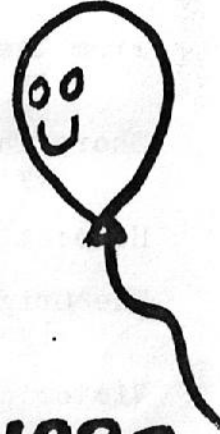

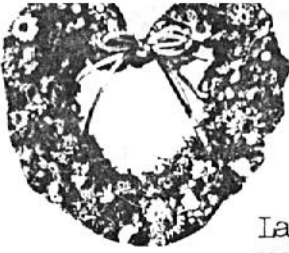

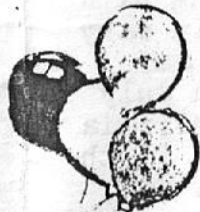

The Original Beach Boys.....by Jessie A. Martin

Henry Lange

Baden, Germany was the origin of many people who came to Ohio in the 1800's, & many of these people or their offspring settled on Kelleys Island.

Henry Lange & Balbina Riedy migrated from Baden in 1838 to Erie County, where they married & had a family of five children. They owned several pieces of property on West Market Street. One of the children died. The others were Caroline, who married Fred Westerhold; Josephine, who married an Andres, & the two became parents of the owners of the Andres-Tucker Funeral Home; Frances, & Henry P. The couple came to Kelleys Island where Henry P. was born on May 9th 1861.

Mr. Lange had a vineyard & was one of the island's first citizens to begin the making of wine for sale. He was an active citizen in many ways. On April 8th, 1863, he was elected as Township Treasurer on the island. Then on July 14th of that year a company of volunteer militia was recruited, organizing Company K of the 139th Regiment of the 100-day call for the Civil War, & he was elected as Second Lieutenant. He was thirty-four years old at the time & was the father of young children. He, along with Captain Webb & First Lieutenant Bristol, were to establish a guard along the north shore of Kelleys Island. The first patrol guard formed at West Bay & was named Camp Cattanach. He was a part of the company involved in the Johnson Island's troubles when rebels on board the Parsons seized the Island Queen & sank her. After this, on September 22nd, 1864, the company was "mustered out" in Toledo. Lieut. Lange remained in Toledo for a while to draw pay for the company. On September 25th when the Island Queen made a trip from Sandusky to Kelleys Island, the first since it was raised & repaired, Lieut. Lange was aboard. He, like other volunteers who returned, went to work in his vineyards. In 1872, he produced 800 gallons of wine.



Prior to 1861, Catholics on the island were visited occasionally by priests from Sandusky & Port Clinton. Services were held in a private home--probably that of Henry Lange. According to Carr's History of Catholicity of Northern Ohio, "In 1863 a plain but neat little stone church (the first church building on the island) was erected on a lot donated by Henry Lange, who generously aided Father Verlet in organizing a congregation on Kelleys Island." This was the beginning of St. Michael's Church.

Henry & Balbina's son, Henry P., married Emma Hauser on October 24th, 1882. Their children were Albert (father of Catherine & the late Elizabeth "Lizzie" Martin), Frank, Theodore, Carl, & a daughter Henrietta (Jim Seeholzer's mother).

The Lange property was located on East Lake Shore Drive & ran through to Chapel Street. The Himmelein House bordered the west side of the property & land owned by Herman Koster across from Inscription Rock on the east side. Through the years some of the Lange property has changed hands, but much of it remains in possession of fourth generation descendants.

The original Henry who migrated from Germany passed away in Sandusky in December of 1885.

One interesting note concerning the spelling of the name: Some early records show it as Lang; later records show Lange. I was curious about this spelling. I also wondered if there was a connection between Henry Lang (as it was originally spelled) & John Lange who was an ancestor of O. Hugh Lange & Tom Lange. After doing a little research, I was told that there is a family connection, but the German Catholics didn't use the e while the Protestant side of the family added the e to the name. I have no information on when the Catholic side began spelling the name with the e added, but family members that I know write it thus today.

The Perotti - Dutt Duo has captured the attention of critics and the public for their exemplary fusion of musicality and virtuosity in four-hand piano repertoire. 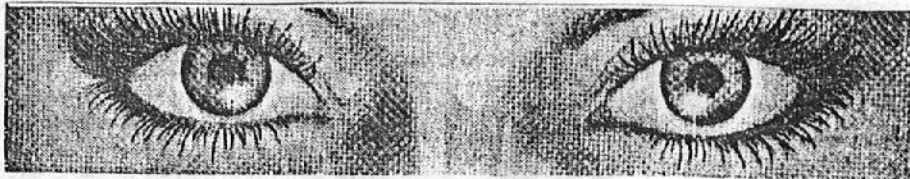

Legislation from June 14th Meeting.....

Public Hearing on Fresch's Island House & Van-Auken's Zoning Map change from R-1 to C-1.

Motion passed to declare Ordinance (Fresch's Island House Zoning Map Change R-1 to C-1) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading. Motion to pass same, failed.

Motion passed to declare Ordinance No. 534 (Van-Auken's Zoning Map change from R-1 to C-1) an emergency, set aside rules & advance to its third & final reading. Ordinance then declared passed.

Motion passed to declare Ordinance No. 535 (Transfer of \$2500 from General Fund to Airport) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading. Ordinance then declared passed.

Committee Reports\*\*\*\*\*

Finance - Motion to purchase trimmer brushblade died for lack of a second.

Streets/Sidewalks - Committee met with State Highway Dept. regarding extending State Route on the Island.

Lands/Buildings - Reported vandalism at Town Hall, piano destroyed & old backdrop was all rolled up on the spool. Motion to put a security light at the Country Store passed.

Administration/Public Safety - Reported the Police Golf Cart & Patrol Car were parked on the hill by the Casino creating a hazard. Chief Moore said they would not park there again.

Police Department - Chief Moore reported 39 complaints, 28 citations, 9 medical runs, 15 assists to Coast Guard. Stated equipment for pagers are on the way.

Planning Commission - Regular meeting was held. Dan Ahner explained his changes regarding his plans with the Monarch Winery property - Planning Commission expressed concern - Special meeting was held on May 24 about rewriting #303 - Park Board encouraged to work with ODNR for trails - Special meeting was held regarding rewording Fresch's ordinance - Discussion of Subdivision rules held at special meeting - McNichols office will put our subdivision rules on a computer disc & will be printed on ordinance paper - The guidelines are from Erie County - Motion passed to hold a public hearing on July 16 at 7pm regarding an amendment to Ordinance #303 pertaining to subdivision regulations.

Landfill - Payment problem still exists. May have to put millage on the ballot.

B.P.A. - Zebra Muscles invaded our intake. One cap was knocked off & one was sat on. The screen has been recovered.

No report from Treasurer.

New Business\*\*\*\*\*

Motion passed approving use of Village facility for the following dates: Pavillion to Ethel Hensel for June 16, Village Park to Historical Assoc. for June 23 from 9am to 5pm. Pavilion to Neuman Group from 11:30 to 5pm. Donation of Baseball Diamond Bleachers by Village Pump & Baseball Team contingent on approval by Lands/Buildings of all plans.

Motion passed to not request hearing for transfer of Liquor permit to Kelleys Island Tavern Co., Inc. from Kamp Kellile Inc./West Bay Inn.

Council requested Clerk Bianchi to call Solicitor's office about no gambling on the Island issue being put on the ballot.

Motion declared passed to have Thompson's spray weed control.

Notes from Special Council Meeting, June 25

Motion passed to direct the Public Safety Committee to meet with our Police Chief Moore to instruct him of the following: Whereas Council has previously directed that no police previously employed by the Village shall be considered for employment, the two police officers who have worked for the Village before are relieved as of June 26, 1990. Chief Moore is to hire two new officers following the procedure outlined by Council.

Notes from Special Council Meeting, June 28

Motion failed to approve the Mayor's appointment of Matthew Kenne, Steve Moore & James Scheid as part-time police officers to the K.I. Police Department.

Emergency Council Meeting, June 29 did not take place due to lack of quorum.

Notes from Emergency Council Meeting, July 1

Motion passed to approve the Mayor's appointment of Robert Hammond as part-time police officer to the K.I. Police Department.

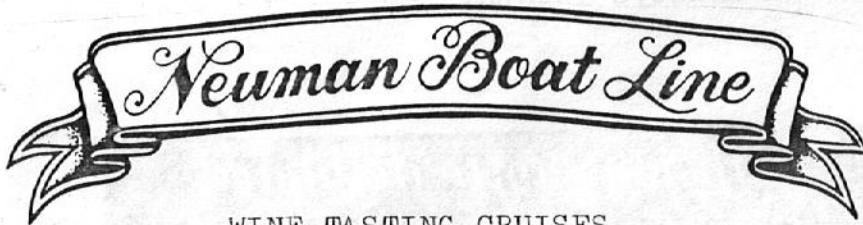
Dump Cake

- 1 pk. Deluxe yellow cake mix
- 1 can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple in syrup,  
undrained
- 1 can (21 oz.) cherry pie filling
- 1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts
- 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or oleo, cut in thin  
slices

Preheat oven to 350' & grease 13 X 9 X 2 inch pan.

Dump pineapple with juice into pan, spread evenly. Next dump cherry pie filling & spread over pineapple as evenly as possible. Spread dry cake mix on top of cherries. Sprinkle nuts over cake mix. Place butter slices over the top. Bake for 48 to 53 min. Serve either warm or cooled.

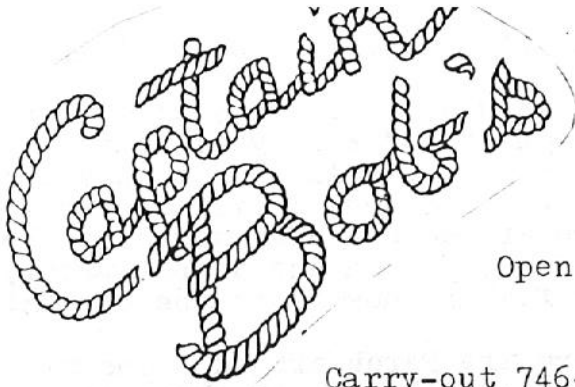

There are some medium size fish being caught east of Kelleys in the deeper water, however, the best fishin' now is in the Central & eastern basin.

It seems there are Perch around & one might want to get some shiners & try for these tasty fish. My neighbor has been Perchin' around Kelleys & the Marblehead lighthouse the last couple of weeks & been doing pretty good. Fish have been ranging 8 to 10 inches. There is nothing wrong with frying up a mess of Perch. The Boss likes Perch better than Walleye. I would go out & catch 3 or 4 Walleye & be very happy & she would burst my bubble by asking, "Where's the Perch?" The quickest answer I could come back with is, "I did have some in the cooler but they were so small compared to the Walleyes, they must have been eaten up." Can you believe that? The Boss never does!

Next time you're frying fish (any kind) try rendering some salt pork & adding this to your skillet. (Don't add salt to your breading though) Also the remains of the rendered salt pork makes a nifty addition to a nice green salad - just crumble it up & add on top of your favorite dressing.

One hot afternoon, when I was out on my boat fishin', I watched a boat nearby netting a floating fish - looked like a carp or sheephead. It seemed the guy tried very hard not to touch it but he brought it up near his face, still in the net, kissed it & jiggled it out of the net & back in the water. Couldn't figure that out at all, my curiosity was really roused! So I steered closer & asked, "Why in the world he would kiss a rotting fish?" He explained he had a bad case of chapped lips. I said that I didn't know fish slime was good for chapped lips. He said he didn't either, it just kept him from constantly licking his lips.

Wish I was fishin' now! (My boat is out of commission!)

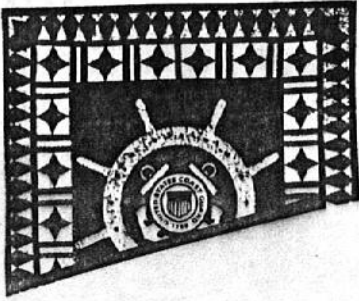
