
OUR NEW GARDEN

Board Member Andrew Muskara graduates from Hawken



"I graduated from Hawken School on June 7th, 2015 after spending the last 4 weeks of my senior year working on my Hawken Project. Hawken Project is an option that seniors have to pursue something that interests them for the month prior to graduation. In my case, a couple of friends and I chose to build a log cabin in the woods behind my house in Gates Mills. This was quite a large task for the four of us to take on and originally we had planned to finish the cabin by June 3^{rd} ,

but we had a major setback after two of our close friends were killed in a car accident. By the time June 3rd came around we still had to build the roof, install the door and windows, and fill in the gaps between the logs with a mortar like substance called chinking. So we

continued working past our deadline and into the summer. We are currently piecing together the metal roof and we hope to have the whole cabin finished by July."

This is the log cabin that Andrew built as part of a school project.

Andrew is going to OSU. He is interested in history and

will continue his role as a Board Member for KIHA. We are thankful to have him.

Andrew was helpful with the current exhibit on Sport Fishing. He made a special trip to International Museum Day to help with the exhibit. We extend sympathy to him, classmates, and families of the young men killed in May.

YESTERDAY'S NEWS

August 1878 – "The [Himmelein] hotel is open during the bass fishing season, and boats, minnows, etc., can be procured by guests upon application. A new boat house has just been built near the hotel and is well supplied with small craft of the kind used by anglers. Fishermen will find the accommodations at the Himmelein house first-class in all respects. The hotel is only 3 minutes walk from the steamboat landing. There are water works on the grounds, and the house has all the modern improvements and conveniences. The rates are \$10.50 per week or \$2 per day."

May 1878 – "Our pound fishermen caught about 75 sturgeon this morning. They looked rather belligerent as they laid on the dock."

KELLEY, KELLEY'S, KELLEYS' or KELLY ISLAND - The spelling of the island's name has caused problems for islanders for many years. But it started in April 1864, when the gauntlet was thrown down by Cleveland newspapers on how to 'correctly' spell the name of Kelley's Island. There is no argument that the island was named after the Kelley family, but why is it so difficult for everyone to spell? Our current problem is the constant dropping of the second 'e' from the Village's name.

April 27 – "Kelley's Island or Kelley Island? - That's the question. The Cleveland Herald, in copying a couple of items from the Register, says: Will our usually correct friends of the Register allow us to criticize their use of one word? They should say Kelley Island, not Kelley's Island." The Register responded, "Certainly. But your criticism is mere assertion. You say 'they should say' so and not so, but adduce no argument or authority in support of your assertion. Now for the facts: The island in question was formerly, and within the memory of many of our citizens, the property of a man named Cunningham, and was then known as Cunningham's Island. Afterwards the island was purchased by the Messrs. Kelley, when the name was changed by a special act of the Legislature to 'Kelley's Island,' and annexed to Erie County, since which time it has ever been

known as 'Kelley's Island.' Will our friends of the Herald 'fall-in' and use the name of one of the most celebrated islands of Lake Erie correctly, or stick to their text?"

The Herald was not to be corrected and a few days later it was "Kelley's Island, or Kelley Island, again - We supposed a 'mere assertion' would instantly suggest to our well educated neighbor the impropriety of which we complain. Kelley's Island signifies the ownership of the island; that it belongs to a man named Kelley. The intention in such cases is to perpetuate a name, not the ownership. As the Register uses the name, it would appear that the island belongs to a Mr. Kelley. That is not true now, nor according to the Register's showing, was it ever true. The island was owned by two persons of the name Kelley, and assuming the name as the Register proposes to use it to be correct, the apostrophe is in the wrong place; it should be Kelleys' Island, not Kelley's Island. Any way you can fix it, the name is not right; it should be Kelley Island, taking its name from its former owners." Even the State wrestles with the spelling of the

The Editor of the Register was guick to correct the Herald reporter. "The Herald seems determined to stick to what it says should be the name of the beautiful island of Lake Erie, which forms a township of Erie county. If the editor of the Herald will take the trouble to turn to the local laws of Ohio. passed by the Legislature of 1842-3, page 300, he will there find an enactment of which the following is a copy:

'AN ACT, to attach Kelley's Island to the county of Erie.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio. That the Island in Lake Erie, formerly known as Cunningham's Island, now called Kelley's Island, and formerly part of the county of Ottawa, shall thereafter be attached to, and form part of, the county of Erie.'


Grammatically, the Herald is right and we have no doubt the name of the Island would have been written in the plural

possessive, if it had been generally known at that early day, that the Island was owned jointly by I. & D. [Irad & Datus] Kelley, instead of Mr. I. Kelley, alone. But the facts are, Mr. I. Kelley was never a resident of the Island and, as only Mr. D. Kelley was known as its proprietor, it was so written, and as we have both custom and law for it, it would not be good policy to change its name, unless by an enactment of the legislature.

In legal papers 'Kelley Island' would not stand before our courts, and it would be the height of nonsense for the people to write it in common-place business one way, and those who administer the law, another."

In 1994 my Aunt Sis, (Florence "Sis" McKillips) who at that time was on the Board of the Kelleys Island

The parsonage house has never had running water, there is a cistern under the house and a pump in the kitchen, and that is how they got their water. She never had an indoor bathroom until she was 90 years old and moved in with Bea.
