


Bibber Overcasher is in Cleveland's University Hospital & we wish her a speedy recovery & return to K.I.

Five Sicilians

Each time that we read a newspaper of our own or a near-by community, we learn that a murder (sometimes more than one) has taken place. When we think of Kelleys Island, we don't often think of murder, but we consider it a quiet, peaceful place. However, murders have happened here.

The first one that we know about occurred in 1826 when men named Barnum & Grummets were settlers on the island. A man, Killiam, & his family cleared several acres on the south side of the island east of Division Street, & he hired these men to work for him. They had originally come to the island to cut & sell firewood. For various reasons, all settlers on the island moved away, leaving only Barnum & Grummets. Barnum killed Grummets. He was incarcerated in jail at Norwalk, Ohio, but wasn't brought to trial until 1835, almost nine years later. He pleadeself-defense & was acquitted of the crime.

More recently, Thomas Hoyt Jones, a longtime summer resident & frequent winter visitor on Kelleys Island was murdered in his home at Long Point. The young man found guilty of the crime is now serving time, I believe at Lucasville. Ohio.

And there was the mysterious death of a poor widow, Elizabeth Selfe, who lived with two of her children near Long Point. She was missing for several days, & when her body washed ashore in July 1877, it was thought that she had been murdered. This theory was never proved, although there was substantial evidence that there was foul play.

Probably the worst of all crimes committed here took place in September, 1911. Five Sicilians, John Barlana, Rothe Klawetch, Dominico Silwate, Antonio Dicarie, & Antonio Berlin, had come to the island to work in the quarry. Their original plan was to earn money, divide it equally, & then return to Sicily, their native homeland. This didn't happen. Instead, on Saturday,

September 23rd, 1911, a nude body washed ashore on the north shore of Kelleys Island. The legs of the body were tightly strapped together between the knees & the thighs, & there was a rope about ten feet in length tied around the waist. There was a deep gash on the right side of the face, extending from the ear to below the chin. At first no one could identify the body. Several men who worked in the quarry had found the body, & they assumed that the man had been murdered & thrown overboard from a passing boat. However, Deputy Coroner John Casey of Sandusky identified the body as that of Antonio Dicarie.

Deputy Casey went to the house where the men lived. There he found an upstairs room splattered with blood, a bed covered with blood, & splotches of blood leading to the lake, but no one was at home. On the next day, the island's marshal, Henry Elfers, Jr., found clothing belonging to the murdered man secreted upon a ledge in the cellar, shoved up under the foundation of the house.

Then on Friday, September 29th, Albert Erne an island fisherman, discovered two more bodies that had been shot & stabbed several times, weighted down with rocks, on the north shore where Dicarie's body had been found. These men were identified as Antonio Berlin & Jim Berlin, previously called John Barlana. Deputy Casey began locking immediately for the other two Sicilians.

He learned that they had left the island on Thursday or Friday with trunks & other baggage. They had spent Friday night at Marblehead, Ohio with Paul Ruffa, a cousin of the Berlins. At the railroad station they had checked a trunk to Cleveland, Ohio & had inquired about train connections to Sharon & Pittsburg, Pennsylvania. On October 1, 1911, the two men were apprehended at an Italian rooming house in Pittsburgh. In their possession was \$514.00 in money, a revolver, & a hat covered with blood.

These men were arrested for murder. They stood trial, were found guilty, & were executed in the Ohio Penitentiary. Some say that the



Legislation from April 11th Meeting....

Motion to declare Ordinance No. 553 (Vilage Volunteer Fire Dept.) tabled, passed.

Motion to declare Resolution No. 219 (Areement with Ken Neufer) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading passed. (To put a driveway in to the runway in a section of grass at the airport)

Motion to amend Ordinance No. 532 (to raise annual rental fees) passed. Fees raised to \$5.00 per bicycle per year, \$25.00 per moped &/or golf carts per year, & \$5.00 per person that all buses & trams can carry per year. Coin operated amusement devices are remaining the same, \$25.00 per device per year. Stickers will be issued to all rental vehicles. Insurance a must for all rental vehicles, proof of insurance is to be given the clerk. Motion to declare this Ordinance an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading passed.

Committee Reports.....

Finance - Herndon reported that appropriations for the Village are critical. Reported the Village has less money to work with, but more is needed. Ex. Need money for Police Dept., will need at least \$26,000 for new Police Chief & Deputies, Fire Dept. needs money for equipment, fire truck upkeep & salaries. Both levies need to pass in order to get money for the appropriate protection needed. No money is being spent on insurance, utilities & salaries. Need money to pay for Dwelle House, sidewalks & the 10% to add to the Airport grant from last year. Village can maybe get by if all levies are passed.

Streets/Sidewalks - Martin reported that Ed Feike was over & did a survey of the whole Island & is going to give the Village an estimate of repairs. Estimate will be given on a tonnage basis. Ed

Feike brought someone to measure some of the roads to see what needed to be done. Follow-up report has not gotten back to Martin.

Iands/Buildings - Haas reports that he wants to get with the Solicitor on the Dwelle House. The house is vacant as of right now, but the Chamber is interested in using ½ of the house. The condition of the house is such that we can't charge much in the way of rent. The possibility of getting something such as insurance for the house, utilities on the building or repairs needed for the house. Lee suggested a proposal be drawn up after researching the issue & getting with the Chamber, Haas will be working on it.

Administration/Public Safety - Matso reported that one interview is left for the Chief of Police position. The funds are not there to have the police protection needed. Also the EMT's & Fire Dept. are going to have to live on the boundaries of last year. Insurance is a good percentage of where money is being spent along with utilities & salaries. Cannot afford to cut insurance.

Treasurer - Financial reports given to all Council members. Seeholzer reported that we need to get Landfill fund out of the red. Village needs money for notes due for the Dwelle house & sidewalks.

Police Department - Moore reported that there were 4 complaints, 1 arrest that earned \$265.00 for the Village & 2 accidents investigated.

Planning Commission - Herndon reported that there will be a Public hearing April 12, with a man from O.D.N.R. to discuss the submerged land lease program. A meeting is scheduled on April 13 with Poggemeyer.

Transfer Station - Haas reports that the new Dump Rules will become effective 5-1-91 even though bills have not been sent. Discussion of availability fees will be going toward the cost

of operating the Transfer Station, money received for the stickers will be used for the disposal truck. Stickers will be sold at both grocery stores. Recycling, if separated, can be deposited for free.

B.P.A. - Phinney reported that there will be a meeting 5-12-91 at Lee's office with Poggemeyer to discuss FHA project. The underground utilities project has not been appealed.

Citizens Participation.....

Statement made that there is a leak in the Cemetery on the north line. Wondered if momey from Perpetual Care Fund could be used to repair the damages. Lee stated that only the interest can be used for repairs.

Comment that if everyone paid last years landfill fees that the Landfill would be in the black. Ans-

wer was that it would still be in the red. Problems with tourists dumping trash at residences & rentals.

Taxes for Quarry due. Money goes to County Auditor & the Island gets their share.

Comment on the possibility of renting other half of Dwelle house, along with rent, fixing it up.

Report that Palladino agrees to negotiate the possibility of hauling the trash.

Suggestion to have an income tax on money earned on the Island.

Motion to pay Ordinance 858 passed.

Herndon suggests authority to get an expenditure of \$1500 from Gen. Fund to cover notes due, Fund will be reimbursed. Seconded motion voted on & passed.

Special meeting set for 5-25-91 with Jack Jones & Poggemeyer on assessment of water project.

Sorry that Legislation notes from the May meeting were not available in time for this issue!

Lettuce Tips

1. Keep lettuces whole until they are needed. They'll last longer, 2 to 4 days.

2. Prevent harmless brown spots or rust spots do not wash lettuce before storing. Just remove excess dirt & damaged leaves.

3. Crisp lettuce before serving by placing in a plastic bag & chilling in freezer for a few minutes.

4. Don't store with canteloupes or apples or tomatoes. Fruit emits ethylene gas.






