





# Blending - art in the bottle

In a winemaker's bag of 'tricks,' one of the most critical tools is his ability to take a variety of wines, mix them together and make the sum larger and better than its individual parts. Blending wines offers a chance for his 'artistic' side to shine.

When you select wine from a local store shelf, often there is no 'varietal' name on the label. Rather than 'riesling,' 'chardonnay,' 'cabernet' 'catawba,' or 'vidal,' the label reads a fanciful name like Sailor's Red, Sweet Belle, or Island Chablis. An internationally recognized red blend is known as Meritage.

What is the difference? In the case of a grape-name label, by law, that bottle contains juice primarily from fruit of a specific variety. The more fanciful names are used for 'proprietary' wines. These are almost always blended from a number of vintages [harvest dates] and different grape types. The initial goal is to create a wine that is more interesting than any one individual component.

When a new blended or 'proprietary' label is created, numerous individual batches of 'finished' wines are brought into the cellar's laboratory. In his mind, the winemaker assesses each lot for compatibility in oak and sweetness levels, color intensities, vintage dates, and numerous other things. With a clear goal for a final product in mind, he creates a series of combinations, each carefully recorded and numbered. A tasting panel is assembled. While often only the winemaker and his assistant make

the final decision, other winery staff and sometimes even regular customers are asked for input. It is essential that the final blend meet the taste expectations of a winery's most loyal clientele.

Once a proprietary wine is released and gains acceptance, the winemaker then must work to replicate those prior blends regardless of the annual variations provided by Mother Nature. That is easier said than done. At the end of one season, any wine from the same grapes grown in the same vineyard and fermented in the same cellar will taste different that of the previous year, if only because it is more aged. To deal with this dilemma, the original blend's notes are resurrected, and similar base wines are prepared. Minor adjustments are made and carefully

noted until the potential new samples imitates the original wine. Tasting panels are gathered again. Several approximate options are compared against the original vintage. Additional adjustments are made until a comparable match is identified. Blending and tasting notes are recorded to assist in replicating the specific combinations for the next year's wines. While final product will be very similar to the original in taste and flavor components, there are always subtle differences from one year to the next. As noted above, if winemaking can be described as a balance between art and science, blending offers the vintner a chance to show off his 'creative' side.

# **Camp Patmos Update**

**David Sellers** 

You will be amazed at what God has done this last year! Though a year without campers or guests, God has provided in miraculous ways through people just like you

like you.

We have so much for which to be thankful and we want to share it with you. Your giving has been so encouraging to our staff and the Camp Patmos Board. Your support has kept us above water and sailing in a Windward direction. We had a goal to raise \$300,000 by June 1st of 2021, and you helped us to surpass that goal by November. In the end, we raised \$342.715.34, plus we had additional designated gifts that totaled almost \$90,000—bringing the total to \$430,155.34!

I shared these verses when speaking about Camp Patmos to give glory to God in what only He could have done. "Now to him who is able to do far more abundantly than all that we ask or think, according to the power at work within us, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations, forever and ever. You may be asking, "What does this mean for Camp Patmos?" In March of 2020, we applied for and received a Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan (\$37,942) and an Emergency Disaster loan (\$296,400) from the SBA. We initially used some of those funds to meet our immediate needs, but we did not need to draw any more from that loan or add any more debt to camp due to your giving. We are holding that loan as an emergency fund if any further COVID issues come our way. It is at a very low interest rate, and we are paying

the interest on that loan. We are also happy to say that we did not need to use our line of credit during this time as we kept spending under our proposed budget. In the end, it was people just like you that have helped us start this season in better financial shape than we ever have in the history of this ministry.

We are starting to make progress on the Chapel Renovation and Expansion project. The project will include adding a 35' x 35' addition to the East side of the building, consisting of two bathrooms, storage, a sound room, and a mechanical room to house the HVAC units. We are also planning on updating the chapel flooring, lighting, ceiling, and stage. The good news is that we have already raised \$56,827 of a rough estimated cost of \$150,000 to \$200,000.



We are currently working to transition our maintenance department to a location that is safer

and more efficient. We were running out of room in our current maintenance building, and it was a liability to have all the sharp rusty things in the middle of the camp. So, on May 1st, we had a workday and moved the majority of the maintenance equipment to the old Rec-Center (Big Blue Pole Barn). As part of this transition, we will be converting the old maintenance building into a recreation room and meeting space, and the "Craft Room" will relocate to cabin 13. We are calling this new space Craft 13, combining the Craft Room and Cabin 13. This move allows better access for campers to be creative and have fun.

The other ongoing project is replacing cabin roofs with metal roofing. Metal roofing will extend the life of our cabins and adds a refreshing blue color to camp. We estimate it will take \$700 per cabin, and we have fifteen cabin roofs to go, plus the office and laundry

room.

We appreciate your generous giving that is impacting lives for Christ at Camp Patmos. Thank you so much!

# What You Didn't Know About Aging Your Thirst Changes Between Ages 65 – 80+ Years Old

Did you know that your thirst changes in later life? I interviewed Dr. Ardeshir Hashmi, Cleveland Clinic Endowed Chair for Geriatric Innovation, about common physical changes that occur in the body of one who is age 80+, compared to one who is age 65. He said there are many changes that occur in the body over that 15-year period, one of which is thirst.

He said, "As we progress from age 65 and 80 years old – especially after the age of 80 -- the thirst signal becomes very diminished or completely goes away. This means, a person at age 80 can be dangerously dehydrated and not even know it. Instead, of feeling thirsty, the older person feels symptoms of being light-headed or dizzy. In more serious cases of dehydration, he/she will actually faint." Dr. Hashmi explained that these symptoms are occurring because certain bodily functions are starting to shut down, caused by the dehydration.

To counter-act this physiological phenomenon in later life, Dr. Hashmi advises that people of older age, chiefly those 80 years and older, should schedule themselves to drink fluid at regular intervals even though they do not feel thirsty. Just as a patient follows a schedule when taking certain medicines to treat a health problem, think drinking fluid as a form of preventative medicine. For example, drinking enough fluid could prevent falling and breaking a hip or striking your head on the floor

For those who are not diagnosed with congestive heart failure, "The medical guidance for the amount of fluid to drink per day is 64 ounces. If you cannot drink 64 ounces/day, 48 ounces also has preventative health benefits, too." he said. "Beverages with caffeine or alcohol do not count. This is because caffeine and alcohol have a diuretic effect, which promotes dehydration."

Dr. Hashmi went on to say, "Water is the best thing to drink. I have found for most of my patients, it is difficult to drink that much water. So, it can be flavored water, fluids with electrolytes or your favorite juice." He also advises to drink as much of the fluid in the morning and the afternoon – not in the evening. "Drinking more fluid will cause a person to use the bathroom more often. So, drink your fluid early enough in the day so it does not interrupt your sleep at night."

# Septic System Maintenance

The Village of Kelleys Island has no municipal sewage treatment facility. All sewage on the island is treated in home sewage treatment systems (HSTS) or commercial package plants/small flow systems. Some systems on the Island are new and some are old. The age of the system does not always determine when or if a system will fail. Numerous problems can occur with any septic system. Some of the problems are caused by human error and others are caused by Mother Nature. Some of the signs that your system may be failing included the following.

- Sewage has begun to back up into the house or into the septic tank causing it to overflow or drain slowly.
- Odors of raw sewage are noticed outside or inside the residence.
- The soil on or around the septic system has become soft and "spongy

from moisture. This area can usually be identified with lush green grass.

Well water is contaminated with

Should any of the signs listed above be observed, they should be further investigated. If one is detected, it may be for other reasons besides a failing household sewage system. Sometimes these issues above can be simple repairs instead of a costly replacement of the entire septic system.

Household sewage systems can fail because of human errors such as the overuse of the septic system. It is not uncommon for homes to be designed as a two-bedroom home and later converted to a three- or four-bedroom home. This new addition can increase the amount of water flow put into the system and can cause pre-mature failures. Sometimes Mother Nature can play a role in the failure of a system. If a system becomes oversaturated with

groundwater it can cause sewage to rise and break through the surface of the ground. Tree roots can also cause system problems. The roots can cause blockages in pipes leading to a backup of sewage into the home or septic tank. These are some tips to prolong the life of your system.

- Conserve as much water as possible by using low flow fixtures, taking shorter showers, etc.
- Never dispose of paper towels, plastics, tissues, greases/oil, paint, feminine hygiene products, or "flushable wipes" into your septic system.
- Make sure downspouts and groundwater sump pumps are not discharging into the septic tank.
- Divert downspouts and groundwater sump pump discharges away from the septic system; especially the secondary system (leach bed, mound, etc.).
- Limit the number of renters at your

• Maintain your system by maintaining pumps, having your septic tank routinely pumped (one every 3-5 years), and have tank lids to grade and easily accessible.

If you suspect that your system may be failing, malfunctioning, or in need of routine servicing you should contact a registered service provider or registered septage hauler. Registered service providers can be found on the Erie County Health Departments website. # Kelleys Island Police Department News







May Waves

Well for some reason some of us feel as if we are in the middle of summer but it has only begun, and we are tired already. In 14 years as an employee for the Village of Kelleys Island I have never seen the Island this busy with day visitors. So hopefully we can get through to Labor Day with only some minor bumps and bruises. In this article I would like to discuss several things going on with your Kelleys Island Police Department (KIPD) including the new tool purchased called the Bolo Wrap, the Memorial Day weekend storm, Celebrate KI event, and the new police levy.

First the Bolo-wrap. Allegations of police excessive force continue to make headlines across the Country. On May 6th, Officer Goldberg and I became instructors for the Bolo Wrap. Only a handful of police departments in Ohio have purchased these tools; we are the only department in Erie County or the surrounding counties

that have taken the initiative to investigate these products. As some departments reevaluate policies and tactics when dealing with suspects, one valley-based company has developed a new tool that it says will keep officers and citizens safe in those unpredictable encounters. The tool sounds like a gun, but it may just be the tool that prevents officers from needing to use them. It is called a Bola Wrap and it is based on the Argentinian bolero, a type of lasso. It is designed with one purpose. "It shoots an eight-foot Kevlar tether that wraps around the suspect and then it restrains them so it can be used very early in a confrontation before it escalates and requires a higher level of force." Wrap Technologies is a Tempe-based company that invented this tool four years ago. Some officers may want to use the Bola Wrap initially instead of handcuffs as officers are able to stay 10 feet away from the subject rather than having to be right next to them. Using the piece

of technology is super easy: it is as simple as attaching the cartridge, turning the safety off, hitting the activation button, and deploying. "You won't see it. It happens in the blink of an eye, then suddenly, it's wrapped around you, and you have this cord, and your mobility is restrained, and you can't move." So far, it is being shipped to more than 30 countries and it is already being used by more than 200 law enforcement agencies nationwide including the Kelleys Island Police Department.

The Kelleys Island Police Department has one Bola Wrap and officers had it available in the field starting Memorial Day weekend. The Department will be doing a demo for the Perry Township Police Department. The department is pleased with it and sees it as another option to de-escalate situations. Acceptance of the tool is growing and is appropriate to use in certain circumstances. This is an invention

that aids law enforcement in doing their jobs safely and effectively for themselves and their communities

themselves and their communities. Second, on May 28th, 2021, during my history on Kelleys Island I have never seen such damage caused by Lake Erie on this island before that weekend. The police department was busy with road closers, down trees, volunteer Fire Department (KIVFD) and Emergency Medical Service (KIEMS) escorting renters and homeowners from East Point Road and Martin Lane. Officers Sorg and Goldberg and I located Woodford & East Point Roads which were underwater. Officers Sorg and Goldberg were placed into immersion suits and entered the water alongside KIVFD and KIEMS. The team escorted at least 10-15 people from their homes. As the Chief of Police, I can say I have never been prouder of our safety services on Kelleys Island that day, especially for my officers.



# **Spring Bird Banding Update**

H. Thomas Bartlett, Research Associate, Cleveland Museum of Natural History

This year, 2021, begins the 26th year of our team's avian research project on Kelleys Island. To recap, the year 2020 was our most productive year in the 25 years of the study. Over 3,500 individual birds of 104 species were banded and 174 of them were northern saw-whet Owls (a record!). So, in early March 2021 we setup the owl nets to see if we could recapture any of the owls from the fall of 2020. In six nights, we managed to capture 12 saw-whets. Four of them received new USGS bird bands but eight of them were birds we banded last fall. It appears that for the winter of 2020-2021 some of the owls stayed on

thought that winter on Kelleys Island would seem like Florida to saw-whet owls?

During March of 2021 we also set up nets at the bird feeders by the state park manager's house for two days. We banded 72 individuals of 11 species. The best bird was a sharp-shinned hawk which was trying to get birds at the feeder. We also recaptured a black-capped chickadee which we originally banded in 2016.

Our normal spring year begins the third week of April and ends the last two weeks of May. We followed this routine again in 2021. In April, we lost one day to snow, almost five inches on Long Point, but we managed to band 104 individuals. Spring migration of 2021 was moving along at a very slow pace, and it continued to be slow well

into May before things opened up.

The third week of May was one of our most productive weeks in 26 years. We banded 804 individuals of 50 species in six days. On Wednesday (May 18) we banded a record 279 individuals of 35 species. Highlights of the day were an alder flycatcher, a white-eyed vireo (a southern species), 17 species of warblers including 15 Tennessee warblers, a Connecticut warbler, 11 mourning warblers, 114 magnolia warblers, 14 bay-breasted warblers, 18 chestnut-sided warblers, 11 Canada warblers, and 11 Wilson's Warblers.

Migration the fourth week of May slowed down but we still managed to

band 248 individuals of 39 species. Highlights included 8 ruby-throated hummingbirds, 55 Yellow-bellied flycatchers, 2 Acadian flycatchers, five great crested flycatchers, and 14 species of warblers. Two of our better finds of the spring were recaptured birds: a chipping sparrow which we banded in 2013, making it a minimum of 9-years-old and an indigo bunting which we banded in 2016, making it a minimum of 6-years-old.

For the spring of 2021 we banded birds for 21 days (17 days for songbirds and six days for owls). We managed to band 1,232 individuals of 66 species making it one of our better spring results. During that time, we banded





our 21,000th individual on the island and are well on our way to the 22,000nd individual this fall.

COVID-19 restrictions were beginning to be lifted and we welcomed some visitors to the banding station. For the first time in over two years, we welcomed the Kelleys Island School students and staff to the station under COVID protocol. They did a great job and had a fun time. It is great to see that many of the older students remember what we do, why we do it, and how to handle birds to be released. It appears that we will be open as usual in the fall but may still require social distancing.


