As we all know, James Estes bequeathed the money for our school to be built. Previous to the construction of cur school, several small schools buildings on the island were used.

In July, 1900 the board accepted \$5000 as partial payment. It was found that the \$10,000 would not be enough to build and equip this school, so the board met with citizens of Kelleys Island and it was decided to bond the village.

Mr. Henry Jordan was hired as Kelleys Island's new schools first custodian. He received \$350 per year. Ir 190h Mr. Arnold Scheele was hired to teach the first, second and third grades at \$35.00 per month.

Here are some interesting high lights found in a report of School Board of Welleys Island, 1853-1906.

"On March 18th, 1877, the board passed a ruling to suspend any pupil from school who threw parlor matches on the floor or who left after the afternoon recess without permission."

"At the meeting of January 5th, 1889, the superintendent complained for so much tardiness, so the board told him to set the clock back ten minutes."

Grades 4,5, and 6 of Kelleys Island Local School consist of two fourth grade girls, six fifth grade boys and girls, and five six grade boys and girls. Although the classes are small, the subjects taught are wide and varied.

Arithmetic, reading, English, and spelling are courses on which all work is based and are required in all grades. Fourth grade arithmetic consists of multiplications, long division, and an introduction of fractions. The fifth graders learn beginning multiplication and division. As the student progresses, the courses become more advanced. The students in grade six are taught to do complicated problems in fractions and decimals.

The reading classes for all three grades are more similar. All have reading texts and workbooks. The stories are longer and the vocabulary is more diversified as the student advances in grade.

The language courses are based on the same principle. For example, the students are taught the correct method of writing reports. The older students, however, are required to do more detailed work.

There are five members of the eleventh and twelfth grades, one in the eleventh and four in the twelfth. During this school year the students could choose their subjects from the three required courses and five elective courses. The required courses being English, American Government and physical education. The elective courses are as follows: bookkeeping, typing, personal guidance, home economics, and industrial arts.

The English class is a combination, grammar and English Literature. This class is taught by Mrs. Martin.

The American Government is a study of the relationship between the government and the people. This class is taught by Mr. Parro. All students take these two courses and upon completion receive one credit for each.

In bookkeeping the students learn and apply the fundementals of accounting, both personal and business. This is a one credit course and is taught by Mr. Hilliard.

The personal guidance course is divided into three groupings: Knowing more about yourself, getting along with others, and making your way in life. Mr. Hilliard teaches this course and one credit is earned.

Typing is taught by Mr. Hilliard. All students have elected to take this subject. One-half credit is earned for typing.

THE JUNIOR AND SENIOR CLASS TRIP

The Junior and Seniors plan on taking a class trip in May to Washington, D.C. and New York City. This trip is a regular scheduled trip sponsored by the Pennsylvania Rail-road.

While we are in Washington, we will visit the Smithsonian Institute. Here we will see the Old and New Museums, Arts and Industries Museum, and the Air Museum. We will see the first telegraph instrument, the first telephone, and many famous airplanes, including Lindbergh's "Spirit of St. Louis," the first steam engine, and the first Franklin printing press.

After visiting the Smithsonian Institute, we go to the Archives Building where we'll see the Constitution of the United States, the Declaration of Independence and the Bill

of Rights, etc.

We will then tour the National Art Gallery. From there we leave for a complete tour of Washington, including the Embassies, Legation, National Zoological Park, thence to Arlington National Cemetery, where we will see the changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, visit the Memorial Amphitheater, thence on to historic Alexandria. In Alexandria, we will visit either the Christ Church or the George Washington Masonic National Memorial. Thence on to Mt. Vernon, Va. Here we will visit the home of George and Martha Washington, the slave quarters, grounds and the tomb of George and Martha Washington.

On the return to our hotel, we will pass the National Airport, Pentagon Building, Jefferson Memorial, and stop at

the Lincoln Memorial.

The next day in Washington, we will visit the Bureau of Engraving and Printing and the Washington Monument. We will also visit the White House for a tour of the home of our President. We will then go to the Supreme Court Building. We will hear a lecture on the U.S. Capital covering the Rotunda, Former Supreme Court Room, Senate Chambers and Work

of Art. We will then visit the Library of Congress.

The third day of our trip will rind us in New York City where we will take a complete tour of Uptown and Downtown Manhattan, including Central Park, Riverside Drive, Crant's Tomb, Columbia University; a walking tour through the Cathdral of St. John, Fifth Ave., Greenwhich Village, Battery Park, for a close-up view of the Statue of Liberty and New York harbor; a short walking tour through Chinatown, thence through the Bowery, the lover East Side, passing the United Nations Building and terminating at Rockefeller Center. Here we shall attend Radio City Music Hall, seeing the famous Rockettes, Corps de Ballet, Symphony Orenestra, a stage show and a first-run screenplay.

On the fourth morning, we will take a bus to Circle Line Pier 83, located at West 12nd Street and Hudson River. Upon our arrival, we will beard a sightseeing yacht and enjoy a three hour cruise around Manhattan Island where will view the great city and part of New York, the Statue of Liberty, Ellis Island, Welfare Island, New York skyline of famous skyscrapers,
