We are now approximately halfway through summer and what a busy time it has been. The July 4th weekend was the busiest I have ever seen. The businesses were packed and for mid-summer the workers are exhausted. Speaking of July 4th, the fireworks display put on by West Bay Inn were spectacular as well as the weather to complement the evening. Thanks to all who donated for the awesome display. I am sure we will all look forward to this display as an annual event.

At the July Council Meeting our Clerk Treasurer presented the 2022 Tax Budget for council's approval. It was posted and available for public viewing ten days prior to the July Council Meeting, and then approved by Council. It will now be forwarded to the Erie County Auditor. This document displays both revenue and expenditure of our Village. The numbers shown tell us that the Village was not hurt by the pandemic and our General Fund has remained stable. Some very good news for the Village as other municipalities have suffered through the pandemic with great losses.

Today, 07/13/2021, I was informed by Hancock-Wood Board Member Brian Terry that Hancock-Wood has entered into an agreement with Amplex Internet to bring Internet to Kelleys Island. We have been waiting a long time for this service. Below is an excerpt of the notice Brian received from Hancock-Wood:

Amplex Internet will begin to construct a fiber-to-the-home network, which will be capable of providing Kelleys Island residents with reliable high-speed internet up to 1,000Mbps. Hancock-Wood Electric Cooperative (HWE) has agreed to terms with Amplex Internet on Kelleys Island, which will allow Amplex to begin hanging fiber on the cooperative's poles. Amplex expects to begin stringing fiber on HWE poles this fall, with internet service being available to KI residents as fiber is installed near homes and businesses. Amplex is headquartered in Luckey, Ohio and provides internet, video, and telephone services since the 1960s. More information about Amplex can be found at https://amplex.net.

In other news, at the July Council Meeting, I had our Solicitor draw up legislation to increase our volunteer firefighters' wages. After doing some homework and contacting other village volunteer fire departments with approximately the same population, I found that some Chiefs were making up to \$15,000.00 annually and few were still at zero. My proposed legislation raised our Chief's salary from \$1000.00 to \$5000.00 annually. The Assistant Chief from \$750.00 to \$1000.00, and the Captain and Lieutenant's from \$500.00 to \$750.00. Callouts from \$25.00 per hour - \$10.00 an hour after two hours to \$25.00 an hour. Meetings from \$10.00 an hour to \$15.00 an hour and trainings \$25.00 per day or event to \$25.00 per day or event then to \$10.00 per hour after one hour. I think it goes without saying how lucky we are to have these dedicated volunteers on our department.

Over the past decades the requirements, training, and ongoing education to maintain a volunteer fire department have increased disproportionately to these raises I am proposing. It is the very least we can do to show our support for their continued risk and participation. Councilman Ritchie said before approving this he wanted to look at all salaries, not just the fire department. Councilman Longbreak stated that he agreed with Councilman Ritchie. Being on the fire department for the last fifteen years I have observed the countless hours the Chief puts in preparing for meetings, trainings, maintaining records of his men, and when fighting a fire, the responsibility is endless. It was only the first reading, but I was hoping to pass it as an emergency as the increase is more than deserving and would not hurt a budget that has averaged \$80,000.00 a year without overspending.

By the time you receive this article, we will be in the month of August, getting ready for Homecoming. Let's stay safe and enjoy summer.

We've grown by almost 4,000 followers on Facebook since 2018 and revamped our website, which now has a reach of tensof-thousands per month. Regional news outlets are taking notice. I used to reach out to influencers and publications to pitch stories and request coverage. Now, they come to us due to public demand and general curiosity. In short, KI is now part of the Great Lakes zeitgeist!

Events.

In the month of July, the Chamber hosted our second (should have been third, thanks COVID) Kelleys Island's Got Talent! The event's inaugural year was 2019 and we were thrilled to be hosting an in-person show again July 10! We will be partnering with a fellow Island nonprofit, the Kelleys Island Landowners Association (KILA), to advertise this event to homeowners. He currently acts as Special Advisor to the office, and continues to participate on regional, national, and international advisory groups concerned with protecting Lake Erie. I am serving as our island's lead delegate and contact for the event. Lake Erie Shores & Islands (LESI) Marketing Board - Following Consultant Roger Brooks' visit in May, LESI has decided to rebrand as a result of our board's input and his advice. Erie and Ottawa County will henceforth be known as Shores & Islands, OH _____ (fill in the blank with your municipality). We are working on messaging for this new era of our region's branding, and I have raised the very crucial issue of over-tourism and accessibility. 

Chardonnay: a cool climate white with several 'personalities'

Around the world, chardonnay is recognized as the most noble of white wines. It is widely planted, capable of producing a broad range of wine styles and has almost universal appeal.

Chardonnay was one of the first 'viniferas' (European style grapes) to be successfully grown here in northern Ohio. While it is surely susceptible to injury from our uneven and rather harsh winter temperatures, it is usually experiencing less winter damage than more tender varieties like Sauvignon Blanc, Merlot or

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Pinot Noir. It is increasingly, one of the whites upon which Ohio will build an exceptional reputation.

Chardonnay vines take their name from a village in France near Macon and yield rather longish bunches with golden berries that are almost translucent when fully ripe. As finished wines, they very much reflect growing conditions and cellaring techniques used by each winemaker.

Every fine North American restaurant offers a plethora of chardonnay selections. Some cynics believe it became the country's most popular white in the early eighties because it has a name that is easy to pronounce. While there may be a grain of truth in that suggestion, a more plausible explanation is that chardonnay is truly a great grape which produces pleasant, interesting wines and complements many styles and varieties of cuisine.

While in the early eighties, nearly all of the chards coming from our west coast friends were heavy with oak, the varietals now available on retail shelves and resta

urant lists offer a wide range of styles. Some chardonnays are grown in heavy soils, fermented, and aged in oak barrels for an extended period. The resulting wines are big, full of vanilla, heavy with oak and long lived. They tend to be more amber in color and require a more complex entrée to match its more intense flavor and aromatic components.

Other grapes are grown in light avely soils, fermented in stainless steel and aged only for a few weeks or months in oak. (Some never see any oak time.) They are fresher, lighter, less complex with a fruit 'up front' finish. Most 'foodies' now prefer this style as the wines tend to match better with today's modern cuisine. With flavors of apple, pear, citrus, peach, butter, honey, butter, and vanilla, how could it not be widely accepted as an appealing food wine? Typically, all chardonnays go through 'malo-lactic' fermentation, a secondary fermentation designed to soften the tart malic acid (think Granny Smith apple) and convert it to softer lactic acid (think milk) sometime during their first year in a wine cellar. Regardless of vineyard and cellaring techniques used, most chardonnavs age well, developing depth, complexity, and interest in the bottle. For addi-tional information: dwinchell@ OhioWines.org


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

The best time of the year is here, HOT SUMMER DAYS!!! It is also the time of year for our most common 911 calls. The dreaded dehydration!

Dehydration can take place quickly and can be dangerous, perhaps even fatal. It occurs when too much water is lost from the body, not enough is taken in, or both. Many summer activities involve outdoor exertion, and it is important to remember that sweating can lead to rapid depletion of water. Signs of dehydration can include a dry mouth, lack of tears, less sweating, muscle cramps, palpitations, dark yellow urine, lightheadedness, nausea, and vomiting. Confusion, weakness, and even loss of consciousness can occur when dehydration is severe.

For mild to moderate dehydration, oral fluid replacement in small, frequent amounts is recommended. Fluid options include water, ice pops and sports drinks containing electrolyte replacement fluids. The average adult needs 2 to 3 liters of fluids a day; if dehydrated, more may be needed. For severe symptoms of dehydration, it is advisable to go to the emergency room or call 911. Try to prevent dehydration by keeping in mind the following:

• Head into shaded areas as frequently as possible.

• Wear hats and light, thin clothes to block some of the heat.

• Hydrate often. A simple rule for hydration in the heat is one glass of water before, one during, and one after any moderate exertion lasting an hour.

• The young and the elderly are most at risk for dehydration. Hydrate between beverages that contain caffeine or alcohol. Yes, we know that beer is made from water and that there is "water in the ice" in a scotch on the rocks. But seriously please have a nice water chaser between these fine beverages.

We would like to remind you to not wait until you feel thirsty to

The Village of Kelleys Island entered into an Agreement with MetroHealth to provide life flight services to the residents and visitors of Kelleys Island. There have been several questions about membership renewals with the St. Vincent's life flight. While the Village does not have a formal relationship with St. Vincent, there is nothing to stop them from advertising their services to Village residents. So that you can make an informed decision, please consider the following information:

MetroHealth Life Flight

• No annual membership fees.

• If you are transported off the island by MetroHealth, they will bill your insurance and accept payment as 100%. There will be no balanced billing. The only cost to you will be co-pays based on your personal insurance plan.

• MetroHealth includes Doc2Go, a telehealth service, to visit with doctors for your needs without going off the island saving you time and ferry fees. There is a small fee associated with this service.

• MetroHealth Life Flight will take you to your hospital of choice, unless you are unconscious, then by Ohio law they will take you to the closest, most appropriate hospital based on your diagnosis/condition.

St. Vincent Life Flight

• Balanced billing may occur after they bill



your insurance unless you subscribe to the annual membership fee.

• There is an annual membership fee.

• They normally will transport you to St. Vincent's Hospital.

• There are no telehealth services.

If you want to take advantage of MetroHealth Life Flight, you must do nothing. If you choose to use St. Vincent's Life Flight, you must sign up for their service since the Village does not have a formal relationship and pay the annual membership fee. Hopefully, this information is helpful as you make the decision whether to renew your St. Vincent's membership plan.

Medicare Counseling Is Available by ZOOM

Serving Our Seniors is your consumer advocate when it comes to Erie County residents, ages 60+, understanding their Medicare coverage. We do not sell Medicare insurance, nor do we care from whom you purchase it. We are here to make sure that you are not paying more than you need to pay for the type of coverage vou can afford. We are also here to make sure that you know the cost of your deductible, co-payments, maximum out-of-pocket costs, what your insurance does not cover - and why.

There is one truth that you can bank on.... as you continue to grow older, Medicare will cost you more

money with each passing year. That is why it pays to be an informed Medicare consumer.

There are three Medicare Savings Programs to help older adults on low incomes to afford their Medicare insurance. One is called the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) Program, the other is a Specified Low Income Medicare Beneficiary (SLMB) and the third is Qualified Individual (QI).

QMB (Qualified Medicare Beneficiary) Program pays the \$148.50/month to cover the cost of the Part B premium, which is deducted from one's social security check. It also pays for the 20% of the hospital and outpatient care that is NOT covered by traditional Medicare insurance. In other words, you do not have to purchase a Medicare Supplemental insurance policy if your income makes you eligible for QMB. The eligibility requirements for OMB are:

A single person with a gross monthly income of not more than \$1,094.00/month and a retirement nest egg (savings, annuities, stocks bonds, IRA, or any other type of liquid asset) not more than \$7,970.00.

A married couple whose • gross monthly income of not more than \$1,472.00/month and a retirement nest egg of not more than \$11,960.00.

For the last 14 years, we have attempted to band some of the colonial nesting birds on the Island to add to our study of the birds using Kelleys Island for breeding or migration stopover. We have concentrated on two colonies on the Island. One has declined and the other has increased but due to various reasons we have not always gotten to each on a regular basis.

This year we only banded at one of the colonies, that of Jeri and Kyle Yoest. Because of damage to one of

the nesting boxes, it had to be repaired just before the nesting season and this caused a delay in nesting by Purple Martins at this colony. The south box was on a somewhat normal schedule, and we were able to band 44 young birds. Some of the nests at this box had already fledge by the date, July 10, and some of the nests contained birds too young to band. The north box which was the one repaired had many nests that contained eggs or birds too young to band. We only banded six young in this box. So, this year we banded 50 young Purple Martins. In 2020, we banded 109 young martins at the two sites. At this point in 2021, we have banded 696 individual Purple Martins on Kelleys Island.

Looking Back - May 1925

The following is an excerpt from the Erie Echo which was a small newspaper published for all the schools in Erie County, Ohio in the early 1900's. The column where the article was published was called Kelleys Island Ramblings.

Kelley's Island's Greatest Industry The Kelley's Island Lime and Transport Co. is our greatest industry. At present this company employees 125 men and its average by-weekly pay roll is \$7,700 or enough to give every man, woman and child on the Island approximately five dollars a week. Few realize, even including those who live on the Island, the value of this company. It can be seen from the above that almost one-fourth of the families living here are more or less dependent upon this company. The economic effect of one summer's shut-down could easily be foretold.

Yet, notwithstanding the above,

the fact remains that it is a case of robbing Peter to pay Paul. The present state of depletion can not always continue. At present the surface of the Island is being stripped to a depth of eight or ten feet at the rate of more than 2,500 tons per day and it is expected that 750,000 tons will be removed this summer or enough to load a train of cars 130 miles in length. Few stop to think what this means to the beauty and usefulness of the island. If continued, in less than fifty years - not quite two generations - two-thirds of the once beautiful island will be a dreary waste and what then will be the means of making a living? What will the children and grandchildren do then? The grape industry is rapidly dwindling away and after the above company is through with the land, the industry could not be revived or could any kind of farming be done.

Surely the above spells decreased


History Museum News


We dug into our archives and found several issues of the Kellegian newsletter from the school, 1951-

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July, was a busy month for bees

All of the flowers are in full bloom, and you can smell the sweetness in the air as the bees are working almost 24 hours a day. On one large brood frame there are 7,000 cells and the queen is trying to fill every one of them by laying 1,500-2,000 eggs per day. The worker bees need to feed the

queen a high protein diet of bee pollen mixed with a small amount of honey and bee saliva. This turns into fermented bee bread, and it is much easier for the queen to digest. It is also fed to the young larva and other bees in the colony. A good diet is very important for the queen if she is to keep production of eggs at an all-time high. If there is not enough space in the

hive due to cells being filled with nectar/honey or brood, then the bees will have no choice but to swarm and leave the hive. Beekeepers at this time will switch out the two brood boxes moving the bottom one to the top and the top one to the bottom as the queen seems to prefer to lay in the top box as it is warmer for the brood. The beekeeper should also be

testing to see how many varroa mites there are in a hive. Varroa mites are a little mite which live off the bees and eat the fatty tissue of the bee. They are a vector of diseases to the bees much like a mosquito is a vector of diseases to humans by giving us



malaria. When you hear of bees dying out these mites are the number one factor for a hive dying out. If left to mother nature the strongest hives would survive and the bees would be able to overcome this host. But, with honey being in greater demand than ever and commercial beekeepers growing their own queens mother

nature is put by the wayside and beekeeping continues.

Honey production is one of the many ways a beekeeper can pay for their hobby or their livelihood depending on the number of hives they own. The average hive can make 30-60 pounds of honey per year. And the beekeeper can use that money to pay for their time in

managing the hive(s). Beekeepers also sell many other products from the hive like bee's wax used in soap, skin creams and polishes. Bee pollen can be mixed with food like cereal and eaten. But be careful about eating it right from the jar as it can give you an allergic reaction in your throat. It is better mixed it in a smoothie or on cereal. Pollen is extremely rich in protein and contains essential amino acids, and vitamins B, C, D, E and K. Beekeepers at this time of the year are doing everything possible to keep the hive from swarming and managing for production of honey.








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Jack-in-the-Pulpit

Jack-in-the-Pulpit grows in the moist shady wooded areas of the Island. It pops ups in early spring and unless you are traipsing around looking for mushrooms you will probably not find them. The hood of the flower, technically known as a "spathe" means pulpit and contains a long, stem-like growth called the spadix" or Jack. That is where the flower's reproductive parts are found. So, the plants name is based on the structure of its flower, and therefore called Jack-in-the-pulpit.

All parts of the plant are extremely toxic. The "flowers or hood are pollinated by gnats; they visit male flowers, where they pick up pollen, but once they enter the female hood they can not escape, the pollen then gets drawn from their dead bodies.

A Delicious Plant - Ramps!

Ramps are a species of wild onions that grow prolifically on Kelleys Island, specifically on Titus Road. They are a shade loving plant and Titus is the perfect home for them. Ramps are also known as wood leeks, spring onions, or wild garlic. I imagine the original Islanders gathered these delicious beauties! A fun fact about ramps - winter and migratory birds such as doves, finches and sparrows like to feast on the seeds of ramp. Smaller birds will perch on top of these root plants to eat the seeds directly from the flower. On some occasions, you might witness a hummingbird visiting, too. Island residents and visitors look forward to harvesting this delicacy every spring. They are a perennial that propagates by bulb division, similar to a tulip, and the entire plant is edible. However, some parts are toxic to pets. Roots have a strong garlicky flavor. The leaves can be sautéed or puréed to make a delicious ramp pesto.

2. Make an appointment with a consultative geriatrician. Ask for thorough assessment and a "plan of care." If you are a healthy older adult this assessment gives you a baseline. If you have existing health problems the assessment gives you and your doctor certain measures to identify when the declines in your health

have occurred. The nearest consultative geriatrician is at the Cleveland Clinic in Lakewood and the main campus. Serving Our Seniors can assist in navigating the Cleveland Clinic's call center, using 3-way calling. We can help you make your first appointment. To request such help, call 419-624- 1856 and ask for a Senior Advocate Assistant.

3. Inform your primary care doctor/nurse practitioner you are using the services of a consultative geriatrician. Explain to him/her, as a health care consumer, your expectation is that he/ she will work cooperatively with the geriatrician, based on the assessment and any additional follow up appointments.

4. If your doctor tells you your health problem(s) is due to your age, know that chronological age is not a diagnosis. If this what you are told... You might want to find a doctor who doesn't see age as an illness.

Out of Town Transportation to Health Care Appointments


We have started the Out of Town Transportation Program again! Serving Our Seniors Volunteer Drivers are driving Erie County residents, who are aged 60 or older

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
