## Two Drop From Mayors Race

### Voter Roster Jumps 14%

The contest for Mayor of the Island lost two candidates over the last several weeks. Ted Terry and Kyle Paine have announced their intentions to withdraw from seeking the office of Mayor. Both individuals indicated that one of the reasons they entered the contest was the appearance in mid-August that there would only be one candidate running for Mayor (Don Haas). Kyle explained his position in a letter to the Perchie Press (see box).

The pace of campaigning has accelerated for the other candidates. Buttons and letters and ads are floating throughout the Village. The candidates forum on October 12 was very polite and low-key, as was the Council Meeting of October 10 as candidates abide by pre-election politeness.

The candidates forum, sponsored by the Landowners Association, was attended by over 100 people, who asked few questions.

The roster of voters took a 14% jump from the end of August to the close of registration, increasing by 46 individuals from 319 to 365. No challenges have been reported, but the Board of Election took the preemptive action of denying registration to five individuals who had been previously removed. The five - Karen Baker, Gary, Deborah Phillips, Mike and Jim Seeholzer - were challenged and removed in 1985. Chris Seeholzer was denied as a new applicant. The current roster contains numerous individuals also removed in 1985, but who have subsequently re-registered. The Board of Elections would make no comment on the

## Popeye's Robbed

Popeye's Gifts was burglarized the evening of October 15. Entrance was gained to the building from a rear window. About \$500 in cash and merchandise was taken, according to Village Police Chief Ron Schnittker.

This is the second robbery of Island business in less than a month. On September 20, the Porthole was broken into and robbed. An employee, Ernest R. Dennison, was apprehended in that crime and he is awaiting trial.

## Boat Cancelled

Neuman Boat Line has cancelled the special late ferry trip to the Island on Friday night. The ferry left Marblehead at 8:30.

Construction on the 269 exit off of Route 2 prompted institution of the special trip to accommodate travelers delayed by the construction. However, the demand for the trip has diminished to the point where the service has been canceled.

The boat will leave Kelleys at 9:30 AM and free transportation will be provided to the Mall and Factory Outlet locations. Departure from Sandusky is at 7:00PM. 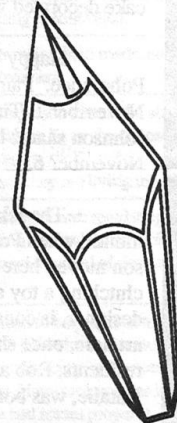

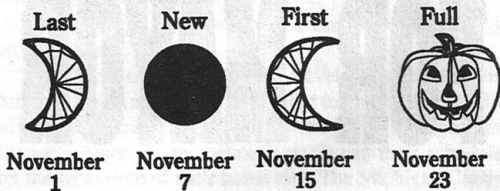

## THE BEGINNING OF STANDARD TIME

When the clocks are changed on Sunday to mark the end of Daylight Savings Time and the return to Standard Time, spend that extra hour imagining a world without standard time. Perhaps a few on the island can remember when standard time wasn't a legal requirement, but none will be able to remember when it wasn't generally practiced.

Any traveler knows the confusion of coping with crossing time zones. Recent years have even given a name to an ailment that proposes the changing of time zones disturbs the circadian rhythm. That of course is "jet lag." Arrivals and departures are commonly listed in schedules according to "local time." The puzzling arithmetic of figuring out how long an airline flight takes always begins with the question - "How many hours difference is there between here and Salt Lake City?" and then adjusting the equation accordingly. That simple problem is often enough to frustrate even the amateur mathematician among us.

But venture back 108 years ago when there was no such thing as Standard Time. Time keeping of the day was based on local "sun time," which was based on the transit of the sun through the middle of the sky. "High noon", as it was called, varied from place to place as did the time for each locality. Even this arrangement presented problems, for the time of high noon on the eastern fringe of Chicago varies by 67 seconds from the time of high noon on the western side. Many smaller cities adopted the local time of larger cities in the region, but that was of small benefit to the traveler or the provider of transportation of the day, the

There are some things I would like to see included in future issues:

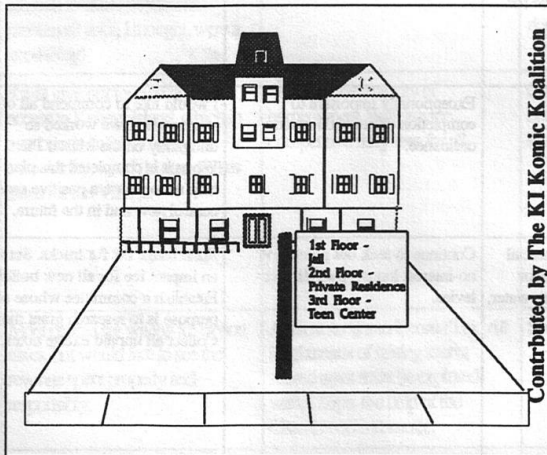

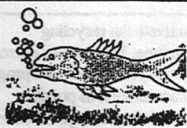

railroads. The Chicago Tribune reported that Wisconsin had 38 different "local times" in effect.

Think again of the problems of travel we have today with only four time zones, and try to project that to the traveler of 1883 who had to cope with railroad schedules published to accommodate over 100 local times. Many railroads published their schedules based on the local time of their home city. The Michigan Central Railroad used Detroit time. The New York Central in its Chicago District (which this area was in) used Columbus time. That was, though, six minutes faster than Cincinnati time and 19 minutes faster than Chicago time. Thus a NYC train listed in the schedule as leaving Chicago at noon, would actually depart the station at 11:41 Chicago time.

To help with this problem of different railroads having schedules based on different times standards, railroad stations would have several clocks, each set to the time used by the various lines serving the terminal. For example, the station in Pittsburgh had six different clocks, each adjusted to the operating time of a railroad serving the station.

A solution to set time which was used in many cities, one which borrows from maritime practice, was the time ball. Each day at noon local time, a big ball was dropped from a high tower so located as to be seen for maximum possible distance. This was used to provide a uniform if not accurate means of calibrating the timepieces for the city. (The New Years Eve tradition of watching the ball fall in Times Square in New York is a remnant of this practice).

As the nation expanded westward and southwards, the number of railroads and the number of cities rose with an attendant

increase in the number of time standard problems. The railroads, as early as 1872, decided that a solution was needed and began the debate on how to best solve the problem. The American Association of Railroads, which was an outgrowth of earlier alliances formed over the time problem, adopted the Standard Time resolution at a meeting in Chicago on October 11, 1883. Implementation of the program, which divided the country (and the world) into time zones which were 15 degrees of longitude wide, was set for November 18, 1883.

The proposal was not enthusiastically received in all quarters. There was strident opposition from many church clerics, on the theory that the proposal interfered with "God's time" and was contrary to nature. Farmers, and others, complained that the switch would rob them of daylight. Others were opposed for xenophobic reasons - they didn't want the likes of "Mr. Vanderbilt telling them how to keep time."

The railroads were unswayed and move forward with the detail of planning. On the appointed day, a Sunday selected for having less trains running, trainmen all over the country stood with watches poised to set time as they listened to telegraphic signals produced by the pendulum of the master clock in the observatory in Allegheny, Pa.

The switch was made in the system with a minimum of problems. The day, November 18, 1883 became known as the "day with two noons" as cities in the eastern portion moved their clocks back to noon at the appointed moment, much the same as we will do this Sunday morning.

Most areas adopted the new time standard within a short period, even though it didn't become law until March 19, 1918.

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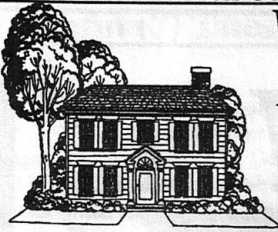
