cold and flu season has not!

What is this Novel Coronavirus they keep talking about on the news every morning? As you are aware, it was first identified in Wuhan, Hubei Province, China in December 2019 and has caused an outbreak of severe respiratory illnesses and a number of reported deaths.

nCoV is believed to have started in wild animal food markets in the district, similar to what we saw with SARS (Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome)in 2003. This virus made the leap from animal to human, and transmission is now possible through human-tohuman contact. Initially it was believed the virus was only contagious after a patient showed symptoms, but Chinese authorities recently reported patients may be able to transmit the disease in the 2-3-day period before showing symptoms.

Coronaviruses include a variety of presentations from the common cold up to more severe respiratory afflictions like Middle East Respiratory Syndrome (MERS) and SARS (severe acute respiratory syndrome). The nCoV outbreak has

come with severe symptoms that have often included fever, chills, and body aches and often progressed to pneumonia, mimicking what we saw with SARS and MERS.

Standard recommendations to prevent infection spread include regular hand washing, covering mouth and nose when coughing and sneezing, thoroughly cooking meat and eggs. Avoid close contact with anyone showing symptoms of respiratory illness such as coughing and sneezing.

EMS will always be available to check you out and advise you if it is necessary to see your physician or go to the emergency department.

Upon completion of this project, Bobby has continued to clean catch basins, sewer jet several other drains, on Chappel Street, East and West Lakeshore Drive and other areas where problems

Serving Our Seniors and Kelleys Island Landowners Association (KILA) are working together to experiment how they can help Kelleys Island residents, ages 60 and older, mitigate the financial burden of air transportation off and on Kelleys Island, when ferry service is not available, to access unanticipated, recurring medical treatment for up to 8 weeks.

The total funding available is \$3,000.00. Serving Our Seniors is providing \$2,000.00 and KILA is contributing \$1,000.00 to study the extent of the need.

Examples of Eligible Conditions that Qualify for Airfare Reimbursement:

Those who are medically stable and do not require the services of emergency medical personnel.

Those who are medically stable and require recurring after care due to unexpected complications.

Those who are medically stable and require recurring after care following an emergency or unscheduled lifesustaining surgery, i.e., organ transplant.

Those who are medically stable and require shortterm dialysis.

Those who are medically stable and require cancer

Those who are medically stable and require recurring treatment due to a flare-up/change in condition of

Examples of Ineligible conditions for Airfare Reimbursement are:

Regular maintenance doctor visits

Emergency medical attention

Dental

Planned elective surgery and after care.

Long term dialysis



The Great Lakes Island Alliance (GLIA)

The Great Lakes Island Alliance (GLIA) is a newer voluntary, collaborative network that brings together island leaders, residents, and advocates from across the region. The mission of the GLIA is to encourage relationship building, foster information exchange, and leverage resources to address shared challenges and embrace opportunities

to benefit islands. The GLIA has connected remote, distant communities by increasing the membership to over 125 people from 14 island communities.

The members facilitate monthly conference calls to share information between communities, along with the annual summits. The first summit was held in 2017 on Beaver Island, Michigan,

followed by Madeline Island, Wisconsin in 2018, then on Mackinac Island, Michigan in 2019. This year the summit is going to be hosted on the Lake Erie Islands (South Bass Island, Middle Bass Island, Kelleys Island, and Pelee Island) October 4-7. The summit will bring together island leaders including: government officials, business, education, and conservation leaders, along with other island advocates to discuss the challenges and opportunities associated with island living. This network has advanced opportunities by partnering with universities, state and federal entities, nonprofits, and other organizations to receive funding to support start-up island-initiated projects such as; Monitoring Monarch on the islands of the Great Lakes, The Island Passport, Great Lakes Islands Educators Network, Great Lakes Islands Media Network,

The Lake Erie Islands committee has been meeting monthly since December

planning and discussing the funding needs and logistics to host the GLIA this fall. There is a need for representatives from each of the islands to seek sponsors and donors to support the 4th Annual Summit. Jordan Killam from the Kelleys Island Chamber of Commerce and Jackie Taylor from the Kelleys Island Field Station have been members of the GLIA, participating in the summits and monthly conference calls. Tuesday, October 6th will be the Kelleys Island day where we will be hosting over 100 people from the Great Lakes to highlight our gem. They are working on local and state funding grants to support this import event, but more is needed. If you are interested in helping with this event contact Jordan or Jackie. We will be meeting in late April to discuss further details and welcome community members and all ideas! We are excited, are looking forward to this opportunity. 

The editor of this very paper once said, "I'd rather plan 10 Ísland Fests than do 1 map" and the reason for this is simple - it's both a logistical nightmare and a daunting graphic design puzzle. Each year, we work with Designer Amy Heflinger, Chamber member and owner of AHA Creative in Sandusky to make this happen. First, we must ensure that all businesses that have renewed their membership are accounted for on the map. This takes a couple months, as many business owners are out of town traveling once they leave the island, not always checking email and may miss our reminders for renewal. Inevitably, each year, some businesses do not renew and we must redistribute and assign new numbers to the businesses that have just joined our Chamber. New lodging properties sometimes require our Graphic Designer to draw in new streets.

Internally, the map is scrutinized for mistakes and accidental omissions. We go round after round making sure that everything is placed and spelled correctly and that the numbers are consecutive. When we think we've got it right, we send it out to the members so they can check our work. 100% of the time, more mistakes are found. Even multiple pairs of the most discerning eyes can't seem to spot all these errors. Even though it's a difficult task, it's simply too important for our members' visibility and for the way-finding of our island visitors to discontinue. Not to mention, it's a selling point and huge benefit of Chamber membership!

The Boat Show. Our Kelleys Island Chamber board felt it was important for us to return to the Progressive Cleveland Boat Show at the IX Center this year, so back we went! And this time, the weather even cooperated! The board coordinated and decorated our booth space with the events staff. At the

show, we greeted boaters, fishing enthusiasts, fans, and friends of the island. I prepared and delivered two presentations about family fun on Kelleys Island. On Saturday night of the Boat Show weekend, Chamber board Vice President Dan Weaver once again hosted the Annual Kelleys Island winter party at his bar, Fat Little Buddies Tavern in Olmsted Township, Ohio. The party featured Steve Brownell and was well attended by Islanders and Clevelanders who love the island! Special thanks to Danielle and George Klonaris, Fredo Policy, Brian Terry, and others who helped us make that weekend successful.

Our Website. Since late last year, we've been working with Thrive Internet Marketing, a digital agency based in Perrysburg, Ohio, on our new website. Though we expected to launchin late January, we encountered some challenges with respect to the transfer of existing content on our site and also the development aspects of the new site. I made an executive decision for Thrive to take the time necessary to make things absolutely right before we decided to launch. By

the time you read this, KelleysIslandChamber.Com will have already launched with many upgrades in design and function, including but not limited to:

• New and improved member business/organization/events pages

• Lodging search with filtering so visitors can search for attributes they want in a vacation home

 More updated written, shareable content about the island (members may have noticed that I reached out to inquire further about their businesses to construct material for this area of our site in the beginning of 2020)

Beautiful images and video prominently displayed

• Online forms for easy event sign-up and donation

We have spent many hours perfecting the taxonomy and user experience of this new site. I have been with Thrive every step of the way to help guide them through the design and build so they will be able to make the perfect site for our audience. We hope you enjoy the fruits of our labor to find an efficient, gorgeous, and not to mention SECURE

Planning 2020 Events. It started with the task of designing and populating the calendar brochure, designed by Chamber member and Graphic Designer Lara Bischoff, owner of Lake Erie Creative in Marblehead. This requires us to collect dates from our members for 60+ events, some of which change due to proximity to other events, holidays occurring on inopportune weekends, etc. Then, it progressed with collecting descriptions for those 60+ events happening this year which were posted on Kelleys Island Chamber. com/events, Facebook events, Ohio. org, and in other outlets like Lake Erie Living, Lake Erie Shores & Islands (LEŠI), to name a few. We designed and are ready to order our Island Fest 2020 t-shirts and began planning for the programs that will occur at Island Fest. We reviewed all incoming vendor applications, selected who will have space in Memorial Park for Island Fest, and hired live entertainment. 

• The Chamber needs to submit

a post-event report, which must be submitted within 45 days of the conclusion of the event. Key elements of the post-event report include media support material, summary of positives and negatives of the event, plans for the future, data for actual room nights generated as a direct impact of the event, and total number in attendance. A complete economic impact study is requested, which we will try to complete supply as best as we can, as we've never done this before!

Bring Some, Take Some: Seed Library at the KI Library

The Kelleys Island Library is now host to a seed library. What is a seed library? A place where gardeners (flower or vegetable) can bring their extra seeds and/or browse for seeds already there that they may be interested in taking.

How does it work? First, you don't need a library card and you don't need to check seeds in or out. Just browse thru the collection and take seeds you would like to plant. If you have seeds to donate, please label them, at a minimum, with the name of the plant, when and how deep to plant, how big it will grow and what type of sun it needs. Add any additional information that may be necessary - such as the seeds will need to be soaked overnight before planting or the plants will need to be staked or trellised. Heritage plant seeds are especially welcomed as are seeds that are difficult to find.

The seed library can be found in a wooden box near the far wall of the library. To help seed patrons, there are envelopes for putting seed donations in. We have marked the envelopes with requested information for gardens but if you don't have all the requested details, just put down what you know and we will be grateful for your contribution. Seeds that have already been donated are in envelopes, filed in alphabetical order by

common name. If there are more seeds in the envelope than you want, just put the extra seeds in a new envelope and transfer the planting information. If you have seeds to bring, there are small plastic (pill) bottles to put your seeds in.

We have also started a notebook with some information about the plants to be grown. The seed library will be open the same times at the

book library. Enjoy!

Kelleys Island Pollinators & Partnerships

In the summer of 2018, the Kelleys Island Pollinators & Partnerships was started as a "grass roots" network between the Kelleys Island State Park and the Kelleys Island School and Field Station. We knew what we were trying to accomplish in enhancing habitat for pollinators, but weren't sure how to get there. We reached out to several experts for advice on the proper methods for preparing the soil and planting the seed. Then with much research we nailed down a plant list of native plants to Kelleys Island, and had a plan that would take three years to show any results.

The plan kicked off in October 2018, when mowing began on the State Park properties totaling around 17 acres, and a demonstration plot of around .15 acres was planted at the Kelleys Island School. This plot was developed at an accelerated rate with the same plant species used in the larger areas and managed in the same fashion as the other acreage within the park. In June 2019 non-native plant species were removed by the use of appropriate methods; this was repeated in July and August as needed. Doing this greatly increases the survival of native species by removing the competition. This spring (2020) specific grasses and wildflowers will be planted for germination, with the assistance from Pheasants Forever and the Division of

Wildlife. If all goes as planned, we will have nearly 17 acres of pollinator habitat established by the summer, and in 2021 three more acres will be planted (see map for detailed areas).

We have had donations, advice, and a great amount of motivation which has allowed this project to be a success. But fortunately, we are only getting started! The seed that will get planted this spring came from a variety of funding sources, but mostly from the local community on Kelleys Island. \$17,000 came from local donations, \$3,000 from Ohio Ornithological Society, and \$1,200 from Pollinator Partnerships. The exceeded has expectations, and we are excited to be able to successfully move forward with this project! Our future plan is to incorporate interpretative trails into two of the properties that will connect with already existing State Park trails. One of the habitats will have an area to park with signage explaining the project and partners (see map for detailed areas).

The research and education opportunities are ongoing and exciting. We will start implementing our own research needs by partnering with schools, universities, state, and federal organizations to better understand the conservation status and the wildlife diversity of these habitats. We have partnered with

citizen science organizations to help monitor these habitats. This is an efficient way of collecting and comparing data. These projects will let all of us contribute directly to the science of animal conservation on Kelleys Island.

This project has already been nationally recognized by Pollinator and Partnerships for the valuable contributions made to the Monarch Wings Across the Eastern Broadleaf Forest Program. With our participation, over 20 acres on Kelleys Island were registered as long-term secured habitat to support the conservation of the Eastern migratory monarch population. Pollinator Partnership's is a non-profit organization that promotes the health of pollinators critical to food and ecosystems, through conservation, education, and research.

In December 2019, the Kelleys Island Village Council approved Kelleys Island as a Monarch City USA. Monarch City USA is a national organization that recognized our efforts and commitment to the environment through promoting civic pride and improvement by directly helping the monarch butterfly population recover by encouraging and planting milkweed and nectar plants within our boundaries. Both the Village of Kelleys Island and the Kelleys Island School purchased

signs that will get posted in the village and at the school recognizing these efforts!

We have created lessons based on the Ohio Department of Education, STEM, and NEXT Generation learning standards for our local school kids, residents, our Nature Camps, and other educational programs for more hands-on learning. The Kelleys Island Field Station and School is working with the Ohio Division of Wildlife to be a State Certified WILD School Site. WILD School Sites are considered an action extension of Project WILD and can involve any school property used by students, teachers, and the community as a place to learn about and benefit from wildlife and the environment. These sites function within the premise that every school, regardless of size and location, can outdoor educational opportunities that can and should be part of any integrated education

We cannot thank all of our partners, sponsors, and donors enough for the amount of support this project has received. At this crucial point in our island's natural history, your participation in this revolutionary program will help our pollinator habitats flourish on Kelleys Island. We will continue to keep updating you on the progress we make!

March 1 is the traditional start of Ohio's fishing license year. However, new license options give those who enjoy the outdoors more choices than ever before. If your hunting or fishing license has expired, you can purchase a new one online at wildohio. gov. Ohio's resident fishing licenses

are \$25 and are valid for one year from the date of purchase. An Ohio fishing license can be purchased up to 30 days prior to its expiration date. After an online purchase, including by smartphone, anyone with an online account can obtain a free reprint of a license or permit (this

option is not available at agents). Customers now have the option of choosing automatic license renewal when purchasing online.





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Historical Society Kicks Off Membership Drive

Lake Erie Fish Ohio Report Updated: Feb. 24, 2020

• A Lake Erie fishing permit is required for nonresidents from January 1 to April 30, 2020 when fishing Lake Erie and areas immediately upstream in creeks, rivers, and tributaries.

• The daily bag limit for walleye in Ohio waters of Lake Erie is 6 fish per angler. The minimum size limit for walleye is 15 inches.

• The daily bag limit for yellow perch is 30 fish per angler in all Ohio waters of Lake Erie.

• The trout and salmon daily bag limit is 2 fish (singly or in combination) per angler. The minimum size limit is 12 inches.

• Black bass (largemouth and smallmouth bass): The daily bag limit is 5 fish (singly or in combination) per angler with a 14-inch minimum size limit

• Update: Effective March 1st, 2020 the spring bag limit for walleye will remain at 6 fish, with the exception of Sandusky Bay and the Sandusky River, which will remain at 4 fish March 1st through April 30th.

• Update: Effective January 1, 2020, it is legal to use three rods per angler in the Lake Erie Sportfishing District.

Western Basin Walleye

Where: Fishing has been more difficult in recent weeks, though limits are still being reported.=. The most popular launches have been Mazurik, Huron, and Lorain. Anglers consistently have been finding marks Southwest and North of Kelleys Island, and towards Cranberry Creek east of Huron. Anglers are advised to use extreme caution with cold water temperatures, and to use lifejackets or float coats at all times.

How: Trolling deep diving crankbaits and stick baits has been the most popular technique at speeds 1.0 to 1.5 mph. Anglers have been experimenting with lures 50-150 feet back without any additional weight, or 20-40 feet back to a 2 oz. weight, and another 20-40 feet back to the lure. Natural colors have been best.

The Lake Erie water temperature off Toledo is 33 degrees, off Cleveland 35 degrees, and off Erie 34 degrees.

Anglers are encouraged to always wear a U.S. Coast Guard-approved personal flotation device while on the water.

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




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


