KIHA Received Grants to Address Drainage Issues For The Church and Parsonage

Last spring, the abundant rain that fell on Kelleys Island caused the crawl space under the church to fill with water. In addition, a continual water problem at the parsonage became worse. During the summer we applied for two grants from Erie County Foundations to provide for sump pumps and drains to pipe any accumulating water to the storm sewer which runs in front of the museum property along Division Street.

We received a grant from the Frost-Parker Foundation for \$6300 to provide drainage for the church. We also received a grant from the Erie County Community Foundation for \$7500 to provide drainage for the parsonage. It is the KIHA Board's hope that these drains will solve the water problems at both the church and the parsonage. We thank both foundations for their contributions to this effort.

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Jeff Vargo is mortaring up the church wall one foot from bedrock to retard water seepage.

ARTIFACTS AND COLLECTIONS

GOOD NEWS - Our website now contains an inventory of our COLLECTION in a searchable database. Just go to *Our Collection* and discover the treasures in our archives. Of course, it is not yet complete, we still have hundreds of items that are in the process of being inventoried, so check back regularly to see what we have added.

Be sure to explore *It's a Mystery* on our website too. This is where we are putting pictures of those items that we cannot identify, because, well, it's a mystery who or what they are. These are the NEW ITEMS that came in since our last newsletter:

JOHN OHLEMACHER donated photographs of ice boats and sail boats, a plat map from 1942, a map from the 1890 Atlas, The Saga of the Tin Goose first edition, and miscellaneous articles about the quarry and railroad.

DIANE HUGHES NICKLES donated a Baseball uniform – worn by her Uncle Ossie in 1932. He and his wife, Mary Augusta Hughes McKillips, were born on the Island and lived here their whole lives.

MOLLIE TEMPLE SEVCIK of Boardman Ohio donated a wonderful collection of Dwelle family photos including: Capt. Alonzo Dwelle; two baby girls, Edna Dwelle and Anna Dwelle; S. S. Dwelle (Sylvester S.); woman standing in field holding two baskets, believed to be Mina Dwelle after picking grapes; man sitting on glacial grooves with railroad in the background; Alonzo Dwelle's house on the east side with ice piled up in front; woman in bathing outfit, Jessie (Dwelle) Strack (She did not know how to swim so she would make a balloon out of the shirt and float on it); and the *Olcott* breaking through the ice. Also in the collection are two wonderfully old items: a New Year's Ball ticket for the Island House from 1862. "Your attendance is respectfully solicited. Committee: E. Huntington, J. T. Woodford, M. Lincoln Fred'k Kelley. Floor manager – Hamilton Hays. Tickets, \$2.00;" and an Independence Party ticket for Kelley's Hall July 3, 1863, "Yourself and Lady are respectfully invited. Committee: M. Lincoln, H. Cattanach, J. McGettigan, D. Morris. Floor managers – John Stone, H. Hays. Tickets, \$2.00." Lastly, a genealogy and history of the Dwelle Family in America, starting with Richard Dwelle who came from England to Watertown Mass. Before 1654.

KELLY JOHNSON of Toledo Ohio - Map of the cemetery dated 1950.

SHIRLEY A. MCKILLIPS – A wood box "Crafted in the dark cold winter." Believed to be cut out with a pocket knife. Made by Herman Geysberger/Geisburger."

MICKEY WIDENER – A photograph of Johnny Widener in the cockpit of the Ford Tri-Motor airplane, in the Fall of 1965.

SALLY SMITH MALISON – A small painting of the steamboat dock and a photograph of four children: Marilyn Blatt, "Bunny" Smith, Don Erne, and "Sally" Smith, eating peaches in a wheel barrow.

BETTY LANGE DOMECK - A Marriage License/certificate for John W. Lange and Lizzie Rohrs, who were married on April 7, 1892.

SOME OF OUR MORE INTERESTING QUERIES

Craig Carey posed this question: I think I can remember a time when Kelleys island was dry, or at least didn't have any bars on it, am I correct and if so when was it? We responded: To the best of my knowledge, the island (whether it was a township or a village) was never dry - EXCEPT, of course, during Prohibition. Reports of court cases where a person was cited for selling liquor without a license date back well into the mid 1800's.

There is a procedure for voting a precinct dry which requires the majority vote of the voters and input by the businesses that currently serve liquor. That would have been something that everyone would remember. Does anyone have a better answer for Craig?

A recent museum visitor was looking for information on Dr. Haas, who was on the island around 1920. He married Mable Marquis. Their son Glen married Mariam Reinheimer. While at the museum he ran into Judy DuShane, who also was connected to his family. What were the chances? Dr. Haas died of a heart attack at Lakeside after travelling across the ice.

Tom Heckman caught up with us at the Art Show. He is connected to the Stokes and Foley families on the island. How are you connected – Old island roots or new green sprouts? Maybe you have old family histories or perhaps you are making new family memories. How are you connected to Kelleys Island?

NEWS FROM THE PAST – ITEMS WE HAVE POSTED ON OUR WEBSITE

November 1861 - The subscriber, having a barn full of well cured hay, that the dews of heaven never touched since it was first cut, desires to inform the poor, half starved horses and horned cattle of this neighborhood through their human owners, that it is most all for sale...at the barn, casks down as soon as weighed, or \$20 per ton on three months time, with good security.

Now fellow citizens, do not oblige the good old Mrs. Brindle this cold winter to steal her living in the streets, eating the straw all out of her aristocratic neighbor's sleigh and wagons and ready to dodge in at any pair of bars left open to annoy the biped part of the population. But give her good honest living for her milk and butter by getting, as soon as possible, a good load of hay as is this hay.

December 1861 - The week now about to close, usually a lively and pleasant one being the commencement of the holidays, has passed off we believe, to the entire satisfaction of all the citizens of the Island and particularly so, to the recipients of the annual visit of Old Santa Claus, who has been unusually bountiful and lavish with his gifts to his favorites. The little children, yes and the large children too, came for a goodly share of his generosity. How much of this was due to their labors in the vineyard last fall, the Old Saint has not informed us. This, however, is pretty generally conceded to be one of his fundamental rules; to deal out, in proportion to the merits of each particular recipient of his favors. Laziness, prodigality and selfishness usually proving a sufficient bar to keep him from them altogether. Be wise then ye little ones, and let him have no cause to pass you by when another Christmas shall have come.

VISITORS FROM AROUND THE WORLD

We always invite people to sign our guest book – we love to see where they are from. This year was a banner year for visitors. In all, 1824 people signed in, which is an increase of 45% over last year. From the U. S., our visitors came from such far flung places as: Arizona, California, Georgia, Idaho, Kansas, Maryland, Minnesota, New Jersey, New York, N and S Carolina, Oklahoma, Tennessee, Vermont, Virginia, Washington, and Wyoming.

But we also entertained visitors from Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, England, Russia and Scotland. We like to think they came just to see our little museum. So many people wrote in the book that they enjoyed the museum and were impressed with the personal attention our volunteers gave them.
