Council To Consider New Fees

Councilman Chuck Herdon proposed several variations of new fees for raising additional revenue for the general fund. He reported that the general fund will be about \$25,000 short of what will be needed to cover known obligations.

One of the proposals he advanced for consideration was the imposition of a vehicle road use fee for the island. Under the proposal, all cars on the island, both resident's and visitor's, would have to display an annual use permit purchased from the village. He suggested considering a fee structure that would assess cars \$5, \$10 for trucks and heavy trucks \$25. The fee would be assessed on all vehicles operating on the island.

As an alternative method of generating revenue, he said a "head tax" could be imposed on all people arriving on the island, presumably by water transportation companies, as well as having marinas collect the fee.. The fee would be in the range of \$.50. He conceded there might be a constitutional question with this proposal, but urged fellow councilmen and citizens alike to offer alternative means of generating revenue for the village.

He also brought up for consideration the possibility of raising the taxrate for the island excise tax from the present 1% to 1-1/2%, its current allowable maximum. The Council could not authorize that raise, as it would take action by the Island Taxing authority. The Island Taxing Authority is composed of three councilmen.(Herdon, Martin and Gruly).

The \$25,000 estimated

Caddy Shack Opens

The Caddy Shack finally went into full operation during the week of June 17 with the transfer of the liquor license and the granting of a conditional use certificate from the Village Council. The conditional zoning was required because the current ordinance does not provide for the establishment of new drinking establishments in the commercial district. Along with the zoning certificate came some specifications. First, it was specified that the drinking establishments boundaries be same as the building for which the conditional zoning was given. This precludes any drinking outside the building and patio area thus forbidding drinking in the miniature golf area of the premises. There are to be signs erected indicating where the off-street parking areas are, and railings are to put around the porch/patio area to restrain people from wandering off the patio with drinks.

The building still has some finishing touches to be added, but the airconditioning was in operation for the Saturday evening, June 29.

Master Plan To Be Presented

The Master Plan for the island, funded by a grant from the Ohio Department of Transportation, being developed jointly by the Village Planning Commission and the Poggemeyer Design Group is nearing completion. The rough draft of the study is to be presented at the July 12 Planning Commission meeting, with a public hearing to be held in the near future, probably in August.

Elements of the plan will include an analysis of current land use patterns and recommendations for future land use regulations, a draft of a shoreline zoning ordinance, identification of sensitive area such as flood plain, wetlands, erosion area, measures to protect endangered species of plant and wildlife, preservation of historically important sites, and suggestions for water transportation related issues. This will all center around managing growth and change on the island.

In preparation for detailed presentation and analysis of this material as it becomes available, the map in this issue shows current zoning classifications and districts on the island, as well as major public land holdings. Also included in this issue are feature stories on the role and duties of the Planning Commission, a synopsis of the draft shoreline zoning ordinance, and a look at some of the elements of the current zoning ordinance.

Village Gets \$8,000 Grant

The Village received an \$8,000 grant for the airport waiting room building from The Erie County Regional Planning Commission. The grant has no matching fund requirements, as do most other grants.

This grant will compliment the airport runway widening grant and allow for relocation of the small waiting room building for expanded tarmac area for planes.

The plans for the project should be submitted to the State for approval in about three weeks, or as soon as possible after the County Engineer approves drainage plans for the runway.

The source of the funds is a block grant provided under the Federal Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 and the grant to Kelleys is one of a number of county wide projects being done with the block grant.

Zoning Issues Abound

Because of the July Fourth holiday several changes in the schedule of the zoning inspector and the Board of Zoning Review have been announced. Jack Terry, zoning inspector, will hold regular hours next Saturday at the Municipal Building on Addison Road from 9-11. The zoning board of review will not meet that morning so no formal review of plans can

shortfall is due in part to the shortage of funds to cover the sidewalk payments. The largest single assessment for the sidewalks was given to the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, which has yet to pay the amount the Village says is due. A meeting is supposed to be scheduled for the week of July 10 to discuss the matter with the ODNR. Apparently Jim McKeen, Erie County Auditor, Lee McDermond, the Village Solicitor, Mayor McCullagh, representatives of the Council will meet next week with State Representative Fred Deering, State Senator Betty Montgomery, and ODNR representatives to attempt to resolve the impasse.

Another portion of the additional revenue is needed to cover an \$8,000 addition mistake recently discovered.

No detailed discussion of the suggestions was conducted at the meeting on the recommendation of the mayor that it be considered at the next meeting in two weeks, since a full scale discussion could not take place in the absence of having realistic estimates of the amount of revenue each proposal would produce. Herdon replied that he didn't want to spend a lot of time preparing estimates if there was no sense of Council that they would support the initiation of the fees. Presumably it will be discussed at the next Council meeting.

Pay Raises

The Council at its regular meeting passed several ordinances granting pay increases to various village officials and employees.

Ordinance 556, passed as an emergency ordinance, increases the pay for the Village Clerk to \$8.50/hour for that time worked in excess of the required 25 hours per week.

Ordinance 557 increased the pay for the volunteer firemen as follows: Chief from \$200/year to \$300/year; Assistant Chief from \$100/year to \$150/year; Captain and Lieutenant from \$50/year to \$100; Volunteer from \$1 to \$2 for attendance.

Council To Meet Twice A Month

The village council voted to hold twice-a-month meetings during the months of July and August. The July meetings will be July 11 and July 25, while the meetings in August will be the 8th and 22nd.

Have you Got 25 Friends?

Signature requirements for nominating petitions for the November elections have changed since the last general elections. Village officials up for election this November consist of the office of Mayor and two Council seats.

The nomination of candidates for election as officers of a village having a population of less than 2,000 can only be done by petitions, unless a majority of the electors petition for a primary election. Under a new law which took effect in January, 1990, the signature requirement for submission of a petition is changed to require the signatures of 25 qualified electors. The old version of the law required the petition to be signed by not less than ten qualified voters or one percent of the number of electors who voted for governor in the previous election, whichever was greater.

Petitions must be filed with the County Board of Elections not later than four p.m. of the 75th day prior to the election, or August 22 this year. Another interesting provision of the statute is "no such nominating petition shall be accepted for filing if it appears to contain signatures aggregating in number more than three times the minimum number of signatures required..." It's not good to have too many friends apparently.

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Don't Miss the Boat

The cruise ship M/V City of Sandusky has been the source of several recent complaints by islanders and some stranded passengers. The boat makes daily trips to the Lake Erie islands from Sandusky, but also returns on Friday nights to bring visitors for a 3 hour stopover from 9-12.

Twice last season the boat was given citations for violating the Village's noise ordinance. An out of court settlement was reached over the winter months which called for certain actions to be taken by the boat during its evening runs. The boat's horn was relocated to the rear of the vessel and the use of the horn was restricted to sounding of a departure signal as it left the dock. This was instead of blowing several blasts to alert passengers of its

scheduled departure. Another provision of the settlement restricted the playing of music aboard the boat until it had been underway for 10 minutes.

Several residents of the downtown area complained that the 10 minute covenant has not been obeyed. On the other side of the issues are the complaints from passengers left stranded on the island by what they feel was inadequate warning of the boats departure. Reports indicated that about 12 passengers were left behind the night of June 21. On the evening of June 28, approximately the same number of passengers, including several with ties to the island who had come aboard the vessel, were left behind as the boat pulled out precisely at its scheduled departure time of midnight.

One stranded passenger on the evening of the 28th stripped to his shorts and

dove in the water in an apparent attempt to catch up with the City of Sandusky. Another enterprising boater on the scene was offering stranded passengers rides back to Sandusky at \$10 per person.

The MV Goodtime I was at the island on Saturday night and apparently had no problems, although it was much more lightly loaded with a reported 55 passengers.

Police Department Doubles

Two new part time officers were added to the police department in the last week, according to police chief Ron Schnittker.

Officer Ron Covet has

been hired as a partime patrolman, while Eric Shiffler has been hired as patrolman, dispatcher, and clerk of Mayor's Court. These appointments are subject to confirmation by the Village Council at the next regular meeting. This brings the patrolman force available partime to three, including Jim Hobby who was hired several weeks ago.

In other news, the repeater relay antenna scheduled for installation on the 25 of June was hooked up, but reception on the radio/telephone is such that it is of no practical use. Apparently the coverage area for the radio is in the vicinity of one-quarter to one-half mile. The subject had been brought up at the last Council meeting where Schnittker requested \$2097 to purchase new radios. No funds have been set aside for capital improvements for the police department so the Council couldn't approve the request.

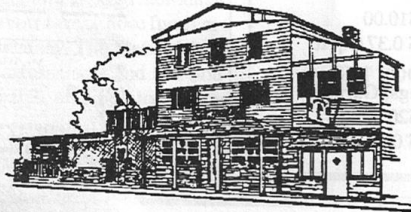

be made.

The following week, the zoning inspector will be available on Friday, July 12 after the Planning Commission meeting with the Poggemeyer Group to cover the rough draft of the Master Plan. The zoning review board will also meet after the Planning Commission meeting. It is anticipated that the Planning meeting will last until about 11:00.

The weekend of June 28th to the 30th was rather active for Terry. He served his first notice of zoning violation to the vehicle junk yard on Woodford road. The alleged violation is the storage of inoperable vehicles (specifically buses and other vehicles outside the fenced area) not under cover in violation of Section 404-4 (f) of the zoning ordinance (ordinance 303) which deals with "Inoperable Equipment." If the violation is not taken care of in 30 days, non-compliance could result in conviction of a misdemeanor with a fine of not less than \$25 and not more than \$500 for each day the violation continues.

In other actions, he sought to enforce the 100 foot buffer area requirement for quarrying operations at the Kellstone Quarry. The zoning regulations for the quarry district state (Section 501-3 (b)) "Production or quarrying of principle product or operation of accessory plants, shall not be permitted less than one hundred (100) feet from a residential district or public right-of-way, excepting use of conveyor under road." Allegedly, loose stone was being removed from within the buffer zone.

There have been numerous projects done on the island without the issuance of a building permit, notably the construction of decks without permits. All residential and commercial structures, any additions or alterations, decks, docks, out buildings and garages must receive a building permit prior to construction. Requirements for receiving the permit vary with the scope of the work, but information can be obtained from Jack Terry on Saturdays from 9-11 except as noted above.

Hancock-Wood Electric Cooperative hosted an open house for its customers in the afternoon, with pop and hotdogs for all, and each family received a canvas tote bag as a gift. It was a well-attended event, and there were hints of other good news coming from Hancock-Wood in the next few weeks.

Island Taxing District Update

The topic of Island business taxes was again in the news with the release of the names of island businesses who are delinquent by Erie County Treasurer Beverly Pressler. The release of the names was done with the acquiescence of the Village Council and the approval of Assistant County prosecutor Ann Giesler.

The Island tax issue is also the subject of a bill introduced in Ohio House of Representatives by State Representative Fred Deering.

The legislation allowing the formation of "Island Taxing Districts" went into effect in June of 1983. Its application was intended to be limited, which is evidenced by the definition of an "island" as meaning "an island that is not connected to the mainland by a highway or bridge".

Its purpose was to raise money for the general funds of the islands by imposing a "tax upon the privilege of engaging in the business of making sales on the island." A companion piece of legislation allows the tax to be imposed on water transportation companies, such as ferries and cruise boats, that engage in business with the island. The amount of the tax can be one-half, one, or one and one-half percent and is determined by the island taxing authority. The island taxing authority on Kelleys is composed of three members of the Council, and the currently acting members are Jake Martin, Bob Gruly and

Chuck Herndon.

The tax on water transportation companies is based on 90 percent of their eligible revenue, but is to be levied on 100 percent of all other business' revenue.

The burden of administering the tax has been assigned by law to the treasurer of the county where the island is located. State Representative Fred Deering has introduced legislation, HB377, to allow modification of the method of administering the reporting and collection of the tax. The bill was passed by the House on June 13 by a vote of 93-0. It now goes to the State Senate but no action is expected until the fall because of the spring recess.

HB 377 will allow, but not require, the taxing authority of the island taxing district to appoint a fiscal agent in lieu of the County treasurer to handle the administration. The wording of the proposed bill is as follows: "At any time, the taxing authority of an island taxing district may appoint as the district's fiscal officer the city auditor or village clerk in the case of a municipal corporation, or the township clerk in the case of a township.... If the taxing authority does not so appoint a fiscal officer, the county treasurer of the county in which the island taxing is located shall be the fiscal officer."

Practice Makes Perfect?

Marblehead is expected to approve shortly the formation of a Planning Commission for the village. That will be the first step in formulating a waterfront development plan.

Events include a fishing tournament on Saturday morning and a nautical scavenger hunt around the island Saturday afternoon from 1-4. The evening will feature a cookout and an awards presentation for winners of the fishing tournament and scavenger hunt.

Each participant will be given a "goody bag" of items donated by island merchants and businesses.

Tour of Homes on Again

Visitors to Kelleys Island will once again be treated to a tour of homes on 4th of July weekend. The earlier tour, hosted by the KI Historical Association, was cancelled due to conflicts with the holiday weekend, but the Chamber of Commerce has agreed to pick up the tour this year, so as not to disappoint the visitors who plan on it as a part of their weekend. This change in sponsorship, for this year only, was necessary because the tour had been advertised in 85,000 Fun Finders and in a variety of magazine articles, and it was just too late for the Chamber of Commerce to retract the notice of the tour. The Chamber thought it would generate bad publicity to not provide alternative homes.

At press time, three homes had confirmed for the tour, and Sandy Kilko, Chamber Director, is hoping to add a fourth home. So far, the tour will include Kelleys Mansion, the Seeholzer home, and the South Shore. Cost for the tour will be \$4 for 3 homes (or \$5 for 4 homes, if another is added), with an additional charge of \$1 for a tram ride between homes. Homes on the tour will be identified by big red, white, and blue ribbons by the sidewalk, and tickets are available at the Chamber booth next to Popeye's. The tour will be held on Saturday, July 6, between 1 and 4 PM.

In the article on the Kelleys Island Ball Team there was an error of commission and an error of omission. First in the

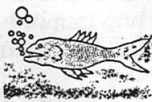


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Sparkling Opener for Diamond Girls
