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Winter Accomplishments for KIHA

Frozen Pipes Burst at The KIHA Museum



On January 10th, several of us were meeting at The Museum to prepare the winter newsletter. Chuck's account of the event follows. "As I entered the building I became immediately aware that we had a problem. I walked into two inches of water and what turned out to be cellulose fiber all over the floor. I ran to the back where I saw and heard water spurting from pipes overhead. I ran to the other end, located the water shut off and cut the supply. The ceiling in the work area in the northeastern corner and out to the mid section in front of the garage door was falling down or had already fallen. On top of the drywall we had about 12 inches of cellulose insulation. That was all over the place, covering up much of the material stored in that part of the building. I opened the door and tried to squidgy water out. That worked for awhile but a snow drift blocked the flow. We called **Bobby Skeans** to bring **Gary Finger's** plow truck down to clear the way out for the water. Both my plow truck and Steve James' were not functioning. We called Steve, he and Patti arrived on the scene, followed by **Bernie Koshla** who heard the need through EMS radio call to Bobby. For the next couple of hours we managed tocontinued on next page

Continued from pg. 1 ... to get most of the water out of the museum and work area. Drywall and wet cardboard were thrown out onto a pile behind the museum. That was followed by wet cellulose insulation. Nothing was harmed in the museum area because most artifacts are up on stands or hang on the walls.

In the back area some materials of value were destroyed or rendered functionless. Our collections managed to do ok. There was some damage to items for the gift shop and materials stored for next year's yard sale were more or less trashed.

The pipes that failed were the feeders to the back sink, thin brittle plastic partially buried in cellulose insulation. The pipes were not protected enough to withstand the fifty below wind chill, froze, split open and released the water on thawing out. Steve and Patti had been in the building the late afternoon of the day before the break and saw no problem then. We are lucky it did not go on longer. After the initial water removal we saw that any building heat would chimney out through the damaged or missing ceiling. Photos were taken and then lunch.

I located tarps to cover the ceiling and Cindy and I returned to meet Patti and Steve. We worked until dark shoveling and sweeping, bagging, hauling, and sorting or saving what we could from the northeast quadrant. The pendant drywall with its overburden of wet cellulose was brought down and tarps stapled in place to minimize heat loss." A big thanks to all of the island people who came immediately to help. Insurance has been contacted and connections made. As I write this, the drywall damage has been repaired and the room repainted. Then KIHA members and volunteers will need to clean and reorganize as well as prepare the new exhibits for the 2014 season.



Frances Minshall is Remembered Fondly

Frances Minshall was a charter member of The Kelleys Island Historical Association. Sadly, she passed away on a crisp, cold morning, March 2nd, 2014, on Kelleys Island.

She loved Kelleys Island and her many friends she developed here over the years. She spent a great deal of time on the island with her husband and three sons. In the latter years she has been seen frequently volunteering at The Historical Museum and in the park selling raffle tickets for the annual quilt made by **Board Member Terri Betzenheimer Behrends**. Terri commented that Franny loved dogs. Most of the time the family had Chesapeake Bay Retrievers and Franny took them everywhere. When working the Park Quilt Raffle, her dog was under the table. Terri reports that one of the biggest worries after The New Museum was built was a sign that said "No dogs allowed" No one wanted to be the person that said she would have to leave her dog at home. We will surely miss her."

Franny's passions were catching as we shared time with her over the years. I remember watching her pit cherries and then make great pies, then freeze more for winter baking. I do that now...and whenever I make a pie, I think of her. She also introduced us to cherry tomatoes and every spring would be certain I had cherry tomatoes plants. She gave us ever-bearing raspberries to grow, and when I needed more, I ordered that variety. She taught us that a weeny roast can be elegant and so fun. She had them annually in front of her island home. She taught us to eat well and not too much, (not all of us learned that skill, but still try) and to be an independent woman, and to give time of yourself, to volunteer. She commented to me a year ago, "Volunteer to tell "daytrippers" why KI History is so important to US History." She went on to say, "There is a certain pride one feels when you understand the people and the events that went on before your time. It makes you want to pass it on to the next generation. Besides it is also FUN."

Frances Minshall made me feel special and had the ability to get along well with her island friends as well as the elite of Washington.



Franny in the years from the fifties to the seventies was often seen as captain on the family boat *The Three Captains*. She had originally asked **Jake Martin** to take her out and teach her to drive the boat without family on board. She told me he was a great teacher.

Board Member Jeri Himmelein Yoest shares: "My first memory of Franny was of her pulling The Three Captains into Koster's dock, and walking up the bank to visit my grandmother Roela Himmelein on the porch of The Himmelein Hotel. She was probably dressed in a bikini top and khaki shorts, with that glorious blonde hair all akimbo from the boat ride. She wouldn't have carried a purse, because there would be no need for one: The keys to the boat would have been left in the ignition, and a comb for her hair would have been a silly convention for a boat captain (it should have been called *The Four Captains!*) She certainly had no need for an ID, as everyone knew Franny.

She walked with an air of confidence and competence, not the least encumbered by three little boys who were (almost) always in tow.

Recently she had become an advisor on The Oral History Project that we have undertaken at the Museum. She provided me with a book that was relevant to the topic, and helped develop the questions that will be the basis of upcoming interviews. This endeavor, of course, led to reminisce about **Franny's** life on Kelleys Island, and she cackled with delight at her memories of escapades with **Lizzie Martin**, and a particular twinkle in her eye as she told of her memory of the boisterous *shivarre* that was held for **Bob** and **Bibber Overcasher**.

I once told her that I considered her to be part of the wall-paper of my life: constant, out of mind but always in the-background, lovely and unassuming, lending color and texture to the scene. She nodded at this, accepting my intention that she be complimented."

After high school, Ruth went to New York, stayed with her aunt, and went to beautician school. Ruth worked in Sandusky for a short time, married my **Uncle Bill(Hops)** and when he came back from the World War II, he built her a beauty shop behind their home on Woodford Road. She cut hair for all the summer people and islanders for many many years, and when she closed the shop, she would go to people's homes to take care of their hair cuts and more. Ruth worked the morning shift at *Bag The Moon*, and at noon would walk down the hill to see her sister, **Dawn Kekelik**, who worked at *The Casino*. She would have a cup of coffee (or maybe a short beer) and a cigarette, before she would go home to sit on the porch, waving to everyone that went by.

Ruth always carried a Crown Royal bag for a purse, which held her cigarettes and a little money. She loved to go to *The Village Pump*, and **Gary** even put a special chair for her outside the kitchen so she could have a cigarette, and not have to stand outside the front door with all the "hoodlums". In her last years she lived with my cousin, **Nancy Olwill,** who took wonderful care of her. She loved Kelleys Island, as we all do, and never wanted to leave. She is buried on Kelleys Island by her husband, Bill, and her son, **Ned.** Terri lovingly reports; "We miss her terribly and loved her very much." Scow Lillie, Steamer Grandon, Steamer American Eagle. These boats did serve the island and surrounding areas.

2013-44 Robert Lehman - Collection of old Put-in-Bay Gazette newspapers and Kelleys Life newspapers

One of Frances Minshall's stories mentioned Shivaree. What is a Shivaree? Shivaree is an old custom involving a groom's male friends making a loud disturbance until the groom paid the men off with cigars and the boys with candy. Cowbells, horns, tin pans, and shotguns were used to create the aggravating noise .
