

ORAL HISTORIES - Board Member Jeri Himmelein Yoest has interviewed and transcribed several wonderful oral histories that can be found in the library of our museum. Please take time to come and read these fabulous oral histories. We are looking for more volunteers to work on this project. Some Kelleys Island notables that have been interviewed are Mary Ellen Bauman, Jake Martin, Florence "Sis" McKillips, and a joint interview with Paul Brown and, good friend, Fritz Ziegler. These are unique and very special recollections of an earlier time.

April 1, 1886 - "The Island, or rather the people thereof, seem to have awakened to the wants of life here below and gone to work with a will to prune and cultivate, and on every hand is heard the click of the shears, and as he passes the 'corners,' the entire absence of the loafer and corner holders convince him that the year's work has begun and the days of idleness have passed. The prospect for an abundant crop of grapes is flattering, while reports from all points indicate an increased demand for our growing crop of limestone.

There is but little interest felt here over the spring election, and the selection of the various officers will be, as usual, non-partisan. The question of purchasing a hearse by the township is the only question before the people likely to produce any division. Navigation can now be considered as fairly open."

Tarzan the dog postcard

We have a Mascot You probably know him as Tarzan the Talking Dog from the Casino

The Tarzan story from Kelleys Life printed in 2012 was only a part of his story. "During remodeling, workers made an unexpected discovery. A postcard was buried in a bottle under the floor boards. Inside the bottle was a postcard, picturing a dog named "Tarzan" with this message in the back: "Tarzan The Talking dog was killed by Frank Hamilton of Kelleys Island July 22nd, 1958". The dog belonged to Ray and Ann Tacke of Kelleys Island and he earned the reputation as a talking dog when he ordered a hamburger in New Orleans. He was an English Bulldog. We elected to have Tarzan as our mascot. We now have stuffed animal Tarzan pups in the gift shop. Come visit; children are encouraged to find Tarzan and hide him for others to find.





ABOUT THE LODGE AND THAT SCHOOL BELL -

We recently received this bell. It is 18" in diameter and 18" high and is suspended from a bracket on a post. It was in the Wendt's garden for years and Jim Miller arranged for the donation and transport of the bell to our museum. The bell is stamped Frederick Town Ohio and on the reverse side C D. According to the Fredricktown Historical Society, the J. B.

Foote Foundry produced these bells between 1850 and early 1900's. The foundry recently closed.

The earliest reference to a school bell on the Island was part of an article on the value of The Lodge, written in 1870. The debate contained pros and cons of the value of The Lodge, which met at the Store on the Corner every day. The issues involved the time that men spent in the store, the way everything smelled of tobacco, the men lounging on the counter on top of the merchandise, and the attraction to children to

eavesdrop on conversations. These debates were often more humorous than real, but always contained a grain of truth.

"It is well known that a great share of the male inhabitants of the Island are frequenters of the Lodge, or literally speaking, the so-called institution at the store of A. S. Kelley & Co., for the purpose of 'killing time.' With many persons this as a habit becomes chronic and they cannot help going there every day and passing away a share, at least, of their time, any more than they can go without eating. It has been so with myself. Many go immediately after breakfast, loaf around until about dinner time, come again in the afternoon and stay until supper time. If they are not found there again in the evening,



they have to be turned out when Jerry [Dean] locks up for the night. On rainy and stormy days the attendance at the Lodge is more numerous. As many of the irregular members turn out and attend, but on holidays (which by the way come oftener on this Island than at any other place I was in) there is a full attendance all day and such a jam as those who go to trade or for their mail can testify.

Now the question arises, what good comes from the institution? And are not the evil results apparent to every one? Is the time spent there used to the best advantage or in fact, to any good advantage? I claim the evil so far out balances the good that it is a serious damage as stated in the resolution. The injury sustained by each individual member is perhaps in proportion to the amount of time he spends at the Lodge. The damage to community is partly through the influence of members, partly from the fact that affairs of importance are neglected while in attendance at the Lodge, which affect others, and partly from the direct effect upon persons attending the store for purposes of business and upon children who like to listen to older persons, many times to things they ought not to hear or know, and often forgetting their errand or that the school bell has rung..."

February 3, 1887, a "petition to incorporate this township as a village is being circulated, and has already some 80 signatures. As an incorporated village we can get back 3/4 of the money paid under the Dow law, which would otherwise go into the county treasury – a sum which would pay all the expenses of the township. W. W. Bowen of your city will represent the petitioners before the Commissioners and as it only takes 30 signers under the law it is hard to see why the enterprise will not succeed."

THE ISLAND & PROHIBITION

Did you know that several Island wineries survived Prohibition by doing several things: They sold grapes, grape juice, Sacramental wine and kits to make Wine Vinegar. The instructions were clear and at one point in the instructions, the purchaser was cautioned to proceed to the next step as failure to do so would result in the production of an alcoholic beverage, which was, of course, against the law!

THE ISLAND HOUSE PITCHER

In the last newsletter we mentioned that Jane Wick donated this small

pitcher, likely pewter, and only 5 inches tall. It was blackened by a fire and partially cleaned. Written in script under the lip on the bowl is *Island House*. It is one of the serving pitchers used at the Island House Hotel before it burned to the ground in 1877. This is a remarkable piece and we consider it a very rare piece of the Island's history.

The disastrous fire of November 1, that destroyed the 102 room hotel owned by Jacob

Rush, was caused by a chimney fire. "The flames were first discovered issuing form the roof near one of the chimneys in the old part of the building. [This would have been the original Kelley home

onto which several additions had been made.] Every

effort was of course made to suppress the fire, but owing to the inadequate facilities for that purpose on the Island, the flames could not be checked and soon enveloped the entire

building...When it was seen that the flames could not be extinguished and that the house must inevitably be reduced to ashes, the Islanders turned their attention to saving the furniture, about 1/3 of which they succeeded in getting out of the burning building. The store of Erastus Huntington, near the hotel, caught fire several times and was only saved by the almost superhuman exertions of the bucket brigade."

Make sure you stop by the downtown park on Islandfest Saturday when we dedicate the Island's second Historic Marker celebrating the rich history of the Kelley Family and their home – The Island House.



The Kelleys Island Historical Assoc. was formed 30 years ago. Since then




our dedicated volunteers worked to actually build a modern museum. Leslie Korenko has worked all winter
