BETH RYBUS - On old milk can.

He was a building contractor and had a carpenter shop. Postcard photograph of Herbert James Selfe September 1910. B&W photo of unidentified boat with smokestack and very old cars. Book – The Life and Public Services of Hon. Abraham Lincoln published in 1860. Another book – Sketches and Stories of the Lake Erie Islands, Perry Centennial Edition 1813-1913.

TERI BETZENHEIMER-BEHRENDS - February 1984 issue of the Ohio magazine that has a nice long article on page 18: "A Wing and a Prayer – Father John Sherbno ministers to the people of the Lake Erie islands. He Flies, they wait" by Sue Gorisek. His insights are unguarded as he offers observations about the Islanders he serves. A photograph of Alice (Seeholzer) Olwill in a bathing suit taken in the mid 1950's THE LAKE CO. HISTORICAL SOCIETY donated a Statement of Condition card, January 1, 1904, for the Kelley (sic) Island Lime & Transport Co.

SHELLEY STEIN donated a glass plate negative and a photograph developed from the plate of the Kelley's Island Wine Co. building (incorporated in 1866 and built in 1871).

ROGER WILLIAMS - Five letters written by his grandfather, Norman Hills, on St. Patricks Day, 1944 until May 9, 1955, to his father Roger Williams Sr. who was a Captain in the Army Air Force in England at the time, preparing for D-Day. Norman's letters simply provided a view of KI in those days.

KEVIN WITCHER - A collection of maritime photos including photos of his great-grandfather, Henry Witcher who was one of the captains of the steam paddle ship the *Boeckling*.

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LIVING IN THE PARSONAGE HOUSE, by Teri Behrends

Since the parsonage was been turned into a resale shop last year, we have had so many questions about what it was like to live in the house. My grandparents rented the home from the German Reform Church after they were married, and my dad and his brothers and sister were born in the house. Grandma raised five children with no running water and an outhouse. Think about trying to potty train your children that way.

The house has always had electric, but it has never had running water. There is a hand pump in the kitchen that pumped water from the cistern under the house. It was great in the summer when you had been outside playing or working, and you came in and got a glass of very cold water from the pump. However, in the winter that very cold water, was very cold. All the water had to be heated on the stove. For example, after dinner, water was heated to



wash the dishes. There were two pans put on the kitchen table, one for washing, and one for rinsing. There was a wringer washing machine and the water also had to be heated to wash the clothes. To empty the washer you put a hose out the window. In the summer the water was not wasted, but used to water the plants and garden. Clothes were put on a drying rack in the dining room by the stove to dry. To bathe, you also had to heat the water, take the hot pan of water into the pantry and bathe. In the summer, the boys enjoyed bathing in the quarry at the "cut" where girls were not allowed. Also with no water, there was no bathroom, and the outhouse in the winter was an extremely cold place. During the winter months there was a chamber pot that could be used so you didn't have to go outside, but that had to be taken to the outhouse in the morning and cleaned.

The house was heated by a fuel oil stove that sat in the dining room. There is no duct work, so that supplied the only heat. There was a register cut into the floor above the stove and that was how the upstairs received heat. One summer my grandmother fell and broke her leg while she was hanging clothes on the line to dry. They put her on the airplane and an ambulance met her in Sandusky at the airport to transport her to the hospital. It was the only time she was off Kelleys Island until she passed. She had many stories about her first airplane ride and her one trip to the "mainland."

REPAIRS AT THE PARSONAGE

While we are on the subject of the house, the Parsonage Resale Shop is doing really well with people dropping off donations almost daily and sales flying out the door. All the proceeds from this shop get rolled back into making repairs to the building. Look what we have accomplished.

The Ceiling - Last year we finally got the roof repaired so it would not leak. That leak caused quite a bit of damage to the inside plaster. A wonderful man stepped forward and repaired the damaged ceiling and corner in the upstairs hall at the Parsonage. This was not an easy job. Thin layers of plaster had to be applied to the lath strips to build up to the level of the old plaster on the walls. It took several weeks of daily visits to accomplish this. All this work and we can't even thank him publically because he wants to remain anonymous.

The Floor – Ray Shaeffer just completed the work on the kitchen floor hole. Until recently the hole in the floor over the cistern had been covered with a sheet of plywood.

Electricity – We now have electricity in the building. This required the installation of a new service line and breaker box and a couple of electric outlets. This will make our great volunteers very happy. Much of this cost was offset by our savings when we disconnected the electricity three years ago (to avoid paying the monthly service charge since no one was using electricity).

The Stairway – Wow, our thanks to Jodie Smith who had new spindles custom made to match. They should be installed shortly. After years of neglect, this house is finally becoming a very happy place with its new look and occupants. Every old building deserves a second chance.

Allow us to paraphrase: When we walk these roads, we follow in the steps of the Island's ancestors, and that is an honor and a privilege. And it is an honor and a privilege for <u>this</u> organization to preserve this history and tell this Island's story.
