

As you know, the decision to cancel "Island Fest" for 2021 was made earlier in the year which prompted Jackie Finger, Lisa Klonaris, and a team of volunteers to introduce a new event, Celebrate KI. They successfully pulled off a wonderful weekend including a parade for Islanders and visitors alike. After last year's pandemic with no Island activities, it was great to see everyone out and having fun again. The "Make a Wish" event offered another great weekend including the Poker Run which raised a record of over \$21,000.00. The "Firemen's Steak Roast" and "Homecoming" were also great successes.

Homecoming does signal that time of year when the children will be soon headed back to school and things are winding down here on the Island. INTERNET UPDATE

I've been told that Hancock Wood and Amplex internet service will be surveying utility poles with the understanding they will be bringing fiber-optic high speed internet service to the Island this fall. They wanted the residents to know that their workers will be walking into some backyards, in the right of ways, to look at and take pictures of the poles. There are no announced dates for completion currently. I will keep you apprised as the details come in.

UPCOMING LEVIES

You will be asked to vote on three levies on this November's ballot. They are the General Fund levy, the EMS levy, and the Police levy.

The General Fund levy is a renewal levy that supports the General Fund of the Village. The monies that this levy brings supports the operations of the Village. The funds augment the real estate taxes provided by the county. As a renewal, it does not raise our taxes higher than they were in recent past years.

The EMS levy is comprised of two parts. One part is a renewal levy, and the second part is an increase. The levy will help to maintain medical services for the Village including MetroHealth for our emergency medical and tele-health services and the support of our Village dedicated on-Island EMS Director 7 days a week.

The Police levy is a new levy which will raise taxes and provide \$150,000.00 over a five-year period for the purchase and maintenance of new cruisers, and other safety equipment.

KILA is hosting a Candidates Forum on September 18 at 1:00 p.m. at the Kelleys Island School where questions can be asked about the levies. Please feel free to call me with any questions regarding the levies, or anything with which I can possibly help.

colleagues, and supporters who make camp possible and provide a great experience each year. Nature Camp would not be possible without the support I receive from the Kelleys Island School Board - Cindy Herndon, Deb Haig, Jodie Smith, Tom Beck, and Natasha Makarova-Skeans; administration and staff including Phil Theide, Superintendent, Betty Schwiefert, Treasurer, and Marissa Dowalter, Field Biologist. Our volunteers are also essential to the program including Katie Dean, Amanda O. Loughlin, Emily Beal, Chirs Ashley, Kelleys Island State Park Manager and his crew, and June Campbell, who prepared lunches for the Geology Day. Additional key partners include the Ohio Geological Survey's J.D. Stucker, Assistant Chief, Chuck Salmons, Publications & Educational Outreach Group Supervisor, Mark Peter, Geologist, Devon Goeller, Environmental Specialist, Krista Hardin, Geologist, and Kurtz Miller, OGS Intern, and Erie County Metroparks Michael Hensley, Cheryl Kilmer, Martyn Drabik-Hamshare. The Kelleys Island Audubon Club provided lunches for the Geology Day and camp support. A grant from the Hancock-Wood Electric Corporative Foundation of \$2,587.50 provided funds for Nature Camp Supplies; a Ohio Division of Wildlife \$500.00 Step Outside Grant supported the purchase of fishing supplies; the Jet Express provided ferry boat transportation; and, the Ohio State University's Stone Laboratory offered a tour of Gibraltar Island and helpful staff.



Nature Camp was packed with explorations each day. Erie Metroparks came for a day and led a bird hike, as well as a nice kayaking trip along the northern shore of Kelleys Island for the older campers 9 and 10 years old. We were able to find over 20 species of birds including Yellow-billed Cuckoo, Brown Thrasher, Yellow Warbler, Bald Eagle, and a Cedar Waxwing just to name a few. The Ohio Geological Survey joined camp for a day also. Campers

were able to explore the glacial grooves and went on a fossil hunt in the East Quarry and the northern rocky beach, the fossil hunting did not disappoint anyone. We hiked around the island looking for insects for a day, traveling to the newest pollinator habitats on Kelleys Island. We started at the State Park Campground finding many monarch butterflies and bees, next we went to the Kelleys Island School Pollinator Habitat behind the school finding Hummingbird Moths, many bees, dragonflies, and a variety of butterflies. After that we went to the North Pond Boardwalk Trail finding a variety of dragon and damselflies,



we ended at the largest pollinator habitat located across from the airport observing the many animals benefiting from the habitat. The fishing day took place at the Kelleys Island State Park Alvar. We defiantly caught plenty of fish especially many in the sunfish family, bass, perch, and gobies, we learned about their habitats, and exterior anatomy. The astronomy day focused on the sun, and planets. We made solar bracelets and went on a solar hike with Dr. Jay Reynolds from Cleveland State University.

Nature Camp remains one of the favorite parts of my job at the Kelleys Island Schools Field Station. I look forward to planning and creating the opportunities that make learning about the outdoors as fun and handson as possible. The best part is watching the plan unfold and cherishing the moments with the campers, families, volunteers, and staff

The Nature Camp mission is to Encourage Children's Natural Curiosity of the Outdoors by Engaging Them in Fun and Educational Activities. We appreciate all the help we get in teaching kids about the beautiful islands they live and play on! With the 80 plus kids who participated in Nature Camp this year, we are excited for Nature Camp

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

The summer always seems to go by so quickly, but this 2021 summer seemed busier and more hectic than usual as people tried to make up for lost fun time on the island. That was due to the Coronavirus Covid-19 that stymied a lot of our activities in 2020. Now the mutated variants of Covid-19 (called Delta, etc.) are making their own scary way around our country and around the world. Scientific and medical experts $\frac{1}{2}$ tell us that a good way to slow those diseases down is to get a "jab" or two of vaccine. The old guidelines are in place again,

even though they are not - at this time- officially mandated.

I encourage you to watch reliable news shows carefully to determine what is happening. Stay away from information on social media because you will not hear truth, sometimes not even partial truth, there. Please stay out of crowded places and wear a mask covering your nose and mouth wherever you may be in danger of catching or spreading the disease. Wash your hands frequently with soap and water and, if that is not possible, use sanitizer. These actions can help you stay healthier. Better yet, it can help the whole world stay healthier because there is less chance that you will carry or transmit the pandemic disease to anyone else. The above ideas are my own

so I will take complete responsibility for them.


However, at Zion Church there are some disease guidelines in place that have been handed down from our East Ohio Conference Bishop and her cabinet; these rules have been affirmed by our local church council. Briefly, everyone is always welcome to visit with us when the church is open for worship. You may use any exterior door to enter or exit the church. Currently (mid-August 2021) those adults who are fully vaccinated may come to services without wearing a mask. You MUST wear a mask if you have not been fully vaccinated. (Note that to be fully vaccinated two weeks must have lapsed since you received your final shot.) Children under age 12 or any other children who are not vaccinated should sit with their families in the rear of the church. We wish the children could sit closer to the front but... this location near the rear of the sanctuary provides the best protection that we can provide to any children worshiping with us. Parents, please ask the kids to wear masks just as they

do in school or in other gatherings.
Some other guidelines: During worship we remain in our seats and do not circulate around to greet people. We also do not pass the offering plates and instead ask donors to use offering receptacles outside the sanctuary where multiple people do not touch them. Pads to record attendance are not circulated from one person to another. Join us personally and we will keep you as safe as possible.

Our last request: if you are sick, please do not enter the church at all. Stay at home and join us in worship by listening in live on the phone or computer. The phone number is listed on a poster on the two exterior church doors commonly used from the parking lot.

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


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
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
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KILA 1st Annual Fish Fry

The pavilion was full. Frank of "Frank



GLIA Hires Project Manager, Announces Island Summit Oct. 3-6



Ann Arbor, MI- The Great Lakes Islands Alliance (GLIA), a voluntary, bi-national network of leaders from 15 populated islands in the Great Lakes, has taken a major step forward with the hiring of its first paid employee. Peter Huston, of

Put-in-Bay (South Bass Island), Ohio, was hired as the GLIA Project Manager starting in July 2021. Huston's objective is to further establish the structure of the four-year old alliance, help develop GLIA's communications and programmatic focus areas, and guide its transition into a sustainable entity. Among his first tasks is to help organize the 2021 Great Lakes Islands Summit to be hosted by four Lake Erie islands (Kelleys, Middle Bass, Pelee, and South Bass) from October 3-6. This will be GLIA's fourth regional event.

The two-year position is funded through a generous grant from the Charles Steward Mott Foundation and will be housed at The Stewardship Network, a non-profit organization specializing in collaborative conservation and empowering communities. Lisa Brush, CEO and founder of The Stewardship Network, says "We are thrilled to support the islands and help give a voice to these rural underrepresented communities." Another GLIA partner, Matt Preisser with the State of Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy, welcomed Huston and noted "Peter's background and unique skill set will offer new ways for GLIA to connect the distant island communities. KI Tax Levies on November Ballot

There will be three tax levies on the November Kelleys Island Ballot. KILA is hosting a meeting on September 18th at the Kelleys Island School to discuss the upcoming election.

The first is a renewal levy for the General Fund. The passage of this levy does not increase your real estate taxes since it is a renewal. It is on the ballot as the Village is required by law to obtain your approval every five years.

The second tax levy is for general Emergency Medical Services (EMS) operating expenses. There are two parts to this levy. The first part is a 0.87 mil renewal that will not increase your real estate taxes. The second part is a 0.70 mil increase to provide an additional \$60,000 of annual income for the EMS. The table below shows the tax increase for different property values for this second part.

Appraised Value	Assessed Value (Appraised x 35%	Annual Tax Increase



Do I Really Need All of These Medications?

Pharmacists are experts at eliminating duplicate medications and looking for drug-drug interactions. They can help to answer the question, "Do I really need all of these medications?"

If you are a Medicare Part D consumer and have various health problems, a "Comprehensive Medications Review" (also known as a "CMR") may be exactly what you need. CMR appointments with a pharmacist are available through Firelands Health System (formerly called Firelands Regional Medical Center).

The CMR gives patients facts about the prescription and non-prescription medications being taken. The patient will learn what diseases each pill is designed to manage, what symptoms the drug treats and what are the side effects.

During the CMR the pharmacist will also look for medications that should not be used in combination with one another because it may be harmful — not helpful. This is a common problem in later life if living with variety of health issues. The CMR can also give the doctor useful information as he/she considers discontinuing a medication, changing the dose or the class of drug.

To see if your Part D insurance will cover the cost of a CMR, call Serving Our Seniors 419-624-1856. We can also assist to make your CMR appointment. Patients are encouraged to bring a trusted person to listen with you, while information and instructions are given at the end of the appointment.

For Erie County residents ages 60+, Serving Our Seniors can provide transportation from Marblehead Ferry Service to Firelands Health System for this appointment. We will wait for you and transport you back to Kelleys Island Ferry Service. To arrange for transportation, call Serving Our Seniors at 419-624-1856. An anonymous donation is requested. Any amount is appreciated. If one is unable to donate, they will still receive the ride.

Serving Our Seniors is a geriatric social service funded by the Senior Services Tax Levy, private donations, and grants. It's work is to advocate for Erie County citizens, ages 60+, to maintain their health and functional independence as they grow older in Erie County.

When you read this article, it will be after Labor Day weekend and the light is at the end of the tunnel. If you're a Kelleys Island homeowner or business owner, you'll know what I mean. With the snap of my fingers Summer has come and gone. Because of the Coronavirus, events for the Kelleys Island Police Association have been cancelled in the last two years. Hopefully in 2022, all our events and some new ones that we have discussed will be ready to go.

Regarding events it was nice to get together with KI EMS and KI VFD at Celebrate KI at Memorial Park. We cooked up some hot dogs and hamburgers for the community and did fingerprints for the kids. Future Kelleys Island Police Association event dates will be discussed and voted on later and advised in a later issue in the Kelleys Life paper.



For the summer of 2021, I've never seen in the 14 years as a police officer and Chief of Police this many people on this island. I know the businesses where booming. As for your Kelleys Island Police Department, we enjoyed the smiles and the waves from everyone. I can say with everyone visiting the island we had no major incidents.

Some of the major complaints that we dealt with where open containers, open containers in a motor vehicle (golf carts are M/V), curfew, loud music complaints, prohibition against permitting minor to operate vehicle, underage person shall not purchase intoxicating liquor or beer, misrepresentation by a minor under 21 years (Fake ID's), and restrictions on sale of beer and liquor (Serving Minors). These Kelleys Island ordinances will continue to be enforced and I have listed them for everyone's review if they can't find them online under villagesofkelleysisland.us under the header of Kelleys Island Code of Ordinance.

Some internal issues that have come up through the season were officers leaving as fast as we hired them. Community trust is an established and highly honored relationship between an agency and the citizens it has been

entrusted to serve. It is the key to effective policing, and law enforcement executives bear the primary responsibility for their departments' honesty, integrity, legitimacy, and competence. It's even harder these days to keep officers once they have been hired. In larger departments, 40% are leaving after only five years on the job, the latest PERF survey finds, with 29% of them getting out with the

first year. Since becoming the Chief of Police in 2015 and employed by the Sandusky Police Academy, I would look for officers coming out of the academy. Up until last year, I would hire four to six of these cadets and some would come from resumes they turned in.

Times have now changed with the

bad publicity with officers around the world. No one wants to be a police officer, and more are retiring at a high rate. Now because of this all departments are fighting over the handful of good officers. This is causing problems within your department by keeping up with staffing levels. Our officers are leaving not just for full time jobs but part time jobs that are paying \$20-\$35 hour.

In other news, with the season ending several officers have been attending classes for AED & CPR certification provided by North Central EMS, Datamaster Training through the Ohio Department of Health, updated OVI SFST's training through Maumee PD, & ALICE Training *active school shooter training. The ALICE training, this class will be instructed by me at the K1-12 Kelleys Island School and will include KIEMS & KIVFD. Some training that will be required for 2022.

On Monday, August 16, 2021, there was a special Ohio Peace Officers Training Commission (OPOTC) meeting regarding the proposed mandatory CPT topics for the 2022 year. Sheriff Michael Heldman, sub-committee chairperson, discussed his committees report and relayed the following subjects which were proposed for 2022 CPT, all officers

will attend these classes and these subjects are:

- 24 mandatory hours
- Diversity, Equity and Inclusion MANDATORY - 4 hours
- Use of force (scenario driven)-4 hrsResponse to Sexual Assault calls-
- for-service 4 hours
 Response to Mental Health calls-
- for-service 4 hours
 Response to Domestic Violence calls-for-service (CPO & TPO issues included) 4 hours
 - Legal updates 4 hours
- Officer health and wellness-4 hrs Lastly, on November's ballot the Kelleys Island Police Department will have a tax levy at 0.36 mils for police vehicles and equipment that will provide \$30,000 of annual income for the purchase and maintenance of new police cruisers, and other safety equipment for the next 5 years. On September 18th, 2021, at 1:00 p.m. I will be attending KILA's candidate's forum at Kelleys Island School to discuss the levy and provide any additional information or questions you may have.


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Audubon Happenings
