

History in the Making on Kelleys Island in Early winter

Tom Bartlett and Gary Finger are pictured here with King. In the last several weeks before the latest cold spell, this stunning bird called a Couch's Kingbird made history living in the cedar woods and around Finger's barn. According to The Cornell Lab of Ornithology, the Couch's Kingbird is a large brightly colored flycatcher of southern Texas and Mexico. It is similar to the more widespread Tropical Kingbird. The two were considered the same species for nearly one hundred years, but they can be separated by voice and subtle morphological characters. Tom Bartlett was able to set up a net and catch the bird to study it up close and obtain a few feathers to send to The Cleveland Museum of Natural History where a DNA test will be done.

While spending time on the island after the holidays, and while it was still relatively warm, Tom spotted several bluebirds, a loon, and a young Magnolia Warbler. Thanks to Gary and Jackie for their keen eyes and Tom Bartlett for his further study and love of birds. Remember to Like <u>Bird Kelleys Island</u> to keep up with all the Island birding news.

OUR VISITORS LAST YEAR - This was a banner year. We had at least 2114 visitors (counted from all those who signed in) and they came from at 25 states including Alaska, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Nevada, Nebraska, Arizona and Montana. Internationally – our reputation must have preceded us – we logged in travelers from Canada, Puerto Rico, Sweden, Netherlands, Germany, Scotland and France. And we are becoming a popular place for groups to visit. Our thanks to Leslie Korenko and Cindy Herndon for giving talks to some of these groups: The Boy Scouts, Laurel School, The Road Scholars, Shores & Islands, UAW Local 86, and Hawken School just to name a few.

OUR ONLINE PRESENCE – Leslie loves digging into statistics and she offers these: On Facebook we now have 727 followers! Our Website? Last year we had over 9000 visitors with 13,500 page views, 90% were first-time visitors and 33% were from Russia. 60% of our visitors are under 34, men make up 54% of our visitors, and 92% viewed our website on a desktop computer.

LEE & BARB SHADLE - 4 boxes of items covering a variety of subjects including magazines, The Firelands Pioneer (1900), Charter of the Kelleys Island Boat Club and constitution, photographs, vintage t-shirts, Newsletter – The Island Scene (1993, 94), aerial maps, Kelleys Life, Put-in-Bay Gazettes, and whole lot more we haven't had a chance to inventory yet. DOT SIMONDS - Scale, Meat Cleaver and hand crank meat grinder. CINDY HOLMES, Framed B&W photo of 17 ladies. JANE WICK – A small pitcher, likely pewter, blackened by a fire, partially cleaned, c1877, engraved "Island House." BILL & JUNE CAMPBELL, Kelleys Island School memorabilia including The Kelleys Island Book of Questions and Answers, written by the Students of Kelleys Island School, 1997-98, and school yearbooks. GERALDINE BETZENHIEIMER-Magazines containing articles about the Island, tourist brochures and ferry schedules, old Fun Finders, The School Spirit newspaper (1964/65), fishing knife, net needles, Maccabee medallion, photographs, promotional items from various bars, a Fire Dept. badge, 1972 plat map, letter from 1956 by Iva Erne describing the Island, War Ration Books, various hunting and trapping licenses issued to Lawrence Betzenheimer, and quite a bit more. LAURA RIEDY SMITH, a vintage souvenir sweatshirt and t-shirt. BARBARA WENDT, Kelleys Island school bell originally obtained from Frank Hamilton and given to Gordon Wendt.

KIHA RECEIVES AN AWARD - It was with great pleasure that we accepted an award from the Ohio Historical Records Advisory Board (part of the Ohio Historical Society State Archives) for our efforts in bringing our inventory online so that people could search the database. They wrote: "We commend the Association and volunteers for the strides that have been taken to gain intellectual control over the archival collections in your possession through inventorying and processing, which have resulted in both the ease of staff access to the collections and an increase in public access to the unique collections. You truly have shown how to successfully use the resources at your disposal to bring access to your collections to a

This past year, several people have used the online database to locate items relating to their families. We shared our system with other small area museums and they were excited to discover how easy it was to put THEIR inventory online. We were happy to share how we did it.

HISTORIC MARKER OPPORTUNITY



After dedicating our new marker, Leslie got another grant for the Village for the Kelley family home – The Island House - now the downtown park. The dedication of that marker will occur this summer. The good news is that there MAY BE MORE GRANTS AVAILABLE from the Pomeroy Foundation. If you would like to have a marker in YOUR yard, just let us know. We will review the sites that are submitted, and Leslie will write the grant for you. The Pomeroy Foundation pays the cost of the marker (about \$2400) and you would have to pay for the installation and ferry fees. Let us know if you are interested.

Ohio Historic Markers can be applied for by anyone, but require quite a bit of research. Markers chronicle important historical events and sites. Places to think about historic markers are The State Park old ice storage and stone oven, the fish dock on the north

side, or maybe even your home!


