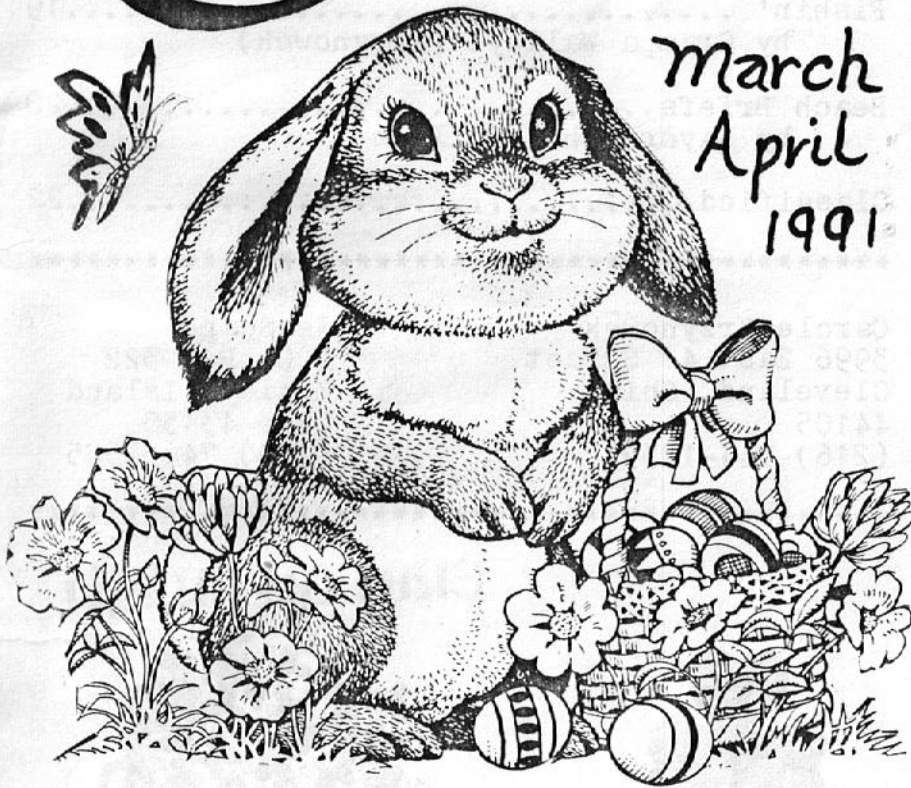

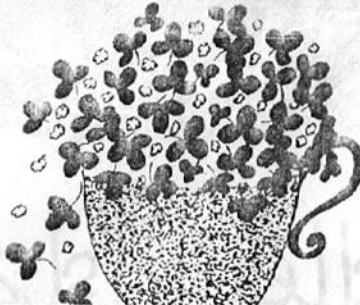

One Versatile Man

In the year of 1836, there were very few settlers on Kelleys Island, which was actually called Cunningham's Island then. In the autumn of that year, a young man named Jake Hay stopped there on his way from Pelee Island to Sandusky. He had no idea that this "lay over" would be his permanent home for the rest of his life. (He lived to be a comparatively old man.) One of the things that caused Jake to decide to remain on the island was the food plus other provisions that the settlers had stored for the winter. He had nearly starved to death on Pelee Island the previous winter.

Addison Kelley hired Jake to help him in the construction of the scow Argus, which was finished & launched by July, 1837. While engaged in this work, Jake developed an inflammation of his eyes, & this prevented him from taking any other jobs until the following spring.

While he was on Pelee Island, he had planted 8 acres of wheat, which he was unable to harvest because of his eyes. He hired a Mr. Conklin to do this for him. The yield was 160 bushels. In February, 1838, he went back to Pelee where he remained for 5 days before returning to Kelleys Island. This trip caused him a "heap" of trouble which is another story for a later time.

The years passed. Jake worked as a carpenter making boats, oxen yokes, whiffle trees, sleighs, wagons, wagon wheels, cupboards, gates, coffins, & almost anything else that was necessary for living on an island during pioneer days. He knew every stick of timber on the island & where & how he could get it.

In 1855, Jake purchased some land on the lake west of Inscription Rock. He built a dock which extended about 10 feet into the water. Near the center of the dock he built a flight of stairs for the convenience of the public who hauled their water from the lake. At the

east end of the dock, he built his carpenter shop, & at the west end a blacksmith's shop which he rented out. As he was a slow worker, those who didn't want to wait for him to finish a job were welcome to use his tools & shop to do their work themselves.

Jake was a bachelor until 1872 when he married Ellen Pallen, & they had three children. Their only son was killed accidentally when he was only 10 years old. This was a real tragedy, as it was not only Jake's son, but also because he had a special love for children. They often played in his shop, in the boats he built, & even sometimes lay down in the coffins he made.

Although Jake was a versatile man, keeping books was not one of his strong points. He listed his accounts on a plain board, & when he needed to make another entry with a lead pencil, he would plane off a shaving with the old entry on it & hang it up.

Every person who knew Jake liked him. He was kind & generous, a temperate man. It was said that no one ever saw him under the influence of alcohol. His one weak point was the use of tobacco.

One of the big contributions that Jake made to the island's history was the building of Dew Drop Inn over his carpenter's shop. Although this structure is no longer standing there are many islanders who remember the building & the fire that destroyed it.

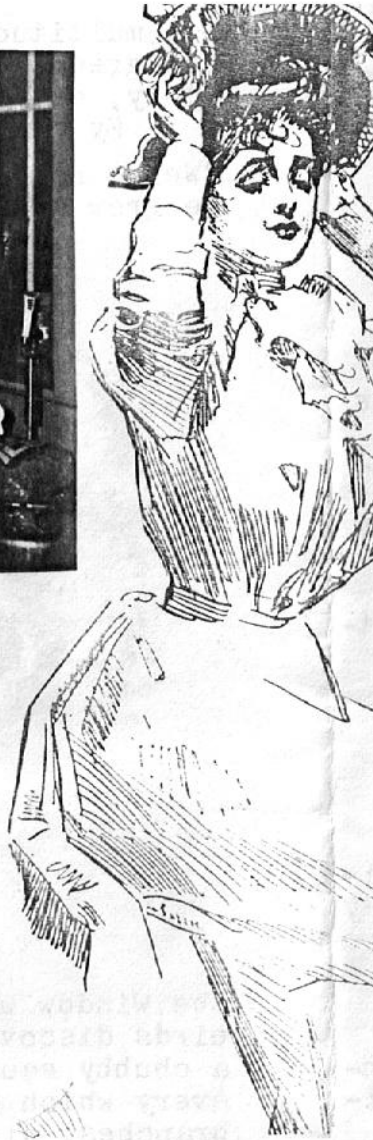
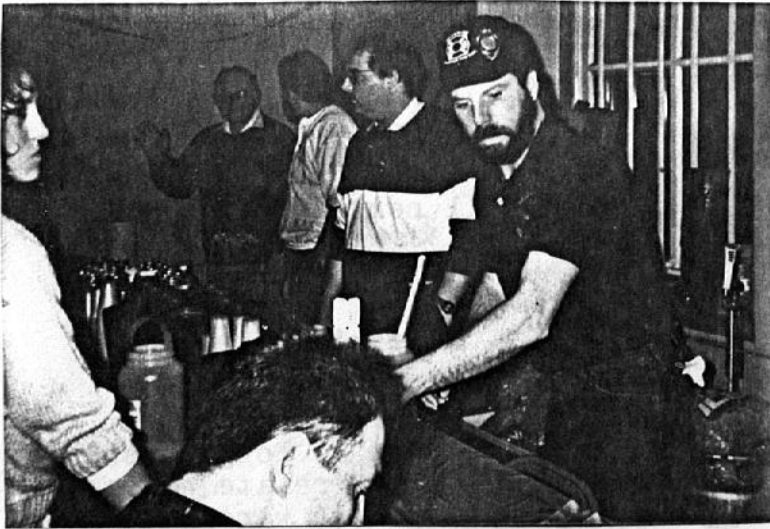

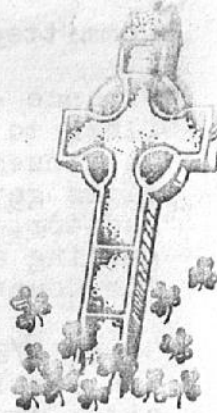

Legislation from January 10th Meeting.....

Matso & Herndon nominated as president pro-tempe - both declined. Motion declared passed for Charles Martin to remain president pro-tempe of Council.

Motion declared passed for the committees & their chairmen, remain the same:

Finance - Martin, Haas, Herndon (Chairman)

Streets/Sidewalks - Gruly, Matso, Martin (Chairman)

Lands/Buildings - Curilla, Gruly, Haas (Chairman)

Administration/Public Safety - Curilla, Herndon, Matso (Chairman)

Transfer Station - Gruly, Martin, Haas (Chairman)

Motion declared passed approving Mayor's appointment of Beatrice Matso to the Board of Public Affairs.

Committee Reports.....

Finance - Herndon reported meeting with Village Clerk to balance accounts. Transfer Station continues to be in deep trouble. Village anticipates getting an advance from McKeen, Erie County Auditor. Council will have to get together regarding a levy in May. The Village is broke & the County will take over.

Streets/Sidewalks - Matso reported one Road Opening Permit issued. Mayor suggested Village Solicitor draw up legislation that the Road Opening Permit fee be increased from \$250 to \$500. The committee's short & long term plans will be available in the Spring.

Treasurer - Seeholzer reported receipts of \$11,972.61; expenditures of \$15,217.15; with a balance in general checking account of \$192,869.00. Council was presented Fiscal Officer's Certification pertaining to Sidewalk Renewal Note.

Police Department - Chief Moore reported 7 complaints, 2 minor medical runs, no arrests, no accidents, 1 transported from airport to home, & regular patrols made on resident checks. The Chief attended a Civil Rights hearing in Toledo on December 17.

Planning Commission - Regular meeting to be held Fri., Jan. 11 at 9 A.M. Meeting for the Poggemeyer Port Development Study to be held Sat., Jan. 12. Zoning Inspector & Clerk reported receipts of \$15,000 in 1990. Herndon suggests a special fund be set aside for the Planning Commission & that monies paid to the Building Inspector & Clerk writing fee be paid out of that fund. Motion to approve Dan Ahner's land split based on contingencies being met & original survey filed on time, failed.

Transfer Station - Haas reported getting facts together from 1989 & 1990 records so that the committee can come up with new Transfer Station fees for 1991. Reported Erie County Landfill Fees are going up 47%. Pointed out that the Village paid \$10,000 this past year just to rent containers & that it would be less expensive if they purchased their own. Will also compare Neuman Ferry rates vs. new ferry line rates. Haas, Herndon & Curilla will meet on Fri., Jan. 11 at 1 PM to prepare legislation so bills can go out after next Council meeting. Solicitor taking those who are delinquent, to Small Claims Court. Steve Casali, Chief Sanitarian of Erie County Health Dept., informed Village that the Transfer Station's requirements still have to be met.

B.P.A. - Phinney reported that between the Engineer & the Solicitor, they hope to get the assessed project (Sweetbriar, Martin Drive, McGettigan & Huntington Lane), to a bid stage & started in the Spring & that blueprints & specifications are on file now. Solicitor said an estimated cost is needed. Smith said that bid opening has to be done again regarding maintenance of the water tank.

Administration/Public Safety - See Matso's report under "Old Business"

Lands/Buildings - No report.

Legislation.....

Motion to declare Ordinance No. 547 (to provide for Issuance of Sidewalk Renewal Note) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading passed. Ordinance No. 547 then declared passed.

Motion to declare Resolution No. 214 (designating Poggemeyer for Bid Opening/Relining Water Tower) an emergency, set aside rules & advance same to its third & final reading passed. Resolution No. 214 then declared passed.

New Business.....

Motion to accept Mayor's appointment of Michelle Helmetz to serve as Clerk of Courts with a 90-day probation period, declared passed.

Motion to accept Police Chief Moore's resignation from K.I. Police Department & K.I. Emergency Medical Service due to his retirement, declared passed.

Concern was expressed over the wear & tear of the roads driven on by Kellstone's heavy equipment. Matso will check into updating an old Ordinance for Road Repair Bond so that Solicitor can present legislation at next month's Council meeting.

Mayor stated Village has until next month's Council meeting to make recommendation for the May ballot & that resolution has to be drawn up prior to that.

Old Business.....

Motion to approve Mayor's appointment of Tina Paladino to the Park Board declared passed. Park Board appointments made by the School Board were

Jon Goodson & Pat Haig. Paul Mack & Lynn Holdren have unexpired terms.

Solicitor stated that no bid was received to enter into contract with Love Insurance for Public Liability & Police Liability Insurance so must readvertise. Mayor requested Clerk to get in writing from Love Insurance that Village is covered to that effect.

Haas reported the voluntary Recycling Program will start as soon as instructions are sent out. Mayor feels it has to be mandatory to be successful. Solicitor to check into legislation on same.

Motion declared passed that a security bond in the form of a \$300 check, be on deposit at the Village office, by those placing Pavilion & Town Hall reservation requests, fulfilling their clean-up fee obligation & said check only to be cashed if damages have resulted & that amount for damages deducted.

Motion approving the following 1991 reservation requests passed:

July 20, 1991 - Jerry Taylor - Pavilion
Various dates - K.I. Chamber of Commerce -
Events & Meetings - Town Hall, Park Area
& Municipal Bldg. (See letter given Council)

Reservation request by the Island Inns Assoc. for various dates has been tabled.

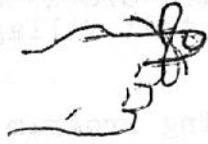
Items from Council.....

Motion declared passed for EMS to rent two vacant offices in Town Hall basement, one for clerical work & the other for storage, at \$1 per month; the Ambulance & Emergency Vehicles are stored in the same vicinity. Matso reported that the EMS group had an election of officers in Jan. & another election will be held once Constitution is verified.

Village Solicitor advised Haas to contact Beverly

Pressler, Erie County Treasurer, regarding benefit from Excise Tax that the Village is entitled to.

Motion declared passed to pay Ordinance No. 856.



Sounds like there is going to be three important levies to vote on, this May - all vitally significant ones!

- 1) Airport expansion
- 2) Police protection & 3) Fire Department

Jim St. Julian, present Fire Chief expressed gratitude that the February Ball brought in about \$1600. (That's not as good as other years) The department is not funded by the Village & needs personal equipment & monies to keep the present equipment running smoothly & up to date.

Presently there are 22 volunteers & not enough gear to equip them adequately. It cost between \$1200. to \$1300. to outfit one fire fighter. The department has not asked the voters for money since needing the truck. The volunteers have raised funds themselves.

There is an ISO rating for your home/business for insurance purposes. The better equipped your fire department, the lower your ISO rating, thus lower insurance rates.

Fishin'.....by Grampa Walleye

Well now, here it is March already & spring is around the corner. Ferry service from Sandusky will start soon & so will the fishin' season! Remember, a 1991 Fishing License is required as of March 1st. Also, the Walleye limit has been reduced to five this year. Soon as the ice clears from the Seaway Marina, try fishin' for Coho/Steelhead in the fingers of the marina. These fish only average 2 - 4 lbs. Although I heard of a couple 6 pounders taken last year. This seems to be the only time they come into the marina, from ice-out thru April. Use Rooster Tails, Mepps Spinners or small Rapala's. Once hooked, these fish put up a tussle - almost comparable to a small Bass. I had some success using minnow/bobber combination fishin' around the docks. Now & then I would get a nice Crappie or Perch using this method, & these cold water fish are fantastic eatin'.

The 54th Sport Show will start at the IX Center in Cleveland on March 15th thru the 24th & if you're looking for fishin' ideas or a charter, this is the place to do that.

What I want to write about next is not connected with fishin' however it is connected with companionship & love. The boss & I just lost a true & loyal friend, our dog -"Teena"- on Mar. 6th. She was only a mutt but if you gave her an ounce of love, she returned it with a pound, We miss her & if there is a "Doggie Heaven" she is there.

See you soon, counting the days & remember, the man who rows the boat generally doesn't have time to rock it.

Spring is just about here & its harbinger boats will soon be bringing supplies & construction materials as well as welcome Islanders on their annual migration to "paradise".

Winter for us brings the peace of ice & water & the quiet of pristine snows. It also brings extra time for thoughtful planning & priority setting for village action during the course of the sleeping season. Many projects have been finalized with still more planning to be done for anticipated action this year.

Among upcoming projects is the finalization of the Transfer Station availability & transfer fees as well as a highly workable recycling program. You will receive more specific information within the next few weeks from our new & very capable Village Clerk, Megan Joyce, who is ably assisted by Joanne Golias.

Newly appointed superintendant, Bob Overcashier's as Road Commissioner should be approved by Council at the March 14th meeting.

Advertisements for a new Chief of Police have been scheduled with interviews to follow, hoping to fill the position that will be open on May 1st with the retirement of Chief Charles Moore. More on his retirement plans later.

The EMT's have moved into their new quarters in the lower level of the Old Town Hall. The new vacuumsplints have already been used with great success.

Chief Jim St. Julian reminds us of the Volunteer Fire Department's needs for new "turn-out" gear & emergency supplies to meet the state requirements for our well trained fully certified members. The EMTs & the Volunteer Fire Department need our continued support & deserve accolades from the entire community.

We are hopeful for funds for our life-line airport runway expansion which we are anxious to complete this summer. The funds are necessary to match a grant awarded the village for this work by the Ohio Department of Transporta-

tion, Aircraft Division.

The Board of Public Affairs while awaiting clearance of the distribution phase of the water service expansion program will, with advise from our consulting engineers (Poggemeyer group) begin construction of the new intake & filtration systems as well as undertaking several privately assessed projects on the island.


Speaking of the Poggemeyer Group - using the monies awarded in a grant by the Ohio Department of Transportation for a waterfront & port study the planning commission assigned the project to them with the results so far indicating a very successful plan emergence.

The Park Commission (headed by Lynn Holdren & comprised of Jon Goodson, Pat Haig, Tina Ridgeway & Paul Mack) is well underway with planning for the future & is forming committees which will encompass areas such as recreation, environmental protection, natural resources & property usage.

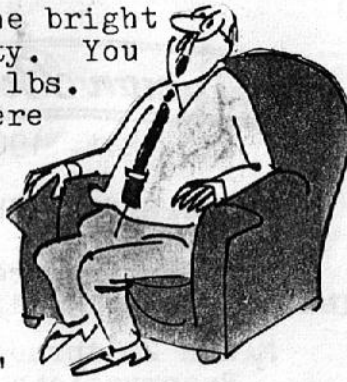
