### William S. Webb family donates Civil War correspondence—

#### An ongoing series of the KIHA Newsletter

Through the generosity of family members of William S. Webb, we were given transcripts of letters that Mr. Webb wrote to his family during his 100 days service in The Civil War. Since the Kelleys Island men left as a company from the island, they, initially at least, stayed together and thus Mr. Webb's letters sometimes include mention of other islanders who were also fighting. It is not often that a person has the opportunity to relive history.

William S. Webb was married to **Elizabeth Kelley** and three children—**Sarah**, **Isabelle** and **Charles**. In 1860, William S. Webb is listed on the Census as a stone mason earning \$8,000 a year.

William S. Webb went to war in 1864 and he wrote letters home to his family on Kelleys Island. Captain Webb's daughter Sarah copied his letters into a notebook. William D. Webb is the great-grandson of this Kelleys Island Civil War soldier and his grand-daughter, Katia Duey, transcribed the letters from the notebook. Katia Duey is currently attending Temple University. We sincerely thank the William D. Webb family for their interest in their own family history and that of Kelleys Island—and for the opportunity they have given the Kelleys Island Historical Association to share this wonderful story.

William S. Webb was first stationed at **Johnson's Island** in **Sandusky Bay**, along with other Kelleys Island soldiers.

#### No. 18 In Camp, Point of Rocks, Va. July 4th, 1864 Monday one o'C P.M. My Dear Wife & Children, Sarah, Belle & Charlie

...I this morning wrote to Mrs. [Marcella] Mitchell in relation to her husband's death. Poor woman! How my heart bleeds for her and I much fear the effects of the news upon her. I had in my previous letter ... given the circumstances of his sickness up to the moment when Oscar Titus came down and informed me that he was worse, and my immediately sending Mr. Worden and W.D. Kelley up to take care of him. Mr. Worden returned within one hour and announced the sad and unlooked for intelligence of his death. I requested Mr. Holbrook to go immediately up to the Post Hospital, learn what he could ... in order to have the body embalmed and sent home for burial, while I could look up the Colonel, and get the necessary papers enabling to go to such places as I might find necessary for the purpose. Having obtained these I started with Mr. Worden for the Hospital, met Mr. Holbrook returning with all information necessary, sent Mr. Worden back with a line to the Col. Asking a loan of some funds in case I should be short and proceeded to the Hospital. After three or four hours delay we finally succeeded in getting an Ambulance and I detailed Holbrook and W.D. Kelley to proceed to Bermuda (Landing), get the body embalmed and forwarded by express, giving them my pass... They left the Hospital about 9 o'C P.M., were successful in the objects of their mission and the express charges \$50 making \$80, the telegraph dispatch was sent unpaid.

You can obtain full particulars other than I have given from Wm.'s letter to Marcella, which will precede this several days. The loss of **Charley** was a terrible blow to myself and all the Co. I could see nothing but the image of his poor wife and little orphan child, my feelings were uncontrollable...

My expenses having been heavy I telegraphed **Alfred** [Kelley] to send me by express \$150. I borrowed \$30 off the Col.,

which I wish to repay immediately. No one here has any currency, all being out. I am not out but do not want to be. I suppose Alfred will have sent the money before this reaches you.

My dispatch was sent clear through the lines, (Telegraph) being continuous and connected from here Via City Point Fortress Monroe and Washington to Sandusky. Was told by the operator that a dispatch would be sent from here (Bermuda Hundred) to Sandusky in two hours. Mr. Holbrook wrote Mrs. Mitchell a full and, of course, accurate description of everything relating to Charlie's sickness and death. You will perhaps see it: Wm. Also wrote Marcella.

Today (being 4th July) an order was issued for national salute by all guns in the Army of the Potomac. Our Batteries here have blazed away their part of the programme and all is again quiet.

Last night while on duty at the Breastworks we could distinctly hear singing within the Rebel lines. We ascertained from our outer pickets that the Rebel singing came up as distinctly to us on the Breastworks as we have often heard it at our house from the **Town Hall** on a still evening. The Colonel and myself listened to them (seated on a pile of sandbags on the works) for a good half hour or more...

The identical tree is here (or said to be the one) under which **John Smith** was laid for execution by **Powhattan** at the time **Pocahontas** saved his life. It is a large oak, though it is going fast as all the Boys are getting pieces of it as relics. Whether the identical tree or not, it is the spot where that occurrence is said to have taken place, and is rendered historical by that story: It is about half a mile from our camp. I have not been there but have a piece of the wood from the tree given me by **Charley Kelley**.

I have written you today  $\dots$  because I have the time and to keep up the "line of communication" whenever I have an opportunity.  $\dots$ 

You do not mention my letters to **Sarah, Belle & Charlie**, and I think the one last rec'd from me must have been about the 17th or 18th of June. I can imagine Charlie's supreme happiness in the possession of his boat and am very glad to learn that you complied with his request. But Oh! How my sympathies were excited by your mention of **Carrie Mitchell** at the moment I was reading your remarks about her, the remains of her Father were lying at Bermuda awaiting conveyance to his once happy home.

It is quite singular that my health remains so good. I have not been sick an hour (save from my eyes) and during all the term of heat we have passed here have as yet had no headache. I attribute both to my diet, the plain course fare on which we live. The only things I miss are vegetables. This morning I was the only commissioned Officer of my Co. reported fit for duty. Lange being sick and Bristol not having done a week's duty altogether since leaving Johnson's Island. Of my Serg'ts only Erastus [Huntington] was on hand, none very sick, only just enough out of sorts, not to want to do anything.

Lange was quite unwell for a week or more [and] is much better now but I shall keep him off duty a day or two yet.

...And now dear ones, write regularly...our Boys are all well...comparatively...No shells flying. Nobody in danger, except from overeating perhaps... and finally no news.

I am as ever your Aff. Father & Husband Wm. S. Webb

Landscape work was done when weather permitted on July 7th through the 10th with eight men carefully hand carrying the thousand pound granite bench to its new permanent location.




