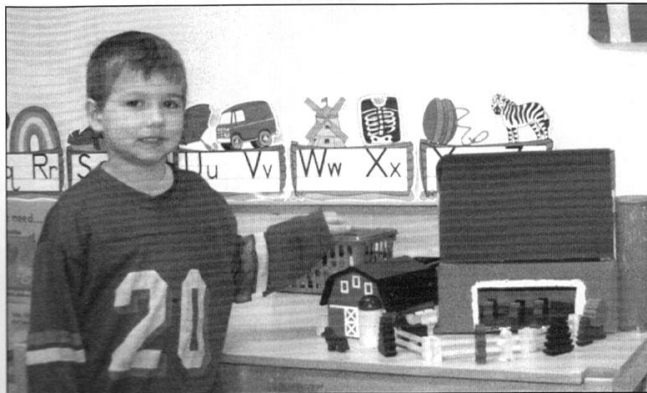
WELCOME

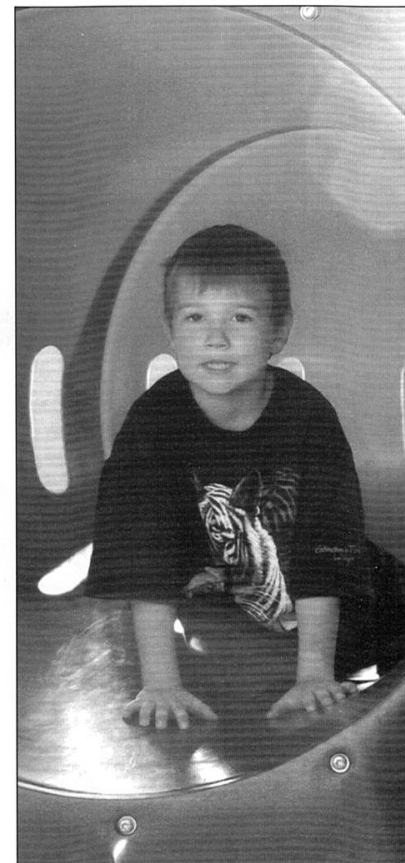

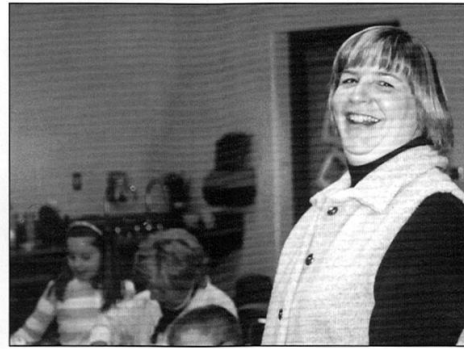

Science was a popular subject this year as the class learned about animals and plants. They started the year learning about the difference between guppies and goldfish and finished the year working with plants. Students learned about growing new plants from seeds, cuttings and bulbs.

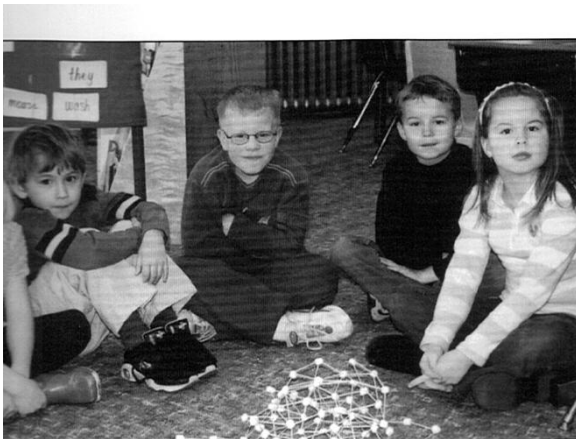

Our Survivor!

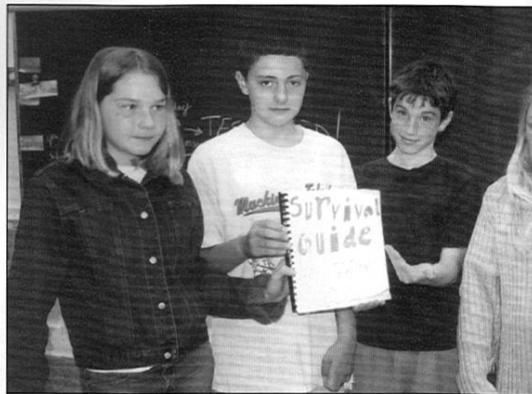
This was Shannon Leary's first year teaching on the island. Shannon, who graduated from BGSU, comes from Strongsville, OH. Shannon's duties included teaching 3rd through 6th reading and language arts, 3rd and 4th social studies, K-8 music, distance learning coordinator, assistant track coach and leader of the school's character education program.

Students read many books and did a lot of writing throughout the year. After reading the books, students responded to the stories by making various things such as a bulletin board quilt, a sequence book based on the story *Thundercake* and bagels (minus the peppers) after reading *Jalapeno Bagels*. After reading poems and tall tales, the fifth graders wrote their own tale and a poem about an animal while the sixth graders completed projects such as a survival wilderness guide that was an extension to the book *Hatchet*.

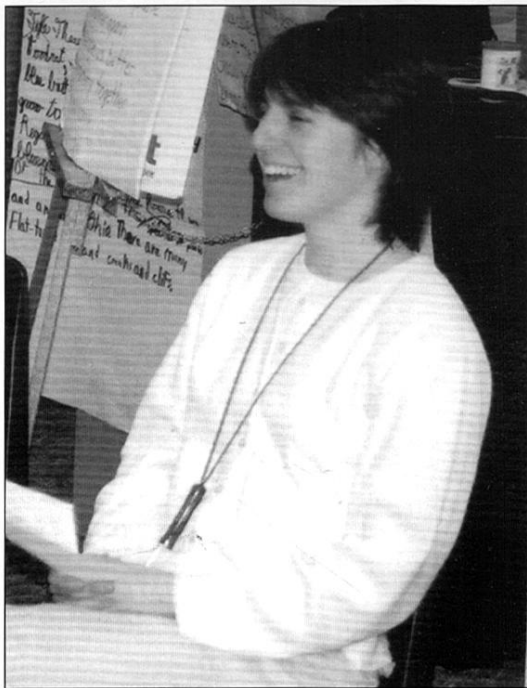

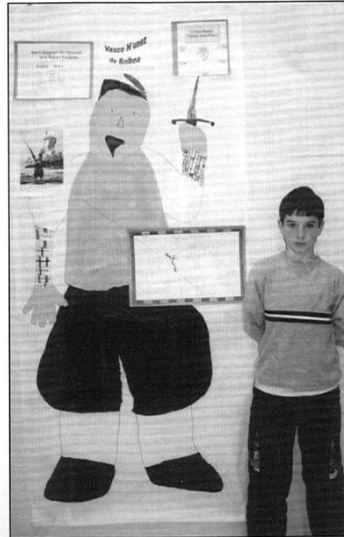

Each group took turns presenting clues about their home location. In addition, the students were busy drawing maps of Kelleys Island, creating a time line of island history and learning about the branches of government.

Miss Leary's music students performed at the Christmas program and for graduation. The 5th through 8th grade students completed a project called KIS 93.1, which was designed as an exploration of musical genre. Students had to pick out a song within a certain genre then find a way to act the song out. Creativity ruled!

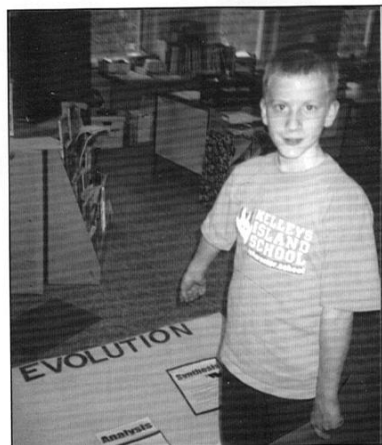

Back for his third year of teaching was Michael O'Brien. His duties included teaching 3rd through 6th math and science, 5th and 6th social studies, and K-6th physical education. He also coached the biddy wrestling team and track and field in addition to being in charge of open-gym.

The 5th and 6th graders worked on a park project for the Fallen Timbers Parks Commission. They were to design a park with additional requirements of including a map, researching the battle of Fallen Timbers history, assembling a portfolio of what would go in their park and finishing it off with a Power Point presentation. Their hard work paid off as the group was awarded the Kathryn Johnson Award for outstanding achievement.

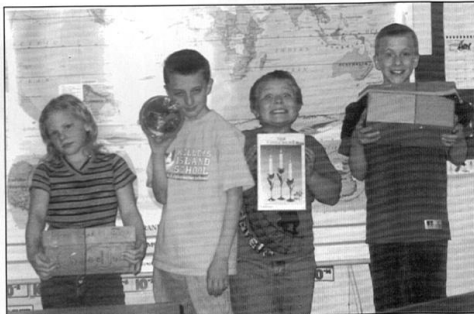

All grades participated in the Great Egg Drop. This was a creative problem solving process, as the students had to build a container to keep their egg intact during a 2-story drop.



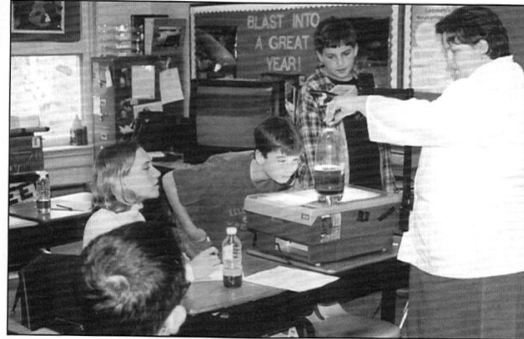

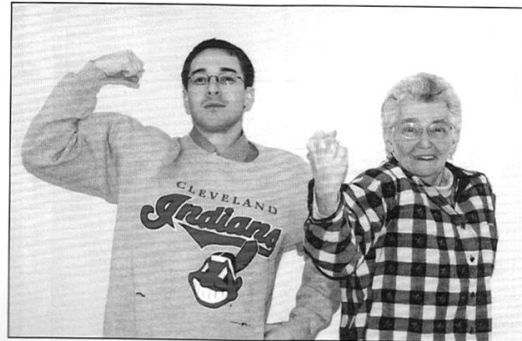

Another new teacher to Kelleys Island is Amy Krajnak. She is a graduate of BGSU and comes from Lyndhurst, OH with previous teaching experience in Garfield Heights. Amy's teaching duties included 7th-8th Science, 9th-12th Biology, 7th Math, Pre-Algebra, Algebra and Geometry. Amy is also the distance learning coordinator.

Miss Krajnak kept the science students busy this year both in and outside of the classroom. The topic of energy was covered as students made mousetrap cars then catapults, both small and large. Students constructed 3-D cellular models, water and soil samples were collected and tested for cellular life, and Krista and Rob studied muscle fatigue by making a documentary starring Lactic Acid Man and various students and staff. Following a genetics unit, several students researched and wrote position papers on genetic issues such as genetic animal cruelty, toxic dumping and legalization of steroid use for athletes.

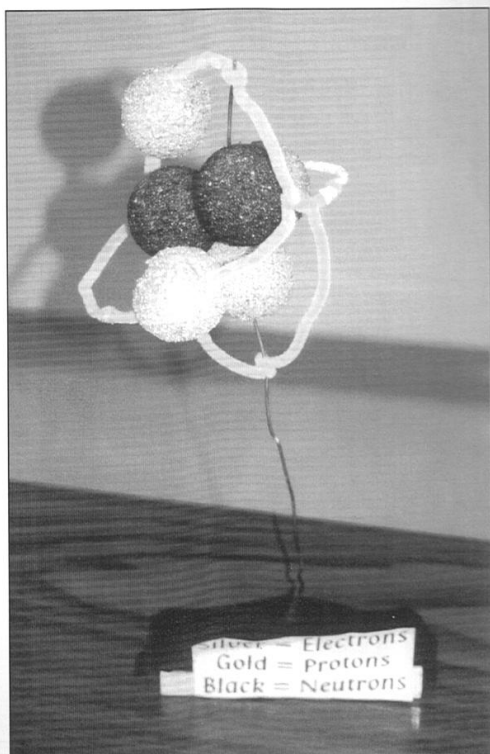

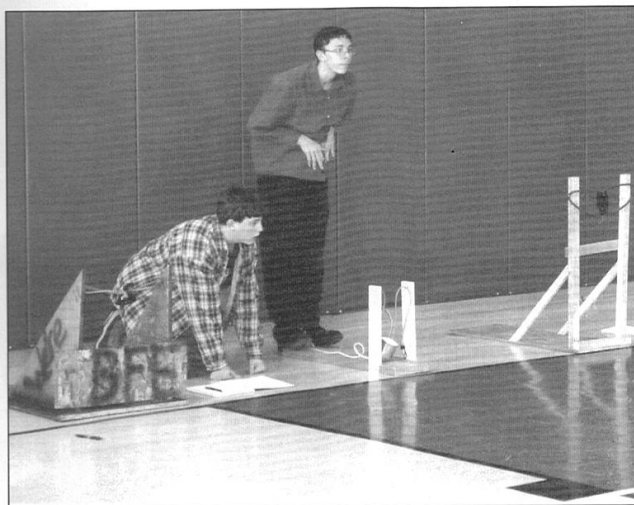
Math students kept busy working on projects. All students participated in a Math in Music Distance Learning program from Cleveland Institute of Music. The Algebra students worked on linear graphing and had to calculate the slopes of hills of roller coasters from around the country then as a culminating project, had to design their own roller coaster. Krista became an "architect for a day" and designed a garden patio. Skyler designed a 2-story house, then built a plywood model using the skills of perimeter and area. The Pre-Algebra students traced stock values for chosen companies over a period of 1 month and "invested" \$5,000 each. Some made money and some lost money!

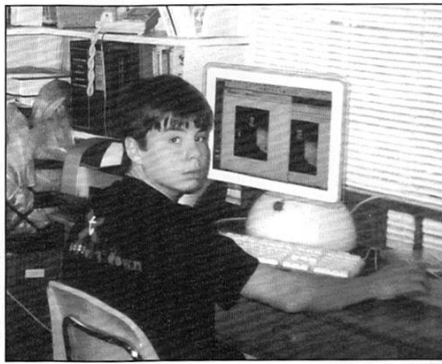

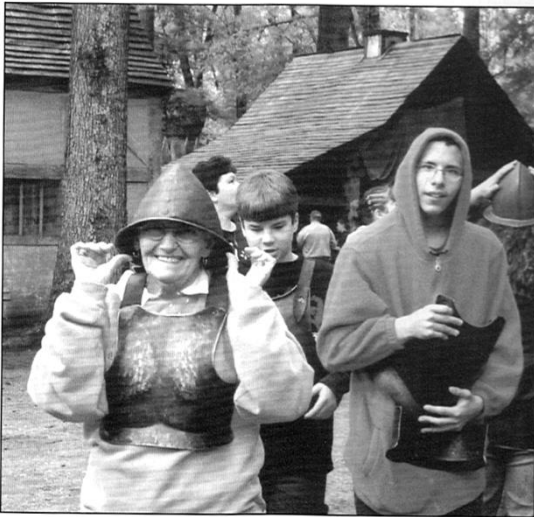
