'The Original Beach Boys ... by Jessie A. Martin George C. Huntington & Sons

George C. Huntington, born in Norwich, Connecticut in 1808, settled in Cleveland & became one of that city's earliest merchants. In 1837, he married Emeline Kelley, daughter of Sarah & Datus Kelley, & a year later the two settled on Kelleys Island. For awhile he engaged in farming on the island, but for some reason he went back to Cleveland until 1845. They again returned to Kelleys Island. They had a family of four sons: Erastus, born August 18, 1838; Simon, born in 1839; Daniel K., born in 1845; & Joseph A,. born in 1850.

Simon enlisted in Company B, 101st Regiment Volunteer Infantry during the Civil War as a sargeant. Before that, in 1860, his name appears as a member of the Lyceum, the Kelleys Island Literary Society. He, along with Erastus and Joseph A, served as editors of the <u>Islander</u>. Unfortunately, he was wounded in a battle at Stone River & died in a hospital at Nashville, Tennessee on January 9th, 1862.

Not much information is readily available about Joseph A. (except that he was once editor of the <u>Islnader</u>) or Daniel K. The later enlisted in Company K, 130th Regiment in May, 1864, along with Erastus. The time period was referred to as the 100-day call. They were in the 10th corps under Colonel Phillips & General Butler. After the was Daniel became a collector of Customs.

Erastus seemed to be the shining light of the family. He was educated at Oberlin College. He worked as clerk in the Kelleys Island general mercantile store in 1854. In 1866, he purchased half interest in the store, & in 1871, he purchased the entire interest. In 1866, he was appointed postmaster & remained so until 1884. He was treasurer of the town for twenty years, of State taxes for the island, & express & telegraph manager. He was one of five persons to sign an application for certificate of incorporation for laying the telegraph & telephone cable to Kelleys Island. Along

with Henry Kelley, he had worked out a plan for using the cable. He wrote a telegraphic news column for the Islander. He was treasurer of

the Kelleys Island Wine Company.

In describing business people & their establishments on Kelleys Island, a reporter wrote, "Mr. Erastus Huntington, near the dock, has always on sale at the most reasonable prices, a first class assortment of fishing tackle & baits of every description suitable to the respective seasons, & having had some thirty years' experience in the fisheries around the island is the best possible authority, & will invariably be found a gentleman most courteous & communicative to strangers."

Erastus was an avid checker player. There was usually a game of checkers in progress at the Lodge from morning until night. In 1873 he bought a new checkerboard, and it was written in the Islander that "most of the loafers at the Lodge had their pants half soled in order to withstand the nails in salt barrels & nail kegs they set on while watching the game." A verse composed by Sarah W. Rush, granddaughter of Datus Kelley, was found in the Islander. She wrote "At E. Huntington's dry goods store, You'll find everything you want, & one thing more. (Tobacco smoke.)"


Erastus married Alzina Hamilton in 1863. Their children were Simon A. & Stella, a daughter that his father George never had. George migrated to Kansas where he died at Wallace,

Kansas in 1876.

Fruit Squares


Bake at 350' for 45 min.

Congress talks Zebra Mussels.....

Congress was told if preventative legislation is not enacted, the zebra mussel that has infested the Great Lakes, will devastate the nation's other bodies of water.

Senator John Glenn told members of the Senate Environment & Public Works that we are facing an environment & economic crisis that rivals the (Exxon) Valdez oil spill. He said the infestation is most intense in Ohio.

Later this month, the Coast Guard is expecting to release a report examining methods for controlling the influx into U.S. waters of non-indigenous aquatic life, such as zebra mussel, sea
lampry, rusty crawfish, spiny waterflea, alewife,
stickleback & the tube-nosed goby.

A House committee has already approved legislation authorizing \$4.5 million for research into "control & eradication" of such non-indigenous species under the National Sea Grant College program & the Great Lakes Environment Research Laboratory.

Legislation from May 10th Meeting.....

Amendment to minutes of April 27th's special Council meeting should read that Ken Neufer appointed by Mayor as Airport Manager & Dick Sennish to receive \$150.00 for back pay, passed.

Motion passed to declare Ordinance No. 532 (pertaining to Mayor's licensing of vehicles & amusement devices) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading.

Motion passed to declare Ordinance No. 533 (pertaining to purchase of property by Village) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading.

Motion passed to declare Ordinance No. 206 (amend. Resolution No. 202 - Zoning Fees) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading.

Motion passed to declare Resolution No. 207 (extension of option agreement with Jean Dwelle) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading.

Committee Reports.....

Streets/Sidewalks - New signs being posted.

Treasurer - Total expenditures as \$31,712.19, total receipts as \$94,472.62 & total in general checking account as \$252.439.80.

Police Department - Chief Moore reported 19 comlaints, 5 citations, 2 medical runs & regular patrols increased.

Planning Commission - L.J. Greek's salary now settled. They voted to recommend approval of following land splits contingent that they present to Council the Surveyor's drawing with Surveyor's Seal: Don Staas & Co., Charlie Brown's land split contingent on tearing down of barn in two months. Special meeting with ODOT on April 20 regarding

Port Assistance Program Grant awarded to the Village by ODOT. First payment was presented in the amount of \$11,250.00. Motion passed approving request for typing services done by Joanne Golias, be paid out of grant monies & documented. Request to change the use of plans was made by Dan Ahner regarding the Monarch Winery property, change being a small bar & restaurant with motel on top. Citizen does not want bar across from cemetery. Procedure sheets are available for applying for building permits.

B.P.A. - They will be able to proceed with the third part of the water project which is the plant itself. FMHA will not designate any part of the loan. The whole loan must be approved & held by the FMHA. If lawsuit is lost, village will be forced to come up with more money.

No reports from Finance, Lands/Buildings nor Administration/ Public Safety Committees.

Landfill - Increasing costs continue.

Old Business....

Motion passed to delay or postpone establishing fees for Pavilion & Town Hall.

Stacey DeBoard, Lori Hayes & Megan Joyce formed a committee to look into recycling on the island & it will be done on their own time.

New Business.....

Motion passed to approve use of Town Hall & piano on Saturday, June 2nd, 5:30 to 9:00 for Jennifer Koba to use in organizing group called Island Singers.

Motion passed to approve use of Municipal Bldg. for meetings (June 16, July 21 & Oct 20, from 9 - 11 AM) the Pavilion for picnics (Town Hall if weather is inclement) on May 19 & Sept. 15 11 - 2 pm) the Village Park - Downtown for

Homecoming (Town Hall if weather is inclement) on Aug. 18, which includes a street dance from 8 - 12 Midnight - Landowners Association.


Motion passed to grant permission fro Landowners to plant a tree in the Village Park in memory of former mayor of K.I., Bob Schwartz.

Motion passed to pay Ordinance No. 848.

We hope that's here to stay.





I would take a walk to the pier everyday - & one day I stopped to watch a couple of youngsters fishin' - one asked me to watch his pole while he went to the bathroom As I did this, a couple of people walked by & we started to talk about fishin' & of course I wanted to impress them about Ohio Walleye Fishin' & I told them about the large "eyes" I catch in Lake They looked at me real funny-like & walked away - I didn't know why until I realized I was holding a Fisher Price Rod & Reel with a Mickey Mouse Bobber. Big time Fisherman!

Must go now - have to Char-B-Q some fillets

on the grill.
