in the church. The program was open to the public and featured Kamille Allen, who gave a presentation titled, "Teaching Experiences at North Bass Island "

Mrs. Allen had taught in a one room school at North Bass for five years in the 1980s. She lived in Lakeside and flew daily to the island during the school year. The students would listen for the plane and would leave for school when they heard it coming. With slides, she described some of the many interesting activities that she was able to do with her multi-age students. She was also able to take the small group of students on many field trips to museums and events on the mainland.

The weather the day of the meeting was great. It was a memorable experience that the KIHA Board plans to repeat in future years.

William S.Webb family donates Civil War correspondence— An ongoing series of the KIHA Newsletter

Through the generosity of family members of **William S. Webb**, we were given transcripts of letters that Mr. Webb wrote to his family during his 100 days service in The Civil War. Since the Kelleys Island men left as a company from the island, they, initially at least, stayed together and thus Mr. Webb's letters sometimes include mention of other islanders who were also fighting. It is not often that a person has the opportunity to relive history this up close and personally.

William S. Webb was married to Elizabeth Kelley and had three children—Sarah, Isabelle and Charles. In 1860, William S. Webb is listed on the Census as a stone mason earning \$8,000 a year.

William S. Webb went to war in 1864 and he wrote letters home to his family on Kelleys Island. Captain Webb's daughter Sarah copied his letters into a notebook. William D. Webb is the great-grandson of this Kelleys Island Civil War soldier and his grand-daughter, Katia Duey, transcribed the letters from the notebook. We sincerely thank the William D. Webb family for their interest in their own family history and that of Kelleys Island—and for the opportunity they have given KIHA to share this wonderful story.

William S. Webb was first stationed at **Johnson's Island** in **Sandusky Bay**, along with other Kelleys Island soldiers, but has been serving in Point of Rocks, Va. For several weeks.

No. 26 In Camp Pt. of Rocks, Va.

Thursday morning, July 14th, 1864 (continued from last newsletter)

...The Post Master has just returned but with no mail, the mail boat not being in. He, however, brings the report that the Rebels have <u>taken</u> Baltimore and were at last advices within <u>three</u> miles of Washington tearing up the track. Our Colonel says that if this is true they will be badly used up. [Nathaniel T.] Banks 19th Army Corps 18,000 strong left Fortress Monroe on Sunday and must have been in Washington on Monday, also 6,000 of the 6th Army Corps. [Richard S.] Ewell must have around him 75,000 men of our army and if Grant is correct in what he told [J. M.] Ashley, Ewell must be totally used up.

There is no mail and no Express today, so my 150 dollars is somewhere else besides here. How true these reports are, you by this time are far better posted than we are. As for us we must bide the course of events.

It looks now as if the **O.N.G.'s** [Ohio National Guard] that found the "soft places" around Washington will have an opportunity of being in the "Front" yet as well as ourselves and not so well situated either. Grant's programme for Ewell as laid down to Ashley seems to be by these reports being carried out so far. If so and if carried out <u>entirely</u> will result most gloriously to our cause, but it's useless for me to speculate on such crude reports as we have yet. **Gen.** [Benjamin **Franklin] Butler** at Headquarters must know something and we will perhaps before long.

I am sorry that more of your letters had not got through and am particularly disappointed this morning as I had fully anticipated one or more letters. Well this is the first time since our being here that the mail boat has failed and I suppose we should not complain... I know you fully understand how much I appreciate your letters from "Home" and how very necessary they are to me, to my happiness and comfort. I learn by **George Wait** that his Grandmothers wrote him that the **North Side School** was broken up the 18th of June in consequence of the Scarlet fever being on the island but as your letters as late as July 6th make no mention of it and as you speak of the picnic on the 4th and also as no other letters rec'd here from the island say anything about it, I am inclined to think there must be some mistake about it. I most fervently hope that it is a mistake though I know full well that our children would be well taken care of. I presume the Island House must be pretty well filled up though I should think of the gaiety of that institution would ill comport with feelings of the people of the island at this present time.

Our Boys who were on guard at the Depot Hospital have just come in. They report that last evening **Miss** [Clara] **Barton** again sent out to them for supper rations a plentiful supply of such articles as she has in her stores. Truly she is making good her assertion that she "feels a deep interest in that little band from Kelley's Island." My sad introduction to her on the occasion of the sickness of **Charley Mitchell** has resulted in no little good to that "little band."

She informed Mr. [Martin K.] Holbrook (who was "Corporal of the Guard") that she should go to Washington with a boat load of the sick to see that they had proper care on the journey. I shall regret her departure and the sick in the Hospital will miss her much. It may perhaps be thought that my letters refer to Miss Barton very often, more so than might be in good taste but place one in my position with my best men lying on the bed in sickness, far from home and friends and kindred, fated to die there in a strange land with no hand of Wife. Mother or Sister to soothe with loving touch the burning brow or aching head, and let one step in with no feeling of relationship, no motive save that natural feeling of woman's heart, the wish to minister to the suffering and take the place of another as did Miss Barton in the cases of Charley Mitchell and Jackson Eldred, and that man must have a heart of stone indeed who could refuse of neglect to acknowledge those services thus rendered in his hour of sadness and trial.

Oh my dear Wife, **Mrs. Mitchell** and **Mrs. Eldred** can never know the depth of obligation which they are under to this Lady. For my part I have tried to make my acknowledgements to her, but with modesty equal only to her self sacrificing devotion she disclaims being entitled to any thanks or praise for doing what she calls her "duty."

However, that may be no one of that "little band of Kelley's Island" (I can at least speak for one of them) can ever forget her, nor will it be their fault if the name of Clara Barton be not engraved on the heart of every resident of our dear Island home who has a friend or relative in the ranks of that "band." Today as usual is warm in the sun but the almost invariable breeze which blows through the day makes it very comfortable in the shade, and our boys are now all in camp for the first time in several weeks. I have done no duty for several days, as I did not think it judicious to expose myself to the heat of the sun and the night air while feeling weak and debilitated. I can now eat any kind of vegetable having today partaken of boiled turnip, onions and squashes. The two latter you know I never touch at home.

The day of **[Jackson] Eldred's** death was intensely hot, though by obtaining the Surgeon's horse I was enabled to get up there, but of course was around in the sun from the time I got there until his burial. Upon my return to camp I was quite worn out, but not being placed on duty have got quite up again, though I shall stay off duty until I think I am capable of going on duty without injury to myself.

All is quiet at Petersburgh today. Night before last there was heavy musketry firing for half the night or more, very plainly heard at camp; when the wind is in the right direction it brings the smoke of the cannonading up to our camp, and the smell of powder here is very often full as strong as is pleasant.

We can hear every shot fired at Petersburgh on our left, on our centre which is not two miles from us, and on our right at the James River from the Batteries and Monitors there. So that not an hour passes but the report of guns from one direction or the other is heard here. The signal Station has been very quiet for several days past. Yesterday however it was talking by signals (colored flags) quite vociferously for two hours or more.

We'll continue with this letter of July 14, 1864, in our Winter Newsletter.
